TOP 5 TEAMS CLASH AS CLEMSON FACES GEORGIA IN PRIME TIME

Clemson will kick off its 2021 campaign on Saturday, Sept. 4 with one of the nation's most anticipated games of the season, as the No. 3/2 Tigers face the No. 5/5 Georgia Bulldogs in a neutral-site rivalry renewal. Kickoff at Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. ET.

Even for a series that previously featured contests that propelled the schools to national championships in consecutive years in 1980 (Georgia) and 1981 (Clemson), from a rankings standpoint, the regional rivalry has never been grander. Clemson and Georgia have met with both schools in the AP Top 10 only once: No. 8 Clemson's 38-35 victory against No. 5 Georgia in 2013. Saturday's matchup will represent the first time the two schools will meet with both programs in the AP Top 5.

Including games against No. 2 Notre Dame and No. 3 Ohio State to end last season, the opener against No. 5 Georgia will be Clemson's third straight contest against an AP Top 5 opponent. The stretch marks Clemson's first time in school history facing three consecutive AP Top 5 opponents.

With a No. 5 ranking in both the AP and Coaches Polls, this 2021 Georgia squad will tie for the second-highest-ranked opponent Clemson has faced in a season opener in school history. Prior to 2021, Clemson's highest-ranked season opener according to the AP Poll came in 1963, when Head Coach Frank Howard's Tigers fell on the road to No. 4 Oklahoma, 31-14. Clemson's three next highest-ranked season openers have all come against Georgia, including contests against No.

5 Georgia in 2013, No. 6 Georgia in 1982 and No. 8 Georgia in 2002.

The contest will be Clemson's first since a 49-28 defeat at the hands of Ohio State to end the 2020 season, but Clemson has historically responded well following losses under Head Coach Dabo Swinney. Swinney's Clemson teams are 26-6 in games following a loss, including season openers following a loss in the previous season finale. Clemson has played 127 games since losing back-to-back contests, the longest active streak in the nation and the longest in ACC history, per ESPN. Clemson's last time losing back-to-back games came in 2011, a note Clemson will try to keep active with a victory on Saturday.

NOTES

WHAT TO WATCH FOR IN 2021

- Clemson, which is already the first team in ACC history to win six consecutive outright titles, attempting to become the first team in ACC history to win seven consecutive ACC titles outright. (Note: Florida State earned at least a share of nine consecutive ACC titles from 1992-2000 but never earned more than three consecutive titles outright.)

- Clemson attempting to become the first team in any active conference to win seven consecutive outright conference titles. Clemson's six consecutive outright titles from 2015-20 are tied with the 2015-20 Oklahoma Sooners for the longest streak of outright conference championships of any current conference.

- Clemson attempting to join Oklahoma (12 straight Big 8 titles from 1948-59) and BYU (seven straight WAC titles from 1978-84) as the only FBS teams ever to win seven consecutive outright conference titles. Oklahoma can also reach that mark again with a conference title this year.

- Clemson attempting to become the first program to win 21 ACC titles. Since helping form the conference in 1953, Clemson leads the ACC with 20 titles all-time, including 19 outright.

- Clemson attempting to become the first team ever to earn seven consecutive College Football Playoff berths. Clemson's six-year streak is both the longest active streak and the longest streak in CFP history.

- Clemson attempting to win 10 games for a school-record 11th consecutive season. Clemson is presently one of three FBS programs ever to post 10 consecutive 10-win seasons alongside Florida State (14 from 1987-2000) and Alabama (13 from 2008-20). Clemson is already the only school to win 10 games in 10 straight seasons as a member of the ACC, as only the final nine of Florida State's 14-straight 10-win seasons came during the Seminoles' tenure in the ACC.

- Clemson attempting to finish in the AP Top 5 for a seventh consecutive season, which would tie USC (2002-08), Miami (Fla.) (1986-92) and Oklahoma (1952-58) for the second-longest streak in poll history behind Florida State (14 straight from 1987-2000). Dabo Swinney would join Bobby Bowden, Pete Carroll and Bud Wilkinson as the only coaches ever to produce seven consecutive AP Top 5 finishes.

- Clemson (94) attempting to remain ranked in the AP Top 10 for six more consecutive polls to join Miami (Fla.) (137 straight AP Top 10 rankings from 1985-93) as the only programs ever to rank in the Top 10 of 100 consecutive AP Polls. (Note: Alabama can also accomplish this feat, as its 94-poll active streak currently matches Clemson's).

- Clemson (57 straight polls in the AP Top 5) attempting to rank in the Top 5 of 11 more consecutive AP Polls to tie (or 12 more consecutive AP Polls to break) Alabama's record of 68 consecutive polls in the AP Top 5 from 2015-19.

- Clemson's 2021 senior class (39 from 2018-20) needing 11 wins to become the fifth Clemson class (and 13th class in FBS history) to win 50 games in four years. Each of Clemson's last four senior classes have reached the 50-win mark. A 15-win season in 2021 would pull the group to 54 career wins, one shy of the FBS record of 55, shared by the 2018 and 2019 Clemson and 2018 Alabama seniors.

- Clemson (24 from 2017-19) needing seven regular season ACC wins to match or eight regular season ACC wins to break the four-year ACC record of 31, shared by Clemson's 2020 seniors and multiple Florida State classes from 1995-2000.

- Clemson facing 10 Power Five Conference opponents in regular season play. During Clemson's

active 10-year streak of 10-win seasons, Clemson has played 119 games against Power Five foes — the most in the country — and leads the nation with 102 wins against Power Five teams in that span. The 2021 season will be Clemson's 20th consecutive season facing at least 10 Power Five opponents.

- Clemson entering the season with an active winning streak against 10 of the 12 teams on its schedule. Clemson has active winning streaks against Wake Forest (12), Boston College (10), NC State (eight), Georgia Tech (six), Louisville (six), South Carolina (six), Florida State (five), South Carolina State (four), Syracuse (three) and Pitt (two). Georgia won its last meeting with Clemson in 2014, and the Tigers have never faced UConn.

- Clemson (28 consecutive home wins since 2016) attempting to win all six home games to pull within three victories of Florida State's ACC-record 37-game home winning streak from 1992-2001. (Note: Miami (Fla.) won an FBS-record 58 consecutive home games from 1985-94 prior to joining the ACC in 2004.)

- Clemson (school-record 28 consecutive home wins since 2016) needing two home wins to produce the 24th 30-game home winning streak in FBS history. It would be the first since Boise State and Oklahoma in 2011. Six home wins in 2021 would move Clemson into 15th place in FBS history, one shy of Boise State's 35 straight home wins from 2005-11.

- The 2021 Clemson seniors (20-0 at home from 2018-20) attempting to become the second Clemson senior class in the modern era (and in Death Valley history) to go undefeated at home in a four-year span, joining the 2020 seniors.

- The 2021 Clemson seniors (20-0 at home from 2018-20) attempting to win all six home games to tie for fifth in school history in home wins over a four-year span. Clemson's last four senior classes are all tied for the school record with 27 career home wins each. The 26 home wins would match the three classes preceding the record holders, as Clemson's 2014, 2015 and 2016 seniors all won 26 home games in four years.

- Clemson attempting to win all its home games in five consecutive seasons for the first time under Head Coach Dabo Swinney.

- Clemson attempting to win at least six home games to add to its active 10-year streak of winning at least six games at Memorial Stadium.

- Clemson attempting to post a perfect record in true road games for the fifth time in seven years.

- Head Coach Dabo Swinney attempting to win his eighth ACC championship. His seven current ACC titles are second only to Florida State's Bobby Bowden (12).

- Swinney attempting to win his eighth conference championship to tie Frank Howard for the most in Clemson history. Howard won two Southern Conference titles (1940,48) and six ACC titles (1956,58,59,65,66,67) in his 30-year run with the Tigers.

- Swinney (140-33) needing 10 wins to become the second coach in school history to win 150 games as Clemson's head coach (Frank Howard, 165).

- Swinney, who is entering his 14th season as Clemson's head coach (including a seven-game interim stint in 2008), needing 10 wins to join Urban Meyer and Bob Stoops as the only coaches in FBS history to win 150 games in the first 15 years of a career. Meyer won 165 games in his first 15 seasons, while Stoops won 160 games in his first 15 years.

- Swinney (85-17 in ACC regular season play) needing one regular season conference win to pass Virginia's George Welsh (85) for sole possession of the second-most regular season conference wins in ACC history.

- Swinney (17) sitting one bowl game appearance

- Swinney (10) sitting one bowl victory (including CFP National Championship Games) shy of tying Bobby Bowden's ACC record (11) for the most career bowl wins leading an ACC program.

- Swinney and Duke Head Coach David Cutcliffe) becoming two of 10 head coaches ever to coach 14 or more seasons as head of an ACC program, joining Virginia's George Welsh, Florida State's Bobby Bowden, North Carolina and Wake Forest's Bill Dooley, NC State's Earle Edwards, Clemson's Frank Howard, Virginia and Wake Forest's Al Groh, Wake Forest's Jim Grobe and Duke's Bill Murray.

- Swinney (173 career games) coaching two games to become only the fifth person ever to coach an ACC team in 175 career games (Bobby Bowden, George Welsh, Bill Dooley and Al Groh). At 173 career games, Swinney is presently tied with NC State's Earle Edwards for fifth-most games coaches leading an ACC program, one ahead

of Frank Howard, who coached 172 of his 295 games at Clemson as a member of the ACC.

- Swinney (173) coaching six games to pass Virginia and Wake Forest's Al Groh (178) for fourth-most career games coached as a member of the ACC.

- Clemson, which has produced each of the last three ACC Players of the Year (Travis Etienne in 2018-19, Trevor Lawrence in 2020) attempting to become the first school to produce four consecutive ACC Players of the Year.

- Clemson producing a single-season leading rusher other than Travis Etienne or Wayne Gallman for the first time since 2013. Gallman led Clemson in rushing every year from 2014-16, and Etienne led Clemson in the category every season from 2017-20 (joining James Davis as the only Clemson players to lead the team in rushing for four years). Clemson true freshmen running backs Will Shipley and Phil Mafah were in fifth grade the last time someone other than Etienne or Gallman led Clemson in rushing for a season.

- Running back Lyn-J Dixon (1,372) needing 628 rushing yards to become the 21st player in school history to reach 2,000 career rushing yards.

- Tight end Braden Galloway (481) needing 519 receiving yards to become the third Clemson tight end since 2000 to reach 1,000 career receiving yards (Dwayne Allen and Jordan Leggett).

- Placekicker B.T. Potter (243) needing 19 points to move past Chris Gardocki (261) to move into the Top 10 in Clemson history in career points.

- Potter (243) needing 57 points to become the eighth player (and fifth kicker) in school history to reach 300 career points.

- Potter (32) needing 18 field goals to become the eighth kicker in school history to make 50 career field goals.

- Wide receiver Justyn Ross (17) needing three touchdown receptions to join DeAndre Hopkins (27), Sammy Watkins (27), Tee Higgins (27), Mike Williams (21), Aaron Kelly (20) and Deon Cain (20) as the only players in school history to record 20 career touchdown catches. He is 10 touchdown receptions shy of matching the school record shared by Hopkins, Watkins and Higgins.

- Ross (1,865) needing 448 receiving yards to pass Derrick Hamilton (2,312) to move into the Top 10 in Clemson history in career receiving yards.

- Ross (112) needing 38 receptions to become the 12th player in Clemson history to reach 150 career receptions.

