CLEMSON TO FACE TENNESSEE IN 2022 CAPITAL ONE ORANGE BOWL

Fresh off its 21st all-time ACC championship and its seventh outright conference crown in eight years, Clemson (AP Poll No. 10, Coaches Poll No. 11, CFP No. 7) will attempt to record its seventh 12-win season in team history when it faces consensus No. 6 Tennessee in the 2022 Capital One Orange Bowl on Friday, Dec. 30. Kickoff at Hard Rock Stadium in Miami Gardens, Fla. is set for 8 p.m. ET.

Clemson will be making its seventh all-time appearance in the Orange Bowl, a game in which the Tigers hold a 4-2 record. The game was the site of Clemson's first national championship victory on New Year's Day 1982, when the Tigers defeated Nebraska, 22-15. Clemson has won each of its last two Orange Bowl appearances, including a 40-35 win over Ohio State to end the 2013 season and a 37-17 College Football Playoff semifinal win over Oklahoma in 2015.

Head Coach Dabo Swinney will be coaching his 200th career game at Clemson, joining Frank Howard (295) as the only coaches in school history to serve as head coach for 200 career contests. With a 161-38 career mark, Swinney will attempt to earn his 162nd victory in his 200th career game as head coach to tie Joe Paterno and Tom Osborne (162 each) for the third-most wins through 200 career games in major college football history, trailing Urban Meyer (170) and Gil Dobie (163). Swinney's 161 wins are already the second-most through the first 15 seasons in a career in FBS history, including his debut season in 2008 in which he was limited to only seven games after ascending to the position in an interim capacity.

Quarterback Cade Klubnik is expected to make

his first career start in the contest after earning ACC Championship Game Most Valuable Player honors for his sterling performance in reserve against North Carolina. Klubnik will become the first Clemson quarterback to make his starting debut in a postseason game since Clemson abandoned the single-wing offense in favor of the T-formation in 1953. Since 2022, Clemson quarterbacks are 9-2 in the first career starts with wins by Charlie Whitehurst, Will Proctor, Cullen Harper, Kyle Parker, Tajh Boyd, Deshaun Watson, Kelly Bryant, Trevor Lawrence and DJ Uiagalelei.

WHAT TO WATCH FOR THIS WEEK

- Clemson attempting to produce its seventh 12-win season in program history, joining the 1981 (12), 2015 (14), 2016 (14), 2017 (12), 2018 (15) and 2019 (14) seasons.

- Clemson (five) attempting to join Alabama (six) as the only programs in the nation to post at least six 12-win seasons since 2015.

- Clemson's 2022 squad attempting to match its 1981 and 2017 teams for the fifth-most wins in a season in school history.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 27-22 all-time in bowl contests. A 27th bowl win would move Clemson into ninth in FBS history. (Note: Ohio State can also earn its 27th all-time bowl victory this year.)

- Clemson attempting to win at least one bowl game in nine of its last 11 seasons. A win would make Clemson 11-4 in bowl games since 2012, including College Football Playoff National Championship Games.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 5-2 all-time in Orange Bowl play, joining wins in the 1950, 1981, 2013 and 2015 seasons.

- Clemson attempting to win its third consecutive Orange Bowl, including victories in its last two appearances in the 2013 and 2015 seasons.

- Clemson (four) attempting to join Oklahoma (12), Nebraska (eight), Miami (Fla.) (six), Alabama (five) and Florida State (five) as the only programs ever to win five Orange Bowls.

- Clemson entering the game having won a postseason game (conference championship, bowl game and/or national championship game) for 12 consecutive seasons. Clemson's current 12-year streak is the longest active streak in the country and passed 1985-95 Florida State (11) for the longest streak on record back to 1980, according to Stats Perform.

- Head Coach Dabo Swinney making his 19th bowl game appearance to break Bobby Bowden's ACC record (18) for the most career bowl appearances leading an ACC program.

- Swinney (11) sitting one bowl victory (including CFP National Championship Games) shy of breaking Bowden's ACC record (11) for the most career bowl wins leading an ACC program.

- Swinney coaching his 200th career game to join Frank Howard (295) as the only head coaches in school history to coach 200 career games at Clemson.

- Swinney joining Florida State's Bobby Bowden (227) and Virginia's George Welsh (223) as the only coaches to lead an ACC program in at least 200 career games.

- Swinney attempting to earn his 162nd victory in his 200th career game as head coach to tie Joe Paterno and Tom Osborne (162 each) for the third-most wins through 200 career games in major college football history, trailing Urban Meyer (170) and Gil Dobie (163).

- Swinney (161) attempting to add to his mark as the second-winningest coach in FBS history through the first 15 seasons of a career. Swinney ranks second behind only Urban Meyer (165). Swinney's win total includes his interim season in which he only coached seven games.

- Swinney attempting to improve to 20-8 all-time in postseason play, including both conference championship games and bowl games. A win would improve him to 9-2 in 11 postseason contests since 2018.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 16-12 all-time in games between AP Top 10 teams. Clemson is 12-6 against AP Top 10 teams in the College Football Playoff era, with all six losses coming to College Football Playoff participants (including four national champions). - Clemson facing multiple AP Top 10 teams in a season for the seventh time in eight years.

- Clemson facing Tennessee for the 20th time in school history, a series that dates to John Heisman's Tigers facing the Volunteers at Knoxville's Chilhowee Park in 1901.

- Clemson attempting to earn its seventh all-time victory against Tennessee.

- Clemson attempting to make Tennessee the fifth different opponent defeated by the Tigers in multiple bowl games all-time, joining Ohio State (four), Oklahoma (three) and Alabama (two), Kentucky (two). In addition to Tennessee, Clemson has defeated Boston College, Colorado, Illinois, Iowa State, Louisiana Tech, LSU, Miami (Fla.), Missouri, Nebraska, Notre Dame, Penn State, Stanford, TCU and West Virginia once each in bowl play.

- Clemson attempting to win its 17th consecutive December game, dating to Clemson's 2011 ACC Championship Game victory against Virginia Tech. Clemson (16-0) is one of three schools to be undefeated in December since 2011 with a minimum of five games played, a list that also includes Alabama (13-0) and Penn State (7-0).

- Clemson attempting to improve to 28-13 all-time in

December games, including postseason play.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 5-0 against AP Top 25 opponents (at kickoff) this season.

- Clemson (four) attempting to tie the school record for wins against AP-ranked teams in a single season (five in 2016 and 2017). (Note: Clemson's 2017 team also had a win against a South Carolina squad that was ranked No. 24 in the College Football Playoff poll but was unranked by the Associated Press.)

- Clemson playing its eighth night game of 2022, tying the 2017 and 2019 campaigns for the second-most in a season in Clemson history.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 28-5 in night games since the start of the 2018 season. A win would move Clemson to 47-8 at night since 2015.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 49-10 in games away from home, including neutral-site contests, since 2015.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 34-16 under Dabo Swinney in games when both teams are ranked in the AP Top 25. A win would make Clemson 28-6 since 2015 in games between ranked teams.

- Clemson playing its 154th consecutive game since losing back-to-back games in a single season. Clemson's 153-game streak dating to 2011 is the nation's longest

active streak.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 14-6 against SEC opponents in the College Football Playoff era. Clemson is currently 7-2 against SEC East foes since 2014 and 6-2 against the SEC West since the start of the 2016 season.

- Clemson facing Tennessee Head Coach Josh Heupel for the first time. A win would improve Clemson to 43-5 when facing an opposing head coach for the first time since 2011 and 160-71-3 since 1950.

