Lou Groza Collegiate Place-Kicker Award Announces 2021 Preseason Watch List

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. – Headlined by three former finalists, a previous winner, and an unprecedented 20 former semifinalists, it's a highly competitive year on the thirty-player Watch List for the 2021 Lou Groza Collegiate Place-Kicker Award, as announced by the Palm Beach County Sports Commission.

Last year's Groza winner, Jose Borregales, is now a Tampa Bay Buccaneer, but his fellow finalists BYU junior Jake Oldroyd and Alabama junior Will Reichard are back to vie for the award. Also returning is SMU senior Blake Mazza, who was a finalist in 2019 while at Washington State, as well as Syracuse senior and 2018 Groza winner Andre Szmyt, who could become just the second player to ever win the award multiple times, joining Sebastian Janikowski who won in 1998 and 1999.

With schools playing such a varied number of games last season, this year's Watch List leans heavily on accuracy. In fact all 16 kickers returning to FBS who attempted 10 field goals and connected at 85% or better are represented on the list: Reichard (14, 100%), Oldroyd (13, 100%), Oklahoma State junior Alex Hale (13, 92.9%), Wyoming sophomore John Hoyland (13, 92.9%), Western Kentucky junior Brayden Narveson (13, 92.9%), UAB sophomore Matt Quinn (11, 91.7%), Auburn senior Anders Carlson (20, 90.9%), Indiana junior Charles Campbell (10, 90.9%), Nebraska super senior Connor Culp (13, 86.7%), Duke sophomore Charlie Ham (13, 86.7%), Louisville junior James Turner (13, 86.7%), LSU junior Cade York (18, 85.7%), Louisiana Tech sophomore Jacob Barnes (12, 85.7%), Kentucky super senior Mark Ruffolo (12, 85.7%), UTSA super senior Hunter Duplessis (17, 85%), and Missouri sophomore Harrison Mevis (17, 85%).

Even though last year's season was shortened, more and more field goals are getting kicked from long distance. All six returning kickers who made at least 3 field goals from 50 yards or further were voted onto the Watch List: York (6), Oklahoma junior Gabe Brkic (4), Campbell (3), Mevis (3), Oldroyd (3), and Georgia junior Jack Podlesny (3).

While the Watch List highlights 30 of the best returning kickers in the country, the Groza Committee will be watching all FBS kickers throughout the season, and releasing a weekly "Stars of the Week" feature on www.lougrozaaward.com. All FBS kickers remain eligible to be selected as semifinalists.

Accomplishments are tabulated throughout the season and the Lou Groza Collegiate Place-Kicker Award will announce its 20 semifinalists on Thursday, November 4th. From this list, a panel of more than 100 FBS head coaches, SIDs, media members, former Groza finalists, and current NFL kickers selects the top three finalists for the award, announced on Tuesday, November 23rd. That same group then selects the

national winner, who will be announced on Thursday, December 9th during the Home Depot College Football Awards on ESPN.

The 30th Annual Lou Groza Collegiate Place-Kicker Award, presented by the Orange Bowl Committee, recognizes the three finalists during a celebration in Palm Beach County, culminating with a gala awards banquet at West Palm Beach's Kravis Center for the Performing Arts on December 6th.

The Award is named for National Football League Hall of Fame kicker Lou "The Toe" Groza, who played 21 seasons with the Cleveland Browns. Groza won four NFL championships with Cleveland and was named NFL Player of the Year in 1954. Although an All-Pro offensive lineman as well, Groza ushered in the notion that there should be a place on an NFL roster for a kicker.

A 2020 Groza semifinalist, Barnes started his collegiate kicking career with eight straight makes, including a 51 yarder in his second game and a 4-for-4 performance on the road at UTSA. Although he suffered his first miss against UAB, he was able to shake off the mistake and hit the game-winning 35-yard FG in double overtime for a 37-34 victory.

A Groza semifinalist in 2018, Biscardi needs just 4 field goals to move to the top of Coastal Carolina's career record book. One of those makes was crucial to getting the Chanticleers' perfect regular season going, as he hit from 40 yards with just seconds left to secure a 30-27 win on the road against a ranked Louisiana team that finished 10-1.

A Groza semifinalist in both 2019 and 2020, Brkic followed up his perfect (17-17 FG, 52-52 XP) freshman season with another stellar campaign. His 20 field goals tie for the most by a kicker who returns this year, and made him just the 4^{th} Sooner to ever reach that mark in a season. He kicked multiple FGs in 8 of 10 games, including the final 7 of the year.

The list of returning kickers who made at least 90% of their field goals while connecting on 3 kicks from 50+ yards: Groza finalist Jake Oldroyd and Charles Campbell. That's it. Two of those long-distance kicks, including his career-long from 53, came in the Outback Bowl, making him just the second Hoosier in program history with two 50+ FGs in the same game.