- Ross (112) needing 51 receptions to pass Terry Smith (162) to move into the Top 10 in Clemson history in career receptions.

- Punter Will Spiers, linebacker James Skalski and wide receiver/holder Will Swinney (56 games each) entering 2021 three game appearances shy of tying or four game appearances shy of breaking the Clemson record for career games played currently shared by Tanner Muse, Cannon Smith, K'Von Wallace and Christian Wilkins (59 each). Safety Nolan Turner has appeared in 55 career games, one behind the trio of Spiers, Skalski and Swinney.

- Spiers entering the year with a 41.4-yard career punting average, 2.1 yards shy of the Clemson career record (43.5, Chris Gardocki from 1988-90).

- Turner (1,537), Clemson's active leader in career snaps, needing 710 defensive snaps to enter the Top 50 in school history in career snaps from scrimmage. Pro Football Hall of Fame safety Brian Dawkins presently ranks 50th with 2,247 snaps from scrimmage.

WHAT TO WATCH FOR THIS WEEK

- Clemson and Georgia staging only the fourth season-opening game of two AP Top 5 teams since 2000, according to The Athletic's Matt Brown. The others include No. 1 Alabama's 24-7 win against No. 3 Florida State in 2017, No. 4 LSU's 40-27 win against No. 3 Oregon in 2011 and No. 5 Miami's 16-10 win against No. 4 Florida State in 2004. Prior to 2004, the two most recent such games were in 1999 (No. 3 Penn State 41, No. 4 Arizona 7) and 1986 (No. 1 Oklahoma 38, No. 4 UCLA 3).

- Clemson attempting to earn a 14th all-time victory against an AP Top 5 opponent. Ten of Clemson's 13 all-time wins against AP Top 5 teams have come under Head Coach Dabo Swinney.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 10-6 all-time in games between two AP Top 5 teams. Clemson is 7-4 since 2016 when both teams enter a game in the AP Top 5.

- Clemson playing a third straight contest against an AP Top 5 opponent for the first time in school history. Clemson has played back-to-back games against Top 5 teams five times, including the 2015 College Football Playoff (No. 4 Oklahoma and No. 2 Alabama), 2016 College Football Playoff (No. 2 Ohio State and No. 1 Alabama), 2018 College Football Playoff (No. 3 Notre Dame and No. 1 Alabama), 2019 College Football Playoff (No. 2 Ohio State and No. 1 LSU) and the current streak dating to the final two games of 2020 (No. 2 Notre Dame and No. 3 Ohio State).

- Clemson attempting to improve to 15-11 all-time in games between AP Top 10 teams. A win would push Clemson to 10-4 in games between AP Top 10 teams since the start of the 2016 season. For more on Clemson's history in games between Top 10 opponents, see the "Top 10 History" section later in the notes.

- Clemson and Georgia meeting with both teams ranked in the AP Top 25 for the fifth time in series history. The series is tied at 2-2 in games in which both teams are ranked.

- Clemson and Georgia facing off with both teams in the AP Top 10 for only the second time in series history, joining No. 8 Clemson's 38-35 defeat of No. 5 Georgia in 2013.

- Clemson playing its third neutral-site season opener in school history (including games in Atlanta against Alabama in 2008 and against Auburn in 2012) and its fourth off-site opener, including one against Alabama in Birmingham in 1904.

- Clemson opening a season against another Power Five Conference opponent outside of the ACC for the first time since 2016, when Clemson earned a 19-13 win at Auburn to kick off a national championship season.

- Clemson opening a season against an SEC opponent for the fifth time under Head Coach Dabo Swinney. Clemson is 3-1 in season openers against SEC foes in his tenure, including a 1-1 mark against Georgia.

- Clemson entering the neutral-site showdown with Georgia having won six of its last seven neutral-site regular season games.

- Clemson attempting to improve upon its 7-1 all-time record at Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte, the site of the season opener. That includes a 1-0 mark in regular season play (vs. Temple in 2006) and a 6-0 record in ACC Championship Games.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 95-23-8 all-time in season openers, regardless of site. Clemson has won 29 of its last 36 openers, including an 11-1 mark in openers under Dabo Swinney and victories in each of the last six season debuts.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 13-4 against SEC opponents in the College Football Playoff era. Clemson

has won its last six games against SEC East foes and is also 6-2 against the SEC West since the start of the 2016 season.

- Clemson attempting to extend its regular season winning streak against SEC opponents to 11 games. Clemson's current 10-game regular season winning streak against SEC teams dates to 2014.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 27-6 in games following a loss under Dabo Swinney, including season openers following a loss in the previous season finale.

- Clemson attempting to push its streak of games since losing back-to-back contests to 128. Clemson's current streak of 127 games without consecutive losses is the longest active streak in the nation and the longest in ACC history, per ESPN. Clemson hasn't lost two games in a row since 2011.

NOTES

- Clemson attempting to win its 25th consecutive non-conference game in regular season play, dating to 2014. Clemson's last regular season non-conference loss came in the 2014 season opener against Georgia. The current 24-game regular season non-conference streak includes wins against South Carolina (six), Auburn (two), Texas A&M (two), Notre Dame (one) and others. Including postseason play, Clemson is 31-5 overall in non-conference play in the College Football Playoff era (since 2014).

- Clemson attempting to push its winning streak in September games to 25. Clemson's last September loss came in 2014 at No. 1 Florida State. Clemson is 23-0 in September games since 2015, the only team in the country with a perfect September record in that span.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 68-3 in regular season play since the start of the 2015 season.

- Clemson attempting to reach 400 yards of offense for a 13th consecutive game dating to last season, which would add to the third-longest streak in school history, trailing only a 16-game streak from 2018-19 and a 15-game streak from 2016-17.

- Clemson attempting to record multiple rushing touchdowns in a 29th consecutive game. The last time Clemson was held to a single rushing touchdown was in a 27-point win in the 2018 Cotton Bowl against Notre Dame.

- Clemson entering the game having recorded multiple sacks in 34 of its last 35 games, including each of its last 18.

- Clemson attempting to record at least two sacks in a 19th straight game to surpass an 18-game streak from 1991-92 as Clemson's longest streak on record back to 1980.

- Head Coach Dabo Swinney attempting to improve to 13-6 as a head coach all-time in games against schools from the state of Georgia. He enters the game with a 9-5 mark against Georgia Tech, a 1-1 record against Georgia and a 1-0 mark against both Georgia State and Georgia Southern.

- Swinney facing Georgia Head Coach Kirby Smart for the first time in Smart's head coaching career. Smart is one of three coaches against whom Clemson is playing for the first time this regular season, along with Florida State's Mike Norvell and South Carolina's Shane Beamer. Clemson has won its most recent contest against all other head coaches on its 2021 schedule.

- Placekicker B.T. Potter (243 career points) needing seven more points to become the 12th player in school history to reach 250 career points. He would be the eighth Clemson player to reach 250 kicking points.

- Potter (32 career field goals) needing two more field goals to enter the Top 10 in Clemson history in career field goals.

- Potter (147 career PATs) needing three more PATs to join Greg Huegel (217 from 2015-18), Chandler Catanzaro (203 from 2010-13) and Aaron Hunt (164 from 2000-03) as the only players in school history to convert 150 career PATs.

- Potter entering the game with five career field goals of 50 yards or more. He is presently tied for the school record for career 50-yard field goals with Chris Gardocki (1988-90) and Donald Igwebuike (1981-84).

- Wide receiver Justyn Ross (1,865) needing 135 receiving yards to become the 16th player in school history to reach 2,000 career receiving yards.

- Punter Will Spiers starting his 57th game to tie the school record held by tackle Mitch Hyatt (57 from 2015-18).

- Spiers, linebacker James Skalski and wide receiver/holder Will Swinney each playing in their 57th career games to tie Chad Diehl (2007-11) for eighth in school

history.

- Quarterback D.J. Uiagalelei entering the game with zero interceptions on 117 career pass attempts. He needs 48 more pass attempts without an interception to tie the Clemson record for most pass attempts without an interception to start a career, presently held by Cullen Harper (first 165 passes of his career that spanned 2005-07).

- Uiagalelei entering the game having thrown for 300 yards in both of his two career starts. He is already one of only 13 Clemson quarterbacks with a 300-yard passing game to their credit and one of only seven with multiple 300-yard passing games. Another 300-yard passing game would be his third and would bring him within one of tying his position coach — Passing Game Coordinator/Quarterbacks Coach Brandon Streeter (four) — for fifth-most in school history.

- Uiagalelei attempting to become the first quarterback in Clemson history to record 300 passing yards in each of his first three career starts.

TOP 10 HISTORY

- Saturday's contest will represent the 26th matchup of AP Top 10 teams in Clemson history. Clemson is 14-11 all-time in games when both teams enter ranked in the Top 10 of the AP Poll.

- Twenty of Clemson's 25 previous all-time Top 10 matchups have come under Head Coach Dabo Swinney, with Swinney posting a 12-8 record in those contests. Danny Ford went 2-1 in three career Top 10 games, including the Orange Bowl to conclude Clemson's 1981 national championship season. Frank Howard and Tommy Bowden each lost their lone matchup of Top 10 teams in their Clemson tenures.

- Clemson has won 11 of its last 16 games between Top 10 teams in the College Football Playoff era.

- Fourteen of the 25 games have been contested at neutral sites. All 14 previous neutral-site Top 10 games were postseason contests, including three ACC Championship Games and 11 bowl games. Saturday's game will be Clemson's first neutral-site Top 10 matchup in the regular season.

- Saturday's game will mark only the second time that Clemson and Georgia have faced one another with both teams ranked in the AP Top 10. Clemson won the only other meeting, a 38-35 home win for the eighth-ranked Tigers over the fifth-ranked Bulldogs.

- The game will also be Clemson's 16th between two Top 5 teams all-time. The Tigers are 9-6 in games contested between two AP Top 5 squads, the first of which was No. 1 Clemson's 1981 national championship victory over No. 4 Nebraska in the Orange Bowl.

SERIES HISTORY VS. GEORGIA

Georgia holds a 42-18-4 advantage in the series dating to the teams' first meeting in 1897. Georgia won the first three games in the series, all in Athens between 1897 and 1899. Clemson's first win was a 39-5 triumph in Athens in 1900 behind Head Coach John Heisman. The victory gave Heisman a 4-0 record to open his first season. Heisman was a perfect 4-0 against Georgia as Clemson's coach.

Clemson won seven games in a row in the series between 1900-06 and held a 7-3 lead in the series through 10 games. The two teams were 8-8-1 against each other from 1897-1914 before Georgia went on a 21-1-2 run in the series between 1915-73. Clemson's only win during that time was a 26-7 win in 1955. Clemson broke an eight-game losing streak in the series in 1974 with a 28-24 win at Death Valley.

The two teams split 11 games (5-5-1) between 1977-87. The 11 games were separated by 12 total points as Georgia outscored Clemson by a cumulative score of 171-159 in those games. When Danny Ford and Vince Dooley coached against each other nine times in that period, the aggregate score was 153 for Georgia and 152 for Clemson. Ford and Dooley were 4-4-1 against each other in that time span.

Clemson broke a five-game Georgia winning streak in the series in 2013 with a 38-35 victory at Memorial Stadium. Prior to that win, the Tigers had last beaten Georgia in 1990 by a 34-3 score under first-year coach Ken Hatfield. Clemson's defense, led by future pros Levon Kirkland, Ed McDaniel, Brentson Buckner, Chester McGlockton and Robert O'Neal, held the Bulldogs out of the end zone.

