### CLEMSON OPENS 125TH SEASON SATURDAY AT WAKE FOREST

After an offseason of unexpected twists and turns, Clemson will kick off the 125th season in program history on Saturday, Sept. 12, when the team faces the Wake Forest Demon Deacons. Kickoff at Truist Field is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. ET.

Clemson's prolific run in the last decade has illuminated a pathway to a number of historical feats that can be accomplished in 2020, but the road to those accomplishments begins with the team's first stated goal: "Win the Opener."

Clemson has won the opener in 10 of Dabo Swinney's 11 full seasons as Clemson's head coach, including each of the last five since 2015. This year marks Clemson's first time opening a season on the road since 2016, when second-ranked Clemson defeated Auburn, 19-13, at Jordan-Hare Stadium to kick off an eventual national championship campaign.

Members of Clemson's program wore shirts in camp bearing the term "2020 Vision" on the front (with the zeroes represented by All In chips) and "Double-Double Mission" on the back, signifying Clemson's pursuit of a 10th straight 10-win season. With 10-plus wins this year, Clemson would join Florida State and Alabama as the only programs ever to accomplish the feat.

The feeling was different at Clemson's first camp practice on Aug. 6. While a workmanlike mentality often permeates camp, the joy of players and coaches being able to do what they love again — after having it ripped away for several months — imbued practice with a noticeable sense of joy.

"As weird as it is, I've never had more fun in a football

camp than this one," Swinney said on Aug. 10. "And I've never seen a bunch of guys have more fun practicing football than this team. I think that's a reflection of a deeper appreciation that we all have to do what we do."

Clemson's 2020 offense received an unexpected boost in January when All-America running back Travis Etienne elected to return for his senior season. In the College Football Playoff National Championship Game last year, Etienne (4,038) became Clemson's all-time leading rusher and moved into seventh all-time in ACC history.

Etienne is the two-time defending ACC Player of the Year, becoming Clemson's first repeat winner since 1977-78. If Etienne were to earn the award again in 2020, he would become the first player in conference history to win ACC Player of the Year honors three times and would join Herschel Walker (1980-82 SEC Player of the Year) as the only Power Five conference players to win conference player of the year honors in three straight seasons.

# NOTES

## WHAT TO WATCH FOR IN 2020

- Clemson, which is already the first team in ACC history to win five consecutive outright titles, attempting to become the first team in ACC history to win six consecutive ACC titles outright. (Note: Florida State earned at least a share of nine consecutive ACC titles from 1992-2000 but never earned more than three consecutive titles outright.)

- Clemson attempting to become the first team in any active conference to win six consecutive outright conference titles. Clemson's five consecutive outright titles from 2015-19 are tied with the 1971-75 Alabama Crimson Tide and 2015-19 Oklahoma Sooners for the longest streak of outright conference championships of any current conference.

- Clemson attempting to become the first program to win 20 ACC titles. Since helping form the conference in 1953, Clemson leads the ACC with 19 titles all-time, including 18 outright.

- Clemson attempting to become the third team in the BCS Championship and College Football Playoff eras to play in three consecutive national championship games. (Note: USC played for three consecutive national championships from 2003-05, but finished No. 1 in the AP Poll in 2003 after playing in the Rose Bowl instead of the Sugar Bowl, which had been designated as the

National Championship).

- Clemson attempting to become the first team ever to earn six consecutive College Football Playoff berths. Clemson's five-year streak is the longest active streak and is tied with Alabama's five-year streak from 2014-18 for the longest all-time.

- Clemson attempting to win 12 games for a sixth straight year, which would give Clemson sole possession of the second-longest streak of 12-win seasons in major college football history (and the longest in the modern era). The record is held by Penn in the 19th century (seven from 1892-98).

- Clemson attempting to win 10 games for a school-record 10th consecutive season. Clemson would become only the third program in history ever to post 10 consecutive 10-win seasons, joining Florida State (14 from 1987-2000) and Alabama (12 from 2008-19). Clemson would be the first school to win 10 games in 10 straight seasons as a member of the ACC, as only the final nine of Florida State's 14-straight 10-win seasons came during the Seminoles' tenure in the ACC.

- Clemson (41 from 2017-19) winning 14 games to tie the 2018 and 2019 Clemson senior classes as the winningest classes in school and ACC history while matching the 2018 and 2019 Clemson and 2018 Alabama seniors as the winningest class in major college football history.

- Clemson attempting to finish a third consecutive season undefeated in ACC play for the first time since 1981-83, when the Tigers went 6-0, 6-0 and 7-0 against ACC opponents. Clemson has won 19 consecutive ACC regular season games (22 including postseason play).

- Clemson needing seven consecutive conference wins to tie or eight conference wins to break Florida State's record of consecutive wins against ACC opponents by an ACC program (29 from 1992-95). Clemson enters 2020 having won its last 22 games against ACC opponents, including postseason play.

- Clemson (23 from 2017-19) needing seven regular season ACC wins to match or eight regular season ACC wins to pass the 2018 and 2019 seniors (30 each) as the winningest class in school history in regular season conference play. Eight regular season conference wins would tie the four-year conference record of 31, set by multiple Florida State classes from 1995-2000.

- Clemson (21 from 2017-19) winning all six home games to allow the 2020 senior class to tie the school record for most home wins by a senior class held by the 2017, 2018 and 2019 seniors and become the first Clemson class in the modern era to post a perfect four-year record at home. (Note: Clemson was undefeated at home in a four-year span from 1900-03 but only played a total of five home games in that four-year window).

- Clemson's 2020 seniors attempting to become the first FBS senior class to post a perfect career record at home since the 2010 Boise State (26-0) and Oklahoma (25-0) seniors.

- Clemson attempting to go undefeated at home for the sixth time in seven years. It would mark the school's first time accomplishing the feat (including ties) since 1935-41, when the team was 15-1-1 in its final seven seasons at Riggs Field prior to the opening of Memorial Stadium in 1942.

- Clemson attempting to win all its home games in four consecutive seasons for the first time under Head Coach Dabo Swinney.

- Clemson attempting to win at least six home games to add to its active nine-year streak of winning at least six games at Memorial Stadium.

- Clemson attempting to add to its program-record home winning streak (22 from 2016-19). A perfect home record in a five-game home slate for Clemson

in 2020 would push Clemson's streak to 27 and put Clemson three home wins shy of producing the 24th 30-game home winning streak in FBS history.

- Clemson playing four home games in the month of October. It will represent the seventh time Clemson has played four home games in a single month, joining the 1920, 1987, 1989, 1993, 2008 and 2011 campaigns. In all six of the previous instances, Clemson posted a winning record in those contests.

- Clemson entering the season with an active winning streak of 12 in true road games, tied for the school record with a 12-game streak across the 2015-17 seasons. A win in the season opener would be the program's record-setting 13th consecutive road victory.

- Clemson attempting to post a perfect record in true road games for a third straight season for the first time in school history. It would make Clemson undefeated in true road games for the fifth time in six years for the first time in school history.

- Clemson entering the season with an active winning streak against every team on its schedule. Clemson has active winning streaks against Wake Forest (11), The Citadel (17), Virginia (four), Miami (two), Georgia Tech (five), Syracuse (two), Boston College (nine), Notre Dame (three), Florida State (five), Pitt (one) and Virginia Tech (five). Clemson boasts an active winning streak against every school ever to compete in ACC play, including all current members, temporary members (Notre Dame) and former members (Maryland and South Carolina).

- Head Coach Dabo Swinney attempting to win his seventh ACC championship to move past Clemson's Frank Howard and Duke's Bill Murray (six each) for sole possession of the second-most ACC titles by a head coach all-time (Florida State's Bobby Bowden, 12).

- Swinney (77-16 in ACC regular season play) needing eight regular season conference wins to tie or nine regular season conference wins to pass Virginia's George Welsh (85) for the second-most regular season conference wins in ACC history.

- Swinney (16) sitting two bowl games (including CFP National Championship Games) shy of tying Bobby Bowden's ACC record (18) for the most career bowl appearances leading an ACC program.

- Swinney (and Duke Head Coach David Cutcliffe) becoming one of 11 head coaches ever to coach 13 or more seasons as head of an ACC program, joining Virginia's George Welsh, Florida State's Bobby Bowden, North Carolina and Wake Forest's Bill Dooley, NC State's Earle Edwards, Clemson's Frank Howard, Virginia and Wake Forest's Al Groh, Wake Forest's Jim Grobe, Duke's Bill Murray and Virginia Tech's Frank Beamer.