- Clemson attempting to score 30 points in a fifth consecutive game and for the 12th time this season.

- Clemson (451) sitting 49 points shy of the eighth 500-point season in school history.

- Clemson (56) needing four touchdowns to post the ninth 60-touchdown season in program history.

- Clemson entering the game having scored at least one rushing touchdown in a national-best 67 of its 68 games since the start of the 2018 season.

- Clemson attempting to rush for a touchdown in a 26th consecutive game.

- Clemson attempting to rush for multiple touchdowns in five consecutive games for the first time since a 28-game streak across the 2018-20 seasons.

- Clemson, which completed 80 percent of its passes against North Carolina (its best in a game since 2018), attempting to post a completion percentage of 75.0 or better in consecutive games for the first time since a three-game streak in 2013 against Virginia, Georgia Tech and The Citadel.

- Clemson attempting to play consecutive games without a giveaway for the second time this season (at Wake Forest and vs. NC State).

- Clemson attempting to produce multiple takeaways in a fifth consecutive game for the first time since the final three games of the 2018 season and the first two games of the 2019 season.

- Clemson attempting to produce three or more takeaways in back-to-back games for the first time since 2020 against Pitt and Virginia Tech.

- Clemson attempting to win the turnover margin in consecutive games for the first time since October 2021 against Boston College and Syracuse.

- Clemson attempting to record at least four sacks in five consecutive games for the first time since a six-game streak across the final three games of 1990 and the first three games of 1991.

- Clemson attempting to score a defensive touchdown in three consecutive games for the first time since 1990 against NC State (Dexter Davis fumble return), Wake Forest (Arlington Nunn interception return) and North Carolina (Davis interception return).

- Clemson's tight ends entering the game having recorded 60 catches for 670 yards and 10 touchdowns this season. The Clemson tight end group records in that category under Dabo Swinney are 65 receptions (2011), 797 yards (2016) and 10 touchdowns (2011, 2012 and 2022).

- Tight ends Davis Allen (five) and Jake Briningstool (four) entering the game with at least four touchdown catches each, making Clemson one of only five FBS programs (and one of only three Power Five teams) to have multiple tight ends with at least four touchdown catches this season.

- Allen (12) needing one touchdown reception to pass John McMakin (12 from 1969-71), Dwayne Allen (12 from 2009-11) and Brandon Ford (12 from 2009-12) for sole possession of the second-most career touchdown receptions by a tight end in Clemson history.

- Allen (career-high 35) needing five more receptions to post the first 40-catch season by a Clemson tight end since 2016 (46, Jordan Leggett). Another touchdown reception, his sixth, would make him the first Clemson

tight end with six or more touchdown catches in a season since Leggett in 2016 (seven).

- Defensive tackle Bryan Bresee (8.0) needing two more sacks to join Myles Murphy (17.5), Xavier Thomas (14.5), Tyler Davis (14.5), K.J. Henry (13.5) and Trenton Simpson (12.5) to become Clemson's sixth active player with at least 10 career sacks for the Tigers.

- Defensive tackle Tyler Davis (8.5 tackles for loss, 4.5 sacks) entering the game within striking distance of his single-season career highs in tackles for loss (9.0 in 2019) and sacks (5.5 in 2019).

- Defensive end K.J. Henry (3.5 sacks this season, 13.5 sacks for his career) needing one sack to match his single-season career high (4.5 in 2021) and 1.5 sacks to reach 15 career sacks.

- Quarterback Cade Klubnik making his first career start.

- Klubnik becoming the first Clemson quarterback since the modernization of Clemson's quarterback position in 1953 to make his first career start in a postseason game.

- Klubnik becoming only the eighth true freshman to start at quarterback for Clemson since the NCAA instituted permanent freshman eligibility in 1972, joining Steve Fuller (1975), Willie Jordan (1975), Patrick Sapp (1992), Nealon Greene (1994), Deshaun Watson (2014), Trevor Lawrence (2018) and DJ Uiagalelei (2020).

- Clemson attempting to improve to 21-14 in games started by true freshman quarterbacks since the NCAA instituted permanent freshman eligibility in 1972.

- Klubnik attempting to improve Clemson to 10-2 in first career starts by quarterbacks since 2002. It would make Clemson 28-18-1 in debut starts for its quarterbacks since 1953.

- Klubnik attempting to become the fifth straight Clemson starting quarterback to win his first start (Deshaun Watson in 2014, Kelly Bryant in 2017, Trevor Lawrence in 2018 and DJ Uiagalelei in 2020).

- Placekicker B.T. Potter (71) needing one field goal to tie or two field goals to pass Nelson Welch (72 from 1991-94) for the Clemson record for career field goals.

- Potter (18) sitting three field goals shy of his single-season career high (21 in 2021).

- Potter appearing in his 69th career game to tie Clemson's program record for career games played shared by James Skalski, Will Spiers and Will Swinney. Potter's 68 career games are the most of any active player at any level of NCAA football.

- Potter making his 54th career start at placekicker to add to his Clemson position record set in the ACC Championship Game.

- Potter attempting to score in a 54th consecutive game to break the Clemson record set by Chandler Catanzaro (53) from 2010-13. Potter has scored in every game since earning the starting placekicking job prior to the 2019 season after serving as the team's kickoff specialist in 2018.

- Potter attempting to add to his Clemson records for career field goals of 40 yards or more (33) and 50 yards or more (nine).

- Running back Will Shipley (career-high 1,110 rushing yards this season) needing 90 yards to produce the ninth 1,200-yard season in Clemson annals.

- Shipley (1,110) needing 77 rushing yards to enter the Top 10 in single-season rushing yardage in Clemson history.

- Shipley (1,848) needing 152 rushing yards to reach 2,000 for his career. He would be the 21st Clemson player to reach that mark.

- Shipley (15) needing one rushing touchdown to tie Travis Zachery (16 in 1999) for the sixth-most rushing touchdowns in a season in Clemson history. He is two

- Shipley (two) attempting to become the first Clemson player to record 200 all-purpose yards in three games in a single season since Sammy Watkins in 2011 (three).

- Linebacker Jeremiah Trotter Jr. attempting to record a sack in four consecutive games for the first time in his career.

- Trotter attempting to become the first Clemson player to post at least 2.0 sacks in three consecutive games since Keith Adams in 1999.

- Trotter attempting to become the first Clemson player on record with at least 3.0 sacks in back-to-back games.

- Cornerback Nate Wiggins (12) sitting one pass breakup shy of the Clemson sophomore record for pass breakups in a single season (13), shared by James Lott (1987) and Justin Miller (2003).

- Wide receiver Antonio Williams (four) attempting to become the first Clemson freshman to catch five touchdown passes in a season since Justyn Ross' nine-touchdown debut campaign in 2018.

This year's Capital One Orange Bowl will represent Clemson's seventh all-time trip to the Orange Bowl. The Tigers are 4-2 in the previous six appearances.

1951 (1950 season): Clemson won its first appearance, 15-14, against Miami (Fla.) in the 1951 Orange Bowl at the end of the 1950 season. To date, it remains the only time Clemson has played a bowl game against a team playing in its home stadium.