CLEMSON-GEORGIA NEUTRAL-SITE HISTORY

Saturday's game will be the ninth neutral-site game between Clemson and Georgia all-time but the first to be played outside of the programs' home states of South Carolina and Georgia.

From 1907-13, the two programs met in Augusta, Ga. every year as part of the annual Georgia-Carolina Fair. That included a 5-0 Clemson win in 1909. E.H. Pinkney starred for Clemson at quarterback that year, recording several long runs and completing a 30-yard touchdown pass (which had just become legal in 1906). Despite missing the point-after attempt, Clemson's stingy defense held Georgia scoreless for the contest in what was the second of Clemson's three consecutive shutouts in a 10-day span.

The only other location in which the programs have met outside of Augusta, Athens or Clemson was in Anderson, S.C. in 1916. That year, Clemson hosted Georgia at Cater Park, the home of the Anderson Fair, in a game that drew a standing-room-only crowd for which 1,500 temporary

CLEMSON-GEORGIA MEMORIES

- **1897:** Clemson and Georgia met for the first time in a season opener in Athens. It was the fourth game in Clemson history and the first time Clemson had played a game outside the state of South Carolina.

- **1903:** Clemson beat Georgia 29-0. In the first 10 minutes, Clemson fumbled the ball three times. After the game, Georgia's team made a deal with Clemson. They would give the Clemson team a bushel of apples for every additional point Clemson would defeat Georgia Tech by above the 29-point margin by which it defeated Georgia. The score turned out to be Clemson 73, Georgia Tech 0. Apples were plentiful around Clemson that winter - 44 bushels.

- **1962:** Hal Davis raced 98 yards with a kickoff return for a touchdown against Georgia, the last time a Tiger would return a kickoff for a score for 25 years.

- **1963:** Clemson and Georgia tied 7-7, but the main item of interest was the strange weather. A hail storm hit at 2:50 p.m. and caused temperatures to plummet from 84 degrees to 57 degrees in 45 minutes. Almost an inch of hail poured in a 20-minute period and the game was delayed. Clemson blocked two field goal attempts to preserve the tie.

- **1974:** Clemson defeated Georgia in Death Valley, 28-24, giving Clemson wins over Georgia and Georgia Tech in the same season for the first time since 1914.

- **1977:** Clemson defeated Georgia, 7-6, the first time that Clemson had won in Athens since 1914.

- **1979:** Clemson won its 400th game in history with a 12-7 victory over Georgia.

- **1981:** Clemson forced nine Georgia turnovers, the most ever by a Clemson opponent, in handing Herschel Walker his only regular season loss as a Bulldog, 13-3. The Bulldogs were the defending national champions and ranked fourth in the nation entering the contest.

- **1984:** Georgia defeated Clemson in Athens, 26-23, on a 60-yard field goal by Kevin Butler with 11 seconds left. Clemson, who had a 20-6 lead at halftime, ran the ensuing kickoff back to Georgia territory and a personal foul was thrown against the Bulldogs after the tackle. But, after a long debate, officials ruled the game had ended when the foul was committed and Donald Igwebuike, who led the nation in field goal percentage in 1984 (17-of-18) was denied an opportunity to tie the game from 42 yards away.

- **1985:** Clemson and Georgia met in the first nationally televised football game from Clemson, when Georgia won the game, 20-13, on CBS thanks to a fourth-quarter fumble recovery by offensive lineman Peter Anderson.

- **1986:** Clemson defeated Georgia, 31-28, as David Treadwell kicked a 46-yard field goal with no time left on the clock. Athens, Ga. native Norman Haynes led Clemson in tackles with 14, while Terrance Flagler led the offense with nearly 200 all-purpose yards.

- **1987:** David Treadwell struck again, booting a 21-yard field goal with two seconds left to beat Georgia on national TV, 21-20.

- **1995 -** Clemson wore "turn back the clock" uniforms for the Clemson-Georgia game at Death Valley. The uniforms were replicas of those worn by the 1939 Clemson team that went to the Cotton Bowl, the first bowl appearance in Clemson history. Georgia won the thrilling game, 19-17, but that would be Clemson's final regular season loss of 1995. Leomont Evans had 18 tackles in the contest, most ever by a Clemson defensive back.

- **2003:** While it was a forgettable day for the Tigers, a 30-0 shutout at the hands of Georgia represented the last time Clemson has been shutout. In the time since, Clemson has scored in a school-record 240 consecutive

games, one of the 25 longest streaks in FBS history.

- **2013:** Clemson defeated No. 5 Georgia, 38-35, in front of 84,350 fans at Death Valley. Clemson was ranked No. 8 and the win gave the Tigers consecutive wins over top-10 SEC teams. Sammy Watkins had a 77-yard receiving touchdown from Tajh Boyd, who threw three passing touchdowns and ran for two others. Danny Ford was inducted into the Clemson Ring of Honor prior to the game.

LAST MEETING

Georgia 45, Clemson 21

(Aug. 30, 2014 at Athens, Ga.)

No. 12 Georgia pulled away late to defeat No. 16 Clemson 45-21 in Athens behind an impressive rushing attack. It was the Tigers' first loss in a season-opener under Head Coach Dabo Swinney.

Georgia's ground game, led by Todd Gurley, amassed 328 yards, with Gurley accounting for 198. Behind Gurley, the Bulldogs scored two touchdowns to end the first quarter with a 14-7 lead.

The Clemson defense played effectively in the first half, holding Georgia to 68 passing yards and 45 rushing yards. But after Clemson took a 21-14 lead on C.J. Davidson's one-yard touchdown run in the second quarter, Gurley broke through, taking a kickoff return 100 yards to tie the score again.

Georgia kicked a field goal in the third quarter to take the lead for good, while the Bulldog defense kept Clemson off the scoreboard during the entire second half. Georgia scored on three consecutive offensive plays in the fourth quarter to pull away.

Clemson played two quarterbacks — Cole Stoudt and Deshaun Watson — in the game. Stoudt now works in offensive player development on Clemson's 2020 support staff.

Stoudt took Clemson on a 70-yard, 12-play drive to open the game and gave the Tigers a 7-0 lead. He finished the game 16-for-29 for 144 yards through the air. Watson drove Clemson 78 yards in six plays in the second period to tie the game at 14. On a 30-yard scoring pass to Charone Peake, Watson became the first Clemson first-year freshman quarterback to throw a touchdown pass since 2007 when Willy Korn threw a scoring pass

against Furman. At the time, those represented the only touchdown passes thrown by a Tiger true freshman quarterback in 20 years. In the time since, Clemson has had four true freshmen record touchdown passes: Hunter Johnson, Trevor Lawrence, D.J. Uiagalelei and Hunter Helms.

The state of Georgia has produced each of Clemson's last two Heisman Trophy finalists. Deshaun Watson set Georgia state high school records for total offense yards, passing yards and touchdowns during his four-year tenure at Gainesville High School. His marks for passing yards and touchdowns would later be broken by Cartersville High School's Trevor Lawrence. Though their Clemson tenures did not overlap, the prodigious Peach State quarterback duo combined for 66 wins as starters, six 10-win seasons, five College Football Playoff berths, four National Championship Game appearances and two national titles in their respective eras at Clemson spanning 2014-20 (excluding 2017).

Including Homer Jordan, an Athens, Ga. native who started at quarterback for Clemson's 1981 national title team, all three starting quarterbacks for Clemson's three national championship squads have hailed from the Peach State. Georgia-raised signal callers have also played a significant role in Clemson's in-state rivalry, as starting quarterbacks from Georgia are 17-0 for Clemson against rival South Carolina since 1979. Clemson's last starting quarterback from Georgia to lose to the Gamecocks was Bill Lott (Jessup, Ga.) in 1979.

Including Jordan, Watson and Lawrence, Georgia has been a key pipeline for many of Clemson's best squads. Clemson's 1981 national championship team featured 22 players from the state of Georgia. Clemson's 2016 national championship team had 19 Georgians on the roster. Clemson's 2018 national championship squad included 21 Georgia natives, including six players who started that year's 44-16 national title game win against Alabama.

SEASON OPENERS

Clemson has won 29 of its last 36 season openers. Head Coach Dabo Swinney is 11-1 in openers in his career and has an opportunity to avenge the only season-opening loss of his head coaching career (at Georgia in 2014). Swinney's 11 season-opening wins are second-most in school history, two ahead of Danny Ford (9) and 14 shy of Frank Howard's record of 25.

Clemson has faced an AP Top 25 opponent in a season opener 11 times since the creation of the AP Poll in 1936. Five of those 11 games have been against a ranked Georgia squad (1982, 2002, 2003, 2013, 2014). With another such contest this week, exactly half of Clemson's all-time season openers against AP-ranked opponents will have come against the Bulldogs.

Clemson was no stranger to exciting season openers

in the first few years after the turn of the century. In 2004, against Wake Forest, Clemson won a 37-30 overtime thriller on ABC. Clemson won at home in 2005, a 25-24 win over No. 17 Texas A&M on a 42-yard field goal by Jad Dean with two seconds left. Clemson also beat No. 19 Florida State in the 2007 season opener.

The Tigers are 94-23-8 (.784) in their first game in their previous 125 seasons. Clemson is 2-1 in off-site season openers, including the 1904 season-opening 18-0 win against Alabama in "neutral" Birmingham and a 26-19 win against Auburn in Atlanta in 2012.

Saturday's game against No. 5 Georgia will tie for Clemson's second-highest-ranked season-opening opponent in school history, matching Clemson's win against No. 5 Georgia to open 2013.

Clemson has enjoyed a recent run of success against opponents from the Southeastern Conference. While the Tigers are 18-10 against SEC foes under the guidance of Head Coach Dabo Swinney, Clemson's success against the SEC has been particularly pronounced as of late, as the Tigers are 12-4 against the conference in the College Football Playoff era, including a 10-1 mark in regular season play during that time frame.

- **Sept. 4, 2004:** Clemson used a last-minute drive, a two-point conversion and two overtimes to defeat Wake Forest, 37-30, in the 2004 season opener. Charlie Whitehurst found Kyle Browning for an 11-yard touchdown pass in the second overtime and the Tiger defense held Wake Forest on four downs to win a conference game on opening day for the first time since 1969.

- **Sept. 4, 2010:** Dawson Zimmerman booted a 79-yard punt in a victory over North Texas, the second-longest punt in Clemson history. He set a school record with a 51.0-yard net average on six punts.

- **Overall:** Clemson is 3-1 all-time in games contested on Sept. 4, including wins against UNLV (1993), Wake Forest (2004) and North Texas (2010).

-- BEST IS THE STANDARD --

TIED FOR MOST WINS SINCE 2015, SECOND-MOST SINCE 2011

Clemson's recent success has been particularly pronounced in the midst of Clemson's six-year streak of College Football Playoff appearances since 2015. Clemson and Alabama have the most wins in the country in that span, with the two teams combining for five out of six national championships in that span.

10-WIN SEASONS

Clemson enters 2021 riding a streak of 10 consecutive seasons with 10+ wins. The program's 10th consecutive 10-win season in 2020 made Clemson only the third program in FBS history to produce a "double-double" — double-digit wins in a double-digit number of consecutive seasons.

The record for consecutive 10-win seasons is 14, set by Florida State (1987-2000). Alabama is the only other program with an active streak of at least 10 straight 10-win seasons.

The Tigers have 17 10-win seasons in school history, with 10 coming under head coach Dabo Swinney.

