ACC NOTES

■ The ACC is 28-6 vs. non-conference competition through the first three weeks of the season, including an 17-6 mark vs. FBS competition. The league's 28-6 record vs. non-conference opponents is the best since going 27-5 in the first three weeks of 2014 and is second among all conferences this season. Eight non-conference games, including three vs. Power 5 opponents, are on the schedule this week.

■ Seven ACC teams are unbeaten heading into week four, which equals the most of any conference. Five teams from the Atlantic have yet to lose. All four ACC teams in the state of North Carolina are undefeated through week three for the first time ever - Duke (3-0), North Carolina (3-0), NC State (3-0) and Wake Forest (3-0). Clemson is 3-0 for the seventh time in the last eight years. Syracuse is 3-0 for the first time since winning 10 games in 2018, and Florida State is 3-0 for the first time since 2015.

PREVIEWING WEEK FOUR

- Week four of the ACC schedule includes:
 - Games on Thursday, Friday and Saturday with prime time matchups each day. No other conference plays each of those three days this week.
 - Three conference games – Virginia at Syracuse on Friday (7 p.m./ESPN); Clemson at Wake Forest (Noon/ABC) and Boston College at Florida State (8 p.m./ACCN) on Saturday.
 - Three non-conference matchups against Power 5 opponents – West Virginia at Virginia Tech on Thursday (7:30 p.m./ESPN), Duke at Kansas (Noon/FS1) and Notre Dame at North Carolina (3:30 p.m./ABC) on Saturday.
 - Four non-conference games against the Group of 5 conferences and one game against FCS competition.

■ Virginia Tech, which leads the ACC and ranks fifth nationally in total defense, hosts West Virginia on Thursday evening (7:30 p.m./ESPN). The programs have squared off 53 times since 1912, but this year's game will mark the first time the teams have met in back-to-back seasons since they met every year from 1973 through 2005.

■ Syracuse, which is seeking its first 2-0 start in ACC play since joining the conference in 2013, hosts Virginia on Friday (7 p.m./ESPN). It is the first meeting between the two schools since 2015, when the Cavaliers outlasted the Orange for a 44-38 win in three overtimes in Charlottesville. Syracuse is currently second in the league in turnover margin.

■ A pair of nationally-ranked ACC Atlantic Division teams

are set to collide Saturday as No. 5 Clemson heads to Winston-Salem to face 21st-ranked Wake Forest (Noon/ABC). The Tigers have the nation's longest active win streak at nine games, while Wake Forest has won 11 straight at home. This is just the third time overall – and first time as ACC opponents – that both teams have been ranked at kickoff. The two previous occurrences came in 1948 (No. 10 Clemson 21, No. 19 Wake Forest 14) and 1950 (No. 16 Clemson 13, No. 17 Wake Forest 12).

■ Undeclared Duke looks to improve to 4-0 for the first time since 2018 when it travels to Kansas on Saturday (Noon/FS1). The Jayhawks are also 3-0. This is the fourth game in a series in which the home team is currently 3-0. Duke QB Riley Leonard is fourth in the ACC, averaging 290.0 total yards of offense.

■ North Carolina looks to improve to 4-0 for the first time since 1997 when the Tar Heels take on Notre Dame at Kenan Stadium Saturday afternoon (3:30 p.m./ABC). North Carolina and Notre Dame meet for the 23rd time and for the third consecutive year for the first time since 1958-60.

■ In the ACC Network prime time game on Saturday evening, Boston College travels to Florida State (8 p.m./ACCN). Florida State has won 10 of the last 11 meetings in this Atlantic Division matchup, including a 26-23 victory at Chestnut Hill late last season.

■ In other FBS non-conference action, Louisville hosts South Florida (Noon/RSN), No. 25 Miami hosts Middle Tennessee (3:30 p.m./ACCN), No. 12 NC State hosts UConn (7:30 p.m./RSN), Georgia Tech plays at UCF (4 p.m./ESPNU) and No. 24 Pitt hosts FCS opponent Rhode Island (Noon/ACCN).

ACC "SCORIGAMI"

■ Scorigami is a term used for results that have never occurred previously. In week three, Syracuse topped Purdue, 32-29. That score had never previously occurred in ACC history. Wake Forest's 37-36 win over Liberty was only the second occurrence of a 37-36 result in ACC history.

STREAKS

■ Clemson's current nine-game win streak is the longest active streak in the country. Clemson also has the nation's longest home win streak at 36 games. NC State has the seventh longest active home streak at 12 games and Wake Forest is ninth with 11.

■ Pitt has won seven consecutive road games, which is the second-longest in the country behind Georgia (8).

FIVE ACC TEAMS IN TOP 25 POLLS

■ Five ACC teams are ranked in the AP Top 25 poll (Sept. 11). The five teams are the second-most of any conference. No. 5 Clemson leads the way and is joined by No. 12 NC State, No. 21 Wake Forest, No. 24 Pitt and No. 25 Miami. Florida State, North Carolina and Syracuse also received votes.

