CLEMSON TO MAKE 2018 ROAD DEBUT AT TEXAS A&M

The second-ranked Clemson Tigers will hit the road in search of the program's first win in the state of Texas since the 1959 Bluebonnet Bowl when the team faces Texas A&M on Saturday, Sept. 8. Kickoff from Kyle Field is scheduled for 7 p.m. ET.

Last week, Clemson opened its season with a 48-7 home win against Furman. Head Coach Dabo Swinney, who was celebrating his 200th career game with Clemson since joining the program as an assistant in 2003, was proud of his squad's efforts in all phases.

"We got better as the day went on and settled in," Swinney said. "The biggest thing was complementary football — offense, defense and special teams."

Indeed, all three phases contributed to the team's season opening victory. On offense, Clemson totaled 531 offensive yards, including 249 rushing yards and 282 passing yards. It represented the ninth time in Swinney's tenure that Clemson had reached at least 245 passing yards and 245 rushing yards in a single contest.

Defensively, the Tigers held Furman to 163 yards on 62 plays, an average of 2.6 yards per play. It marked the lowest yards-per-play average allowed by Clemson since holding Auburn to 1.8 yards per play in the second week of the 2017 season.

However, the victory was jumpstarted in part by momentum-building plays on special teams. Amari Rodgers recorded 87 yards on two punt returns, including returns of 25 and 62 yards that pushed Clemson to an early 10-0 lead.

WHAT TO WATCH FOR THIS WEEK

- Clemson and Texas A&M meeting for the fifth time in history.
- Clemson playing at Kyle Field in College Station for the third time in program history and the first time since 2004.
- Clemson playing in the state of Texas for the 12th time in school history.
- Clemson evening its all-time record in the state of Texas at 6-6 by collecting its first victory in the state since the 1959 Bluebonnet Bowl.
- Clemson earning its first victory at Kyle Field in program history.
- Clemson playing the featured College Gameday game for the 18th time in the show's history.
- Clemson improving to 11-7 in College Gameday contests. Clemson has won its last six games featured on College Gameday, dating back to 2016 (vs. Louisville, Ohio State and Alabama in 2016; vs. Louisville, Virginia Tech and Miami in 2017).
- Clemson winning its 50th road opener in program history. The Tigers are currently 49-65-8 all-time in their first road game of the year.
- Clemson winning its fourth straight road opener dating back to 2015. The 2018 senior class would become the first Clemson class to sweep all four of its road debuts since the 1989 seniors, who won all four road openers in the midst of the program's record streak of six consecutive road-opener victories from 1984-89.
- Clemson winning its fourth straight true road game against SEC opponents, which would represent the longest such streak in program history. The Tigers won road contests against South Carolina (2015 and 2017) and Auburn (2016), matching the program's longest stretch of road wins against SEC foes (three, all at South Carolina in both 1995-99 and 2003-07).
- Clemson securing its 14th victory in its last 15 true road games.
- Clemson earning its 22nd victory in its last 25 games away from home, including neutral site contests.
- Clemson opening a season 2-0 for a fourth straight year and for the eighth time in the last nine years.
- Clemson extending its winning streak in non-conference regular season play to 17 games. Dating back to 2014, Clemson's current 16-game winning streak in regular season non-conference games is already the longest such streak in program history.
- Clemson rushing for 200 yards in back-to-back games for the first time since a three-game span against Georgia Tech, NC State and Florida State in 2017. A second-straight 245-yard rushing game would give Clemson back-to-back 245-yard rushing performances since the third and fourth games of the 2017 season against Louisville and Boston College.
- Clemson posting consecutive games with at least 245 yards both in the air and on the ground for the first time since the final two games of the 2001 campaign against Duke and Louisiana Tech.
- Clemson throwing four or more touchdown passes in back-to-back games for the first time since the fifth and six games of the 2016 season against Louisville and Boston College.
- Clemson attempting to hold their first two opponents under 3.0 yards per play for a second straight season. Clemson held Kent State (2.4) and Auburn (1.8) under that figure to open the 2017 season and held Furman to 2.6 yards per play last week.
- Clemson winning the turnover margin in consecutive games for the first time since the ACC Championship Game and Fiesta Bowl during the 2016 campaign.