SENIORS CHASING HISTORY

Every January, Head Coach Dabo Swinney conducts his first official meeting with his new team. The first order of business in the meeting is to "reset the room," reorganizing the seating arrangement with seniors in front and all succeeding classes in order behind them in the team auditorium.

Each of Clemson's last four senior classes have placed themselves among select company in college football history. The 2017, 2018, 2019 and 2020 Clemson seniors account for four of only 12 four-year classes in FBS history to reach 50 career wins. That includes the 2018 and 2019 groups that are tied with the 2018 Alabama seniors for the most wins in FBS history (55 wins in four years).

"A"NOTHER "C"LEMSON "C"HAMPIONSHIP

With its sixth straight conference title last year, Clemson became the first program ever to win 20 ACC Championships, five more than Florida State, which ranks second with 15.

Clemson was the first program in the conference championship game era to win six straight conference championship games. Clemson also became the first ACC program to win six consecutive outright titles, as Florida State had a streak of nine straight ACC titles, but that streak included two co-championships that prevented Bobby Bowden's Seminoles from ever winning more than three straight titles outright.

In 2020, Clemson and Oklahoma's six-year streaks of outright titles made the two programs the first among current Power Five programs to win at least six straight outright titles since Oklahoma (12 from 1948-59) as part of the now-dissolved Big 8 Conference.

Including titles from its days as a member of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association and Southern Conference, Clemson has 26 conference championships overall, also the most of any current ACC school. Duke ranks second among the ACC's current membership with 18 overall conference titles, including 11 Southern Conference titles and seven ACC titles.

The Tigers won the 1900, 1902 and 1903 SIAA Conference championships under John Heisman, then the 1906 SIAA title under Bob Williams. Clemson also won the 1940 and 1948 Southern Conference titles under Frank Howard. Howard won eight total conference titles, including two in the Southern Conference and six in the ACC.

Clemson Football's sixth straight conference title extended a program record and tied for the third-longest ACC championship streak in Clemson Athletics history.

The record is eight in a row by Clemson's men's soccer program between 1972-79. Dr. I.M. Ibrahim was Clemson's coach for all eight of those titles. Ibrahim also led Clemson to national titles in 1984 and 1987 and sits aside Dabo Swinney as the only Clemson coaches in any sport to win two national championships.

Chuck Kriese took the Tigers men's tennis program to seven straight titles from 1983-89. The Clemson women's tennis program won six straight between 1982-87. Mary King won the first title and Andy Johnston won the last five in that run.

POWER OVER THE POWER FIVE

Early in his head coaching tenure, Dabo Swinney laid out his belief to then-Clemson athletic director Terry Don Phillips that the Tigers needed to add tough non-conference challenges on top of their tests in ACC play to serve as a foundation for the program's growth.

"I had a conversation with Terry Don and said, 'Terry Don, I know we are not very good right now, but we need to play people because that is going to help me teach and help me develop the culture and the mindset that you have to have to win at the highest level,'" recounted Swinney. "I didn't think we had that, and that's what we committed to. That's what we've done."

That scheduling philosophy and culture change has resonated in the Clemson program, and since 2013, no team can claim more wins against Power Five Conference opponents than the Tigers.

NO. 1 FOR NO. 1 RECRUITS

As Clemson was in the midst of the winningest decade in school history and tied for the third-winningest decade in major college football history, Head Coach Dabo Swinney would frequently point out that Clemson accomplished its goals by finding the right fits for its program in recruiting rather than chasing recruiting rankings.

Swinney often noted that Clemson accomplished its immense success in his tenure despite never signing

the No. 1 recruiting class in the country. That changed in 2020, when ESPN ranked Clemson's 2020 group as the nation's top recruiting class. Clemson also recorded its highest rankings in both Rivals (No. 2) and 247 Sports (No. 3) history.

Clemson has signed the nation's consensus top player in two out of the last four recruiting cycles, welcoming quarterback Trevor Lawrence in 2018 and defensive tackle Bryan Bresee in 2020.

Clemson and LSU are the only teams in the country to sign Rivals' No. 1 recruit twice in a three-year span since Dabo Swinney was named head coach at Clemson.

Clemson, LSU and Alabama (two each) are tied for the most No. 1 recruits signed since 2009 per Rivals' rankings. Clemson, Georgia and USC (two each) are tied for the most in that span per the 247 Composite.

Clemson's recruiting classes have finished in the top 15 of at least one of three primary recruiting services (ESPN, Rivals and 247 Sports) every year since 2011. Clemson is one of only seven schools to produce a Top 15 class in each of the last 11 recruiting cycles, a group that also includes Alabama, Auburn, Georgia, LSU, Notre Dame and Ohio State. After that group, the next longest active streak of Top 15 classes is six (Florida).

SIGN AND DEVELOP

While proud of his incoming classes, Head Coach Dabo Swinney has long stated that a true ranking of a recruiting class cannot and should not be published until four years later when the group can be evaluated on performance rather than potential.

Much to Swinney's delight, The Athletic has annually assumed that role in recent years, re-ranking every recruiting class four years later to account for on-field performance.

For its re-rankings, The Athletic uses the following grading scale: 5 points: All-American, award winner, top-50 NFL Draft pick; 4: Multi-year starter, all-conference honors; 3: One-year starter or key reserve; 2: Career backup; 0: Minor or no contribution, left the program. The outlet also adds a bonus to each

program's class average, derived from its total number of wins from 2017 through 2020 (e.g.: For re-ranking the Class of 2017, Clemson won 51 games, so its class average received a bonus of 0.51).

Even in its current stretch of recruiting success, Swinney has often pointed out Clemson drops in rankings for signing smaller recruiting classes as a function of lower attrition than other programs, as well as noting that much of Clemson's on-field success is a function of the program's development, citing All-Americans like former three-star Isaiah Simmons or former two-star Nolan Turner. The re-rankings illustrate Clemson's pristine recent track record of talent identification, culture fit, resource allocation and player development.

On average, Clemson finished 13th in the 247 Composite team rankings across the 2014-17 recruiting cycles. Upon re-ranking those groups, Clemson ranked 3.5 on average, a ratings bump of nearly 10 full spots. Each of those Clemson classes won at least 50 games in their four-year window.

Head Coach Dabo Swinney's run of excellence in his tenure at Clemson has placed him in the company of college football legends.

Swinney boasts a career winning percentage of .809, sitting as one of only 13 head coaches in history with at least 10 seasons of FBS head coaching experience to post a mark of .800 or better.

IN SEARCH OF WIN NO. 150

Entering 2021, Head Coach Dabo Swinney is 140-33 in 173 career games and needs 10 more wins to reach 150 career victories.

Among coaches who qualify for the NCAA FBS record book by virtue of five years or 50 wins as a major college head coach, only 15 have ever reached 150 career wins in 200 games or less. Fourteen of the 15 are College Football Hall of Famers, with the 15th — Urban Meyer — likely to be inducted upon meeting eligibility requirements.

The fastest Swinney could reach 150 victories would be 183 games if Clemson were to open 2021 with 10 straight victories. That would place him above Fielding Yost and Joe Paterno to become the fourth-fastest FBS coach to 150 career wins and the third-fastest in the modern era.

Four previous Clemson head coaches earned 150+ FBS wins in their careers: John Heisman (186), Jess Neely (207), Frank Howard (165) and Ken Hatfield (168). Howard, a College Football Hall of Famer, is the only coach to reach 150 career wins as Clemson's head coach. He recorded his 150th victory in his 273rd career game, in a 14-10 victory against Maryland in 1966 that clinched a piece of what later became an outright ACC title. Heisman earned win No. 150 in game No. 203, Neely earned it in game No. 268, and Hatfield did it in game 259, though none of those three won more than 43 games in their Clemson tenures.

According to data furnished by Sports Reference, only five active coaches have recorded at least 150 career victories as an FBS coach (excluding wins coaching at other levels). All five needed at least 200 games to reach 150 career wins, led by TCU's Gary Patterson, who recorded win No. 150 in his 204th career game.

SIX "FINAL FOURS" FOR SWINNEY

While the term "Final Four" may still be the linguistic property of the men's basketball tournament, since the advent of the four-team College Football Playoff in 2014, Head Coach Dabo Swinney has had Clemson among the sport's final four teams in each of the last six seasons, becoming the first coach to lead a team to six consecutive College Football Playoffs since the format's institution in 2014.

The men's college basketball tournament dates to 1939. In the history of that tournament, only John Wooden of UCLA (nine from 1967-75) and Mike Krzyzewski of Duke (five from 1988-92) coached teams to at least five consecutive Final Fours. With his sixth "Final Four" appearance in 2020, Swinney joined basketball's Wooden as the only college football or men's basketball coaches to take teams to six consecutive Final Fours in their respective sports.

During Wooden's streak of nine straight Final Fours, he recorded eight championships and a semifinal loss. Coach K's Blue Devils had two championships, a second-place finish and two semifinal losses in their run. Nick Saban's Final Four history includes three championships, two runner-up finishes and a semifinal loss, while Swinney so far has two championships, two runner-up finishes and two semifinal losses.

Swinney is among only nine coaches in football and men's basketball to record six career Final Four berths. He is one of only six with a winning record in Final Four games.

Swinney's ability to place his team among the nation's elite quartet is also illustrated by the polls. Clemson finished first in the AP Poll in 2016 and 2018, second in 2015 and 2019, third in 2020 and fourth in 2017. Swinney became just the fourth coach to record at least six consecutive top four finishes since the AP Poll began in 1936, an exclusive list that also includes Florida State's Bobby Bowden (13), USC's Pete Carroll (seven) and Oklahoma's Bud Wilkinson (six).

Clemson's streak represents the fifth time a program has had a run of at least six top four finishes in the AP Poll. Miami (Fla.) had a seven-year run from 1986-92 with two different head coaches leading the program.

STAFF CONTINUITY

Clemson has become a beacon of stability in the increasingly unstable environment of college football. Clemson Head Coach Dabo Swinney is in his 19th overall season at Clemson in 2021, including his 13th

full season as head coach (and his 14th including an interim stint in 2008).

From the start of Swinney's first season as full-time head coach in 2009 through 2020, there have been nearly 400 head coaching tenures in the FBS (excluding those by interims), but only one such tenure at Clemson. Clemson and Duke are the only schools in the ACC with only one head coach since the start of the 2009 season, and among the 11 schools ever to qualify for the College Football Playoff, only Clemson and Alabama have had only one head coach since 2009.

A FAMILIAR NO. 1

A year ago, Clemson opened the 2020 season at No. 1 atop both polls, marking the program's second straight top preseason ranking. With the top selection in the AP Poll, Clemson became the sixth program since the inception of the preseason poll in 1950 ever to open consecutive preseason polls at No. 1, joining Alabama (2016-18), USC (2004-05), Oklahoma (1985-87, 1974-75, 1956-57), Ohio State (1969-70) and Notre Dame (1953-54).

Seeing Clemson at No. 1 has started to feel familiar in recent years, as 2020 represented the sixth straight year in which Clemson appeared at No. 1 in at least one AP Poll. Dabo Swinney joined Nick Saban (13) as the only coach in AP Poll history (since 1936) to lead a team to at least one No. 1 ranking in six consecutive years. Clemson, Alabama (14 from 2008-21) and Miami (seven from 1986-92) are the only programs to appear at No. 1 in at least six consecutive years.

A total of 22 coaches have led the AP's top-ranked team into a game at least 15 times. Seventeen of the 22 coaches on the list are College Football Hall of Famers. Swinney holds a total of nine career victories over five coaches on the list, including two each over Bob Stoops, Nick Saban, Urban Meyer and Steve Spurrier and one over Bobby Bowden.