■ No. 5 Clemson leads a group of four ACC teams ranked among the top 25 of the USA TODAY Sports AFCA coaches poll. The Tigers are joined by No. 11 NC State, No. 16 Wake Forest and No. 25 Miami. Pitt, Florida State, Syracuse, North Carolina and Duke also received votes.

WEEKLY AWARD LIST RECOGNITION

Walter Camp Football Foundation National Defensive Player of the Week: Aydan White, NC State: White recorded five tackles (3 solo), including one for loss, one quarterback sack and intercepted two passes in NC State's 27-14 win over Texas Tech. White returned one of his interceptions 84 yards for a touchdown as the Wolfpack improved to 3-0 with the victory. White is the sixth NC State player to earn Walter Camp National Player of Week honors since 2004, and the first since quarterback

Devin Leary (Sept. 26, 2021). White is the first Defensive POW honoree since former linebacker Nate Irving (Sept. 26, 2010).

■ **Manning Award:** Syracuse QB was named a Manning Award Star of the Week for his performance vs. Purdue. Shrader, who also earned ACC quarterback of the week honors, connected on a pair of fourth-quarter touchdown passes, including the game-winner from 25 yards out in a thrilling 32-29 win over the Boilermakers.

■ **Groza Award:** Virginia PK Brendan Farrell was named one of the three Groza Award Stars of the Week. His 26-yard field goal as time expired gave the Cavaliers a 16-14 win over Old Dominion in Charlottesville. It was Virginia's first game-winning kick as time expired in over a decade. The senior from Dunwoody, Ga. also made another 26 yarder and connected from 30 yards out for his first career three field goal game. He made his only extra point attempt for a 10-point game.

RECORD CHASE - MALIK CUNNINGHAM, UL

■ Louisville's Malik Cunningham is sixth in ACC history in total offense and is 505 yards behind Clemson's Deshaun Watson for fifth. Wake Forest's Sam Hartman is 11th and is 401 yards behind Clemson's Trevor Lawrence for 10th. Cunningham is also ranked second in rushing yards and rushing touchdowns by a quarterback.

■ Wake Forest QB Sam Hartman ranks tied for seventh in ACC history with 79 touchdowns. Pitt's Kenny Pickett is sixth with 81.

■ Hartman threw 39 touchdown passes in 2021 to rank second in the conference and leads returning ACC quarterbacks this season. Leary threw for 35 touchdowns last fall and Armstrong for 31. Twenty-seven of Leary's TDs came against ACC competition.

■ The ACC leads all conferences with eight starting NFL quarterbacks.

■ Boston College QB Phil Jurkovec recorded the seventh 300-yard passing game of his BC career with 320 yards on 25-for-37 passing in the win over Maine. He is the 10th QB in BC history to surpass 4,000 career passing yards and the third fastest to do so, having reached the milestone in his 19th game.

■ Clemson QB D.J. Uiagalelei completed 17-of-29 passes for 221 yards with two touchdowns and no interceptions in the Tigers' win over Louisiana Tech. He also rushed nine times for a season-high 62 rushing yards, one shy of his career high set in 2021 at NC State. He has now posted consecutive games with a passer rating of 145.0 or better for the first time since his first two career starts as a freshman in 2020.

■ Duke's Riley Leonard completed 11-of-12 (.917) passes for 155 yards with 2 TDs in the win over North Carolina A&T. He also rushed five times for 66 yards & two TDs. It was his first career multi-score game.

■ North Carolina freshman QB Drake Maye leads the nation with 11 passing touchdowns.

■ NC State's Devin Leary recorded his 6,000th-yard passing and is only the sixth quarterback in school history to do so. He now has 6,040 yards for his career.

■ Syracuse QB Garrett Shrader threw for three fourth quarter touchdowns – including a game-winning strike from 25 yards out with seven seconds remaining – to overcome two separate fourth-quarter deficits in a win

over Purdue. Shrader threw for 181 yards on 13-of-29 passing, but also was the Orange's leading rusher with 83 yards on 17 attempts. He saved his best for the fourth quarter, converting a 46-yard touchdown on a fourth-down play, to cap a 75-yard scoring drive to take the lead, also rushing in for the two point conversion to take the lead with 8 minutes to play. He then regained possession with 45 seconds remaining and marched the team 50 yards for the second go-ahead score in the frame.

■ Virginia QB Brennan Armstrong broke the program's career passing record with a 17-yard completion to Lavel Davis Jr. in the fourth quarter vs. ODU. He passed Matt Schaub on UVA's all-time list, who threw for 7,502 from 2000-03. Armstrong accounted for 284 passing yards in the contest and now has 7,504 for his career.

■ Virginia Tech QB Grant Wells completed 26 of 35 passes for 314 yards and two touchdowns in a win over Wofford. The 26 completions and 314 yards were the most by a Hokie in a game since Ryan Willis completed 29 passes for 344 yards against Boston College in 2019. The redshirt junior completed passes to 11 different receivers. It was the ninth 300-yard game of his career and the first at Virginia Tech.