- Swinney (161 career games) attempting to become only the fifth person ever to coach an ACC team in 175 career games (Bobby Bowden, George Welsh, Bill Dooley and Al Groh). Clemson would need to play all 11 of its scheduled games plus three postseason contests for him to reach that milestone.

- Clemson playing a 10-game conference schedule for the first time in school history. Clemson will once again play at least 10 Power Five teams in 2020. Clemson has won 76 games against Power Five opponents since 2013, seven more than any other program in the country.

- Clemson carrying a 298-143-6 all-time regular season record against ACC opponents according to conference records. Two regular season wins in conference play this year would make Clemson the first team to be credited with 300 regular season wins in ACC play all-time, including postseason play.

- Every game on Clemson's regular season schedule being scheduled on Saturday. Clemson has won 43 consecutive Saturday games, with its only three losses since the start of the 2017 season coming on a Friday

and two Mondays.

- Clemson facing only one of the four other ACC charter members from the 1953 football season still in the conference (Duke, North Carolina, NC State and Wake Forest). Barring any postseason meetings, the 2020 season will represent the first time Clemson has not played at least one of the trio of Duke, North Carolina or NC State since 1955.

- Clemson entering the season as only the third program in FBS history to return a passer with 6,000 career passing yards (Trevor Lawrence, 6,945) and a rusher with 4,000 career rushing yards (Travis Etienne, 4,038).

- Running back Travis Etienne, the 2018 and 2019 ACC Player of the Year, attempting to become the first player in conference history to win ACC Player of the Year honors three times. Etienne would join Herschel Walker (1980-82 SEC Player of the Year) as the only Power Five conference players to win conference player of the year honors in three straight seasons.

- Etienne (4,038) needing 565 rushing yards to pass NC State's Ted Brown (4,602) for the ACC's career rushing record.

- Etienne (17) needing three more 100-yard rushing games to become the ninth player in ACC history to record 20 career 100-yard rushing games, joining Ted Brown, Lamar Jackson, Amos Lawrence, Montel Harris, Warrick Dunn, Dalvin Cook, Joe McIntosh and AJ Dillon.

- Etienne entering the season with 62 career total touchdowns, only 26 shy of the NCAA record held by Keenan Reynolds (88).

- Etienne (26 total touchdowns in 2018, 23 in 2019) attempting to become the first player in ACC history to score 20 or more total touchdowns in three different seasons. He would join Louisiana Tech's Kenneth Dixon (2012, 14-15) as the only FBS players since 2000 to accomplish the feat.

- Etienne (at least one rushing or receiving touchdown in 36 of his 43 career games) sitting two touchdowns shy of matching or three touchdowns shy of passing FBS records held by Florida's Tim Tebow (38 games from 2006-09) and Louisiana Tech's Kenneth Dixon (38 from 2012-15).

- Etienne entering the season with 18 career multi-touchdown games (rushing and receiving). The FBS record is 25, set by Miami Ohio's Travis Prentice (1996-99) and Wisconsin's Montee Ball (2009-12).

- Etienne attempting to rush for 1,500 yards for a third straight season to join Pitt's Tony Dorsett (1973, 1975-76), Georgia's Herschel Walker (1980-82), Miami Ohio's Travis Prentice, (1997-99), Northern Illinois' Garrett Wolfe (2004-06), Oregon's LaMichael

James (2009-11), San Diego State's Donnel Pumphrey (2014-16) and Wisconsin's Jonathan Taylor (2017-19) as only the eighth player in FBS history to reach 1,500 rushing yards in three different seasons. He would be the first member of the ACC to do it, as Dorsett accomplished the feat prior to Pitt's membership in the ACC.

- Etienne (7.80) entering 2020 with the second-highest yards-per-carry average among any FBS player with a minimum of 400 carries since 1956. He and Colin Kaepernick are the only two FBS players since 2000 to average at least 7.0 yards on 100+ carries in three different seasons.

- Etienne (156 in 2018) attempting to become the first player in ACC history with multiple 150-point seasons. In 2018, his 156 points tied Pitt's James Conner (2014) for second-most in a season in conference history, one point shy of the record set by Florida State's Roberto Aguayo (157) in 2013.

- Etienne (567) needing 433 more receiving yards to reach 1,000 career receiving yards. He would become only the 12th player in FBS history to record at least 4,000 rushing yards and at least 1,000 receiving yards, joining Stanford's Darrin Nelson, Colorado State's Steve Bartolo, Miami Ohio's George Swann, Florida's Errict Rhett, Boise State's Brock Forsey, Tulane's Mewelde Moore, North Texas' Lance Dunbar, San Diego State's Donnel Pumphrey, Louisiana Elijah McGuire, Southern Miss' Ito Smith and New Mexico State's Larry Rose III.

- Etienne (372) needing 33 points to break Chandler Catanzaro's school record for career points (404 from 2010-13).

- Etienne (30 career starts) needing 13 starts to tie or 14 starts to pass James Davis (43 from 2005-08) for the most starts by a running back in Clemson history.

- Quarterback Trevor Lawrence entering the season with a 25-1 record as a starting quarterback. He is seven wins shy of tying or eight wins shy of passing the school record of 32, shared by Rodney Williams (1985-88), Tajh Boyd (2010-13) and Deshaun Watson (2014-16).

- Lawrence (3,280 in 2018, 3,665 in 2019) attempting to become the second quarterback in Clemson history to post three 3,000-yard passing seasons, joining Tajh Boyd (three from 2011-13).

- Lawrence (76) needing only 24 combined passing and rushing touchdowns to become only the fifth player in ACC history to be responsible for 100 career touchdowns, joining Tajh Boyd (133), Lamar Jackson (119), Deshaun Watson (116) and Philip Rivers (112).

- Lawrence (66) sitting nine passing touchdowns shy of becoming the sixth player in ACC history to throw 75 career touchdown passes, joining Tajh Boyd (107), Philip Rivers (95), Deshaun Watson (90), Chris Weinke (79) and Russell Wilson (76).

- Lawrence (6,945) needing 3,055 passing yards to become only the sixth 10,000-yard career passer in ACC history, joining Philip Rivers, Tajh Boyd, Ryan Finley, Deshaun Watson and Thaddeus Lewis.

- Lawrence (7,685) needing 2,315 combined rushing and passing yards to join Tajh Boyd and Deshaun Watson as the only players in school history to accrue 10,000 yards of total offense.

- Lawrence entering the season having thrown 239 consecutive passes without an interception, the fifth-longest streak in ACC history. He is 61 passes without an interception shy of joining Russell Wilson (379 from 2008-09) and Ryan Finley (339 from 2016-17) as the only players in conference history to throw 300 consecutive pass attempts without a pick.

- Lawrence entering the season with a 162.21 career pass efficiency rating, roughly one point shy of the ACC

- Punter Will Spiers (44) needing only three more starts to set the Clemson record for career starts by a punter, currently held by Cole Chason (46 from 2003-06). He is 13 starts from tying and 14 starts from breaking the Clemson record across all positions, currently held by tackle Mitch Hyatt (57 from 2015-18).