CHAMPIONSHIP HERITAGE

After being named Clemson's full-time coach in December of 2008, Head Coach Dabo Swinney set about securing his first signing class in 2009.

His first class, which he tabbed the "Dandy Dozen," brought home Clemson's first ACC title since 1991 during their junior campaign in 2011. Excluding the incoming freshmen, all of Clemson's signing classes under Swinney have at least one ACC title to their credit in their tenures at Clemson, and every signing class since 2012 has earned at least one College Football Playoff berth.

EXCEEDING EXPECTATIONS

Much like Clemson's recruiting classes that have delivered above national expectation (see "Sign and Develop" section above), Clemson's current decade of 10-win seasons has been built upon exceeding national expectations.

While Clemson's national cache has resulted in elevated preseason perches in recent year years, prior to 2019, Clemson equaled or exceeded its postseason AP and USA Today rankings in comparison to its preseason rankings in eight straight seasons. That included little margin for error in both 2016 and 2018, as Clemson finished No. 1 by winning the national championship to exceed the school's No. 2 preseason ranking both times.

Clemson exceeded its USA Today coaches poll preseason ranking eight straight years from 2011-18, the longest such streak in poll history.

MEETING (AND BEATING) THE BEST

Clemson's first Top 25 matchup of the season came in a 42-17 win against No. 7 Miami on Oct. 10. Clemson added another Top 25 win with a 34-10 handling of No. 2 Notre Dame in the ACC Championship Game.

Since 2015, Clemson is 23-5 (.821) against AP Top 25 teams, the best winning percentage in the ACC and third-best winning percentage in the country.

WHEN IN DOUBT, CLEMSON RESPONDS

After opening the 2020 season as the preseason No. 1, Clemson held firm as the nation's No. 1 team in the AP Poll until Nov. 8, 2020, when the Tigers dropped to No. 4 following a double-overtime loss at Notre Dame. In Head Coach Dabo Swinney's tenure, though opportunities have been limited, the Tigers have routinely responded well following dips in the AP rankings.

Under Swinney, Clemson is 25-4 in games in which it enters ranked lower in the AP Poll than it did in its previous contest. This includes the 2014, 2016, 2017 and 2018 season openers in which Clemson opened the season lower than its ranking from the final game of the previous campaign. Clemson has won its last 17 games when entering ranked lower in the AP Poll than in its previous game.

Clemson is also 26-6 in games following a loss under Swinney, including season openers following a loss in the previous season finale. After a Sugar Bowl loss to conclude 2020, Clemson will attempt to improve that mark in the 2021 season opener against Georgia. Clemson has played 127 games since losing back-to-back contests, the longest active streak in the nation and the longest in ACC history, per ESPN. Clemson's last time losing back-to-back games came in 2011.

TAKING CARE OF BUSINESS

Clemson has won 34 consecutive games against teams unranked in the AP Poll, the program's second-longest such winning streak since the inception of the poll in 1936. Clemson's last defeat at the hands of an unranked squad came in 2017 at Syracuse.

Clemson's longest winning streak against unranked teams came across the 2012-16 seasons, when Clemson won 46 in a row starting with a season-opening win against Auburn in 2012 and ending with an upset loss to Pitt in 2016.

Clemson's returning all-conference honorees include

SATURDAYS ARE FOR THE TIGERS

Clemson has won 74 of its last 76 Saturday games. Clemson went 12-2 during the 2017 campaign, with its only losses coming on a Friday at Syracuse and a Monday on New Year's Day in the Sugar Bowl, followed by a 15-0 campaign in 2018 and a 14-1 season in 2019 in which its only loss was on a Monday in the College Football Playoff National Championship Game. Clemson then went 10-1 on Saturdays in a 10-2 season in 2020.

Before a loss to Notre Dame on Saturday, Nov. 7, 2020, you had to travel back to Nov. 12, 2016, a total of 1,456 days prior to that Notre Dame game for Clemson's most recent loss on a Saturday. Clemson's 50-game Saturday winning streak was the longest winning streak in Saturday games in FBS history, surpassing the 45 straight Saturday tilts Oklahoma won in the midst of its FBS-record 47-game winning streak in the 1950s.

The Tigers' record streak started following a 2016 loss to Pitt that was preceded by a 21-game Saturday winning streak across the 2014-16 seasons, previously the longest such streak in program history.

-- NO. 5 QB D.J. UIAGALELEI --

"BIG CINCO" ON BIG STAGE

Asked for the proper pronunciation of his name, Clemson quarterback D.J. Uiagalelei will walk you through the syllables of his surname of Samoan descent:

"ooh-ee-AHN-guh-luh-lay"

But he'll also offer a helpful tip:

"Or you can just call me 'Big Cinco.'"

Big Cinco is the 250-pound quarterback wearing No. 5 who assumed Clemson's starting role in 2021 after starting two games as a true freshman in the absence of Trevor Lawrence in 2020.

Uiagalelei was thrust into the starting lineup vs. Boston College in 2020 after Lawrence was diagnosed with COVID-19. With the win in his first start, Clemson improved to 20-13 all-time in games started by true freshman quarterbacks. He joined Steve Fuller, Willie Jordan, Patrick Sapp, Nealon Greene, Deshaun Watson and Lawrence as one of only seven true freshmen ever to start for Clemson at quarterback, and he joined Watson and Lawrence as the only true freshmen to win their starting debuts.

Uiagalelei impressed against Boston College as Clemson overcame an 18-point deficit to record the

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largest comeback win in the history of Death Valley. He completed 30-of-41 passes for 342 yards with two passing touchdowns and no interceptions, and also rushed six times for 25 yards with a rushing touchdown. His 342 passing yards were the third-most by a Clemson freshman (true or redshirt) in his starting debut, trailing Deshaun Watson's 435 yards against North Carolina in 2014 and Charlie Whitehurst's 420 yards against Duke in 2002.

A week later, Uiagalelei completed 29-of-44 passes for a career-high 439 yards with two passing touchdowns in a double-overtime contest against No. 4 Notre Dame. His 439 passing yards were the third-most in a game in school history and broke Watson's school freshman record of 435. The 439 passing yards were the most ever thrown against Notre Dame by an opposing quarterback, breaking the mark of 425 held by USC's Carson Palmer in 2002.

In his two starts, Uiagalelei completed 59-of-85 passes for 390.5 yards per game with four touchdowns and no interceptions. His 162.1 pass efficiency rating in those two starts was nearly 11 points higher than Lawrence's 151.5 mark in his 11 starts as a first-year freshman.

INTERCEPTION AVOIDANCE

Uiagalelei's explosiveness in the vertical passing game and his deft decision-making in the running game made highlight reels from 2020, but his ability to protect the ball was elite in his debut season as well.

Uiagalelei became only the second FBS player since 2000 to throw at least 115 passes and record at least five passing touchdowns and no interceptions, joining Georgia Southern's Shai Werts from 2018.

Uiagalelei enters the season opener having thrown 117 career pass attempts without an interception. He is 48 attempts shy of tying the Clemson record to open a career, set by Cullen Harper (165 from 2005-07). By virtue of reaching the 100-attempt mark, he is Clemson's career leader in interception percentage.

Despite starting only two career games prior to 2021, Uiagalelei is already one of only 13 quarterbacks in Clemson history to record at least one 300-yard passing game and is one of only seven to record multiple 300-yard passing games. He is already two 300-yard games shy of tying his position coach, Brandon Streeter, for fifth in school history.

COMEBACK CINCO

Last year, Clemson trailed Boston College at home, 28-10, with 1:02 remaining in the first half. With no timeouts, Uiagalelei led a 10-play, 42-yard drive in 55 seconds to get a B.T. Potter 50-yard field goal before half. The drive jumpstarted Clemson's comeback 34-28 victory, as the Tigers scored 24 unanswered for the win. Of note:

- Clemson trailed by 18 points in the first half, making the win Clemson's largest home comeback victory in school history.

- The win tied for the second-largest comeback win in school history at any location, matching an 18-point comeback at Maryland in 2011, which had also stood as Clemson's largest comeback win under Dabo Swinney.

AN IMPACT RETURN?

Clemson's biggest impact among returning players could potentially come from one who didn't play a snap in 2020: wide receiver Justyn Ross.

Ross missed the 2020 season after surgery following the diagnosis of a congenital fusion in his spine. Ross participated in spring ball in a non-contact capacity with an eye toward full participation in fall camp, a plan that was successful in current NFL receiver and former Clemson star Mike Williams' return from a neck injury in 2016 en route to becoming the No. 7 overall pick in the NFL Draft.

Even though he missed the entire 2020 campaign, Ross still enters 2021 tied for 10th in career touchdown receptions in Clemson history.

Ross had two of the most productive first two seasons by a Clemson player in school history, recording 1,865 receiving yards and 17 touchdowns from 2018-19. His 17 touchdowns through two seasons were the most through two years in school history, and his 1,865 yards in those years trailed only Sammy Watkins (1,927) and Artavis Scott (1,866) during the first two years of a Clemson career.

OPPORTUNITY AWAITS

Lyn-J Dixon, a senior running back from Butler, Ga. enters his fourth season at Clemson with the largest window of opportunity of his career after the departure of ACC all-time leading rusher Travis Etienne. In fewer than 70 carries per year through his first three seasons, Dixon has averaged 6.60 yards per carry, second-most among qualified players in school history.

The only thing standing in Dixon's way from major productivity from 2018-20 was the All-American in front of him for three years wearing No. 9. With Etienne's departure, opportunity awaits for Dixon or another from Clemson's bevy of talented backs to seize the moment.

Dixon teased his explosiveness in his true freshman campaign in 2018, averaging 8.82 yards per carry. Among his five rushing touchdowns that year were scoring scampers of 65, 52 and 55 yards, and his three career rushing touchdowns of 50 yards or more are already tied for fourth-most by a Clemson player since 1950, trailing only Travis Etienne (10), C.J. Spiller (six) and Andre Ellington (six).

His 8.82-yard average in 2018 remains a Clemson single-season record among qualified players.

TRENCH WARFARE

Clemson's success in its 39-3 run since 2018 has been powered in part at the line of scrimmage, where Clemson holds a 147-55 edge over opponents in sacks in that time frame, including a 46-20 edge in 2020. The defense is led by Defensive Coordinator Brent Venables, whose track record as an assistant is nearly immaculate. Teams with Venables on staff posted winning seasons in all 25 of his seasons prior to 2021, including 21 seasons with 10 wins or more. The oldest members of the 2021 Clemson defense — super seniors Nolan Turner and Regan Upshaw — were born in November of 1997. SOPHOMORE SACK PRODUCERS

Clemson entered 2020 missing two presumptive preseason starters at defensive end in Justin Foster and Xavier Thomas, perhaps leaving the uninitiated to wonder from where Clemson's pass rush might come.

America then met 2020 true freshmen Myles Murphy, Bryan Bresee and Trenton Simpson.

Bresee joined Clemson as the consensus No. 1 player in America for the class of 2020. Murphy joined the Tigers as ESPN.com's third-ranked player in the class, while Simpson was 247Sports' No. 13-ranked player in the group.

It had been five years since a Clemson true freshman

had recorded a sack in a season opener, when Dexter Lawrence and Tre Lamar each did so in the 2016 season opener at Auburn. Both Murphy and Bresee got on the stat sheet in the opener against Wake, with Murphy compiling two sacks among a team-high seven tackles and Bresee adding half a sack and the Tigers' first blocked field goal since Week 2 of 2018.