■ Sam Hartman broke the Wake Forest all-time passing mark, eclipsing Riley Skinner (2006-09) with a five-yard pass to Ke'Shawn Williams in the third quarter against Liberty. He has now thrown for 9,891 career passing yards, moving into the top 10 in ACC history. The Charlotte, North Carolina, native will look to become the 131st player in NCAA history and just the ninth passer in the history of the ACC to eclipse the 10,000-yard passing barrier next week against No. 5 Clemson.

■ Ten of 14 ACC teams returned a quarterback this year with at least nine career starts. Louisville's Malik Cunningham leads with 41 career starts and Wake Forest's Sam Hartman has 35. Both NC State's Devin Leary and Virginia's Brennan Armstrong have 23 career starts. Kedon Slovis has started 28 career games, including 26 at USC before transferring to Pitt for the 2022 season.

■ The ACC has three of the top 12 returning quarterbacks in the country based on last season's passing yards per game. Virginia's Armstrong is the top returning player in the country after finishing last season with 404.5 passing yards per game, Wake Forest's Hartman is eighth (302.0 ypg), Miami's Van Dyke is 11th (293.1 ypg) and NC State's Leary is 12th (286.1 ypg).

■ Three of the top seven quarterbacks in the country entering the 2022 season are from the ACC, according to USA Today – No. 3 Hartman of Wake Forest, No. 4 Van Dyke of Miami and No. 7 Leary of NC State.

■ In 2021, Armstrong ranked fourth nationally in total passing yards (4,449) while Hartman (4,228) ranked seventh. Hartman's 39 touchdown passes tied for fifth nationally, and Leary's 35 TD passes ranked 10th. Armstrong stood second nationally in total yards per game (427.3), and Hartman (327.9) placed seventh.

■ Louisville's Cunningham led the league and ranked fourth in the country with 20 rushing touchdowns in 2021 while also averaging 218.5 yards passing.

2022 SUBWAY ACC CHAMP GAME SET FOR PRIMETIME

■ The 2022 Subway Atlantic Coast Conference Football Championship Game will kick off at 8 p.m. on ABC on Saturday, Dec. 3, at Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte, North Carolina. The game will feature the winner of the Atlantic Division vs. the winner of the Coastal Division.

■ This is the 13th time in the last 14 years that the game will be held in primetime, and 12 different teams have competed in the game since it began in 2005. Last season, No. 15 Pitt, behind the play of ACC Player of the Year Kenny Pickett, captured its first ACC football title with a 46-21 victory over No. 16 Wake Forest.

■ Bank of America Stadium, home of the NFL's Carolina Panthers, has been the site of 11 of the last 12 ACC Football Championship Games. In 2018, the ACC and the Charlotte Sports Foundation reached an agreement to keep the game in Charlotte through 2030. Not including the 2020 game, which had limited attendance due to the pandemic, ACC Football Championship Games played at Bank of America Stadium have had an average attendance of nearly 70,000 fans. The ACC has the second-highest average attendance of any Power 5 conference championship game since 2010.

■ The winner of the conference championship game has gone on to play in the National Championship Game or compete in the College Football Playoff in eight of the last nine seasons, including two teams in 2020. The ACC has the second most CFP appearances of any conference.

AROUND THE ACC

▼ **Boston College:** Preseason first-team All-ACC wide receiver Zay Flowers finished the Maine game with eight catches for 89 yards and a touchdown. Late in the third quarter, Flowers moved into fifth place all-time on Boston College's receptions list. He now has 144 career catches.

▼ **Clemson:** Clemson won its 36th consecutive home game with a 48-20 victory over Louisiana Tech to extend its school record for both the longest home winning streak and longest home unbeaten streak in school history.

▼ **Duke:** QB Riley Leonard accounted for four touchdowns in a 49-20 victory over North Carolina A&T. Leonard finished the night 11-of-12 passing for 155 yards and two touchdowns. He also rushed for two scores, including a career-long 56-yard sprint that put Duke up 35-6 in the third quarter.

▼ **Florida State:** Ontaria Wilson caught both of FSU's touchdown passes vs. LSU, tying career highs with two touchdowns and seven catches. He had a game-high 102 receiving yards, the second-most in his career.

▼ **Georgia Tech:** Georgia Tech LB Ayinde Eley, who entered the week as the only player in NCAA Division I FBS with at least 20 tackles, two tackles for loss, two fumble recoveries and a forced fumble this season, added to those numbers with 12 tackles, 3.0 tackles for loss, 1.0 sack, and a forced fumble vs. Ole Miss.

▼ **Louisville:** Against FSU, QB Malik Cunningham finished 21-of-34 for 243 yards passing with one interception and one touchdown to go with 127 rushing yards and two scores on the ground. He completed passes to six different receivers.

▼ **Miami:** Miami is allowing just 12.3 points per game, which ties for first in the ACC and is 16th nationally.