Clemson was the first Southern Conference team to be invited to the Orange Bowl when it played in the 1951 event. The Tigers won that game as middle guard Sterling Smith tackled Miami running back Frank Smith in the end zone for a safety with six minutes left. Miami's Harry Mallios had returned a Fred Cone punt 79 yards for a touchdown on the play before the drive started, but Miami was called for clipping and was backed up to their own eight. After two clipping penalties, the Hurricanes had the ball at their own one when Smith's safety on the ensuing play gave Clemson a 15-14 advantage.

The game was not over, however, as Fred Cone fumbled on Clemson's next possession and Miami had the ball at the Clemson 24. But, Smith came through again with a

10-yard sack of the Hurricanes to stop the drive.

1957 (1956 season): Clemson went to the 1957 Orange Bowl as champions of the four-year-old ACC. Colorado took a 20-0 lead into halftime, and coach Frank Howard threatened to quit when he talked to his team at the break if their play did not improve. The team took it to heart and took a 21-20 lead in the fourth period, but Colorado recovered an onside kick at midfield and drove for the winning touchdown.

1982 (1981 season): Clemson won the 1982 Orange Bowl with a 22-15 victory over fourth-ranked Nebraska to conclude a 12-0 season for Clemson that gave the program its first national championship in any sport. The Tigers held the lead most of the game and scored touchdowns on a two-yard run by Cliff Austin and a 13-yard pass from Homer Jordan to Perry Tuttle. Nebraska's team included future Heisman Trophy winner Mike Rozier and future San Francisco 49ers star Roger Craig.

2012 (2011 season): West Virginia defeated Clemson, 70-33, in the 2012 Orange Bowl after the 2011 season. Clemson had entered the game by virtue of its ACC Championship, the first for the school in 20 years.

Clemson held a 17-14 lead at the end of the first quarter. Trailing by 21-17 in the second period, Clemson drove to the West Virginia two, but Andre Ellington fumbled at the one and Darwin Cook raced 99 yards for a touchdown to give West Virginia a 28-17 lead instead of a 24-21 Clemson advantage. The Tigers could not recover in the eventual defeat.

2014 (2013 season): Clemson won the 2014 Orange Bowl over Ohio State, 40-35, in a thrilling affair. Tajh Boyd led the Tigers in his last game with 505 yards of total offense. He completed 31-of-40 passes for 378 yards and five touchdowns and added 20 rushes for 127 yards and a touchdown. The 505 yards of total offense set a Clemson record for a bowl game.

In his final game at Clemson, Sammy Watkins had 16 receptions for 227 yards and two scores. The reception total and yardage both set Clemson single-game records and Orange Bowl marks. Stanton Seckinger caught a five-yard pass from Boyd with 6:16 left to put Clemson ahead and an interception by Stephone Anthony cemented the win for the Tigers. Boyd and Anthony are now both on the support staff for Clemson's 2022 Orange Bowl team.

LAST ORANGE BOWL APPEARANCE

Clemson 37, Oklahoma 17

(Dec. 31, 2015, Miami Gardens, Fla.)

MIAMI GARDENS, Fla. — Clemson outscored Oklahoma, 21-0, in the second half and defeated the Sooners, 37-17, in the College Football Playoff National Semifinal at the Orange Bowl. With the win, the No. 1 Tigers advanced to the National Championship game against No. 2 Alabama.

The two teams traded scores in the first half and the Sooners took a 17-16 lead at intermission. Clemson gained 305 yards of total offense in the first half, but still trailed by a point.

Oklahoma scored first on its first drive of the game, then Clemson scored 13 straight points to take a 13-7 lead. A key play took place in the second quarter when the Tigers executed a fake punt. Punter Andy Teasdall threw a pass out of punt formation to defensive tackle Christian Wilkins, who was on the field as part of the punt shield.

Wilkins' 31-yard reception set up a Deshaun Watson five-yard run that gave Clemson a 10-7 lead. Greg Huegel booted three field goals in the first half, but Oklahoma took the lead just before the half on an 11-yard pass from Baker Mayfield to Mark Andrews.

It was all Clemson in the second half as the Tigers

shutout the high-scoring Sooners, who had won seven straight entering the contest, over the final two quarters.

Clemson's ground game was dominant as Wayne Gallman finished with 150 yards rushing and Watson added 145. It was the first time in history Clemson had a pair of 140-yard rushers in the same game.

Gallman scored on a one-yard run on Clemson's first drive of the second half to take a 23-17 lead. Hunter Renfrow then caught a 35-yard touchdown pass from Watson to give Clemson a 30-17 lead entering the fourth period. Gallman then put the game away with 10:48 left on a four-yard run.

Clemson's defense forced two turnovers in the second half, including interceptions by starting linebackers B.J. Goodson and Ben Boulware.

T.J. Green led Clemson with 10 tackles, but Boulware was named the MVP with the interception, eight tackles and a sack. Kevin Dodd added 3.5 tackles for loss, including a sack, as Clemson held the Sooners to just 67 rushing yards on 40 attempts.

Watson finished 16-for-31 for 187 yards and a touchdown, and his 145 rushing yards gave him 332 yards of total offense. Artavis Scott was Clemson's top receiver with five catches for 63 yards and Renfrow added four catches for 59 yards.

Huegel finished 3-for-4 on field goals and scored 13 of Clemson's points. With Renfrow's touchdown, it gave Clemson 19 points from walk-ons, more than the Sooners scored as a team for the entire game.

BOWL STREAKS

With a berth in the Orange Bowl this season, Clemson extended its school-record bowl streak to 18 years. Clemson's 18-year bowl streak is the longest in the ACC and the fifth-longest in the country.

Though Clemson did not make a bowl appearance in 2004, Clemson has been bowl eligible in 24 consecutive seasons, dating back to a 1999 appearance in the Peach Bowl.

BOWL SUCCESS UNDER SWINNEY

Clemson has posted a 11-7 bowl record under Head Coach Dabo Swinney, including a 10-4 mark in its last 14 bowl games dating back to the 2012 season.

Many of Clemson's 10 bowl wins since 2012 have not come against run-of-the-mill opponents. Eight of Swinney's 10 bowl victories in that span have come against head coaches with national championship victories to their credit at various levels of NCAA play, including two wins each against Nick Saban, Urban

Meyer and Bob Stoops, as well as single victories against Les Miles and Brian Kelly. Four of those coaches won FBS titles, while Kelly was a two-time champion at the Division II level.

SWINNEY TO COACH 200TH GAME

This year's Orange Bowl will be the 200th game in Dabo Swinney's head coaching career.

Among coaches who qualify for the NCAA FBS record book by virtue of five years or 50 wins as a major college head coach, 17 coaches have earned at least 150 victories in their first 200 career games as head coach. Fifteen of the 17 are College Football Hall of Famers, while the other two — Lance Leipold and Urban Meyer — are, respectively, active or not yet eligible.

With his 162nd career win in his 200th career game, Swinney would tie Joe Paterno and Tom Osborne (162 each) for the third-most wins through 200 career games in major college football history (and tie for second-most in the modern era).

- Twenty-two of Clemson's 27 previous all-time Top 10 matchups have come under Head Coach Dabo Swinney, with Swinney posting a 13-9 record in those contests. Danny Ford went 2-1 in three career Top 10 games, including the Orange Bowl to conclude Clemson's 1981 national championship season. Frank Howard and Tommy Bowden each lost their lone matchup of Top 10 teams in their Clemson tenures.

- Clemson has won 12 of its last 18 games between Top 10 teams in the College Football Playoff era. All six losses came to College Football Playoff participants, with four of them coming at the hands of that season's national champion.