- Clemson forcing a turnover in a 10th consecutive contest, which would be the program's longest since opening the 2016 season with a takeaway in its first 10 games.
- Dabo Swinney improving to 14-9 as a head coach against SEC opponents. Clemson enters the contest having won seven of its last nine games against SEC foes, including five of the last six.
- Swinney becoming 1-0 against Texas A&M as a head coach.
- Swinney pushing his all-time record in road openers to 6-4.
- Swinney breaking a 4-4 all-time deadlock as a head coach against Texas A&M Head Coach Jimbo Fisher. A win would be Swinney's fourth consecutive victory against a Fisher-coached team, which would be the longest streak of victories by either coach in their meetings dating back to 2010.
- Swinney pushing his all-time record in non-conference play as a head coach to 38-13, including a 31-8 record against non-conference opponents in regular season play.
- Quarterback Kelly Bryant (286) needing two completions to pass Steve Fuller (287) for 11th-most career pass completions in school history.
- Bryant (286) completing nine passes to surpass his position coach, Brandon Streeter (294), to enter the Top 10 in career completions in Clemson history.
- Bryant (286) completing 14 passes to become only the 10th player in school history to complete 300 career passes (Tajh Boyd, Charlie Whitehurst, Deshaun Watson, Cullen Harper, Woodrow Dantzler, Nealon Greene, Kyle Parker, Rodney Williams and Tommy Kendrick).
- Quarterback Trevor Lawrence attempting to become the first Clemson quarterback to throw three touchdown passes in consecutive games since Deshaun Watson against South Carolina and Virginia Tech in 2016.
- Lawrence (217.2 last week) attempting to become the first Clemson quarterback (min. 10 att.) to post back-to-back games with a pass efficiency rating of 200.0 or better since Tajh Boyd's three-game stretch against Virginia, Georgia Tech and the Citadel in 2013.
- Kicker Greg Huegel (282) scoring seven points to pass Obed Ariri (288) for seventh-most career points in school history. Huegel can also pass James Davis (294) with 13 points on Saturday.
- Huegel (282) scoring 18 points to become the sixth player in school history to reach 300 career points, joining Chandler Catanzaro, Aaron Hunt, C.J. Spiller, Nelson Welch and Travis Zachery.
- Huegel (45) kicking three field goals to pass David Treadwell (47) for seventh-most made field goals in a career in school history.
- Huegel (45) kicking five field goals to join Nelson Welch, Chandler Catanzaro, Obed Ariri, Chris Gardocki, Aaron Hunt and Jad Dean as the only players to connect on at least 50 career field goals with Clemson.
- Huegel (147) making three PATs to become only the third kicker in Clemson history to record 150 career PATs (Chandler Catanzaro, 203; Aaron Hunt, 164).
- Tackle Mitch Hyatt (2,934) playing 66 snaps to become only the fifth player in school to play 3,000 career snaps from scrimmage (Dalton Freeman, Landon Walker, Kyle Young and Glenn Rountree).
- Hunter Renfrow (29) catching a pass to extend his streak of consecutive games played with a reception to 30.

ROAD OPENERS

On Saturday, Clemson will be in search of its 50th win in a road opener in program history. The Tigers are 5-4 in their road debuts under Head Coach Dabo Swinney.

This week will mark the eighth consecutive year that the Tigers have entered their road opener ranked in the AP Top 25, surpassing a seven-year stretch from 1987-93 for the longest streak in school history.

TIGERS IN TEXAS

Saturday's contest will mark Clemson's 12th game in the state of Texas in program history. A win on Saturday would even Clemson's all-time record in the Lone Star State at 6-6.

Clemson won its first game in the state of Texas on Jan. 1, 1940 in the Cotton Bowl. The Tigers defeated Boston College, 6-3, in Clemson's first win over a ranked team as the Eagles were ranked 11th in the nation with a 9-1 record entering the game. Frank Leahy, still the second-winningest coach in college football history with an .864 winning percentage, was the head coach at Boston College.

A win on Saturday would give Clemson its first victory in Texas since Frank Howard's 1959 Clemson squad defeated TCU, 23-7, in the Bluebonnet Bowl in Houston's Rice Stadium. That win against No. 7 TCU marked the highest-ranked team defeated by the Tigers in Howard's tenure.

SERIES HISTORY VS. TEXAS A&M

Clemson currently trails its all-time series against Texas A&M, 1-3, but won the programs' most recent meeting at Memorial Stadium in 2005.