▼ **North Carolina:** QB Drake Maye's 11 touchdown passes are the most by a UNC quarterback in a three-game span since Mitch Trubisky had 11 in three games in 2016 (three vs. JMU, five vs. Pitt, three at FSU).

▼ **NC State:** NC State has two interceptions in every game this season. The only FBS team that has completed three games this season with two plus interceptions in every game is Wisconsin.

▼ **Pitt:** Israel Abanikanda paced a Pitt rushing attack that amassed 238 yards on the ground in the win over Western Michigan. Abanikanda recorded his second consecutive – and third career – 100-yard rushing game, finishing with 133 yards on a career-high 31 carries and a 4-yard touchdown.

▼ **Syracuse:** In the win over Purdue, running back Sean Tucker moved within 10 yards of Ernie Davis (3,386) on Syracuse's all-time rushing list.

▼ **Virginia:** Quarterback Brennan Armstrong broke UVA's career passing record with a 17-yard completion to Lavel Davis Jr. in the fourth quarter. He passed Matt Schaub on UVA's all-time list who threw for 7,502 from 2000-03. Armstrong now has 7,504 for his career.

▼ **Virginia Tech:** The Hokies have scored in 349 consecutive games, the third-longest active streak in the nation among FBS schools. It's also the fifth-longest streak in FBS history.

▼ **Wake Forest:** QB Sam Hartman broke the Wake Forest all-time passing mark, eclipsing Riley Skinner (2006-09) with a five-yard pass to Ke'Shawn Williams in the third quarter against Liberty. Hartman has thrown for 9,891 career passing yards, moving into the top 10 in ACC history.

RETURNING LEAGUE LEADERS

■ In addition to the prolific quarterbacks, several other statistical leaders from last year return in 2022, including Syracuse running back Sean Tucker, North Carolina wide receiver Josh Downs and Virginia linebacker Nick Jackson.

■ Tucker led the ACC and ranked fourth in the country with 124.7 rushing yards per game. He shattered the Syracuse single-season rushing record (1,496) in 2021 and was named a first-team FWAA All-American. Tucker headlines a contingent of five returning rushers who ranked among last season's top 10 in yards per game – Boston College's Patrick Garwo (87.1 ypg), Louisville's Cunningham (79.3 ypg), Clemson's Will Shipley (73.9 ypg) and Syracuse's Shrader (65.1 ypg).

■ A Biletnikoff semifinalist, UNC's Downs led the league in receptions per game (7.8) and was second in receiving yards per game (102.7). He set program records with 101 receptions and 1,335 receiving yards. Returning standouts Dontayvion Wicks of Virginia (100.3 ypg), A.T. Perry of Wake Forest (92.4 ypg), Keytaon Thompson of Virginia (82.5 ypg) and Zay Flowers of Boston College (62.2 ypg) all ranked among the top 10 in receiving yards per game last season.

■ More than half of the top 20 tacklers from a year ago return in 2022, including three players – Virginia's Jackson (117), Syracuse's Mikel Jones (111) and NC State's Drake Thomas (100) – who had at least 100 tackles. NC State's Payton Wilson, who led the league in tackles in 2020, but missed most of last season with an injury, also returns. Georgia Tech's Ayinde Eley, Duke's Shaka Heyward, North Carolina's Cedric Gray, Florida State's Jammie Robinson, Virginia Tech's Dax Hollifield, NC State's Tanner Ingle, Pitt's SirVocea Dennis, Virginia Tech's Chamarrri Conner, and Syracuse's Stefon Thompson all ranked in the top 20 of ACC tacklers last year.

RETURNING ALL-CONFERENCE

■ The ACC returned 47 players who earned first-, second-, or third-team All-ACC honors from a year ago, including five first-team offensive players and seven first-team defensive players. Another 37 who were honorable-mention picks also return.

ACC FOOTBALL SCHEDULE NOTES

■ The 70th season of ACC Football features 56 league games and 56 non-conference contests. Each team will play eight league contests, which includes six division games, one permanent non-division opponent and one rotating opponent from the opposite division. The 2022 schedule includes a minimum of one open date for each team, and at least one conference contest is scheduled each week, except for Week Zero.

■ Once again, the ACC's non-conference schedule is arguably the most difficult in the country. In addition to 21 games against Power 5 opponents, the ACC will play eight non-conference games against teams ranked in the final 2021 AP Top 25 poll. All 14 ACC teams play at least one Power 5 non-conference opponent, while seven schools – Boston College, Clemson, Duke, Florida State, Georgia Tech, Pitt and Syracuse – play two. ACC teams will play 27 games against opponents that appeared in a bowl game last year.

Subway ACC Football Championship Game

■ The 2022 Subway ACC Football Championship Game will be played Dec. 3 at Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte, North Carolina, and feature the winner of the Atlantic Division vs. the winner of the Coastal Division. The ACC and the Charlotte Sports Foundation have an agreement in place to keep the championship game in Charlotte through the 2030 season.

ACC COACHING NOTES

■ Four new football coaches have been hired in the ACC for the 2022 season: Duke's Mike Elko, Miami's Mario Cristobal, Virginia's Tony Elliott and Virginia Tech's Brent Pry.