## WHAT TO WATCH FOR THIS WEEK

- One year after playing the earliest season opener in school history (Aug. 29, 2019 vs. Georgia Tech), Clemson playing its latest season opener since 1986 (Sept. 13, 1986 vs. Virginia Tech).
- Clemson opening the season against an ACC opponent for only the 14th time since the conference's founding in 1953. Clemson is 10-2-1 against ACC opponents in Week 1 contests all-time, including a 52-14 home win against Georgia Tech last season.
- Clemson opening conference play on the road the for the seventh time in eight years. Clemson has won each of its last five conference openers since 2015, tied for the longest conference-opener winning streak in school history (five from 1980-84).
- Clemson opening the season against Wake Forest this year, after opening against Georgia Tech last season, representing the first time Clemson has opened with an ACC foe in back-to-back years since a five-season stretch of in-conference season openers across the 1965-69 seasons.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 94-23-8 all-time in season openers, regardless of site. Clemson has won 28 of its last 35 openers, including a 10-1 mark in openers under Dabo Swinney and victories in each of the last five season debuts.
- Clemson opening a season on the road for the first time since 2016, when second-ranked Clemson defeated Auburn, 19-13, at Jordan-Hare Stadium to kick off an eventual national championship campaign.
- Clemson seeking its 13th consecutive victory in true road games, which would break the school-record 12-game streak set across the 2015-17 seasons.
- Clemson attempting to improve to 68-17-1 all-time against Wake Forest. Clemson's current 67 all-time wins against Wake Forest are its second-most against any opponent in school history, trailing the Tigers' 71 wins against South Carolina.
- Clemson attempting to win its 12th consecutive game against Wake Forest, dating back to 2009. It would mark Clemson's second 12-game winning streak in series history, trailing a 15-game streak from 1977-91. Clemson's current 11-game winning streak against Wake Forest is the Tigers' longest active winning streak against an ACC foe.
- Clemson attempting to earn a sixth straight road victory against Wake Forest, dating back to 2010. Clemson's last loss in Winston-Salem came in 2008, leading to Dabo Swinney being named Clemson's Interim Head Coach four days later.
- Clemson attempting to record a six-game road winning streak against a single opponent for the eighth time in school history. It would be Clemson's first such streak since 1989-99, when Clemson won six straight against South Carolina in Columbia.
- Clemson attempting to defeat its 23rd consecutive ACC opponent, including postseason play, dating to October 2017 against Georgia Tech. Clemson's 22 consecutive victories against conference opponents (including postseason play) is already the longest such streak in school history.
- Head Coach Dabo Swinney attempting to improve to 12-0 as a head coach against Wake Forest. Wake Forest is one of five ACC schools against whom Swinney is undefeated as head coach, a list that also includes Duke (3-0), Louisville (6-0), Virginia (4-0) and Virginia Tech (5-0). Swinney is also 2-0 vs. temporary ACC member Notre Dame.
- Though 2020 will technically be played sans divisions, Clemson attempting to defeat a traditional ACC Atlantic Division opponent for a 15th straight time and for the 35th time in 36 opportunities.

- Clemson attempting to push its winning streak in Saturday games to 44 to extend the longest Saturday winning streak in school history. Clemson's current 43-game run of consecutive Saturday victories is the longest active streak in the country.
- Clemson attempting to hold Wake Forest to three or fewer points for a third straight meeting (63-3 in 2018, 52-3 in 2019). It would be Clemson's first time holding a single opponent to three or fewer points in three straight meetings since doing so in three games against The Citadel in 1978, 1986 and 2000. It would be Clemson's first time doing so against an FBS opponent and ACC opponent since a four-game streak against Maryland from 1993-96 in which the Tigers produced three straight shutouts from 1993-95 plus a 35-3 win in 1996.
- Travis Etienne (17) rushing for 100 yards to break Wayne Gallman's Clemson record for career 100-yard rushing games (17 from 2014-16).
- Etienne (56) needing four more rushing touchdowns to become only the 12th player in FBS history to record 60 career rushing touchdowns, a mark reached only by Navy's Keenan Reynolds (88), Wisconsin's Montee Ball (77), Miami (Ohio)'s Travis Prentice (73), Texas' Ricky Williams (72), Louisiana Tech's Kenneth Dixon (72), Florida Atlantic's Devin Singletary (66), Indiana's Anthony Thompson (64), Texas' Cedric Benson (64), Wisconsin's Ron Dayne (63), San Diego State's Donnel Pumphrey (62) and Oregon's Royce Freeman (60).
- Etienne entering the game with two career 100-yard games against Wake Forest (167 in 2018, 121 in 2019). With another 100-yard game against the Demon Deacons, he can tie the school record held by Kenny Flowers (vs. Duke, 1983-85) and Wayne Gallman (vs. South Carolina, 2014-16) for career 100-yard rushing games against a single opponent.
- Etienne (288 career rushing yards against Wake Forest) needing 151 rushing yards to break Cliff Austin's school record for career rushing yards against a single opponent (438 vs. Duke from 1980-82).
- Etienne (372) needing eight points to pass placekicker Greg Huegel (379 from 2015-18) for second on Clemson's career scoring leaderboard. Doing so would also move him into eighth in ACC history.
- Etienne attempting to rush for a touchdown in a 10th straight game, dating to last season, to move past Lester Brown (1978), Terry Allen (1988-89) and James Davis (2005-06) for sole possession of the longest such streak in school history.
- Etienne attempting to score a touchdown on any kind in a 13th consecutive game to pull within one game of the school record held by C.J. Spiller (14 straight games in 2009).
- Etienne (5,122) gaining eight all-purpose yards to pass Sammy Watkins (5,129) for second on Clemson's career all-purpose yardage leaderboard. C.J. Spiller holds the Clemson and ACC record at 7,588.
- Etienne (5,122) needing 142 all-purpose yards to enter the Top 10 in career all-purpose yards in ACC history.
- Quarterback Trevor Lawrence (66) sitting one passing touchdown shy of entering the Top 10 in career passing touchdowns in ACC history. He is within striking distance of No. 10 Thaddeus Lewis (67), No. 9 Darian Durant (68), Nos. 7 Brad Kaaya and Lamar Jackson (69) and No. 6 Jacory Harris (70).
- Lawrence (seven) attempting to join Tajh Boyd (18), Deshaun Watson (13) and Charlie Whitehurst (eight) as the only players in school history to record at least eight career 300-yard passing games. His next 300-yard game would tie him with Whitehurst for third in school history.
- Lawrence entering the game having thrown 239 consecutive passes without an interception. With five

more attempts without an interception, he would pass Mitch Trubisky (243 from 2015-16) for the fourth-longest in ACC history. He is 32 attempts short of passing Drew Weatherford (270 in 2007) for third.

- Kicker B.T. Potter (86-for-86 for his career) entering the game two extra points shy of tying or three extra points shy of breaking Clemson's all-time record for consecutive extra points made (88 by Mark Buchholz from 2007-08).

- Potter (86) chasing No. 8 Mark Buchholz (88 from 2007-08) and No. 7 David Treadwell (92 from 1985-87) on Clemson's leaderboard for career PATs.

- Receiver Amari Rodgers (465) sitting 14 punt return yards shy of entering the Top 10 in school history in career punt return yards. Ray-Ray McCloud (485) and Jacoby Ford (479) presently sit ninth and 10th in school history, respectively.

## -- THIS WEEK --

### SEASON OPENERS

Clemson has won 28 of its last 35 season openers. Head Coach Dabo Swinney is 10-1 in his career in season opening games with the only loss coming at Georgia to open the 2014 season. Swinney's 10 season-opening wins are second-most in school history, one ahead of Danny Ford (9) and 15 shy of Frank Howard's school record (25).

Clemson has played eight openers against top 25 teams in the last 20 years after having played just five Top 25 teams in opening games between 1936 (the first year of the AP Poll) and 1999.

Clemson was no stranger to exciting season openers in the first few years after the turn of the century. In 2004, against Wake Forest, Clemson won a 37-30 overtime thriller on ABC. Clemson won at home in 2005, a 25-24 win over No. 17 Texas A&M on a 42-yard field goal by Jad Dean with two seconds left. Clemson also beat No. 19 Florida State in the 2007 season opener.

The Tigers are 93-23-8 (.782), regardless of site, in their first game in their previous 124 seasons.

### CLEMSON IN ACC OPENERS

The 2020 season marks Clemson's 68th year of membership in the ACC, dating back to the conference's first year of play in 1953. In its previous 67 seasons of ACC membership, Clemson has posted a 41-25-1 record in conference openers.

Clemson has won its last five ACC openers, including road victories at Louisville in 2015 and 2017, road wins at Georgia Tech in 2016 and 2018 and a season-opening home win against Georgia Tech in 2019. Last season broke a streak of seven consecutive years that Clemson had to travel to open ACC play, so this year will represent the eighth time in nine years that Clemson will open ACC play on the road.

Head Coach Dabo Swinney is 7-4 in ACC openers at Clemson, with all four losses coming to Top 20 opponents, including No. 15 Georgia Tech in 2009, No. 16 Miami (Fla.) in 2010, No. 4 Florida State in 2012 and No. 1 Florida State in 2014. Three of those four contests were on the road.

The Tigers are seeking a sixth consecutive victory in conference openers, which would pass the 1980-84 squads for the longest streak in school history. With a win on Thursday, the 2020 senior class would become the seventh senior class in Clemson history to win all four of its ACC openers, joining 4-0 records posted by the 1983, 1984, 1989, 2005, 2018 and 2019 senior classes in ACC debuts.

## -- ON THE OPPONENT --

### SERIES HISTORY VS. WAKE FOREST

Clemson owns 67 all-time wins over Wake Forest, its second-highest victory total against any opponent (71 wins vs. South Carolina). Clemson has a 57-9-1 lead in the series since the formation of the ACC in 1953, an .858 winning percentage. Clemson is 25-10-1 all-time against Wake Forest in games played in Winston-Salem since 1936.