- Swinney is 17-11 against AP Top 10 teams all-time, regardless of Clemson's rank. His 17 wins against AP Top 10 competition are the second-most of any active coach.

SERIES HISTORY VS. TENNESSEE

The 2022 Orange Bowl will be the 20th all-time meeting between Clemson and Tennessee. Though the teams met 16 times from 1901-44, including 10 times in a 16-season span from 1901-16, this year's postseason contest will be only the fourth meeting between the Tigers and Volunteers since Clemson joined the ACC as a charter member in 1953.

Clemson won the only postseason contest between the two teams in the programs' most recent meeting, a 27-14 Clemson victory in the Peach Bowl to end the 2003 season. Clemson entered that contest unranked after a 5-4 start to the season but finished the year 9-4 including the 13-point win against sixth-ranked Tennessee. The game marked Dabo Swinney's first bowl game as an assistant at Clemson, as he was in his first season as the team's wide receivers coach under Head Coach Tommy Bowden.

LAST MEETING VS. TENNESSEE

Clemson 27, Tennessee 14

(Jan. 2, 2004, Atlanta, Ga.)

ATLANTA — Clemson finished its 2003 campaign on a four-game winning streak as the Tigers upset No. 6 Tennessee by a score of 27-14. The win gave Clemson two victories over top-10 teams for the first time since the 1981 National Championship season and propelled the Tigers to a No. 22 ranking in both final polls.

Clemson received the ball to start the game, and the offense responded with a quick start. Charlie Whitehurst found Derrick Hamilton for 26 yards and Kevin Youngblood for 35 more to move into scoring position. On first-and-goal, Whitehurst led an option to the short side of the field. Duane Coleman took the pitch and leaped over a would-be tackler for an eight-yard score.

Tennessee was forced to punt on its second possession, as Clausen was sacked by Justin Miller and then had a pass tipped at the line by Eric Coleman. All-America punter Dustin Colquitt booted a 41-yard punt, but Clemson's Hamilton provided some fireworks as his 58-yard punt return put Clemson on the Volunteers' 17-yard line to begin the next drive.

The Tigers quickly responded to a Volunteer touchdown late in the first quarter. Chad Jasmin rushed for 46 yards on the drive, including a 15-yard touchdown run up the middle to put the Tigers ahead 17-7.

Clemson again responded with points on the ensuing possession. Jasmin ignited the drive with a 31-yard run up the middle. Whitehurst then found Hamilton for a 23-yard gain into the redzone. Faced with third-and-goal from the eight, the Tiger coaching staff reached into its bag of tricks.

Whitehurst took the shotgun snap and handed the ball to Kyle Browning between his legs. Whitehurst then carried out a fake option to the right, while Browning hesitated and then ran left for the touchdown. The play, known as "Panther," put the Tigers ahead 24-14 at halftime.

Clemson rushed for 153 yards, while Tennessee struggled to just 38. Jasmin, voted the game's most valuable offensive player, had 130 yards on the ground and a touchdown.

Recording sacks for Clemson were Charles Bennett, Touré Francis, Leroy Hill, John Leake, DeJuan Polk and Miller. With two sacks, Hill was voted the defensive most valuable player.

ON THIS DATE

- **Dec. 30, 1989:** The Tigers defeated West Virginia, 27-7, in the Gator Bowl. It was Clemson's fourth straight bowl victory and the fourth straight year Clemson concluded the season ranked in the national top 20. The Tigers held West Virginia to just 119 yards passing and forced Heisman Trophy runner-up Major Harris into three fumbles. Chester McGlockton sacked Harris in the end zone and recovered the ball for a touchdown for Clemson's final score.

NOTES FROM LAST GAME

- Among Clemson's victories in each of its last eight ACC Championship Game berths, Clemson has won each of its last five ACC Championship Game appearances by at least 24 points.

- Quarterback Cade Klubnik entered the game on Clemson's third possession and completed 20-of-24

passes for 279 yards and a passing touchdown and added seven carries for 30 yards and a rushing touchdown.

- Klubnik engineered a nine-play, 71-yard touchdown drive on his first series of the game. He accounted for 58 yards of total offense on the drive, including completing 5-of-5 passes for 50 yards and rushing once for eight yards.

- Klubnik ended his first possession with a one-yard touchdown pass to tight end Davis Allen, Klubnik's second career touchdown pass and his first since Clemson's season opener at Georgia Tech.

- Klubnik recorded a 19-yard reception on a pass from running back Phil Mafah in the first quarter, the longest reception by a Clemson quarterback since DeChane Cameron's 37-yard reception against Virginia in 1991. Mafah's pass was the longest by a Clemson running back since Travis Etienne's 23-yard pass to Justyn Ross against Florida State in 2019.

- Klubnik recorded his first career rushing touchdown on a one-yard touchdown run in the second quarter.

- Klubnik opened the game 10-for-10 for 149 yards prior to his first incompletion late in the second quarter.

- With his 12th touchdown reception, Allen tied John McMakin (12 from 1969-71), Dwayne Allen (12 from 2009-11) and Brandon Ford (12 from 2009-12) for the second-most career touchdown receptions by a tight end in Clemson history.

- Allen set a new single-season career high in touchdown receptions with his fifth touchdown reception of the season.

- Clemson's tight ends have now combined for 10 touchdown receptions this season, tied for the unit's most under Dabo Swinney (10 in 2011 and 2012).

- Mafah scored his career-high fourth rushing touchdown of the season on a four-yard touchdown run in the first quarter.

- Wide receiver Cole Turner recorded his second career reception on a 68-yard pass from Klubnik. The long gain setup Klubnik's one-yard touchdown run on the ensuing play.

- The 68-yard reception by Turner was Clemson's longest play of the season from scrimmage, surpassing 59-yard passes against Florida State and South Carolina.

- Turner recorded 101 yards on three receptions, becoming the first Clemson player to record 100 receiving yards in a game since Beaux Collins against Wake Forest last season.

- Wide receiver Brannon Spector caught a career-long 43-yard reception in the third quarter.

- Running back Will Shipley scored his 15th rushing touchdown of the season on a two-yard touchdown run in the third quarter. He has now produced only the seventh individual season in Clemson history with at least 15 rushing touchdowns. He is now one touchdown shy of tying Travis Zachery (16 in 1999) for sixth-most rushing touchdowns in a season in Clemson history and three shy of a three-way tie for third.

- Shipley rushed for a touchdown in a sixth straight game to tie Woodrow Dantzler (six straight games in 2000) and Travis Etienne (six straight games from 2018-19) for the 10th-longest streak of consecutive games with a rushing touchdown in school history. It pulled Shipley's current streak one game shy of his career-long streak of seven, set across the 2021-22 seasons.

- Three different Clemson players rushed for a touchdown. Clemson rushed for a touchdown in a 25th consecutive game. Clemson has scored at least one rushing touchdown in a national-best 67 of its 68 games since the start of the 2018 season.

- Clemson has also rushed for multiple touchdowns in four consecutive games for the first time since a 28-game streak across the 2018-20 seasons.

- Defensively, Clemson recorded the game's first takeaway, as defensive tackle Ruke Orhororo fell on a missed quarterback exchange for his second career fumble recovery.

- The fumble recovery was Orhororo's first since Sept. 25, 2021 at NC State.

- Linebacker Jeremiah Trotter Jr. recorded a career-high 3.0 sacks and nearly doubled his career-high season sack total to 6.5.