The 2018-19 home-and-home series between Clemson and Texas A&M represents the third such home-and-home arrangement between the two schools in history. However, while Clemson has represented the Atlantic Coast Conference in each contest, Texas A&M has represented a different conference in all three sets of home-and-home series. The Aggies swept the Tigers as members of the Southwest Conference in 1973-74, and the two teams split a pair of games in 2003-04 during Texas A&M's membership in the Big 12 Conference. The 2018-19 games will be the teams' first meetings since Texas A&M's transition to the Southeastern Conference in 2012.

Included below is an overview of all four games contested between Clemson and Texas A&M all-time, with home games listed in **bold**:

CLEMSON-TEXAS A&M PARALLELS

Despite residing in different conferences, different states and different time zones, the historical similarities and parallels between Clemson University and Texas A&M University are striking.

Both institutions are land-grant universities, initially founded with primary focuses in the fields of agriculture, engineering and science. Clemson was founded as the Clemson Agricultural College of South Carolina in 1889 only 13 years after classes began at the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas in 1876.

Both schools are also famed for their military heritage. Clemson was an all-military school until 1955, while Corps of Cadets participation at Texas A&M was mandatory until 1965. Outside of the United States Military Academy at West Point, no schools in the country supplied more officers to the United States Army during World War II than Texas A&M and Clemson.

On the field, Clemson and Texas A&M are both known for their strong football traditions. For instance, Texas A&M entered 2018 with 732 all-time wins; Clemson has 729. The Tigers held a higher all-time winning percentage, .609 to .601.

Texas A&M has been ranked in the AP Top 25 a total of 436 times to Clemson's 420, but the Tigers hold a 10-6 edge over Texas A&M in all-time No. 1 rankings. The Tigers have 42 bowl game appearances to 39 for A&M, and Clemson also leads in conference championships, 23-19.

CLEMSON VS. SEC OPPONENTS

Clemson has enjoyed a recent run of success against opponents from the Southeastern Conference. The Tigers are 13-9 against SEC foes under the guidance of Head Coach Dabo Swinney.

Clemson's success against the SEC has been particularly pronounced as of late, as the Tigers are 7-3 against the conference in the College Football Playoff era, including a 6-1 mark in regular season play during that time frame. Clemson has won five of its last six against the SEC, including three in 2016, the most wins against SEC opponents in a single season in school history.

Clemson has won its last six regular season games against SEC opponents, including its last three true road games.

Swinney's 13 wins against SEC opponents date back to his final game as an interim coach, when he defeated South Carolina and Steve Spurrier, 31-14, at Clemson. That victory led to his hiring as Clemson's full-time coach the Monday after that victory.

Swinney's 13 non-conference wins against SEC teams are the most by any non-SEC coach since 2008. Current Texas A&M head coach Jimbo Fisher ranks second with 10 from his tenure at Florida, and Georgia Tech's Paul Johnson ranks third with eight.

Swinney's list of wins against SEC teams includes five over Top 25 teams, four of which have come against Auburn since 2011. Swinney's list of wins over SEC teams include five over South Carolina (including four in a row), four over Auburn, and one each over Kentucky, LSU, Georgia and Alabama. So he has already beaten six different SEC programs in his nine previous years as Clemson head coach. A win over Texas A&M on Sept. 8 would be a seventh different SEC program.

LAST MEETING VS. TEXAS A&M

Clemson 25, Texas A&M 24

(Sept. 3, 2005, Clemson, S.C)

Jad Dean set a school record with six field goals, including the game-winner with two seconds left to give Clemson a dramatic 25-24 win over 17th-ranked Texas A&M in the 2005 season opener at Memorial Stadium. It was Clemson's first win over a ranked team in a season opener since 1959.

Clemson won the game without the benefit of an offensive touchdown, but did gain 396 yards of total offense (183 yards rushing and 213 passing). Clemson's only touchdown came on a 47-yard punt return by Chansi Stuckey.

The Tigers also won the game despite an injury to fourth year starting quarterback Charlie Whitehurst. Will Proctor came off the bench to run the Clemson offense to the victory in the second half. At one point Proctor led the Tigers on a 96-yard drive that took 7:46 off the clock, leading to an 18-yard field goal by Dean.

Texas A&M took a 24-22 lead in the fourth quarter, but the Tigers had a final drive. With freshman back James Davis running the ball on eight consecutive plays at one point, the Tigers moved the ball to the Texas A&M 25. That set up a field goal attempt for Dean from 42 yards and the junior delivered for the sixth time in six attempts in the game with just two seconds left on the clock.