Clemson has played Wake Forest in football 67 consecutive years, as the last year the two schools did not play was 1952. Only South Carolina has a longer string of consecutive seasons played against the Tigers, a string that will come to an end in 2020 after 111 years.

Clemson has won 11 in a row in the series, all under Head Coach Dabo Swinney, by a combined score of 442-127. That represents an average victory margin of 28.6, and Clemson has scored at least 28 points in all 11 games.

This will be the 10th straight year that Wake Forest has faced a Top 20 Clemson team, including six years in a row facing a Top 5 Clemson squad.

## STREAKIN' AGAINST THE DEACONS

Clemson enters this year's game against Wake Forest in search of its 12th consecutive victory against the Demon Deacons. Clemson's 11-game winning streak is its longest active winning streak against any FBS foe.

The Tigers have produced 10-game winning streaks against opponents seven times in school history. Wake Forest is the only opponent against whom Clemson has recorded multiple winning streaks of 10-plus games, posting a 15-game winning streak against the Demon Deacons from 1977-91 as well as a 10-game streak from 1940-50.

Clemson has recorded three win streaks of 10 or more games against Wake Forest in comparison to a combined four 10-game streaks against all other opponents (Furman, Virginia, The Citadel and Presbyterian).

## SERIES MEMORIES

- Clemson defeated Wake Forest on Halloween in 1981 by an 82-24 score. That was the highest-scoring ACC game in Clemson history until 2012 when NC State and Clemson combined for 110 points in a 62-48 Clemson win. Clemson was 12-for-12 on third down in that 1981 game and gained 756 yards of total offense, including 536 on the ground, still school records for the modern era.

- The two teams have played three neutral site games over the years, including one in Tokyo, Japan. Clemson won that game in 1982 by a 21-17 score to close out an ACC Championship season.

- Clemson had a 7-3 record against Wake Forest under

Tommy Bowden, but five of the seven Clemson wins were decided by 10 points or less.

- Clemson won the 2006 game at Wake Forest, 27-17. The late Gaines Adams had a game-changing 66-yard fumble return on a botched field goal attempt in the fourth quarter to cut the Demon Deacons' lead to 17-10. The Tigers scored 24 points in the fourth period to gain the victory against the eventual ACC champions.

- In 2011, the Tigers won 31-28 on a 43-yard field goal by Chandler Catanzaro on the last play of the game. That gave the Tigers the Atlantic Division title, and Clemson went on to win its first ACC title in 20 years.

## FRANK AND PEAHEAD

Only one coach in history — Wake Forest's Peahead Walker — won as many as four games against Clemson without a loss in Death Valley. Frank Howard and Walker had a close friendship, but Peahead had a 4-0 record against Howard in Death Valley.

Walker fielded some tough teams, but lost five in a row to the Tigers from 1937-41, including his first two outings against Howard, 39-0 and 29-0, after Jess Neely's departure to Rice in 1940.

Peahead's response was to win six in a row against Howard from 1942-47, knocking No. 16-ranked Clemson out of a likely AP Top 20 finish in 1945 with a season-ending 13-6 victory. Even if Peahead conceded that three of his wins from 1942-44 were during Howard's depleted "war years," he still held a 3-2 edge over his soon-to-be comedic partner on the gridiron speaking circuit.

In the final three years of the Howard-Walker rivalry from 1948-50, both the Tigers and Deacons were at their strongest. In going undefeated in both 1948 and 1950, Clemson faced only one Top 20 team in regular season play each year: Peahead's No. 19 Wake Forest in 1948 and his No. 17 Deacs in 1950, both on the road. Howard's 21-14 and 13-12 wins, respectively, enabled his Tigers to finish No. 11 and No. 10 in the nation; Peahead's 1948 Deacons settled for a No. 20 national ranking.

## LAST GAME VS. WAKE FOREST

### Clemson 52, Wake Forest 3

(Nov. 16, 2019 at Clemson, S.C.)

No. 3/3 Clemson downed Wake Forest, 52-3, on Senior Day, setting a school record with its 22nd consecutive home victory. The 49-point victory was an ACC-record sixth straight by 30 or more.

The Tigers scored on a Trevor Lawrence pass to Tee Higgins on their opening drive, then closed out the half with back-to-back scores from Lawrence to Higgins in just 29 seconds of game clock. The half's final touchdown was set up by an A.J. Terrell interception and gave the Tigers a 31-3 halftime lead. Clemson added touchdowns from Joseph Ngata, Frank Ladson Jr. and Lyn-J Dixon in the second half.

Lawrence recorded a career-high tying four touchdown passes and connected on 21-of-27 passing for 272 yards. Tee Higgins caught three touchdown passes, marking the Tigers' eighth three-touchdown receiving performance in school history and the second such performance this season. Etienne turned in 16 carries for 121 yards and a touchdown, while also catching three passes for 37 yards and took sole possession of the school record for consecutive 100-yard rushing games by reaching the mark in a sixth straight game.

Safety Tanner Muse recorded four tackles (two for loss) a sack and an interception, as the Tiger defense held Wake Forest to 105 total yards of offense (41 passing, 64 rushing). Clemson's defense forced seven three-and-outs while limiting Wake Forest to only five first downs. With the win, Clemson joined 1944 Army and 1972 Nebraska as the only teams in the AP Poll era to win four consecutive games by 45 or more points.

## LAST ROAD GAME VS. WAKE FOREST

### Clemson 63, Wake Forest 3

(Oct. 6, 2018 at Winston-Salem, N.C.)

Travis Etienne, Lyn-J Dixon and Adam Choice all eclipsed the 100-yard rushing mark as the No. 4/4 Clemson Tigers amassed 698 total offensive yards en route to a 63-3 defeat of Wake Forest at BB&T Field.

Between Etienne, Dixon, Choice and three other rushers, Clemson ran for 471 yards, the team's most in a single game under head coach Dabo Swinney. Through the air, a balanced effort quarterbacked by Trevor Lawrence powered the Tigers. Lawrence completed 18 of his 21 pass attempts in the first half alone, connecting with nine different receivers to amass 173 yards and two touchdowns in the first 30 minutes.

The Tigers held a 7-0 advantage at the end of the first quarter courtesy of a 59-yard scoring run by Etienne. It was the first of six touchdowns of 50 yards or more by Clemson during the contest, including two by Etienne, two by Dixon, one by Choice and one by receiver Justyn Ross.

The game represented the second straight ACC road game in which Clemson played all 72 dressed players. Four different players appeared at quarterback for the Tigers, including starter Trevor Lawrence, quarterbacks Chase Brice and Ben Batson and wide receiver Hunter Renfrow.

Clemson's 60-point win against Wake Forest last season was, at the time, Clemson's largest margin of victory against an ACC opponent in school history. Clemson later exceeded that mark a month later against Louisville. It was also the third-largest conference win by any FBS team in 2018.

## 12-WIN SEASONS

Clemson has won at least 12 games in five consecutive seasons, the longest active streak of 12-win seasons and one of only four such streaks in major college football history, joining Alabama (five from 2014-18), Penn (seven from 1892-98) and Yale (five from 1888-92).

## 10-WIN SEASONS

Clemson enters 2020 riding a streak of nine consecutive seasons with 10+ wins. The program's ninth consecutive 10-win season in 2019 made Clemson only the fourth program in FBS history to record at least nine consecutive 10-win seasons, tying the 2001-09 Texas Longhorns for the third-longest streak on record. With another 10-win season in 2020, Clemson would become only the third program in FBS

history to produce a "double-double" -- double-digit wins in a double-digit number of consecutive seasons.

The record for consecutive 10-win seasons is 14, set by Florida State (1987-2000). Alabama is the only other program with an active streak of at least nine straight 10-win seasons.

The Tigers have 16 10-win seasons in school history, with more than half coming under head coach Dabo Swinney. The 2019 season was Clemson's sixth with at least 12 wins, with Swinney sitting at the helm for five of them.

## 2010s IN REVIEW

Head Coach Dabo Swinney can vividly recall the looks he received when he said Clemson was on the cusp of the winningest decade in program history following a 2010 campaign in which the Tigers finished 6-7. In 2017, that vision became a reality with two seasons to spare when Clemson collected its 88th win of the decade in the ACC Championship Game against Miami (Fla.) to surpass the Tigers of the 1980s (87) for most wins in any decade in school history.