Perhaps even more impressive is that he didn't get an attempt in 3 games, making it up with multiple FGs in each of Auburn's other 8 contests, including four 3-FG games.

After a transfer from Mississippi State, Christmann will try to fill the shoes of two-time Groza semifinalist Evan McPherson, the only kicker taken in the 2021 NFL Draft. He brings a resume that's topped by his 80% career accuracy, tied for 7th among active FBS kickers with more than two seasons.

In his first season at Nebraska, Culp earned Big Ten Kicker of the Year honors with his 13-for-15 FG season. That mark also ties him for 2^{nd} among returning kickers for the best accuracy rate on at least 15 attempts. He put on a pair of 3-for-3 performances, one on the road at Penn State and the other featuring the longest Nebraska FG since 2016.

A starter since he stepped on campus, Dicker needs just 61 points to become the Longhorns' all-time leading kick-scorer, and third among all players in program history. A Groza semifinalist in 2019, Dunn already ranks as NC State's all-time leading field goal kicker with 56 career makes. That total comes on a career accuracy rate of 83.6%, making him one of just three active kickers who can claim both 50 FGs and an 80% connection rate. He needs 43 points to become the program's all-time leading scorer.

His 85% accuracy ranked 4th among FBS kickers who attempted at least 20 kicks last year. He set UTSA's single-season scoring mark, with 15 coming in a 51-48 20T victory over Texas State capped by his 29-yard winner.

Though he only played in 6 games, he still led Oklahoma State in scoring, and provided more than the margin in 3 victories.

Among active kickers with that much experience, his career 85% accuracy rate ranks third, bolstered by his memorable 20-for-21 sophomore season and staying perfect on four attempts in a very short season for the Cougars last year.

A grad transfer from USC, McGrath joins Tennessee on a streak of 70 consecutive made extra point attempts dating back to the 2017 season. He has 31 FGs in 30 career games, including one of the top scoring performances by a kicker in recent memory, going 5-for-5 on FGs and 4-for-4 on XPs for a 19-point game in the 2018 season opener against UNLV.

The freshman nailed a long distance kick in each of two 3-for-3 performances, both coming on the road in post-Thanksgiving weather. His 53 yarder against Toledo was the longest by a MAC kicker.

Against Arkansas, he scored a remarkable 20 points, going 5-for-5 on both FGs and XPs, including a 32-yard FG as time expired to lift Mizzou to a 50-48 victory and create an instant legend.

His only miss on the year came from 50 yards, but he bettered that try when he hit from 53 for the third-longest FG in program history. Among returning kickers, last year's 12 makes from at least 30 yards tie for 4th most.

A finalist for the 2020 Groza Award, Oldroyd showed a rare combination of accuracy and leg strength with more than half of his 13 perfect attempts coming from at least 40 yards out. His 3 long distance field goals are the most by a kicker in a perfect season since at least 2004. At one point he hit 72 straight extra point attempts, setting a new BYU record.

In addition to the win, the kick gave him 3 from 50+ yards, tied for third among returning kickers.

In Clemson's two battles with Notre Dame last year, he went a combined 6-for-6 on field goals and totaled 26 points.

Over the final five games of the season, Quinn finished with a remarkable 10-for-10 field goal total. That includes a 3-for-3 performance on the road in the Conference USA Championship game in which he hit from 42 and 48 yards in the fourth quarter to secure the Blazers' 22-13 win over Marshall.

Staying perfect on eight attempts in just five games, Redding led the Pac-12 in both accuracy and field goals per game. He put up matching 3-for-3 FG, 3-for-3 XP performances in back-to-back win over Oregon State and on the road against Colorado. In two seasons, his career line at Utah stands at 18-for-21 on field goals and 73-for-73 on extra points.

A finalist for the 2020 Groza Award, Reichard didn't miss an attempt of any kind last season. His 14 field goals were the most by a kicker without a miss, while his 126 total points led the nation in kick-scoring. Despite not getting a field goal attempt in three games, he notched double-digit points in 8 out of 13 contests, including the CFP National Championship.

It was the first time a Kentucky kicker had made three field goals in a bowl game and sets him up to enter the season a streak of six straight makes.

The 2018 Lou Groza Award winner, Szmyt enters the year tied for fourth among active kickers with 56 field goals, on a career accuracy rate of 86.2% that would put him in the top ten all-time. He needs just 4 field goals and 44 points to become Syracuse's program record holder in each category.

Among kickers with just two seasons of experience, his 36 FGs rank third, with 23 of them coming from 30+ yards.