The kick was the latest game winner by a Tiger since 1987 (David Treadwell vs. Georgia), and he became the first Clemson player to kick six field goals in a game.

True freshman running back Davis finished with 101 yards rushing on 19 carries. He became the first Clemson freshman to rush for 100 yards in his first game since 1945 and was named the ACC Rookie of the Week. Clemson controlled the clock for 37:58, the

most time of possession for the Tigers in the Tommy Bowden era.

TAKING ATTENDANCE

The current record for the most people in attendance for a Clemson football game at any site is 92,476, set in 2014 at Georgia's Sanford Stadium. Texas A&M's Kyle Field features a seating capacity of 102,733, making Saturday's crowd potentially the first six-figure crowd in the history of Clemson football.

Clemson has played 13 contests in front of crowds of 85,000 or more in school history. While Clemson holds only a 4-9 record in those contests, the Tigers have won each of the last three games in front of crowds of 85,000 or more, including home wins against South Carolina (2014) and Florida State (2015) and a road win at Auburn (2016).

- No. 2 Clemson defeated Furman, 48-7, in front of an announced crowd of 80,048 at Memorial Stadium on Saturday.
- Clemson has now won 44 of their last 47 games, dating back to 2014.
- Clemson improved to 92-23-8 all-time in season openers.
- Clemson improved to 93-17-8 all-time in home openers and has now won 15 straight home openers, with the last home-opening loss coming to Georgia in 2003 in Dabo Swinney's first game as an assistant coach at Clemson.
- Clemson improved to 29-0 since 2015 when scoring first.
- Clemson improved to 43-10-4 against Furman all-time.
- Clemson opened a season against Furman for the ninth time in program history. The Tigers are now 9-0

all-time against Furman in season openers, including victories to begin the 1896, 1915, 1916, 1964, 1979, 1989, 1994, 1998 and 2018 campaigns.

- Clemson won its 31st consecutive contest against Furman and extended its unbeaten streak against the Paladins to 32 consecutive games. The last tie between the two teams occurred in 1937, and the most recent Furman victory in the series came during the 1936 campaign. Clemson's 31-game winning streak against Furman is its longest active winning streak against any opponent.

- Clemson extended its winning streak in non-conference regular season play to 16 games. Dating back to 2014, Clemson's current 16-game winning streak in regular season non-conference games is the longest such streak in program history.

- Clemson won its ninth consecutive game at Memorial Stadium, dating back to a 56-7 win against South Carolina on Nov. 25, 2016. It marks Clemson's third home winning streak of at least nine games in Dabo Swinney's tenure as head coach (21 from 2013-16, 13 from 2011-12).

- Clemson accrued 531 offensive yards, including 249 rushing yards and 282 passing yards. It marked the ninth time in Swinney's tenure that the team eclipsed 245 yards both on the ground and through the air.

- Clemson's 249 rushing yards were the team's third most in a season opener under Swinney (366 in 2017, 320 in 2012).

- Clemson held Furman to 163 total yards on 62 plays, an average of 2.6 yards per play. It marked the lowest yards-per-play average allowed by Clemson since holding Auburn to 1.8 yards per play on Sept. 9, 2017. Clemson has held opponents to 2.6 or fewer yards per play 10 times since 2014.

- Clemson allowed only 46 passing yards, marking the 10th time under Swinney that the Tigers have held an opponent to 50 or fewer passing yards.

- Clemson had a 23-13 advantage in total first downs and has now posted a 75-2 record since 2011 when recording more first downs than their opponent.

- Clemson won the turnover margin for the 43rd time since 2011 and improved to 40-3 when winning the turnover margin in that timeframe.

- Clemson eclipsed the 200-yard rushing mark in a game for the 47th time under Swinney. The Tigers are now 46-1 when rushing for 200-plus yards in Swinney's tenure.

- The victory was Clemson's 57th consecutive win when holding an opponent under 23 points, a streak that dates back to 2010.

- Clemson has now won 30 of their last 31 games at Memorial Stadium.

- The victory was Clemson's 14th straight victory in games played in September.

- Clemson won its 53rd game in its last 55 contests against unranked opponents.

- Clemson remained undefeated against Football Championship Subdivision opponents, pushing the school's all-time record against FCS teams to 33-0.

- Swinney improved to 2-0 all-time against Furman as a head coach, including victories in 2012 and 2018.

- Swinney extended his record in season openers as head coach to 9-1.