With a rivalry win against South Carolina to close the 2018 regular season, Clemson reached triple digits in wins in a decade for the first time in program history. Included below are the schools that have accomplished that feat.

"Transformative," Head Coach Dabo Swinney called the 2010s prior to the 2020 College Football Playoff National Championship Game to conclude the 2019 season. "We've transformed Clemson, and the next decade is the Roaring Twenties. I heard those were

great. Hopefully we can relive those."

Clemson finished the 2010s with 117 victories, tied for the third-most victories in a decade in major college football since the 1890s, trailing only Penn (124 in the 1890s) and Alabama (124 in the 2010s). Clemson recorded a 117-22 record in the decade of the 2010s, an .841 winning percentage that represented the best for any decade in school history.

In the 1980s, Clemson had a .767 winning percentage (87-25-4), the nation's fifth-best winning percentage. Clemson did not have a losing season in any year in the 1980s under Danny Ford, who coached every game in that decade. Dabo Swinney coached every game in the decade of the 2010s and finished the decade with nine winning seasons and one losing season (6-7 in 2010).

## SENIORS CHASING HISTORY

Every January, Head Coach Dabo Swinney conducts his first official meeting with his new team. The first order of business in the meeting is to "reset the room," reorganizing the seating arrangement with seniors in front and all succeeding classes in order behind them in the team auditorium.

The 2020 Clemson seniors reached the front of the room having watched each of the two classes in front of them depart as the winningest senior classes in FBS history, tied with the 2018 Alabama seniors at 55 wins in four years. This year's group will have the ability to follow in that lineage and earn that same claim.

The 2019 seniors were the second Clemson class and one of only three classes all-time to reach 55 career wins in a four-year span. Clemson's 2019 group reached 55 wins in 58 games, tying the 2018 Alabama seniors as the quickest to that mark.

Clemson had already been the first ACC school to win four outright titles in a row prior to extending the streak to five in 2019. Florida State was a champion or co-champion nine years in a row from 1992-2000, but never won more than three outright in a row.

Clemson's success in the conference championship game era is unprecedented, as in 2019, Clemson became the first school since the formation of conference championship games in 1992 to win five consecutive conference title games.

## POWER OVER THE POWER FIVE

Early in his head coaching tenure, Dabo Swinney laid out his belief to then-Clemson athletic director Terry Don Phillips that the Tigers needed to add tough non-conference challenges on top of their tests in ACC play to serve as a foundation for the program's growth.

"I had a conversation with Terry Don and said, 'Terry Don, I know we are not very good right now, but we need to play people because that is going to help me teach and help me develop the culture and the mindset that you have to have to win at the highest level,'" recounted Swinney. "I didn't think we had that, and that's what we committed to. That's what we've done."

That scheduling philosophy and culture change has resonated in the Clemson program, and since 2013, no team can claim more wins against Power Five

## NO. 1 FOR NO. 1 RECRUITS

As Clemson was in the midst of the winningest decade in school history and tied for the third-winningest decade in major college football history, Head Coach Dabo Swinney would frequently point out that Clemson accomplished its goals by finding the right fits for its program in recruiting rather than chasing recruiting rankings.

Swinney often noted that Clemson accomplished its immense success in his tenure despite never signing the No. 1 recruiting class in the country. That changed in 2020, when ESPN ranked Clemson's 2020 group as the nation's top recruiting class. Clemson also recorded its highest rankings in both Rivals (No. 2) and 247 Sports (No. 3) history.

Clemson has signed the nation's consensus top player in two out of the last three recruiting cycles, welcoming quarterback Trevor Lawrence in 2018 and defensive tackle Bryan Bresee in 2020.

Clemson is the only team in the country to sign Rivals' No. 1 recruit twice in a three-year span since Dabo Swinney was named head coach at Clemson. Signing the No. 1 overall recruit again in 2021 would make Clemson the first school to sign the nation's top player in back-to-back years in accessible Rivals.com and 247 Sports data.

Clemson and Alabama (two each) are tied for the most No. 1 recruits signed since 2009 per Rivals' rankings. Clemson and Georgia (two each) are tied for the most in that span per the 247 Composite.

Clemson's recruiting classes have finished in the top 15 of at least one of three primary recruiting services (ESPN, Rivals and 247 Sports) every year since 2011. Clemson is one of only seven schools to produce a Top 15 class in each of the last 10 years, a group that also includes Alabama, Auburn, Georgia, LSU, Notre Dame and Ohio State. The next longest active streak of Top 15 classes is five (Florida).

## ESTEEMED COMPANY

Head Coach Dabo Swinney's run of excellence in his decade-plus at Clemson has placed him in the company of college football legends.

Swinney enters the 2020 season with a winning percentage of .807, sitting as one of only 13 head coaches in history with at least 10 seasons of FBS head coaching experience to post a mark of .800 or better. That list presently includes Knute Rockne (.881), Frank Leahy (.864), Urban Meyer (.854), George Woodruff (.846), Barry Switzer (.837), Tom Osborne (.836), Fielding Yost (.833), Percy Haughton (.832), Bob Neyland (.826), Bud Wilkinson (.826), Jock Sutherland (.812), and Bob Devaney (.806).

Among the legends Swinney has already passed are College Football Hall of Famers Bo Schembechler (.775), Bear Bryant (.780) and Henry Williams (.785).

In early November 2019, Swinney recorded his 125th win in his 155th career game. Per records available via Sports Reference, he became the 10th-fastest coach to reach 125 career wins in terms of games coached.

## FIVE "FINAL FOURS" FOR SWINNEY

While the term "Final Four" may still be the linguistic property of the men's basketball tournament, since the advent of the four-team College Football Playoff in 2014, Head Coach Dabo Swinney has had Clemson among the sport's final four teams in each of the last five seasons, joining Alabama Head Coach Nick Saban (2014-18 seasons) as the only coaches to make the College Football Playoff five consecutive years. Oklahoma has qualified for four College Football Playoffs in the last five years, one under Bob Stoops and three in a row under current coach Lincoln Riley.

The men's college basketball tournament dates to 1939. In the history of that tournament, only John Wooden of UCLA (nine from 1967-75) and Mike Krzyzewski of Duke (five from 1988-92) coached teams to five consecutive Final Fours.

During Wooden's streak of nine straight Final Fours, he recorded eight championships and a semifinal loss. Coach K's Blue Devils had two championships, a second-place finish and two semifinal losses in their run. Saban's run produced two championships, two runner-up finishes and a semifinal loss in his run from 2014-18, while Swinney so far has two championships, two runner-up finishes and a semifinal loss from 2015-19.

Swinney is 6-3 in College Football Playoff games and that .667 percentage is tied for the best among football coaches who have been in at least three games. When compared to basketball coaches who have been in the Final Four, only three have a better winning percentage

than Swinney with a minimum of eight games coached: John Wooden (21-3, .875), Adolph Rupp (9-2, .818) and Bob Knight (7-2, .778).

With another "Final Four" appearance by virtue of a College Football Playoff selection in 2020, Swinney would join basketball's John Wooden (nine straight at UCLA from 1968-75) as the only college football or men's basketball coaches to take teams to six consecutive Final Fours in their respective sports.

## STAFF CONTINUITY

Clemson has become a beacon of stability in the increasingly unstable environment of college football. Clemson Head Coach Dabo Swinney enters his 18th overall season at Clemson in 2020, including his 12th full season as head coach (and his 13th including an interim stint in 2008).

Since the start of Swinney's first season as full-time head coach in 2009, there have been 392 head coaching tenures in the FBS, but only one such tenure at Clemson. Clemson and Duke are the only schools in the ACC with only one head coach since the start of the 2009 season, and among the 11 schools ever to qualify for the College Football Playoff, only Clemson and Alabama have had only one head coach since 2009.

## 150+ GAMES COACHED

Head Coach Dabo Swinney coached his 150th game as leader of the Clemson program in the 150-year anniversary season of college football in 2019. He became just the second coach to coach 150 career games at Clemson, joining Hall of Famer Frank Howard, who coached 295 games as Clemson's head coach from 1940-69.

Entering 2020, only eight coaches had coached at least 150 games at schools presently in the Football Bowl Subdivision while achieving an .800 or better mark. Interestingly, Clemson holds a 4-0 combined all-time record against the top three coaches on the list.

to its preseason rankings in eight straight seasons. That included quite an accomplishment in both 2016 and 2018, as it finished No. 1 by winning the national championship to exceed the school's No. 2 preseason ranking both times.