Bresee earned Freshman All-American in 2020, joining Lawrence as the second ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year in Clemson history. Murphy collected de-facto consensus Freshman All-America status from The Athletic, ESPN, Rivals and the Football Writers Association of America and was named ACC Co-Newcomer of the Year by the Associated Press. The duo was joined by a midseason surge by Simpson, the former high school running back whose presence as an edge rusher and growth at Clemson's nickel/sam linebacker position was part of former starter Mike Jones Jr.'s decision to transfer to LSU.

All three members of the trio recorded 4.0 sacks in 2020, tying William "Refrigerator" Perry and others for third in Clemson history in sacks by a true freshman.

Among Murphy's impact plays in 2020 were three forced fumbles. Murphy became the first Clemson true freshman in the Dabo Swinney era to record three forced fumbles in a season as well as the first Clemson freshman (true or redshirt) with three forced fumbles in a season since redshirt freshman Ed McDaniel in 1988. He tied for the national lead in forced fumbles by a freshman, and his three were the most by a freshman defensive lineman.

Meanwhile, Bresee led all FBS true freshman interior linemen in sacks, Clemson's second straight season producing the the leader in that category (Tyler Davis in 2019).

THE BRUISE BROTHERS

Behind Clemson's headline defensive line is a pair of hard-hitting veteran linebackers that led Head Coach Dabo Swinney to coin the duo as "The Bruise Brothers."

Middle linebacker James Skalski, the only player ever to play in (and win) five ACC Championship Games, returned for his sixth season at Clemson in 2021 following an all-conference performance in 2020. He took a mid-career redshirt in 2018, playing four games including the ACC Championship Game, Cotton Bowl and National Championship Game in what he and others called "the sweetest gig on the team" before becoming a full-time starter in 2019. The physical presence of No. 47 led Swinney to call him "a war daddy" and call his participation in practices and scrimmages "just unfair."

Skalski's running mate at the second level of the defense continues to be fifth-year linebacker Baylon Spector, whose strong performances in 2020 included an ACC Linebacker of the Week selection for his play against Virginia.

"[Spector] and Skalski, it's a reflection of how they practice. I'm telling you, every single rep at practice is a game rep to those two guys. They put a ton of work in every week to get themselves ready to play," Swinney

said. "I know how hard they've worked. It's the unseen grind. That's a ton of work that they've put in.

"I call them The Bruise Brothers. Those two right there, it's something to watch and it's fun to see."

The duo's success is not merely a function of their physicality and hard work. Defensive Coordinator Brent Venables praised the cerebral nature of their play as well.

"They've developed some really good chemistry together. They're always having side chat conversations when I'm trying to talk with the whole defense and I'm having to correct at practice, and I look over and they're coaching each other. Sometimes that bothers me, I'll be honest, [smiling] but I absolutely love it because it's always about the details of what we're talking about," Venables said. "They're like two coaches, really, out on the field."

-- SPECIAL TEAMS --

SPOTLIGHT ON THE SPECIALISTS

- **B.T. Potter, PK:** Clemson's cannon-legged 2020 Lou Groza Award semifinalist has been remarkably consistent on both his shortest kicks and his longest kicks throughout his career. He is 147-for-148 on PATs, and his 122 consecutive PATs prior to his first miss shattered Clemson's school record (88 by Mark Buchholz from 2007-08). Potter, who has been one of the nation's foremost touchback specialists throughout his career, is also 5-for-6 on field goal attempts of 50 yards or more during his Clemson tenure, tying Clemson's record for career field goals of 50 yards or more.

- **Will Spiers, P:** Already a four-year starter at punter entering his "Super Senior" campaign in 2021, Spiers entered the new season already holding school records for starts by a punter (56), career punts (211), punts downed inside the 20 (81) and total punting yards (9,483). His 2020 season was his best to date, as his 44.0-yards-per-punt average in 2020 represented the second-best single-season mark in school history. He averaged at least 50.0 yards per punt in three-straight games against Miami, Georgia Tech and Syracuse in 2020, a career-long streak and a Clemson record with a minimum of three punts per game.

- **Will Swinney, H:** Spiers is not the only four-year starter "Super Senior" among Clemson's special teams corps. The 2021 season will be Swinney's fifth as Clemson's primary holder, as he has held for more placekicks than any player in Clemson history. Since 2017, Clemson has scored 463 points on placekicks, including field goals and PATs. Swinney, a 2020 William V. Campbell Trophy semifinalist, has held for 458 of those 463 points, and including his receiving touchdown vs. Louisville in 2018, he's touched the ball for 464 total points for Clemson in his career. Clemson's only five kicking points not held by Will Swinney in his career were instead held by his brother, Drew. Clemson's last hold by any player outside the Swinney family was on the final point of Clemson's 2016 national championship following Hunter Renfrow's game-winning touchdown with one second remaining.

- **Jack Maddox, LS:** Maddox is in his second year as Clemson's starting long snapper after earning the job in the spring of 2020. A native of Acton, Mass., his attention first turned to Clemson after visiting his uncle, who is a professor at the university. He walked on at Clemson, and in August 2020, he was en route to Clemson's Applied Science Lab when Head Coach Dabo Swinney approached him and asked him if he'd already paid his fall tuition. Upon Maddox confirming that he had, Swinney told him he'd have a little extra money in

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his pocket that semester, as Maddox was being placed on scholarship.

- **Quinn Castner, PK:** Castner joined Clemson's program in August 2020. At 140 pounds, the 5-foot-5 walk-on became the 15th player below 150 pounds to appear on Clemson's roster since 1944. He became a viral sensation for his 2020 debut against The Citadel once Dabo Swinney, after exaggerating Castner's vitals as "5-foot-3 and 80 pounds... maybe," told the following anecdote about Castner and Clemson's current culture: "I put him out there and gave him a chance to kick one off, and listen, he ain't kicked one deep in the end zone yet since he's been here... So I put the first [team] kickoff out there and said, 'All right, boys, we've got a little wind, I'm putting my man Quinn out there. Y'all know this is coming out and y'all need some dadgum practice...'" Potter booms 'em out of the end zone and I wanted them to get a little work, so I got my man Quinn out there, and what does he do? He kicks that sucker four yards deep in the end zone, and the whole team went crazy. They just *loved* it, and, I mean, that's *special*."

The approach to creating functional depth and rewarding players ready to play has been a key philosophy for Head Coach Dabo Swinney, whose own collegiate playing career was hatched as a walk-on fighting for playing time in Alabama's receiving corps.

"We're fully committed to playing guys who deserve to play," Swinney said. "You commit to a guy early in the season, and even if a guy has only played 10 percent of the snaps, when you get to game eight or

nine, they've got some good experience."

Clemson's high-water mark for player participation in 2020 was 96 against The Citadel in the team's home opener. Clemson approached that mark with 94 against Pitt in a Senior Day rout.

YOUTH IS SERVED

In the first year of new redshirt regulations in 2018, Clemson played a then-school-record 20 true freshmen. Clemson immediately shattered that record in its 2019 season opener, with 27 true freshmen making their collegiate debuts in that contest. An additional eight true freshmen made their debuts to push that 2019 total to a school-record 36.

In 2020, Clemson played 27 true freshmen, tied for the most in the country at the end of the regular season. Coinciding with redshirt rule changes, Clemson's three most recent seasons have resulted in the most game action for first-year freshmen since 1982.

Clemson's previous average under Venables had been 16.5, and Clemson's two national title teams of that era in 2016 and 2018 started 16 and 15 different players, respectively.

400-YARD GAMES

Clemson reached the 400-yard mark in all 12 games in 2020, the second-longest streak to open a season in school history, behind only the 2018 Tigers, who reached the 400-yard mark in all 15 games of their 15-0 national championship season.

Clemson's 12 400-yard games in 2020 were second-most in the country, and its 74 400-yard games since 2015 lead the nation.

Clemson's recent track record of prolific offense and

stingy defense has helped Clemson produce nine of its 11 best single-game yardage differentials in school history since 2014. Only Clemson's plus-467-yard margin in total yards against The Citadel in 1954 and its plus-464-yard margin against Wake Forest in 2000 predate the 2014 season among the Top 10 yardage margins in Clemson annals.

OFFENSIVE BALANCE

Clemson's distribution of talent throughout its offense and its willingness to adapt to how defenses are game planning has resulted in the Tigers fielding one of the nation's more balanced offenses in recent years. In 2018, Clemson set a school record with 3,723 rushing yards. In 2020, Clemson set a school record with 348.5 passing yards per game.

Clemson has exceeded both 200 passing yards and 200 rushing yards in 53 games under Dabo Swinney, posting a perfect record in those contests. Clemson's 19 such games since the start of the 2018 season are tied for the second-most in the country.

Clemson has averaged at least 200 rushing yards and 200 passing yards per game four times in school history, with two of those seasons occurring in the 2018 and 2019 campaigns. Clemson broke the 3,000-yard mark both rushing and passing in both 2018 and 2019, two of three 3,000/3,000 seasons in school history (2015).

A LEGEND RETURNS

Among the lengthy list of moments that have led to Clemson's current seat among college football's oligarchy, one came at Union County High School in Lake Butler, Fla. on Feb. 1, 2006. It was that day that a five-star running back named C.J. Spiller publicly supported the vision of his recruiter, a young wide receivers coach named Dabo Swinney, by committing to Clemson on National Signing Day.

Spiller spent four years building a sparkling on-field and off-field legacy at Clemson, and now, Clemson has welcomed Spiller back as one of its 10 full-time assistant coaches.

In February, 33-year-old Spiller officially assumed leadership of Clemson's running backs, a role previously held by Tony Elliott, who assumed the title of Assistant Head Coach/Offensive Coordinator/Tight Ends Coach.

"[Spiller] is one of the greatest ambassadors that we've had for our program for a long time and now for him to be able to come back and be able to sow seeds into these young men and teach all the things he's learned throughout his career, there's not a guy on this staff that's more committed and more ALL IN for Clemson than C.J. Spiller, that's for sure," Swinney said.

Spiller joined Clemson's staff on a full-time basis after joining the program as an unpaid coaching intern in 2020 while pursuing his Master's degree in athletic leadership. Prior to entering the coaching ranks, Spiller was one of the most decorated players in Clemson history, earning selection last month for induction in the College Football Hall of Fame Class of 2021.

"It doesn't happen very often that you're able to coach at your alma mater, especially in your first gig, and for me to have that opportunity, I don't take it lightly," Spiller said.

Spiller's historic Clemson playing career covered 2006-09, including a senior campaign in which won ACC Player of the Year and was a unanimous first-team All-American en route to finishing sixth in Heisman Trophy voting. That year, he joined Reggie Bush as the only players in college football history with 3,000 rushing yards, 1,500 yards in kickoff returns, 1,000 receiving yards and 500 yards in punt returns. He became the fourth Clemson graduate among the Tigers' 10 full-time assistant coaches, joining Brandon Streeter (1999), Tony Elliott (2002) and Tyler Grisham (2009).

TIGHT END RENAISSANCE

Dabo Swinney has often mentioned tight ends as being a foundational piece of Clemson's offensive identity for the balance they provide in both the running and passing game in Clemson's base 11 personnel.

So when Clemson tight ends combined for 43 catches for 400 yards and two scores across both the 2018 and 2019 seasons, the familiar refrain outside the program became, "Where are Clemson's tight ends?"

The tight ends returned to public consciousness in 2020, as the group combined for 50 receptions for 664 yards and seven touchdowns, the position group's most in a season in all categories since 2016.