- With the victory, Swinney tied Danny Ford (nine) for the second-most season-opening victories in Clemson history, trailing only Frank Howard (25) in program annals.

- Swinney pushed his all-time record in non-conference play as a head coach to 37-13, including a 30-8 record against non-conference opponents in regular season play.

- Quarterback Kelly Bryant recorded his 15th career start and passed for 132 yards (11-of-17) and a touchdown. Bryant also recorded the 15th rushing touchdown of his career on a 35-yard run.

- Quarterback Trevor Lawrence was 9-14 for 137 yards and three touchdowns. Lawrence joined Deshaun Watson as the only true freshmen in program history to throw three touchdown passes in a game.

- Running back Travis Etienne recorded his first career start, rushing for 63 yards on 11 carries, including a 7-yard touchdown run in the second quarter.

- Clemson opened the scoring with a 40-yard touchdown pass from Bryant to wide receiver Amari Rodgers. The touchdown pass was the 15th of Bryant's career and the first receiving touchdown of Rodgers' career.

- Rodgers finished with a career-high 49 receiving yards and 87 punt return yards plus a five-yard rush for a career-best 141 all-purpose yards.

- Rodgers averaged 43.5 yards on two punt returns, the third-highest single-game average by a Clemson returner with at least two returns since 2000 (Jacob Ford, 47.0 vs. Florida Atlantic in 2006; Ray Ray McCloud, 44.0 at NC State in 2017).

- The touchdown pass was Bryant's sixth career touchdown pass of 40 or more yards.

- Rodgers recorded a 62-yard punt return in the first quarter, the longest punt return by a member of the Tigers since Ray-Ray McCloud's 77-yard return against NC State in November 2017.

- Kicker Greg Huegel matched his career-long by converting a 49-yard field goal in the second quarter, matching his previous best set against Louisville in 2017.

- Lawrence recorded the first passing touchdown of his career on a six-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver Diondre Overton, the second receiving touchdown of his career.

- The touchdown pass from Lawrence to Overton was the culmination of an 11-play, 95-yard drive. It was the longest drive by distance by Clemson since a 95-yard touchdown drive against Syracuse on Nov. 5, 2016.

- Etienne recorded his 14th career rushing touchdown in the second quarter.

- Wide receiver Cornell Powell recorded a career-long 42-yard reception in the second quarter.

- Wide receiver Justyn Ross recorded his first career touchdown reception on a 15-yard pass from Lawrence in the third quarter. The drive was the culmination of a touchdown drive that covered 92 yards in three plays, with all 92 yards gained by true freshmen.

- The 92-yard, three-play scoring drive marked the fewest plays needed for Clemson to go 90-plus yards since a two-play, 95-yard drive against Syracuse on Nov. 5, 2016.

- Clemson led at halftime, 27-0. Dating back to last season, Clemson has shut out its opponents in the first half of five of its last six games (27-0 vs. Furman, 21-0 vs. Miami, 20-0 vs. South Carolina, 38-0 vs. The Citadel, 17-0 vs. Florida State).

- Clemson led 41-0 through three quarters. Clemson is now 75-2 since 2011 when leading after three quarters.

- Wide receiver Hunter Renfrow extended his streak of consecutive games with a catch to 29 games.

- Wide receiver Derion Kendrick recorded his first career reception a 38-yard pass from Bryant. On the play, Bryant surpassed 3,000 career passing yards, becoming the 15th player in Clemson history to reach the mark.

CHASING 100

Head Coach Dabo Swinney can vividly recall the looks he received when he said Clemson was on the cusp of the winningest decade in program history following a 2010 campaign in which the Tigers finished 6-7. In 2017, that vision became a reality with two seasons to spare when Clemson collected its 88th win of the decade in the ACC Championship Game against Miami to surpass the 1980s Tigers (87) for the most wins in any decade in school history.

With 12 wins in 2018, the Clemson can reach triple digits in wins in a decade for the first time in program history.

SWINNEY FOURTH COACH TO REACH 100 WINS IN FIRST 10 YEARS

When Dabo Swinney and the Tigers defeated South Carolina, 34-10, in the final regular season game of 2017, it gave Swinney 100 wins in his first 10 years as a head coach. Swinney accomplished the feat despite his first season as a head coach being limited to seven games after assuming the Interim Head Coach title six games into the 2008 campaign.

He became just the fourth coach to reach 100 wins in his first 10 years, joining Bob Stoops, Chris Petersen and Urban Meyer.