Clemson exceeded its USA Today coaches poll preseason ranking eight straight years from 2011-18, the longest such streak in poll history. With regard to Associated Press voting, Clemson exceeded its preseason ranking in the AP poll in seven of the last nine years. The lone exceptions came in 2013, when Clemson was picked No. 8 in the AP preseason poll and finished No. 8, and 2019, when Clemson finished second in the country after opening the season at No. 1.

## A FAMILIAR NO. 1

Clemson opened the season at No. 1 atop both polls, marking the program's second straight top preseason ranking. With the top selection in the AP Poll, Clemson became the sixth program since the inception of the preseason poll in 1950 ever to open consecutive preseason polls at No. 1, joining Alabama (2016-18), USC (2004-05), Oklahoma (1985-87, 1974-75, 1956-57), Ohio State (1969-70) and Notre Dame (1953-54).

Seeing Clemson at No. 1 has started to feel familiar in recent years, as 2020 is now the sixth straight year in which Clemson has appeared at No. 1 in at least one AP Poll. Dabo Swinney joined Nick Saban (12) as the only coach in AP Poll history (since 1936) to lead a team to at least one No. 1 ranking in six consecutive years. Clemson joins Alabama (12 from 2008-19) and Miami (seven from 1986-92) as the only programs to appear at No. 1 in at least six consecutive years.

## CHAMPIONSHIP HERITAGE

After being named Clemson's full-time coach in December of 2008, Head Coach Dabo Swinney set about securing his first signing class in 2009.

His first class, which he tabbed the "Dandy Dozen," brought home Clemson's first ACC title since 1991 during their junior campaign in 2011. All of Clemson's first 11 signing classes under Swinney have at least one ACC title to their credit in their four years at Clemson. Every signing class since 2012 has played for at least one national title, and every class since 2013 has won a national championship with exception of Clemson's 2019 class, which fell just shy in the College Football Playoff National Championship Game last season.

## POLL STREAKS

Clemson has been ranked in the top 25 of 86 consecutive AP polls dating to the 2014 season, the third-longest active streak in the nation. That includes a streak of 77 straight top-10 rankings, tied for first in the country with Alabama.

As far as total top-25 rankings since 2011, Clemson has appeared in 141 of a possible 148 polls (95.3 percent). That is the third-most in the nation, trailing only Alabama (148) and Oklahoma (144).

- Has won 22 of its last 25 games against top-25 teams since the start of the 2015 season.

## SATURDAYS ARE FOR THE TIGERS

Clemson enters 2020 having won each of its last 43 Saturday games. Clemson went 12-2 during the 2017 campaign, with its only losses coming on a Friday at Syracuse and a Monday on New Year's Day in the Sugar Bowl, followed by a 15-0 campaign in 2018 and a 14-1 season in 2019 in which its only loss was on a Monday in the College Football Playoff National Championship Game.

You have to travel back to Nov. 12, 2016, a total of 1,407 days prior to Clemson's first Saturday game of the 2020 season (Sept. 19 vs. Louisville), for Clemson's most recent loss on a Saturday.

Clemson's 43-game Saturday winning streak is the longest active streak in the FBS. The Tigers' current streak started following a 2016 loss to Pitt that was preceded by a 21-game Saturday winning streak across the 2014-16 seasons, previously the longest such streak in program history.

## A LOOK BACK: 29 IN A ROW

Clemson's remarkable 29-game winning streak across the 2018-19 seasons represented not only a highwater mark in the history of the program but also one of the most impressive streaks in the history of the sport's highest levels.

Clemson's streak was only the 28th winning streak of 25 or more games in major college football history. It finished tied for the 12th-longest streak all-time and tied for the second-longest since the turn of the century.

### ESTABLISHED FIREPOWER

In the past two seasons, the 2018 and 2019 Clemson squads became two of only 21 teams since 2010 to produce a 3,000-yard passer, 1,500-yard rusher and 1,000-yard receiver. By virtue of Trevor Lawrence, Travis Etienne and Tee Higgins each reaching their respective thresholds in 2019, Clemson became the first program this decade to produce a player in all three categories in back-to-back seasons.

Etienne scored at least one touchdown rushing or receiving in 36 of his 43 career games across his first three seasons from 2017-19. The FBS record for most career games scoring a touchdown is held jointly by Florida's Tim Tebow (38 games from 2006-09) and Louisiana Tech's Kenneth Dixon (38 from 2012-15). ## RETURNING 4,000-YARD CAREER RUSHERS (FBS HISTORY)

Clemson returns one of the most prolific career passer-rusher duos in college football history in 2020. Trevor Lawrence enters his junior campaign with 6,945 career passing yards, while Travis Etienne enters his senior season with 4,038 career rushing yards. The 2020 Clemson Tigers will become only the third team in FBS history to return a 6,000-yard career passer and 4,000-yard career rusher, joining the 2001 Oregon State Beavers and 2018 Washington Huskies.

Per data available via Sports Reference, of the 139 players who have rushed for 4,000 yards all-time prior to 2020, Etienne is one of only 14 to enter his final collegiate season with 4,000 career yards.

## SEASONS WITH 7.0+ PER CARRY

Through his first three seasons, Etienne earned the distinction as the only FBS running back to average at least 7.0 yards per carry on at least 100 carries in three different seasons since 2000. The only other FBS player to accomplish the feat since the turn of the century was Nevada quarterback Colin Kaepernick, who did so from 2008-10.

This season, Etienne will attempt to become the first FBS player since 2000 to reach that average in four different seasons. He opened his career with a 7.2-yard average on 107 carries in 2017, a career-best 8.1-yard average on 204 carries in 2018 and an ACC-leading 7.8-yard average on 207 carries in 2019.

## GAMES WITH 10.0+ PER CARRY

Etienne's explosive 2019 season opener resulted in an average of 17.1 yards per carry against Georgia Tech, which at the time was the second-best single-game average of his career (19.1 vs. Louisville in 2018). Against Louisville in mid-October, he ripped off 192 yards on 14 carries for a 13.7-yard average, and in early November, he posted a career-best 23.6-yard average on nine carries for 212 yards against Wofford.

Etienne's 12 career games averaging double-digit yards per carry on at least five attempts exceed Colin Kaepernick's 11 for the most by any FBS player since 2000.

Etienne averaged at least 7.0 yards per carry in each of his first three seasons. Etienne is the only FBS back since 2000 to average 7.0 yards in three different seasons and joins Kaepernick (three years) as the only two FBS players at any position to accomplish the feat.

## 200-YARD RUSHING GAMES

Etienne wasted no time rewriting history in 2019. He recorded a then-career-high 205 yards in the season opener against Georgia Tech, the 17th 200-yard rushing game in Clemson history. At the time, it was Etienne's second career 200-yard day, tying him with Ray Yauger, Terrence Flagler, Raymond Priestler and Andre Ellington for the most in school history.

Etienne then went on a record-grabbing spree in November against Wofford. He posted a career-high 212 yards on only nine carries, becoming the first Clemson player to post three career 200-yard games and joining Terrence Flagler as the only players with multiple 200-yard games in a single season. Etienne set those marks in the same contest in which he rushed for his 48th career touchdown to break James Davis' career record at Clemson.

Etienne's 12 carries against Georgia Tech had been the fewest by any Clemson player in the midst of a 200-yard performance. He undercut that mark with his nine-carry performance against Wofford, becoming only the third FBS player since 2000 to rush for 200 yards on single-digit carries.

## HISTORY OF EXPLOSIVENESS

Nine of Etienne's 56 career rushing touchdowns have covered at least 50 yards. His nine rushing touchdowns of 50-plus yards are the most by a Clemson player in records back to 1950, and his 10 total touchdowns covering that length (including a 53-yard touchdown reception in the Fiesta Bowl) are tied for the second-most in that time frame.

## AIR ETIENNE

Etienne had a career-high 98 receiving yards on three receptions and two touchdowns in Clemson's Fiesta Bowl win in last year's College Football Playoff. The 98 receiving yards were the most by a Clemson running back since C.J. Spiller recorded 104 receiving yards at Miami in 2009 in a 40-37 overtime win. It marked the first time a Clemson running back had two receiving touchdowns in a game since 2010 when Jamie Harper scored two at Auburn.

After finishing his first two seasons with 17 career receptions for 135 yards and two touchdowns, Etienne was much more involved in the passing game in 2019, recording 37 receptions for 432 yards and four touchdowns. His 432 receiving yards in 2019 ranked as the third-most in a season for a running back in Clemson history, trailing only the 2008 and 2009 production of College Football Hall of Fame nominee C.J. Spiller.