- Trotter's third sack set an ACC Championship Game record, surpassing the 2.0 sacks produced by Florida State's Lawrence Timmons, Georgia Tech's Jeremiah Attaochu (2012) and Clemson's Dexter Lawrence (2016).

- Trotter became the first Clemson player to post at least 2.0 sacks in back-to-back games since Clelin Ferrell in 2018 against Texas A&M and Georgia Southern.

- Trotter also became the first Clemson player to record 3.0 sacks in a game since Ferrell against Syracuse in 2017 (3.5).

- Trotter has now recorded a sack in three consecutive games for the first time in his career.

- On Clemson's fourth sack of the game, Trotter's third of the evening, Clemson (40) reached 40 sacks for the ninth consecutive year. Clemson is the only program in the country to record at least 40 sacks in every year since the inception of the College Football Playoff in 2014.

- Clemson has now recorded at least four sacks in four consecutive games for the first time since last season against Florida State, Louisville, UConn and Wake Forest.

- Linebacker Barrett Carter and defensive tackle Tyler Davis split a sack in the second quarter.

- Cornerback Nate Wiggins recorded two pass breakups and an interception, which he returned for a touchdown.

- Wiggins recorded his first career interception in the third quarter and returned his pick of Drake Maye 98 yards for a touchdown.

- Wiggins' 98-yard interception return was the longest play in ACC Championship Game history. It was the second-longest interception in Clemson history, trailing Don Kelley's 102-yard return vs. Duke in 1970.

- Wiggins' return for touchdown tied for the seventh-longest play in Clemson history and the longest for the Tigers since Derrick Hamilton's 100-yard kickoff return against UNC in 2003.

- Clemson, which scored its first defensive touchdown of the season a week earlier, scored another defensive touchdown to give the Tigers multiple defensive touchdowns in 13 straight seasons. The last time Clemson had fewer than two defensive touchdowns in a season was 2009, Dabo Swinney's first full season as head coach, when the Tigers supplemented a single defensive touchdown with six special teams touchdowns.

- Clemson scored a defensive touchdown in consecutive games for the first time since a three-game streak in 1990 against NC State (Dexter Davis fumble return), Wake Forest (Arlington Nunn interception return) and North Carolina (Davis interception return).

- Clemson recorded multiple takeaways in four consecutive games for the first time since the middle of the 2020 season.

- Wiggins recorded the first blocked field goal of his career in the second quarter.

- Wiggins' field goal block was Clemson's fifth overall blocked punt or placekick this season, Clemson's most in a season since 2016 (five). It was the Tigers' third field goal block of the season and its first since Oct. 8 at Boston College.

- Cornerback Jeadyn Lukus recorded Clemson's third takeaway of the game with his first career interception in the fourth quarter.

- B.T. Potter made his 53rd career start at placekicker to take sole possession of the Clemson record at the

position shared currently with Chandler Catanzaro (52 from 2010-13).

- Potter appeared in his 68th career game to pull within one game of Clemson's program record for career games played (69, shared by James Skalski, Will Spiers and Will Swinney). Potter's 68 career games are the most of any active player at any level of NCAA football.

- Potter scored in a 53rd consecutive game to tie the Clemson record set by Chandler Catanzaro from 2010-13. Potter has scored in every game since earning the starting placekicking job prior to the 2019 season after serving as the team's kickoff specialist in 2018.

- Potter recorded a career-long-tying 52-yard field goal on the final play of the first half. It was his fourth career field goal of 52 yards, matching 52-yarders against LSU (2019) and Wake Forest (2020 and 2022).

- Potter's 52-yarder added to his Clemson records for career field goals of 40 yards or more (33) and 50 yards or more (nine).

- On the 52-yarder, with his fourth point of the game, Potter (103) became the first player in ACC history to score 100 points in four different seasons.

- Potter's 52-yarder was also an ACC Championship Game record for longest field goal, surpassing a 51-yarder by Notre Dame's Jonathan Doerer against Clemson in 2020.

- Holder Drew Swinney scored his first career points on a successful two-point conversion attempt in the third quarter. It was Clemson's third successful two-point conversion of the season, its most since 2016.

- After producing 15 giveaways over the last five games, Clemson produced its first giveaway-free game since an Oct. 15 game at Florida State.

- Clemson won the turnover margin, 3-0, to end a five-game streak of losing the turnover margin, Clemson's longest under Dabo Swinney. Clemson now has a 71-4 record when winning the turnover margin since 2011.

- Clemson finished plus-three in the turnover margin for the first time since Sept. 17 vs. Louisiana Tech.

- Clemson did not allow a sack and is undefeated since 2011 in games in which it does not allow a sack.

- Clemson made its ninth all-time ACC Championship Game appearance, adding to the Tigers' ACC record (2009, 2011, 2015, 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019 and 2020).

- Clemson represented the Atlantic Division in the ACC Championship Game for the eighth time and did so in the final year of the ACC's divisional format. That total does not include Clemson's appearance in 2020 in which the conference's top two regular season teams faced off in the conference title game.

- Clemson and North Carolina met with both teams ranked in the AP Top 25 for the fifth time in series history. Clemson is 5-0 in those contests, including previous wins in 1959, 1981, 1982 and 2015.

- Clemson played its seventh night game of 2022, the fourth-most in a season in Clemson history.

- Captains for the contest were tight end Davis Allen, defensive end K.J. Henry, wide receiver Joseph Ngata and safety Jalyn Phillips.

WITH THE WIN...

- Clemson became the first program to win 21 ACC titles. Since helping form the conference in 1953, Clemson leads the ACC with 21 titles all-time, including 20 outright.

- Clemson earned its 27th conference championship all-time, including four SIAA championships and two Southern Conference championships prior to the formation of the ACC. Clemson's 27 conference titles across all conferences are the most of any current or former ACC member.

- Clemson moved past Colorado (26) for sole possession of the 11th-most conference titles among current FBS programs.

- Clemson has now won a postseason game (conference championship, bowl game and/or national championship game) in 12 consecutive seasons. Clemson's current 12-year streak is the longest active streak in the country and passes 1985-95 Florida State for the longest streak on record back to 1980, according to Stats Perform.

- Clemson became the first program in an active Power Five conference to win seven outright conference titles in an eight-year span since Alabama won eight SEC titles in nine seasons from 1971-79.

- Clemson improved to 8-1 all-time in ACC Championship Games.

- Clemson improved to 2-0 all-time in ACC Championship Games against North Carolina, including a 45-37 victory in the 2015 ACC Championship Game. Clemson has faced Virginia Tech and North Carolina twice each in conference title games and faced Georgia Tech, Miami, Pitt, Virginia and Notre Dame once each.

- Clemson produced its 11th 11-win season in program history, joining the 1948, 1978, 1981, 2012, 2013, 2015, 2016, 2017, 2018 and 2019 seasons. It is Clemson's eighth season of 11-plus wins under Head Coach Dabo Swinney.

- Head Coach Dabo Swinney won his eighth conference championship to tie Frank Howard for the most in Clemson history. Howard won two Southern Conference titles (1940,48) and six ACC titles (1956,58,59,65,66,67) in his 30-year run with the Tigers.

- Swinney (eight) joined Bobby Bowden (12, including 10 outright) as the only coaches in conference history to win eight career ACC titles.

- Swinney improved to 19-8 all-time in postseason play, including both conference championship games and bowl games. The win improved him to 8-2 in 10 postseason contests since 2018.

- Swinney improved to 35-3 all-time against teams from the state of North Carolina.

- Swinney improved to 18-4 in games played inside North Carolina state limits.