■ Among active head coaches, the ACC's Dabo Swinney (Clemson), Mack Brown (North Carolina), Mike Norvell (Florida State), Dave Doeren (NC State) and Scott Satterfield (Louisville) rank among the top 30 in the nation in career winning percentage. Swinney's .810 winning percentage ranks second in the nation. Brown is second among all active coaches with 268 victories.

■ Clemson head coach Dabo Swinney secured his 150th career win in the Cheez-It Bowl vs. Iowa State in 2021. Swinney joins Bobby Bowden as the only head coaches ever to lead an ACC program to 150 wins. It was Swinney's 11th bowl victory, which ties Bowden's record (11) for the most career bowl wins leading an ACC program.

■ Two of the five active coaches to win a national title reside in the ACC. Dabo Swinney led Clemson to national titles in 2016 and 2018. North Carolina's Mack Brown won a national title at Texas in 2005.

■ Four current league coaches have won ACC Coach of the Year honors - North Carolina's Mack Brown in 1996, Clemson's Dabo Swinney in 2015 & 2018, Louisville's Scott Satterfield in 2019 and Wake Forest's Dave Clawson in 2021.

CLEMSON FAVORED IN 2022 ACC FOOTBALL PRE-SEASON POLL

■ Clemson is favored to claim the 2022 Atlantic Coast Conference football title for the seventh time in the last eight years, according to a preseason poll of 164 media voters.

■ The Tigers, who recorded their 11th consecutive double-digit win season with a 10-3 finish in 2021, were also chosen as likely Atlantic Division winners. Miami was picked to finish atop the Coastal Division following a 7-5 campaign last season that included wins in five of the final six games.

■ The 2022 ACC Preseason Poll was conducted via a vote of a media panel, including those who were credentialed for the ACC Football Kickoff in Charlotte, North Carolina.

■ Clemson was named the likely 2022 ACC champion on 103 ballots. NC State picked up 38 votes, followed by Miami with eight and Wake Forest with four. Pitt (3), Virginia (3), Florida State (2), North Carolina (2), and Boston College (1) also received votes.

■ In the Atlantic Division preseason voting, Clemson led the way with 111 first-place votes and 1,080 total points. NC State, which was tabbed as the likely second-place finisher, picked up 44 first-place votes while accumulating 959 points.

■ Defending Atlantic Division Champion Wake Forest (six first-place votes, 783 points) was picked for a third-place finish this season, followed by Louisville (591), Florida State (two first-place votes, 509) Boston College (one first-place vote, 469) and Syracuse (201).

■ In the Coastal Division forecast, Miami received 98 first-place votes and amassed 1,036 total points. Defending ACC champion Pitt (38 first-place votes) was next with 911 points, followed by North Carolina (18 first-place votes, 823 points) and Virginia (six first-place votes, 667 points).

■ Virginia Tech (three first-place votes, 592 points), Georgia Tech (one first-place vote, 343 points) and Duke (220 points) closed out the voting.

■ Clemson was selected as the likely ACC champion in the media preseason poll for the fifth consecutive season and the eighth time in the last 10 years.

■ Miami was projected as the preseason Coastal Division champion for the sixth time and the first time since 2018. The Hurricanes' lone Coastal Division championship came in 2017.

■ The Atlantic and Coastal Division winners will meet in the 2022 ACC Football Championship Game on Saturday, December 3, at Charlotte's Bank of America Stadium.

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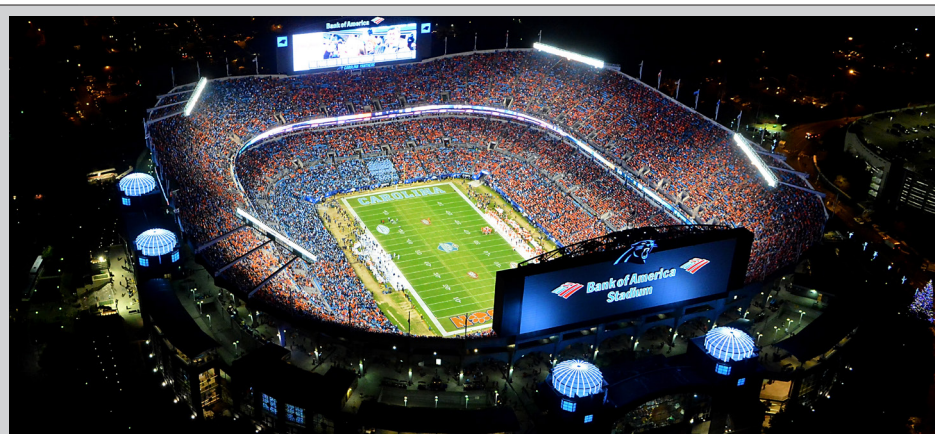

• The Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl and the Fiesta Bowl are national semifinal sites for the 2022 season. There is no limit on how many teams from one conference can appear in the CFP. If the ACC Champion is in the top four of the final CFP rankings, it will play in one of the national semifinal games. Additional ACC teams could also be selected for the CFP or Goodyear Cotton Bowl as at-large representatives. If the ACC Champion is not in the top four of the final CFP rankings, it will appear in the Capital One Orange Bowl against the highest ranked available non-champion team from the Big Ten or SEC, or Notre Dame.