A similar performance in the passing game in 2020 could help Etienne join elite company in college football history. Only 11 players in FBS history have finished their careers with at least 4,000 rushing yards and at least 1,000 receiving yards. Etienne has already exceeded the 4,000-yard mark on the ground for his career and enters 2020 with 567 career receiving yards. With 433 receiving yards in 2020, Etienne would become the 12th FBS player all-time to join the 4,000/1,000 club.

## TREAD ON THE TIRES

While some observers were surprised by Etienne's decision to return to Clemson in 2020, a projected second-round grade and a desire to complete his degree program made Etienne's call an easy one.

"I just felt like I could come back and improve that grade," Etienne said. "I don't have my degree. Coming back and going second round (in 2021), at least I'd

have my degree. Leaving for the second round has never been a dream of mine. I feel like I can do so much better than that. The NFL is going to be there."

Detractors cited the "wear and tear" of another collegiate season as reasons why Etienne would have benefited from turning pro, but the story of Etienne's career usage has been one of immense production in very measured opportunities. In his first three seasons from 2017-19, Etienne averaged only 12.0 carries per game. Even accounting for only his two seasons as a full-time starter, he averaged only 13.7 carries per game from 2018-19.

The difference in the amount of tread left on Etienne's tires, figuratively speaking, to some of the NFL's most recent draft picks at running back is stark. All six running backs selected in the first two rounds of the 2020 NFL Draft were early entrants, and Etienne enters his senior season with fewer career carries than all but two of the six.

Etienne's single-season career high in carries is 207, set in 2019. Even if Etienne were to add another 207 carries to his career total in 2020, despite using all four years of his eligibility, he would still enter the NFL with 201 fewer carries than Jonathan Taylor's three-year career, 120 fewer carries than AJ Dillon's three-year run and the exact same number as J.K. Dobbins' three-year tenure.

## QB WIN STREAKS

After entering his first four career games at Clemson as a reserve, Trevor Lawrence was named Clemson's starting quarterback heading into its game against Syracuse on Sept. 29, 2018. Clemson's victory in that contest was its first with Lawrence as a starter.

Lawrence would go on to guide Clemson to another 24 straight wins as the starting quarterback prior to suffering his first defeat in the College Football Playoff National Championship game to conclude the 2019 season. Per ESPN Stats & Info, Lawrence's 25-game winning streak tied for the sixth-longest by a starting quarterback in major college football history and finished one shy of being the longest such streak to open a career.

As a freshman, Lawrence set a then-single-season Clemson record by closing the 2018 season with 169 consecutive pass attempts without an interception. Lawrence threw an interception on his 13th pass attempt of the 2019 season opener against Georgia Tech, ending a streak of 182 consecutive pass attempts without an interception.

As a sophomore, Lawrence shattered school single-season and multi-season records in that category in 2019. Lawrence enters 2020 having thrown a school-record 239 pass attempts without an interception, the fifth-longest streak in ACC history.

Last season, Lawrence set a school record for consecutive completions in a single game, completing 18 consecutive passes at South Carolina to break the mark held by Cullen Harper (15 vs. Central Michigan in 2007) and Kelly Bryant (15 vs. Miami in 2017). His 18 consecutive completions tied ACC single-game records held by Virginia's Michael Rocco (vs. Miami in 2012) and North Carolina's Mitch Trubisky (vs. James Madison in 2016).

## 300-YARD GAMES

Clemson's balance and its willingness to take what defenses offer on the ground or through the air sometimes limits opportunities for Lawrence to accrue some of the passing numbers put up around the country. But even playing in an offense that values balance and for a coach who values spreading playing time throughout the roster, Lawrence has still been able to light up defenses in his young career, ranking fourth on Clemson's all-time leaderboard in 300-yard passing games.

## LAWRENCE'S LEGS

Lawrence had a Clemson team-high and career-best 107 rushing yards on 16 carries and scored on a career-long 67-yard run in Clemson's 29-23 win against Ohio State in last year's PlayStation Fiesta Bowl. The 67-yard run was the longest by a Clemson quarterback since Woody Dantzler had a 75-yard scoring run at Virginia in 2000.

Lawrence finished 2019 with 563 rushing yards on 103 carries, an average of 5.47 yards per rush. That rushing average was the best in a season for a Clemson quarterback since transitioning away from single-wing formations in 1953.

## 650-POINT SEASONS

Clemson scored 659 points in 2019, concluding the season only five points shy of tying the school record of 664 set in 2018. Clemson is responsible for two of the 22 650-point seasons in major college football history and two of only 16 since Division I split in 1978. Clemson was the first school with back-to-back 650-point seasons since Yale in 1888-89, predating the start of official NCAA recordkeeping in 1937 and the second year of which was coincidentally the year Clemson was founded.

Clemson's third 600-yard game of the 2019 season came in a 674-yard effort against Boston College. Clemson outgained the Eagles, 674-177, in the game. The 497-yard differential was Clemson's biggest since a 545-yard advantage against Kent State on Sept. 2, 2017 and was Clemson's largest yardage differential against an ACC opponent since the conference's founding in 1953, surpassing a 464-yard advantage against Wake Forest in 2000. Clemson added another dominant performance one week later with a 446-yard margin against Wofford, resulting in the 2019 campaign producing two of the school's nine largest yardage differentials since 1953.

## OFFENSIVE BALANCE

Clemson has featured remarkable offensive balance while qualifying for the College Football Playoff National Championship Game in each of the last two years. Clemson has averaged at least 200 rushing yards and 200 passing yards per game four times in school history, with two of those seasons occurring in the 2018 and 2019 campaigns.

Clemson exceeded the 200/200 mark rushing and passing in 2019 by averaging 240.4 rushing yards per game and 288.3 passing yards per game. Clemson was one of only three teams in 2019 to average at least 240 yards per game in each category, along with fellow CFP participants Ohio State and Oklahoma. Clemson broke the 3,000-yard mark both rushing and passing in 2019, making the campaign only the third 3,000/3,000

season in school history (2015 and 2018).

Clemson has exceeded both 200 passing yards and 200 rushing yards in 51 games under Dabo Swinney, posting a perfect record in those contests. Clemson's 17 such games since the start of the 2018 season are the most in the country.

## STRONG OUT OF THE GATES

"Some start fast, some start slow, but the thoroughbred is great at the final pole."

Dabo Swinney used that horse-racing analogy with his team to encourage his team to "run its own race" in 2019. Clemson was strong out of the gates in 2019, outscoring opponents by a 177-34 margin (+143) in the first quarter. Only 26 teams in the country (including Clemson) recorded a plus-143 or better point differential in *entire games* in 2019.

Clemson's 9.53-point average scoring differential in the first quarter was the second-largest in the country in 2019, contributing significantly to Clemson's second-place finish in overall scoring differential. Clemson defeated the team with the nation's top scoring differential (Ohio State) and suffered its only loss of the season at the hand of the No. 3 team in that category (LSU).

The approach to creating functional depth and rewarding players ready to play has been a key

philosophy for Head Coach Dabo Swinney, whose own collegiate playing career was hatched as a walk-on fighting for playing time in Alabama's receiving corps.

"We're fully committed to playing guys who deserve to play," Swinney said. "You commit to a guy early in the season, and even if a guy's only played 10 percent of the snaps, when you get to game eight or nine, they've got some good experience."

That philosophy was on display in record fashion against Charlotte in September 2019, when Clemson played a school-record 111 players. Clemson later played 105 players against Wofford and 93 players against Wake Forest that season as well.

## YOUTH + EXPERIENCE

One year after Clemson returned a school-record 61 lettermen for the 2018 season, Clemson entered the 2019 campaign with a roster that included 80 freshmen and sophomores. Clemson's 2020 squad will be a mixture of youth and experience, as Clemson has 60 returning lettermen yet still features a roster that includes 81 players classified as freshmen or sophomores.

In the first year of new redshirt regulations in 2018, Clemson played a then-school-record 20 true freshmen. Clemson immediately shattered that record in its 2019 season opener, with 27 true freshmen making their collegiate debuts in that contest. An additional eight true freshmen made their debuts to push that total to a school-record 36. The only true freshmen not to see game action for Clemson in 2020 were injured linebackers Bryton Constantin and Matthew Maloney.

## NO FLY ZONE

Despite finishing the season with a tough contest against a historically prolific LSU passing offense, Clemson ranked among the nation's best against the pass in 2019. Though Clemson's secondary lost three of its four starters from 2019 to potential NFL careers, the Tigers return second-team All-ACC cornerback Derion Kendrick as well as safety Nolan Turner, a fifth-year senior expected to start after all three of his career interceptions to date have come in postseason play.