- Clemson improved to 39-19-1 all-time against North Carolina.

- Clemson earned a fifth consecutive victory against North Carolina, starting with a 59-38 victory in 2011. It is Clemson's fifth winning streak of at least five games in series history (seven from 1986-92 and six from 1958-63).

- Clemson won its 16th consecutive December game, dating to Clemson's 2011 ACC Championship Game victory against Virginia Tech. Clemson (16-0) is one of three schools to be undefeated in December since 2011 with a minimum of five games played, a list that also includes Alabama (13-0) and Penn State (7-0).

- Clemson improved to 27-13 all-time in December games, including postseason play.

- Clemson won a 12th consecutive game against conference opponents, dating to last season, taking sole possession of Clemson's fourth-longest streak against conference opponents since the formation of the ACC in 1953.

- Clemson finished 37-9 against opponents historically from the ACC Coastal Division, including postseason play, under Head Coach Dabo Swinney in the ACC's divisional era, which concluded with this game. That figure includes games against traditional Coastal opponents in a divisionless season in 2020. The win made Clemson 22-2 in its final 24 games against Coastal Division teams since 2015.

- Clemson (100-12 since 2015) became the second program in the nation to win 100 games since the start of

the 2015 season (Alabama).

- Clemson improved to 4-0 against AP Top 25 opponents (at kickoff) this season.

- Clemson (four) tied for its second-most wins against AP-ranked teams in a single season (four in 2011, 2015 and 2018) and pulled one shy of the school record (five in 2016 and 2017). (Note: Clemson's 2017 team also had a win against a South Carolina squad that was ranked No. 24 in the College Football Playoff poll but was unranked by the Associated Press.)

- Clemson has now won at least four games against AP Top 25 teams in a single season for the sixth time in school history, joining the 2011 (four), 2015 (four), 2016 (five), 2017 (five) and 2018 (five) seasons.

- Clemson improved to 8-2 all-time at Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte. Clemson's 8-2 mark in the facility now includes a 7-0 record in ACC Championship Games.

- Clemson improved to 27-5 in night games since the start of the 2018 season. The Tigers are now 46-8 at night since 2015.

- Clemson improved to 48-10 in games away from home, including neutral-site contests, since 2015.

- Clemson improved to 33-16 under Dabo Swinney in games when both teams are ranked in the AP Top 25. The win made Clemson 27-6 since 2015 in games between ranked teams.

- Clemson's 2021 and 2022 recruiting classes won their first ACC title. Every Clemson signing class in Head Coach Dabo Swinney's tenure (recruiting classes of 2009-22) has earned at least one conference title in their four years at Clemson. The championship was the third ACC title for Clemson's 2019 class and the second for its 2020 class.

- Swinney (161) passed Oklahoma's Bob Stoops (160) for sole possession of the second-most victories in the first 15 seasons of a head coaching career in FBS history.

- Clemson improved to 31-7 in games following a loss under Swinney, including season openers following a loss in the previous season finale. Clemson has not lost back-to-back games in the same season since November 2011.

- Clemson played its 153rd consecutive game since losing back-to-back games in a single season. Clemson's 153-game streak dating to 2011 is the nation's longest active streak.

- Clemson improved to 32-6 under Swinney in games in which the Tigers enter ranked lower in the AP Poll than they did in its previous contest.

- Clemson is now 127-3 since 2011 when leading after three quarters.

- Clemson has won 106 of its last 107 games when holding teams under 23 points (dates to 2010).

-- BEST IS THE STANDARD --

ONE OF THE ERA'S WINNINGEST PROGRAMS

Alabama and Clemson rank No. 1 and 2 in the country in wins since 2015, with the two teams combining for five out of seven national championships in that time frame. With a dominating win in the 2022 ACC Championship Game, Clemson became only the second program in the FBS to win 100 games since 2015.

Clemson's lofty perch in that ranking reflects not only its dominance against middle and lower tier opponents, but also its success in matchups with other premier programs. Since 2011, Clemson has played 13 other programs that entered 2022 ranked in the top 30 in wins by a Power Five program in that span. Clemson is 53-13 (.803) against those programs in that span and is .500 or better against 12 of the 13 teams.

Narrowed further among the winningest Power Five programs, Clemson is 8-5 (.615) against the top five, 12-8 (.600) against the top 10 and 22-11 (.667) against the top 20.

10-WIN SEASONS

Two years ago, Clemson's 10th consecutive 10-win season in 2020 made Clemson only the third program in FBS history to produce a "double-double" — double-digit wins in a double-digit number of consecutive seasons. The record for consecutive 10-win seasons is 15, as Alabama's 15th consecutive 10-win season in 2022 broke Florida State's record of 14 from 1987-2000.

With another 10-win season in 2022, Clemson joined Florida State and Alabama as the only programs ever to reach 10 wins in a dozen straight seasons. The 2022 season is Clemson's 19th 10-win season in school history. It is Clemson's 12th such season under Dabo Swinney.

SENIOR SUCCESS

Every January, Head Coach Dabo Swinney conducts his first official meeting with his new team. The first order of business in the meeting is to "reset the room," reorganizing the seating arrangement with seniors in front and all succeeding classes in order behind them in the team auditorium.

Clemson's recent senior classes have placed themselves among select company in college football history. The 2017, 2018, 2019 and 2020 Clemson seniors account for four of only 13 four-year classes in FBS history to reach 50 career wins. That includes the 2018 and 2019 groups that are tied with the 2018 Alabama seniors for the most wins in FBS history (55 wins in four years).

HISTORIC CONFERENCE REIGN

After a one-year hiccup in 2021, Clemson reclaimed the ACC throne with "A"nother "C"lemson "C"ampionship in 2022. The conference title was Clemson's seventh in eight years, as the Tigers became the first team in an active Power Five conference to win seven outright conference titles in an eight-year span since Alabama won eight SEC titles in nine seasons from 1971-79.

Two years earlier, Clemson became the first program ever to win 20 ACC Championships, distancing further from Florida State, which ranks second with 15. That year, Clemson became the first program in the conference championship game era to win six straight conference championship games. Clemson also became the first ACC program to win six consecutive outright titles, as Florida State had a streak of nine straight ACC titles, but that streak included two co-championships that prevented Bobby Bowden's Seminoles from ever winning more than

three straight titles outright.

Including titles from its days as a member of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association and Southern Conference, Clemson has 27 conference championships overall, also the most of any current ACC school. Duke ranks second among the ACC's current membership with 18 overall conference titles, including 11 Southern Conference titles and seven ACC titles.

The Tigers won the 1900, 1902 and 1903 SIAA Conference championships under John Heisman, then the 1906 SIAA title under Bob Williams. Clemson also won the 1940 and 1948 Southern Conference titles under Frank Howard. Howard won eight total conference titles, including two in the Southern Conference and six in the ACC. Swinney matched Howard with his eighth conference title in 2022.

RETIRING WITH THE ATLANTIC BELT

On Nov. 5, Clemson earned the Atlantic Division's berth in the 2022 ACC Championship Game by virtue of holding tiebreakers, but the Tigers and Head Coach Dabo Swinney were emphatic that they wanted to win the division outright, a goal they accomplished with a 31-16 win vs. Louisville a week later.

With the ACC slated to dissolve its divisional format in 2023, it was a point of pride for Swinney that the Atlantic Division crown that had so frequently made its residence in Clemson resided in Clemson for good.