Entering 2018, Clemson had equaled or exceeded its postseason AP and USA Today rankings in comparison to its preseason rankings each of the last seven years. That included quite an accomplishment in 2016, as finished No. 1 by winning the national championship to exceed the school's No. 2 preseason ranking.

Clemson has exceeded its preseason ranking each of the last seven years in the USA Today coaches poll and has exceeded its preseason ranking in the AP poll six of the seven. Clemson was picked No. 8 in the AP preseason poll in 2013 and finished No. 8. Dabo Swinney is the first head coach in history with a seven-year streak in that area. John Cooper (Ohio State) and Bill Snyder (Kansas State) had five-year streaks.

Clemson's status as an elite producer of pro talent has been inarguable in recent years, particularly at wide receiver, where the school has adopted the moniker of "Wide Receiver U" (or #WRU in hashtag form).

An independent analysis by TigerIllustrated.com in August highlighted Clemson's seven wide receivers drafted from 2013-18, the most from any school. It provides a legacy and a foundation upon which Clemson's talented 2018 receiving corps — one co-offensive coordinator Jeff Scott said contains nine plausible starters — to build.

"Get your cameras ready for this year and beyond. Because there's a good chance more history will be made," wrote TigerIllustrated's Larry Williams. "The headlines and cover stories now are about the defensive line. But celebrity status is fast approaching for these receivers."

#75 MITCH HYATT, OT

While the return of the members of Clemson's ballyhooed defensive line generated a majority of the team's offseason headlines, Clemson's offensive line returned its own first-team All-American in left tackle Mitch Hyatt. In July, Hyatt was the leading vote-getter in the preseason All-ACC selection process, appearing on a conference-high 130 of 148 possible ballots, 28 more votes than ACC Preseason Player of the Year AJ Dillon.

Hyatt, a three-year letterman out of Suwanee, Ga., entered the 2018 campaign with 43 games, 42 starts and 2,885 snaps to his credit, helping Clemson to an ACC title and College Football Playoff berth in each of his first three seasons.

The group, known affectionately as the Power Rangers following the unit's Halloween costumes of choice in 2016, includes ends Austin Bryant and Clelin Ferrell and tackles Dexter Lawrence and Christian Wilkins.

The group's return alone made college football history. Clemson's 2018 squad will be the first in the sport's history to feature four returning All-Americans on the defensive line.

Clemson entered the 2018 season looking to replace primary 2017 punt returner Ray-Ray McCloud, who ranked seventh in the FBS in punt return average (12.1) a season ago. In camp, wide receiver Amari Rodgers separated as the team's top option at punt returner, and Rodgers immediately rewarded the coaching staff's faith in the team's 48-7 season-opening win vs. Furman.

Rodgers' first return of the game went for 25 yards, setting up an ensuing drive that saw him score the team's first points of the season on a 40-yard touchdown reception. On his next return, Rodgers recorded a career-long 62-yard return to finish the day with a 43.5-yard return average.

Through Week 1, Clemson ranks No. 1 in the FBS in punt return average, and Rodgers ranks No. 2 in the category among individual averages.

CLEMSON, S.C. — No. 2 Clemson opened its 2018 campaign in dominant fashion, defeating the Furman Paladins by a score of 48-7 at Memorial Stadium.

Offensively, the Tigers amassed 531 yards, leading a balanced attack that eclipsed 250 passing yards and 250 rushing yards on the day. On the defensive side of the ball, the Tigers limited the Paladins to just 2.6 yards per play and 163 total yards.

The Tigers opened the scoring midway through the first quarter on a Kelly Bryant 40-yard touchdown pass to Amari Rodgers, marking the first career score for the sophomore wideout. Bryant would later add a 35-yard rushing touchdown as well, while Rodgers would finish the contest with a career-high 141 all-purpose yards, including 87 yards on two punt returns.

Freshman quarterback Trevor Lawrence threw three touchdown passes in his debut, hitting Diondre Overton, Justyn Ross and Braden Galloway for touchdowns in the second, third and fourth quarters, respectively.

Clemson's shutout bid was denied with just over a minute remaining in the game, when Furman scored on a 16-yard touchdown pass from quarterback Darren Grainger to Ryan DeLuca.

Clemson kicker Greg Huegel recorded 11 points in his return from a knee injury, connecting on two field goals (including a career-high-tying 49-yarder) and five of the team's six PATs on the day.