• The ACC and its bowl partners will make team selections based on several factors, including geographic proximity, avoiding repeat appearances and matchups, and regular-season won-loss records.

• **Capital One Orange Bowl** - The Capital One Orange Bowl will host the ACC Champion (or highest ranked ACC team not ranked in the top four) against the highest ranked available non-Champion team from the Big Ten or SEC.



HOME OF THE ACC

NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

■ No other conference won more NCAA national championships in 2021-22 than the ACC. The league's seven titles matched the conference's record in an academic year, which was set in 2009-10. The ACC brought home NCAA Championships in women's cross country (NC State), women's soccer (Florida State), men's soccer (Clemson), women's swimming & diving (Virginia), fencing (Notre Dame), men's tennis (Virginia) and women's lacrosse (North Carolina). Additionally, ACC student-athletes won 24 individual national titles in 2021-22.

■ The ACC has won seven national championships in football, men's basketball, women's basketball and baseball since 2015. The ACC is the only conference to win each of those four titles over that stretch.

■ The ACC has won three of the last nine football national titles and three of the last seven men's basketball national championships (most of any conference).

■ Clemson (15-0) won the league's eighth football national championship in 2018 with a 44-16 win over previously unbeaten Alabama. The 28-point margin of victory was the largest over a No. 1 ranked team in ACC history.

ACC SUCCESS IN 2021-22

■ Eleven ACC programs finished the 2021-22 season ranked either No. 1 or No. 2 in their respective sports, and 12 of 15 member schools captured either an ACC or NCAA Championship.

■ Six ACC schools placed among the top 25 of the final Division I LEARNFIELD College Directors' Cup standings. North Carolina finished sixth and was joined in the top 10 by Notre Dame, which placed eighth. Virginia (11th), Florida State (14th), NC State (17th) and Duke (21st) completed the ACC's top-25 contingent. Virginia Tech (33rd place), Louisville (34th), Wake Forest (45th) and Miami (50th) followed to give the ACC 10 institutions among the top 50. This marks the 20th consecutive year that four or more ACC schools placed among the top 30 in the final rankings.

■ The ACC had the most Honda Award winners of any conference in 2021-22 with four – Florida State's Jaelin Howell (soccer), Virginia's Kate Douglass (swimming), North Carolina's Jamie Ortega (lacrosse) and Louisville's Lauren Thibodeau (Inspiration Award).

FOOTBALL SUCCESS

■ The ACC has had a team in either the College Football Playoff or the BCS National Championship Game in eight of the last nine years, including two teams in 2020. The ACC has the second most CFP appearances of any conference.

■ The ACC placed 10 teams in football postseason bowl games in 2021. It is the 21st consecutive season in which the ACC earned at least six bowl bids. Not including the pandemic-affected 2020 season, the ACC has sent at least 10 teams to a bowl every year since 2016. Since 2013, the ACC is second among all conferences with 91 postseason appearances.

■ Four ACC teams finished the 2021 season ranked in the AP Top 25. In the AP poll, ACC Champion Pitt finished No. 13, its highest ranking since 1982. The Panthers were followed by No. 14 Clemson, No. 15 Wake Forest and No. 20 NC State.

■ In ESPN's Way Too Early Top 25 for 2022, NC State led the ACC at No. 7, followed by No. 11 Clemson, No. 15 Pitt and No. 17 Wake Forest. Four ACC teams are in The Athletic's Too Early Top 25 – No. 8 Clemson, No. 9 NC State, No. 11 Pitt and No. 15 Wake Forest. In SI.com's Way Too Early Top 25, Clemson is No. 4, followed by No. 8 Wake Forest and No. 19 NC State.

■ Pitt quarterback Kenny Pickett finished third in the voting for the 2021 Heisman Trophy. He is the seventh ACC player in the last nine years to finish in the top three, including 2013 winner Jameis Winston of FSU and 2016 winner Lamar Jackson of Louisville. Clemson's Trevor Lawrence finished second in 2020.