"We went and *won* the division championship," Swinney said after defeating Louisville. "That was actually one of my personal goals. It's always a goal to win the division but it was even a little bit more [of a goal] this year because we're not going to have any more divisions. This is the last one, so it's really fitting that it's here at Clemson."

Including shared titles, Clemson won nine Atlantic Division titles (2009, 2011, 2012, 2015, 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019 and 2022) since the ACC instituted the division structure in 2005. Clemson also earned an ACC Championship Game berth in a divisionless season impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020.

Clemson played 97 games against Atlantic Division opponents in the divisional era spanning the 2005-22 seasons (including games against traditional Atlantic Division teams in 2020). Clemson went 80-17 (.825) against division teams in that span, including a 14-4 record against Boston College, 12-5 record against Florida State, 8-0 record against Louisville, 6-3 record against Maryland, 15-2 record against NC State, 9-1 record against Syracuse and a 16-2 record against Wake Forest. Clemson finished the divisional era with more ACC Championship Game berths (nine, including 2022) than losses to any single divisional opponent in that span (led by five wins by Florida State).

Clemson's intra-divisional dominance was particularly pronounced in the division's final years. Clemson closed the ACC's divisional era by winning 48 of its last 50

games against Atlantic Division teams.

POWER OVER THE POWER FIVE

Early in his head coaching tenure, Dabo Swinney laid out his belief to then-Clemson athletic director Terry Don Phillips that the Tigers needed to add tough non-conference challenges on top of their tests in ACC play to serve as a foundation for the program's growth.

"I had a conversation with Terry Don and said, 'Terry Don, I know we are not very good right now, but we need to play people because that is going to help me teach and help me develop the culture and the mindset that you have to have to win at the highest level,'" recounted Swinney. "I didn't think we had that, and that's what we committed to. That's what we've done."

That scheduling philosophy and culture change has resonated in the Clemson program, and since 2013, no team can claim more wins against Power Five Conference opponents than the Tigers. On Nov. 12, Clemson became the first program to reach 100 victories against Power Five opponents since 2013.

Clemson's national-best 102 Power Five wins since 2013 include victories against Boston College (10), Wake Forest (10), Georgia Tech (9), Syracuse (9), NC State (8), Louisville (8), Florida State (7), South Carolina (7), Notre Dame (3), Ohio State (3), Miami (4), North Carolina (4), Virginia (3), Virginia Tech (3), Alabama (2), Pitt (2), Auburn (2), Oklahoma (2), Texas A&M (2), Georgia (1), Duke (1), Maryland (1) and Iowa State (1).

On a year-by-year basis, Clemson has finished the season atop the country in wins against Power Five opponents four times since the institution of the College Football Playoff in 2014, including four of the last seven years. That includes 13 wins against Power Five opponents in 2018, the first team ever to reach that figure.

SIGN AND DEVELOP

While proud of his incoming classes, Head Coach Dabo Swinney has long stated that a true ranking of a recruiting class cannot and should not be published until four years later when the group can be evaluated on performance rather than potential.

Much to Swinney's delight, The Athletic has annually assumed that role in recent years, re-ranking every recruiting class four years later to account for on-field performance.

For its re-rankings, The Athletic uses the following grading scale: 5 points: All-American, award winner, top-50 NFL Draft pick; 4: Multi-year starter, all-conference honors; 3: One-year starter or key reserve; 2: Career backup; 0: Minor or no contribution, left the program. The outlet also adds a bonus to each program's class average, derived from its total number of wins from 2017 through 2020 (e.g.: For re-ranking the Class of 2017, Clemson won 51 games, so its class average received a bonus of 0.51).

Even in its current stretch of recruiting success, Swinney has often pointed out Clemson drops in rankings as its commitment to not oversigning leads to smaller recruiting classes, as well as noting that much of Clemson's on-field success is a function of the program's development, citing All-Americans like former three-star Isaiah Simmons or former two-star Nolan Turner. The re-rankings illustrate Clemson's pristine recent track record of talent identification, culture fit, resource allocation and player development.

On average, Clemson finished roughly 12th in the 247 Composite team rankings across the 2014-18 recruiting cycles. Upon re-ranking those groups, despite having little room for improvement while recruiting at a Top 15 clip in that span, Clemson ranked 3.2 on average in the re-rankings, a ratings bump of about eight-and-a-half spots. Each of those Clemson classes averaged at least 12 wins a season during their careers.

ESTEEMED COMPANY

Head Coach Dabo Swinney's run of excellence in his tenure at Clemson has placed him in the company of college football legends.

Swinney boasts a career winning percentage of .809, sitting as one of only 14 head coaches in history with at least 10 seasons of FBS head coaching experience to post a mark of .800 or better.

ONE OF THE FASTEST TO 150 WINS

With a win against Iowa State in the 2021 Cheez-It Bowl, Head Coach Dabo Swinney earned his 150th career head coaching win in only his 186th career game.

Among coaches who qualify for the NCAA FBS record book by virtue of five years or 50 wins as a major college head coach, only 16 entered 2022 having reached 150 career wins in 200 games or less. Fourteen of the 16 are College Football Hall of Famers, with the 15th and 16th — Swinney and Urban Meyer — likely to be inducted upon meeting eligibility requirements.

Swinney became the sixth-fastest FBS coach to 150 career wins — two games behind Fielding Yost and Joe Paterno — and the fourth-fastest in the modern era.

Four previous Clemson head coaches earned 150+ FBS wins in their careers: John Heisman (186), Jess Neely (207), Frank Howard (165) and Ken Hatfield (168). Howard, a College Football Hall of Famer, is the only coach to reach 150 career wins as Clemson's head coach. He recorded his 150th victory in his 273rd career game, in a 14-10 victory against Maryland in 1966 that clinched a piece of what later became an outright ACC title. Heisman earned win No. 150 in game No. 203, Neely earned it in game No. 268, and Hatfield did it in game 259, though none of those three won more than 43 games in their Clemson tenures.

FIRST 15 SEASONS

With his 150th career win in the 2021 Cheez-It Bowl, Dabo Swinney moved into third on the all-time leaderboard for the most wins through the first 15 years of a head coaching career in FBS history, moving past College Football Hall of Famer Barry Switzer.

Impressively, Swinney has amassed his total despite not having the benefit of a full season in his first year. Swinney went 4-3 on an interim basis in his first season in 2008 after taking over for Tommy Bowden in October.

Swinney has continued to add to his total in his 15th season in 2022.

HEAD COACH CONTINUITY

Over the last decade, Clemson became a beacon of stability in the increasingly unstable environment of college football. Clemson Head Coach Dabo Swinney is in his 20th overall season at Clemson in 2022, including his 14th full season as head coach (and his 15th including an interim stint in 2008).

From the start of Swinney's first season as full-time head coach in 2009 through 2021, there were more than 400 head coaching tenures in the FBS (excluding those by interims), but only one such tenure at Clemson.

Clemson is the only school in the ACC with only one head coach since the start of the 2009 season, and among the 13 schools ever to qualify for the College Football Playoff, only Clemson and Alabama have had only one head coach since 2009.

SIX "FINAL FOURS" FOR SWINNEY

While the term "Final Four" may still be the linguistic property of college basketball, since the advent of the four-team College Football Playoff in 2014, Head Coach Dabo Swinney had Clemson among the sport's final four teams six times from 2015-20, becoming the first coach to lead a team to six consecutive College Football Playoffs since the format's institution in 2014.