The group now falls under the direct purview of playcaller Tony Elliott, the Offensive Coordinator who assumed control of Clemson's tight ends after sliding over from the running backs group in 2021 upon the hire of C.J. Spiller. Elliott returns a strong group for 2021, as Braden Galloway and Davis Allen were primary contributors for two of the tight end group's best games in the Dabo Swinney era in 2020 against Wake Forest and Miami (Fla.) That 2020 Miami game represented the first time that Clemson tight ends combined for three scores in a game.

Clemson's most productive tight end output by yardage came from its 2016 National Championship team that featured the play of All-American Jordan Leggett. Clemson tight ends had 797 receiving yards that year, most in the Swinney era, on 52 catches. The record for receptions for the tight end position under Swinney is 65, in 2011 when the Tigers featured John Mackey Award winner Dwayne Allen.

YARDS PER PLAY

Clemson shattered its school record for yards per play in 2018 at 7.35, the program's first time exceeding seven yards per play in a season. That record stood for barely 12 months until Clemson broke it again in 2019 by averaging 7.38 yards per play. Clemson then averaged 6.69 yards per play in 2020, giving Clemson its top three yards-per-play averages in school history all within the last three years.

In 2018-19, Clemson became only the third school since 2000 to average 7.35 or better yards per play in back-to-back seasons, joining Alabama, which did it across 2018-19, and Oklahoma, which was in the midst of a four-year streak across the 2016-19 seasons.

Collectively, Clemson averaged 7.2 yards per play across the 2018-20 seasons, joining Oklahoma (7.9) and Alabama (7.8) as the only programs to average at least seven yards per play across those three seasons.

650-POINT SEASONS

Before scoring 522 points (tied for second-most in the country) in a pandemic-truncated 2020 season, Clemson scored 659 points in 2019, concluding the season only five points shy of tying the school record of 664 set in 2018.

Clemson remains responsible for two of the 22 650-point seasons in major college football history and two of only 16 since Division I split in 1978. Clemson was the first school with back-to-back 650-point seasons since Yale in 1888-89, predating the start of official NCAA recordkeeping in 1937 and the second year of which was coincidentally the year Clemson was founded.

OWNING THE "MIDDLE EIGHT"

During its current run of six consecutive College Football Playoff appearances dating to 2015, Clemson has frequently won one of the hidden "games within the game."

SportSource Analytics tracks the "Middle Eight," the section of the game defined as the final four minutes of the first half and the first four minutes of the second half. Clemson has outscored opponents in that time window 54 times since 2015, posting a 52-2 record in those contests.

Clemson was historically strong in that category in 2018, outscoring opponents 132-10 in the middle eight, an average margin of +8.1 points per game. That per-game differential was the largest by any program in the country since 2013.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

Clemson has matched its on-field success in recent years with national acclaim for its success in the classroom. Of note:

- Clemson set a program record in APR in the NCAA's most recent national figures released in May 2020, recording a multi-year APR score of 993 for the 2018-19 academic year. The performance marked the third straight year Clemson broke its program record in the metric after breaking its 992 from 2017-18, which had broken its 987 mark from 2016-17.

- Clemson's 993 multi-year APR ranked fourth in the Power Five and fifth among FBS programs, trailing only Washington (999), Ole Miss (997), Northwestern (995) and Air Force (995). That metric covered a four-year span in which Clemson matched its off-field success with on-field accolades that

included a 55-4 record, four College Football Playoff appearances and two national championships.

- The NCAA recognized Clemson with its annual APR Public Recognition Award, which is bestowed upon programs ranking in the Top 10 percent of their respective sports. From 2009-10 through 2018-19, only 37 of the 130 FBS programs earned at least one APR recognition since the 2009-10 academic year. Only 30 of them earned it multiple times. Clemson, Duke and Northwestern programs were the only ones to earn the award nine or more times in that 10-year span. Clemson would have earned a 10th APR Public Recognition Award for 2019-20 after recording a perfect 1000 for the term, but the NCAA suspended national APR reporting as a function of the COVID-19 pandemic.

- Prior to the NCAA suspending APR reporting, Clemson was one of only six FBS programs with an active streak of having earned an APR Public Recognition Award in each of the last three academic years, a group that also included Air Force, Boston College, Navy, Northwestern and Washington.

- With its most recent award for the 2018-19 academic year, Clemson was the only FBS program since the NCAA created the APR metric in 2003 to win a national championship and an APR Public Recognition Award in the same year multiple times. Alabama is the only other school to accomplish the title/APR double in a single year once (2011-12 academic year).

In addition to the APR honors, in November 2019, the AFCA announced that Clemson had repeated as Academic Achievement Award winners, making Clemson the only school in the country to earn the award across both of the 2018-19 seasons. Clemson had earned the award a year earlier as well in the midst of major college football's first 15-0 season since 1897.

TIGERS DOMINATE FALL 2020 SEMESTER

In the face of one of the most abnormal learning environments in the history of the university, Clemson's student-athletes responded to academic adversity impressively last fall. Among Clemson's academic achievements for the Fall 2020 semester were:

- A program-record 74 individuals earned a 3.0

GPA or better, including 11 perfect 4.0s. Among the freshmen, seven of Clemson's eight summer enrollees earned a 3.0 or better in their initial semester on campus, as did three of the four summer preferred walk-ons.

- Seventeen current football student-athletes graduated in December, including Elijah Turner, who earned a second degree by securing a Master's in athletic leadership and graduating with a perfect 4.0 GPA. Twelve different majors were represented by this year's graduates.

- Three players completed their undergraduate degrees in three years (K.J. Henry, Trevor Lawrence and Xavier Thomas) after all enrolled in January 2018. In recent history, the only other scholarship players to graduate from Clemson in this time frame were Christian Wilkins (2.5 years), Deshaun Watson and Artavis Scott (three years).

- Eight of the 17 fall graduates did so with honors, completing their degrees with a cumulative GPA over a 3.0: Matt Bockhorst, Peter Cote, Justin Foster, K.J. Henry, Trevor Lawrence, Darien Rencher, Will Spiers and Elijah Turner.

- Clemson entered 2020 bowl season with 23 graduates on the roster. Included in this number were double graduates Nyles Pinckney (Sociology and Criminal Justice) and Elijah Turner (Communication and Athletic Leadership). Nine of the 23 were enrolled in or have applied to graduate programs at Clemson while continuing their eligibility.

ALL EYES ON CLEMSON

"Where the Blue Ridge yawns its greatness, where the Tigers play..."

Those are the opening words to Clemson's alma mater. In recent years, "where the Tigers play" has also been where eyes and television sets inevitably turn.

Over the previous three seasons, Clemson games accounted for the four most-watched college football games and five of the 10 most-watched games since 2018.

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. – A stellar outing by quarterback Trevor Lawrence and a Clemson-record 18th career 100-yard rushing performance by running back Travis Etienne led No. 1 Clemson to a 37-13 victory over Wake Forest in front of only 68 people in the first game under COVID-19 protocols.

Lawrence went 22-of-28 for 351 yards and a touchdown along with two touchdown runs. With 102 yards, Etienne passed Wayne Gallman (17 from 2014-16) for Clemson's career 100-yard rushing games record.

Defensively, Winston-Salem native K.J. Henry recorded the first of Clemson's six sacks on the night. Myles Murphy (2.0) and Bryan Bresee (0.5) each contributed sacks, become Clemson's first true freshmen with sacks in a season-opener since 2016.

Lawrence's two rushing touchdowns gave the Tigers a 14-0 first quarter lead, marking his first career game with multiple rushing touchdowns. His first passing touchdown of the season was a 12-yard strike to tight end J.C. Chalk in the second quarter.

A career-long-tying 52-yard B.T. Potter field goal as the first half expired gave Clemson a 27-0 halftime lead. During the game, Potter broke Mark Buchholz's Clemson record for consecutive PATs (88 from 2007-08).

Clemson carried a 37-3 lead into the fourth quarter before surrendering the final 10 points. The Tigers played 78 of their 80 available players in the contest.

CLEMSON, S.C. – No. 1 Clemson won its home opener in front of a socially distanced crowd of 18,609 fans at Memorial Stadium, defeating The Citadel by a score of 49-0. The victory marked Clemson's 31st consecutive regular season win, passing the 2013-15 Florida State Seminoles for the longest such streak in ACC history.

Quarterback Trevor Lawrence went 8-of-9 passing for 168 yards with three passing touchdowns and a rushing touchdown. Freshman quarterback D.J. Uiagalelei added his first two career scores on the ground.

All of Clemson's points came in a 49-point first half, Clemson's most points in the first two quarters of play since scoring 49 against Temple in a 63-9 victory on Oct. 12, 2006.

Clemson's defense held the Bulldogs to just 162 total yards and added a score of its own when linebacker James Skalski returned a fumble 17 yards for the first touchdown of his career. Freshman Myles Murphy added two tackles for loss and forced the fumble that led to the Skalski scoop-and-score.

Wide receiver Frank Ladson Jr. recorded career highs in receptions (three), receiving yards (87) and receiving touchdowns (two).

Clemson produced its first shutout since the 2016 Fiesta Bowl, a 31-0 win against Ohio State. It was Clemson's first regular season shutout since a 54-0 win against Syracuse in 2016. The shutout was Clemson's seventh under Head Coach Dabo Swinney, and its fifth home shutout in his tenure.

CLEMSON, S.C. – Clemson improved to 3-0 with a 41-23 win against Virginia at Memorial Stadium. The win extended Clemson's winning streak on Saturdays to 46, passing the 1953-57 Oklahoma Sooners for the longest such streak in FBS history.

Trevor Lawrence was 25-for-38 passing for 329 yards and three touchdowns, including two to Amari Rodgers. Travis Etienne totaled 187 yards from scrimmage, including 73 on the ground and a career-high and Clemson running back record 114 through the air.

Clemson's defense picked off Virginia quarterback Brennan Armstrong twice. Nolan Turner recorded the Tigers' first interception of the season in the second quarter, and on the first drive of the second half, Andrew Booth Jr. made a spectacular one-handed interception, the first of his career, in the corner of the end zone.

Lyn-J Dixon returned the opening kickoff of the game for a career-long 52 yards, setting the tone for Clemson to run out to a 24-3 lead before a late second-quarter Virginia touchdown made it 24-10 Clemson at the half.

The Tigers opened the second half scoring off the Booth interception with a 42-yard Potter field goal. The Cavaliers answered with a touchdown before Etienne recorded his second score of the game to give Clemson a 34-17 lead. Chez Mellusi added a fourth quarter two-yard rushing touchdown, his first of the season and first since the 2019 ACC Championship against the Cavaliers, to extend the Tiger lead to 41-17 before a late Virginia touchdown brought the final score to 41-23.

CLEMSON, S.C. — No. 1 Clemson earned a 42-17 victory over No. 7 Miami (Fla.) in Clemson's first regular season matchup of Top 10 teams since 2016.

Clemson's defense kept the Hurricanes offense in check all night, allowing only 210 yards, while the offense piled up 550. Sheridan Jones, Derion Kendrick and Kane Patterson all had interceptions while the Clemson pass rush totaled five sacks.

Trevor Lawrence completed 29-of-41 passes for 292 yards and three touchdowns and Travis Etienne ran for 149 yards and two scores and caught a game-high eight passes for 73 yards. Etienne's second rushing touchdown was the 60th of his career, making him only the 12th player in official FBS records to score 60 career rushing touchdowns.