## TAKEAWAYS, NO GIVEAWAYS

Clemson emphasizes the importance of turnover margin every week on what it dubs "TANOGA Tuesday," standing for "TakeAways, NO GiveAways."

Clemson was trading water in that respect early in 2019, creating 12 takeaways but turning the ball over 11 times in the first half of the regular season. But Clemson's ball security improved drastically in the season's second half and in the postseason, as the Tigers finished the season turning the ball over only twice in its final eight games. Clemson had six games with zero giveaways in 2019, a school record, surpassing the five turnover-free games in 1988, 1994, 2007 and 2018.

Clemson finished the year with 15 giveaways on the season, tied for the eighth-fewest in school history. Clemson's 1.0 per-game average in giveaways ranked third in school history, behind only the 1940 and 2007

seasons.

Defensively, Clemson's 30 takeaways tied with the 2009 and 2013 squads for the school's most under Head Coach Dabo Swinney and won the turnover margin 11 times, the most under Swinney.

Clemson plus-15 margin in turnovers tied with the 1989 team for the ninth-best mark in school history, and at +1.00 per game, Clemson finished eighth in the country in turnover margin per game, the program's first time ranking in the Top 10 in the category since 2007 (+1.00, ninth). By total margin rather than by per-game margin, Clemson finished tied for sixth in the country in 2019.

## CLOSE-GAME SUCCESS

Though Clemson has not played a large number of one-possession games in recent years, the Tigers have proven very adept at winning such contests since 2011. In that span, the Tigers have played 30 games with a final margin of eight points or less, and Clemson's .867 winning percentage in those one-possession contests is the best in the country in that time frame.

Clemson's win against Ohio State in the Fiesta Bowl last season pitted the nation's top two teams in one-score games since 2011 against one another in a win-or-go-home one-possession game. With the six-point win, Clemson improved to 26-4 in one-score games in that span, reaching the mark against a Buckeye squad that entered the game with a .735 winning percentage since 2011 in one-score games.

## OWNING THE "MIDDLE EIGHT"

During its current run of five consecutive College Football Playoff appearances dating to 2015, Clemson has frequently won one of the hidden "games within the game."

SportSource Analytics tracks the "Middle Eight," the section of the game defined as the final four minutes of the first half and the first four minutes of the second half. Clemson has outscored opponents in that time window 47 times since 2015, posting a 46-1 record in those contests.

Clemson was historically strong in that category in 2018, outscoring opponents 132-10 in the middle eight, an average margin of +8.1 points per game. That per-game differential was the largest by any program in the country since 2013. Clemson outscored opponents in the Middle Eight 10 times in 2019, posting a 108-24 advantage in that time window.

Clemson recorded a critical middle eight performance in its 2019 Fiesta Bowl win against Ohio State. Trailing 16-0 prior to the final four minutes of the first half, Clemson scored 14 points in the half's waning minutes to pull the halftime deficit to two. The 14-point momentum swing in that span helped Clemson to victory in the fifth-largest comeback in school history.

## ALL-CONFERENCE O-LINEMEN

As Clemson climbed into the elite echelon of college football programs during the last decade, observers posited that Clemson's rise coincided with the rapid ascent of its offensive line play.

During Clemson's five-year run of College Football Playoff appearances from 2015-19, the Tigers produced a total of 22 All-ACC selections along the offensive line, including 10 first-team honors. Clemson's 22 all-conference selections by offensive linemen are the most of any Power Five program, and its 10 first-team selections are tied with Oklahoma for the most in that span.

## PASS PROTECTION

Clemson's protection for quarterback Trevor Lawrence has taken on an almost-mythical quality in recent years, according to Syracuse Head Coach Dino Babers, whose own prolific defensive line was held without a sack against Clemson in 2019.

"[It's like] Game of Thrones. He's got a castle, he's got a moat, he's got some dragons. That dude's *protected*," Babers said.

The standard will remain high for Clemson's 2020 unit, which will feature four new starters. Last year, led by four seniors, Clemson's 2019 offensive line was named as a Joe Moore Award semifinalist, and its metrics compared favorably to the four lines that went on to be named as finalists, including the LSU squad that earned the award and helped lead the Bayou Bengals to a national championship.

## SACK DIFFERENTIAL

Clemson's success in its 29-1 run since 2018 has been powered in part at the line of scrimmage, where Clemson holds an 101-35 edge over opponents in sacks in that time frame. Clemson's +66 margin in sacks since 2018 is by far the top differential in the country, as no other program can boast a sack differential greater than +55 since 2018.

## 300 OR FEWER YARDS

Clemson opened the 2019 season by keeping each of their first 12 opponents to fewer than 300 yards,

marking the first time in ESPN Stats & Info searchable data going back to 1996 that a team had held the first 12 opponents of a season under that mark. ACC Coastal Division champion Virginia became the first team to hit the 300-yard plateau on Clemson, accounting for 387 in the ACC Championship Game.

## 20 OR FEWER POINTS

Prior to surrendering 23 points in the Fiesta Bowl, Clemson had not surrendered more than 20 points since the 2018 regular season finale and had held 16 consecutive opponents to 20 or fewer points. A defensive streak of that length had not occurred at Clemson in 79 years, when Hall of Fame coaches Jess Neely and Frank Howard combined for a 31-game streak across the 1937-40 seasons.

Prior to the 16-game streak in 2018-19, there had been only four streaks of 15 or more such games in Clemson history. All four came in a vastly different era not just for college football, but for Clemson University as well. At the time of all four previous streaks, Clemson was an all-male, military institution still operating as Clemson Agricultural College before becoming known as Clemson University in 1964.

Since Brent Venables joined Clemson as defensive coordinator prior to the 2012 season, Clemson has allowed only 1.14 points per possession against FBS opponents, the second-fewest in the country in that span. No program has given up fewer points per possession against FBS opponents since 2018, as Clemson's 0.85 points allowed per possession since the start of the 2018 season makes Clemson the only program in the country to allow fewer than a full point per drive to opponents.

## ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

Clemson has matched its on-field success in recent years with national acclaim for its success in the classroom. Of note:

- Clemson set a program record in APR in the NCAA's most recent figures released in May 2020, recording a multi-year APR score of 993 for the 2018-19 academic year. The performance marked the third straight year Clemson broke its program record in the metric after breaking its 992 from 2017-18, which had broken its 987 mark from 2016-17.

- Clemson's 993 multi-year APR ranked fourth in the Power Five and fifth among FBS programs, trailing only Washington (999), Ole Miss (997), Northwestern (995) and Air Force (995). That metric covered a four-year span in which Clemson matched its off-field success with on-field accolades that included a 55-4 record, four College Football Playoff appearances and two national championships.

- The NCAA recognized Clemson with its annual APR Public Recognition Award, which is bestowed upon programs ranking in the Top 10 percent of their respective sports. Only 37 of the 130 FBS programs have earned at least one APR recognition since the 2009-10 academic year. Only 30 of them have earned it multiple times. Clemson, Duke and Northwestern programs are the only ones to earn the award nine or more times in that 10-year span.

- Clemson is one of only six FBS programs with an active streak of having earned an APR Public Recognition Award in each of the last three academic years, a group that also includes Air Force, Boston College, Navy, Northwestern and Washington.

- With its most recent award for the 2018-19 academic year, Clemson is now the only FBS program since the NCAA created the APR metric in 2003 to win a national championship and an APR Public Recognition Award in the same year multiple times. Alabama is the only other school to accomplish the title/APR double in a single year once (2011-12 academic year).

In addition to the APR honors, in November 2019, the AFCA announced that Clemson had repeated as Academic Achievement Award winners, making Clemson the only school in the country to earn the award across both of the 2018-19 seasons. Clemson had earned the award a year earlier as well in the midst of major college football's first 15-0 season since 1897.

## ACC: WE DO THIS

Entering the 2020 season, the ACC is tied for the most football national titles of any conference since 2013 (three of the last seven). The conference has had a team in either the College Football Playoff or the BCS National Championship Game in each of the past seven years.

No conference produced more bowl teams in 2019 than the ACC, which placed 10 of its 14 members in bowl games. With the selection of 10 teams in 2019, the ACC has had 42 bowl teams in the previous four years, including double-digit selections all four years (11 in 2016, 10 in 2017, 11 in 2018 and 10 in 2019).