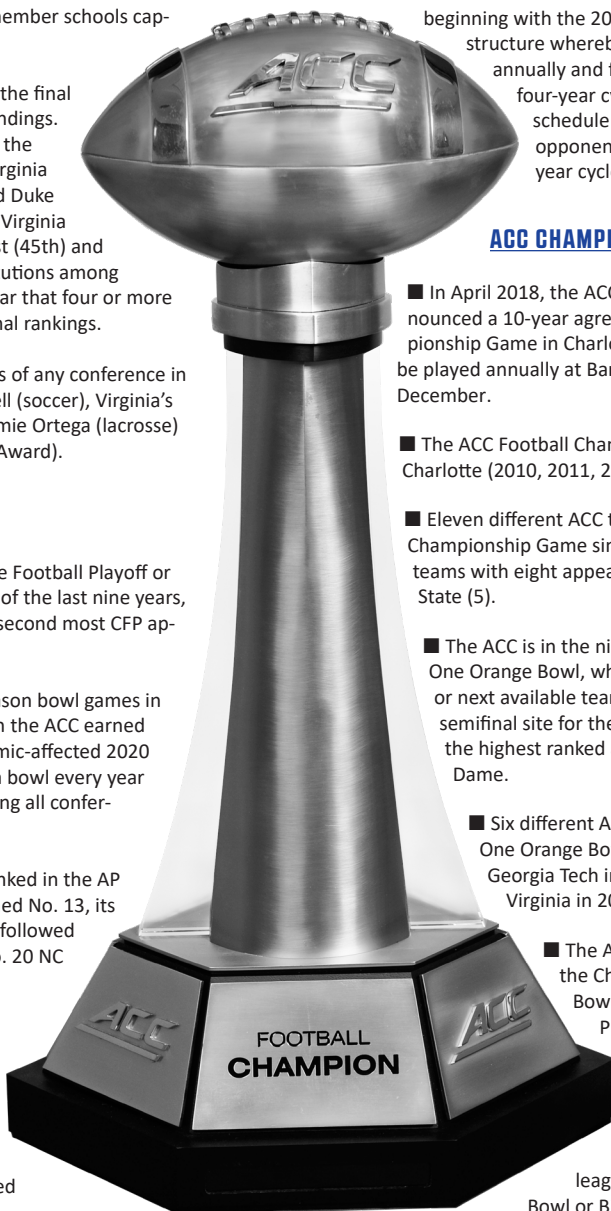
■ Led by unanimous first-team All-America offensive tackle Ikem Ekwonu of NC State, the ACC placed 12 players – representing eight different schools – on NCAA recognized 2021 All-America teams. Pitt led the league with four selections. The NCAA recognizes the All-America teams selected by AP, FWAA, The Sporting News, AFCA and Walter Camp to determine consensus All-Americans.

■ The ACC continued to establish itself as the Conference of Quarterbacks in 2021, and many of the leading players return this season, including 10 players with at least nine career starts.

■ Ten different quarterbacks from ACC schools started at least one game in the NFL last season – most of any conference.

■ Among active head coaches, the ACC's Dabo Swinney (Clemson), Mack Brown (North Carolina), Mike Norvell (Florida State), Dave Doeren (NC State) and Scott Satterfield (Louisville) rank among the top 30 in the nation in career winning percentage. Swinney's .806 winning percentage ranks second in the nation. Brown is second among all active coaches with 265 victories.

■ The ACC announced a new football scheduling model that will go into effect beginning with the 2023 season. The new model is based on a 3-5-5 structure whereby each team will play three primary opponents annually and face the other 10 league teams twice during the four-year cycle, once at home and once on the road. The schedule allows for each team to face all 13 conference opponents home and away at least once during the four-year cycle.



ACC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME & BOWL SUCCESS

■ In April 2018, the ACC and the Charlotte Sports Foundation announced a 10-year agreement that will keep the ACC Football Championship Game in Charlotte through the 2030 season. The game will be played annually at Bank of America Stadium on the first Saturday in December.

■ The ACC Football Championship Game has sold out five times in Charlotte (2010, 2011, 2015, 2017, 2020).

■ Eleven different ACC teams have played in the ACC Football Championship Game since its inception in 2005. Clemson leads all teams with eight appearances, followed by Virginia Tech (6) and Florida State (5).

■ The ACC is in the ninth year of a 12-year agreement with the Capital One Orange Bowl, which will host an ACC team – either its champion or next available team – in all years when the Orange Bowl is not a semifinal site for the College Football Playoff. The opponent will be the highest ranked available team from the SEC, Big Ten or Notre Dame.

■ Six different ACC teams have played in the prestigious Capital One Orange Bowl since 2013 – Clemson in 2013 & 2015, Georgia Tech in 2014, Florida State in 2016, Miami in 2017, Virginia in 2019 and North Carolina in 2020.

■ The ACC's current bowl lineup through 2025 includes the Cheez-It Bowl, Duke's Mayo Bowl, Wasabi Fenway Bowl, Military Bowl Presented by Peraton, New Era Pinstripe Bowl, San Diego County Credit Union Holiday Bowl, TaxSlayer Gator Bowl and Tony the Tiger Sun Bowl. In addition, the ACC will send a team to the Outback Bowl if the league's opponent in a non-semifinal Capital One Orange Bowl is from the Big Ten. The league will also send a team to either the Gasparilla Bowl or Birmingham Bowl on an annual basis.