Braden Galloway produced the first multi-touchdown game by a Clemson tight end since 2016, catching touchdown passes of 24 and 11 yards. Davis Allen added his first career touchdown as well to give Clemson tight ends three touchdowns in the contest.

Clemson controlled the ball for 12:31 of the first quarter and ran 25 plays to Miami's six. At halftime, Clemson held a 21-3 advantage in first downs.

Miami scored its first touchdown of the game on the final play of the first half, blocking a 61-yard field goal attempt by B.T. Potter and returning it 48 yards for a touchdown. It was one of three Miami field goal blocks.

Clemson's 25-point win represented its sixth victory of 25 points or more against an AP Top 10 opponent all-time.

ATLANTA — No. 1 Clemson cruised to the largest conference win in ACC history, defeating Georgia Tech, 73-7, at Bobby Dodd Stadium.

Clemson scored a modern-era school-record 52 first-half points, as Trevor Lawrence was 22-for-27 passing for 391 yards and five touchdowns in the first half alone. Lawrence finished with a career-high 404 passing yards. Wide receiver Amari Rodgers found the end zone twice in a career-high 161 yard performance as 17 different Tigers caught a pass, the most in the Dabo Swinney era.

Among those with a touchdown was defensive tackle Nyles Pinckney, who scored on a one-yard touchdown run in the second quarter. Travis Etienne scored a three-yard rushing touchdown in the second quarter as well, giving him 408 career points to break Chandler Catanzaro's school record of 404.

The Tiger defense forced three turnovers and totaled four sacks. Clemson held Georgia Tech to seven first downs, its second straight game holding its opponent to single-digit first downs.

Chef Mellusi, Kobe Pace and Ajou Ajou added second half touchdowns. Pace's came on Hunter Helms's first career touchdown pass. Ajou's touchdown, also from Helms, marked the first of his career as well.

CLEMSON, S.C. — Top-ranked Clemson improved to 6-0 with a 47-21 victory over Syracuse. After Clemson raced out to a 17-0 lead, Syracuse pulled to within six points at 27-21 before Clemson rattled off 20 unanswered points to seal the game.

The Tigers' defense forced a momentum-swinging strip-sack in the third quarter that was returned for a touchdown by Andrew Booth Jr. Clemson also had three interceptions, one each by Nolan Turner, Mike Jones Jr. and Jalyn Phillips.

Travis Etienne scored three rushing touchdowns on 16 carries and totaled 86 yards on the ground. Trevor Lawrence was 27-of-43 passing for 289 yards and two touchdowns.

Syracuse returned a Lawrence interception 39 yards for a touchdown and the Tigers responded with another Potter field goal to give them a 27-14 lead as the first half expired. With Clemson's fumble return touchdown and Syracuse's interception return touchdown, the game was Clemson's first in which both teams recorded a defensive touchdown since 2014 when Clemson's Jadar Johnson and South Carolina State's Dominique Mitchell each scored via fumble return.

The win gave Clemson a school-record 26-game home unbeaten streak. Clemson went unbeaten in 25 straight games at Memorial Stadium from 1980-84 with 23 wins and two ties in that span.

CLEMSON, S.C. — No. 1 Clemson scored 24 unanswered points to overcome an 18-point deficit to defeat Boston College, 34-28 at Death Valley. The comeback tied for the second-largest in school history and was Clemson's largest at Memorial Stadium all-time.

Running Travis Etienne totaled 224 all-purpose yards, including 84 rushing on 20 carries, becoming the ACC's all-time leading rusher by breaking the record held by NC State's Ted Brown (4,602) since 1978. His 140 receiving yards also broke his own school running back record set earlier this season against Virginia (114).

Making his first career start, quarterback D.J. Uiagalelei dazzled, going 30-for-41 passing for 342 yards and two touchdowns. He also added 25 yards and a touchdown on the ground after learning on Thursday he would start in place of Trevor Lawrence, who missed the game after testing positive for COVID-19.

The Eagles scored on their opening two possessions, and Clemson was one yard away from tying the game at 14 when Boston College picked up a fumbled exchange and returned it 97 yards for a touchdown for a 21-7 lead. Boston College extended the lead to 28-10 with 1:02 remaining in the second quarter, but a B.T. Potter 50-yard field goal cut Clemson's halftime deficit to 15.

Clemson outscored Boston College in the third quarter, 13-0, to cut the lead to two on a touchdown run and touchdown pass by Uiagalelei. Clemson took its first lead early in the fourth quarter on a 17-yard touchdown run by Etienne. The Eagles had the ball at their four-yard line with 1:24 remaining, but on the drive's first play, freshman Bryan Bresee forced an intentional grounding penalty in the end zone for a safety to seal the win.

NOTRE DAME, Ind. — No. 1 Clemson fell to No. 4 Notre Dame, 47-40, in double overtime in the highest-ranked matchup of ACC squads in conference history.

The Irish jumped out to an early 10-0 lead. The Tigers responded with a 53-yard bomb from D.J. Uiagalelei to Cornell Powell. Powell finished with a career-high 161 yards on six receptions. Uiagalelei finished with 439 passing yards, the most ever surrendered by Notre Dame.

The second quarter saw the two teams exchange field goals before an Etienne fumble was recovered by Notre Dame and returned for a touchdown to give the Irish a 20-10 advantage before ultimately going into halftime at 23-13 in favor of Notre Dame.

The Tigers scored 10 consecutive points to open the third, tying the game at 23. Another Notre Dame field goal gave the Irish a 26-23 lead, which was quickly erased by B.T. Potter's career-high fourth field goal of the game. With 9:14 remaining and the score locked at 26-26, Uiagalelei led the Tigers on a 12-play, 74-yard touchdown drive lasting 5:41 capped by a Travis Etienne three-yard touchdown run to give Clemson the lead.

In their last possession of regulation, Notre Dame cashed in on a 91-yard touchdown drive that sent the game into overtime. Both teams scored touchdowns in the first frame, but when Notre Dame opened the second overtime period with a score, the Tigers allowed two sacks to thwart the comeback bid.

CLEMSON, S.C. — No. 4 Clemson defeated Pitt, 52-17, on Senior Day behind a 403-yard passing performance by Trevor Lawrence in his return from a two-game absence. Clemson forced five turnovers, including four interceptions, two from cornerback Mario Goodrich. The game was Clemson's first in 21 days, its longest regular season layoff since 1918.

The Tigers raced out to a 31-0 lead behind 31 first-quarter points, a school record against an FBS opponent. E.J. Williams, wearing No. 39 to honor his father on Military Appreciation Day, opened the scoring with his first career touchdown catch. Cornell Powell added a first-quarter score amid a career-high 176 receiving yards and became only the third Tiger ever to post at least 150 receiving yards in back-to-back games.

The Tigers took a 38-10 lead into halftime, but a Lawrence fumble on the opening play of the second half led to a Panthers touchdown that cut the deficit to 21 points. After the two teams traded several punts, Travis Etienne cashed in his second score on a three-yard touchdown run. A late Chez Mellusi receiving touchdown from D.J. Uiagalelei brought the final score to 52-17.

With the victory on Senior Day, Clemson's 2020 seniors finished 27-0 at home, the first Clemson class to go undefeated at Death Valley and the first FBS class to go undefeated at home since Boise State and Oklahoma in 2010.

BLACKSBURG, Va. — No. 4/3 Clemson defeated Virginia Tech, 45-10, to advance to its sixth consecutive ACC Championship Game. With the win, Trevor Lawrence (33-1) passed Rodney Williams, Tajh Boyd and Deshaun Watson to become the winningest starting quarterback in school history.

Tied at 10-10 early in the second quarter, Clemson rattled off 35 unanswered points for the victory.

Clemson opened the scoring with a 28-yard B.T. Potter field goal, but the Hokies responded to take their only lead of the game on a seven-play, 75-yard touchdown drive. The Tigers regained the advantage when Lawrence scampered for a 17-yard score.

After a 54-yard Virginia Tech field goal evened the score at 10-10, Lyn-J Dixon capped off a 75-yard drive with a 19-yard touchdown run. The Tigers escaped with a 17-10 halftime lead after a hail mary pass was caught at the one-yard line as the half expired.

After Myles Murphy forced his third fumble of the season, Clemson cashed in on the turnover with a seven-yard Lawrence touchdown run to open the second-half scoring. Derion Kendrick later scooped a Virginia Tech fumble and returned it 66 yards for a touchdown to give Clemson a 31-10 third quarter lead.

In the fourth quarter, Lawrence found Cornell Powell for a 65-yard touchdown. Darien Rencher, who won the Disney Spirit Award earlier in the week, capped the scoring by taking a handoff 50 yards for his first touchdown of the season and the longest rush of his career.

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — No. 3 Clemson won its sixth straight outright ACC title with a commanding 34-10 win against No. 2 Notre Dame. Trevor Lawrence, who did not play in a November loss to Notre Dame, completed 25-of-36 passes for 322 yards and two touchdowns and added a 34-yard touchdown run among his 90 rushing yards to earn MVP.

The Tigers held the Fighting Irish to just 263 yards and sacked quarterback Ian Book six times. James Skalski, who became the first player to ever appear in five ACC championships, recorded a sack and five total tackles.

Notre Dame opened the scoring with a 51-yard field goal on the first drive of the game. After a missed 24-yard attempt on the Irish's next drive, the Tigers quickly capitalized with a 67-yard touchdown bomb from Lawrence to Amari Rodgers to take a 7-3 lead, starting a run of 34 consecutive Clemson points.

After a 33-yard E.J. Williams touchdown and a 27-yard B.T. Potter field goal, on a fourth and one in the final minute of the half, Etienne pushed the halftime lead to 24-3 on a 44-yard touchdown run.

Lawrence opened the second half scoring with a 34-yard touchdown scamper. Potter added another field goal. The Fighting Irish scored their lone points of the second half on a 21-yard run to bring the score to 34-10.

The game represented only the fourth time in the AP Poll era that two teams faced one another twice in a single season with both teams ranked in the AP Top 5 for both meetings. Clemson's win improved teams that lost the first meeting to 4-0 in those rematches, with the team that lost the first game winning the rematch by at least 21 points in all four meetings.

NEW ORLEANS — No. 2 Clemson fell to No. 3 Ohio State in the Allstate Sugar Bowl by a score of 49-28. Clemson ended the 125th season in school history with a 10-2 mark.

Heisman Trophy finalist Trevor Lawrence fell to 34-2 for his career as Clemson's starting quarterback while throwing for 400 yards on 33-for-48 passing.

Lawrence opened a high-scoring first quarter on the first possession of the game with a two-yard rushing touchdown. The Buckeyes responded with a touchdown to even the score at seven. Travis Etienne found the end zone on a three-yard rush, becoming the ACC's all-time leading scorer (468) on the play.

Ohio State would score touchdowns on each of its next four drives, giving them five consecutive touchdown drives of 75 yards or more, to take a 35-14 advantage into half-time.

On the first possession of the second half, Mike Jones Jr. intercepted OSU quarterback Justin Fields in the Clemson end zone. Clemson capitalized on the turnover with a nine-play, 80-yard drive, culminating in a 10-yard touchdown pass from Lawrence to Cornell Powell.

The Tigers' comeback effort was quickly thwarted when Fields connected on a 56-yard touchdown to Chris Olave to extend the Buckeye lead to 42-21. Another long touchdown pass by Ohio State put the game out of reach.

Lawrence found Powell for another touchdown, but the Buckeyes secured their first ever win over Clemson and advanced to the College Football Playoff National Championship.