ACC & THE NFL DRAFT

- Since the 2005 season, the ACC has had 634 players chosen in the NFL Draft, including 99 first-round picks, the second highest totals of any conference.
- Four ACC players were selected in the first round of the 2022 NFL Draft in Las Vegas, headlined by No. 6 pick Ikem Ekwonu (OL) of NC State to the Carolina Panthers. He was joined in the first round by Boston College OL Zion Johnson (17th, Los Angeles Chargers), Pitt QB Kenny Pickett (20th, Pittsburgh Steelers) and Florida State DE Jermaine Johnson II (26th, New York Jets). Clemson cornerback Andrew Booth Jr. was taken in the second round and North Carolina offensive guard Joshua Ezeudu and Virginia tight end Jelani Woods were third round picks. Fourteen ACC players were taken in rounds four through seven.
- Ekwonu is the first ACC offensive lineman taken in the top six picks since Virginia's D'Brickashaw Ferguson was taken fourth overall in 2006.
- The ACC has had 353 players selected since 2013 - the second-highest total among all conferences - and has had 40 or more players picked in five of the last nine drafts. The ACC's 45 draftees in 2018 was its third-highest ever.
- Current ACC teams have had a total of nine players chosen as the first overall selection in the NFL Draft. The most recent was Clemson's Trevor Lawrence, who was tabbed first in 2021 by the Jacksonville Jaguars. Miami (Vinny Testaverde, 1987, Tampa Bay; and Russell Maryland, 1991, Dallas) and Virginia Tech (Bruce Smith, 1985, Buffalo; and Michael Vick, 2001, Atlanta) each had two top selections while Clemson (Lawrence, 2021, Jaguars), Florida State (Jameis Winston, 2015, Tampa Bay), NC State (Mario Williams, 2006, Houston), Virginia (Bill Dudley, 1942, Pittsburgh) and Syracuse (Ernie Davis, 1962, Washington) each had one. Also, NC State's Roman Gabriel, the No. 2 overall selection in the 1962 draft, was chosen No. 1 in the AFL Draft by the Oakland Raiders.

ACC STUDENT-ATHLETE PROGRAMS & SERVICES

- The ACC's Committee for Racial and Social Justice (CORE - Champions of Racial Equity) continued its mission to promote and encourage inclusion, racial equity and social justice through education, partnerships, engagement and advocacy.
- Among CORE's accomplishments in 2021-22 were the creation and recognition of the inaugural UNITE Award Class; the ACC's Fall, Winter and Spring UNITY Weeks (theme: "Awareness to Action"); mandatory staff education and the ACC Unity Tour in Selma and Montgomery, Alabama in July, 2022.
- The ACC conducted a Health and Safety Summit in Greensboro in May, in partnership with the ACC Sports Medicine Association, bringing together athletic trainers, team physicians, nutritionists, mental health practitioners, sports performance coaches, and others within the ACC's health and sports performance community to collaborate and to share best practices.
- The 2021 ACC/Big Ten Basketball Challenge used the series of 28 men's and women's games to bring awareness to the importance of mental health and to help to break down any stigma related to mental health struggles.
- In December, the first cohort of "Coaching the Whole Athlete Academy" was completed. The Coaching Academy is an eight-week virtual and immersive development program established by the league office that equips coaches with information, tools, and skills of a humanistic approach to better support the needs of the student-athlete.
- The ACC's Professional Development Academy was completed in June and featured more than 60 student-athletes coming together as part of a four-week program. The Academy's curriculum, designed and delivered by student-athlete development administrators from ACC member institutions, assisted participants in identifying core values, developing circles of influence, establishing effective communication and leadership skills, and charting career plans.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS

- A player from a current ACC school has won the William V. Campbell Trophy® five times, including three times in the last eight years. That is the most of any conference over that span. The award recognizes an individual as the absolute best football scholar-athlete in the nation for his combined academic success, football performance and exemplary leadership.
- Ten of 14 ACC Football teams earned a graduation success rate (GSR) at or above the FBS average based on the report released by the NCAA last November. That tied for the most among Power 5 conferences.
- The ACC remains the only conference to have multiple teams register GSR scores of 90 or higher every year since 2005. Duke (96), Louisville (93), Pitt (93) and Boston College (92) reached that plateau in this year's report.
- For the 15th consecutive year, the ACC led the way among FBS conferences in the "Best Colleges" rankings released by U.S. News & World Report.
- ACC teams continue to stand out among those from Division I colleges and universities that meet standards and excel academically, as evidenced by the annual Academic Progress Rate (APR) team data released by the NCAA in January 2022. All ACC football, men's basketball, women's basketball and baseball programs exceeded the NCAA's required APR. In football, 11 ACC teams have an APR above the Division I average 969 (second among peer conferences).

ACC NETWORK

- Owned and operated by ESPN in partnership with the Atlantic Coast Conference, ACC Network (ACCN) and its digital platform ACCNX is a 24/7 national network dedicated to ACC sports that launched on August 22, 2019. ACCN televises more than 500 regular-season and tournament games from across the conference's 27 sponsored sports plus a complement of news and information shows and original programming. Together, ACCN and its digital platform, ACCNX, combine to feature more than 1,500 ACC events each year.