The NCAA men's college basketball tournament dates to 1939. In the history of that tournament, only John Wooden of UCLA (nine from 1967-75) and Mike Krzyzewski of Duke (five from 1988-92) coached teams to at least five consecutive Final Fours. With his sixth "Final Four" appearance in 2020, Swinney joined basketball's Wooden as the only college football or men's basketball coaches to take teams to six consecutive Final Fours in their respective sports.

During Wooden's streak of nine straight Final Fours, he recorded eight championships and a semifinal loss. Coach K's Blue Devils recorded two championships, a second-place finish and three semifinal losses. Nick Saban's Final Four history includes three championships, three runner-up finishes and a semifinal loss, while Swinney so far has two championships, two runner-up finishes and two semifinal losses.

Swinney is among only nine coaches in football and men's basketball to record six career Final Four berths. He is one of only six with a winning record in Final Four games.

Swinney's ability to place his team among the nation's elite quartet has also been illustrated by the polls. Clemson finished first in the AP Poll in 2016 and 2018, second in 2015 and 2019, third in 2020 and fourth in 2017. Swinney became just the fourth coach to record at least six consecutive top four finishes since the AP Poll began in 1936, an exclusive list that also includes Florida State's Bobby Bowden (13), USC's Pete Carroll (seven) and Oklahoma's Bud Wilkinson (six).

Clemson's streak represented the fifth time a program has had a run of at least six top four finishes in the AP Poll. Miami (Fla.) had a seven-year run from 1986-92 with two different head coaches leading the program.

Swinney ranks second among coaches in both College Football Playoff appearances and College Football Playoff wins. Only seven head coaches have ever won a College Football Playoff game, and only five have won a College Football Playoff national championship.

HISTORY AT NO. 1

In the 2019 and 2020 preseason polls, Clemson became the sixth program since the inception of the preseason poll in 1950 ever to open consecutive preseason polls at No. 1, joining Alabama (2016-18), USC (2004-05), Oklahoma (1985-87, 1974-75, 1956-57), Ohio State (1969-70) and Notre Dame (1953-54).

Prior to topping out at No. 3 in 2021, Clemson appeared at No. 1 in at least one AP Poll in six consecutive years from 2015-20. The last time Clemson did not win at least one postseason game was in 2010, when Clemson lost in the Meineke Car Care Bowl after not qualifying for the ACC Championship Game.

Clemson's present streak is the longest on record back to 1980, according to research from Stats Perform.

CLEMSON VS. UNRANKED OPPONENTS

Prior to a loss at NC State in late September of 2021, Clemson had won 36 consecutive games against teams unranked in the AP Poll, the program's second-longest such winning streak since the inception of the poll in 1936. Prior to the loss to NC State, Clemson's last defeat at the hands of an unranked squad had come in 2017 at Syracuse.

Clemson's longest winning streak against unranked teams came across the 2012-16 seasons, when Clemson won 46 in a row starting with a season-opening win against Auburn in 2012 and ending with an upset loss to Pitt in 2016.

Clemson is 124-15 against AP-unranked teams under Dabo Swinney, including wins in 101 of 106 games against those unranked teams since the start of the 2012 season. Clemson had won 12 consecutive games against unranked teams until being defeated by Notre Dame on Nov. 5.

NO. 0 WR ANTONIO WILLIAMS

Despite a lot of returning experience at the outside receiver positions and at tight end, Clemson's primary weapon in the passing game in 2022 has been true freshman slot receiver Antonio Williams.

Despite not turning 18 until July and not enrolling in January like much of his recruiting class, Williams immediately turned teammates' heads upon his arrival in the summer of 2022. Clemson coaches and players alike complimented his natural route-running and football instincts, and Clemson's coaching staff has said that he is further along than Clemson legend and NFL Pro Bowler Hunter Renfrow was at the same point in his collegiate career.

Williams recorded career highs in receptions (10) and receiving yards (83) with a touchdown in a win against Louisville on Nov. 12 and also added 23 punt return yards to finish with a career-high 106 all-purpose yards. His 10 receptions tied the Clemson single-game freshman record shared by Sammy Watkins (2011 vs. Auburn) and Artavis Scott (2014 vs. Louisville and Boston College). His 10 receptions were the most by a Clemson player of any age since Amari Rodgers' 10 receptions against Pitt in 2020.

This season, Williams became only the fourth Clemson freshman since 2010 to record 50 receptions in a season, joining Artavis Scott (2014), Sammy Watkins (2011) and DeAndre Hopkins (2010).

NO. 0 LB BARRETT CARTER

Linebacker Trenton Simpson's impressive 2022 campaign has led to semifinalist selections for the Butkus Award and Lott IMPACT Trophy, but the performance of one of his linebacker counterparts, sophomore Barrett Carter, has thrust a new name into conversations about one of the college football's emerging young linebackers.

Head Coach Dabo Swinney has routinely sung the praises of Carter's versatility.

"He's one of the best football players in my 20 years at Clemson," Swinney said. "He's a pure *football player*. I mean, the guy can play anywhere. He could go play tailback, he could play corner, he can play safety, he can play Nickel/Sam, he can play Mike, he can play Will. He's special... He's so smart and he's got unbelievable instincts for the game."

Close observers of Clemson in 2022 quickly recognized Carter's impact in his first year as a starter, but Carter served notice of his arrival to the country with a signature performance against Louisville on Nov. 12. In that game, Carter recorded eight tackles (3.5 for loss), two sacks, an interception and a pass breakup, becoming the first player to record 3.5 or more tackles for loss, 2.0 or more sacks and an interception in a game between two Power Five teams since South Carolina's Melvin Ingram against Auburn in 2011.

Carter is one of only four players in the Power Five with at least 8.5 tackles for loss, 4.0 sacks, multiple interceptions and multiple forced fumbles this season.

SHIP HAPPENS

Despite Clemson's roster featuring a backfield group that players and coaches have described as a trio of NFL-caliber running backs, sophomore Will Shipley emerged as a difference maker early in his career and throughout the 2022 season.

Shipley ranks second in the ACC and tied for 11th in the nation in rushing touchdowns this season. His consistency has made him one of only five players nationally to have rushed for a touchdown in at least 11 different games this season.

SHIP'S MAIDEN VOYAGE IN 2021

Despite missing three games of his debut season due to multiple injuries, Shipley led Clemson in rushing touchdowns (11), total touchdowns (11), rushing

attempts (149) and rushing yards (738) as a true freshman in 2021.

Shipley's freshman performance in 2021 was another entry in Clemson's recent history of feature backs declaring their arrival immediately. Clemson was led in rushing yards in each of the previous seven years by either Wayne Gallman (2014-16) or Travis Etienne (2017-20), both of whom led Clemson in rushing in their freshman seasons (Gallman's redshirt freshman season in 2014 and Etienne's true freshman season in 2017). Before Shipley, the last time someone other than Etienne or Gallman led Clemson in rushing in a season was 2013 (Rod McDowell), when Shipley was in fifth grade.

Shipley's 2021 performance ranked second in rushing touchdowns by a Clemson true freshman since 1972.

STARTING DEBUT UPCOMING

Head Coach Dabo Swinney said in the immediate aftermath of Clemson's ACC Championship Game victory that freshman Cade Klubnik's performance in reserve against North Carolina earned him the right to start at quarterback in the Orange Bowl.

Klubnik will become the first Clemson freshman quarterback on record to make his starting debut in postseason play. He will become only the eighth true freshman to start at quarterback for Clemson since the NCAA instituted permanent freshman eligibility in 1972, joining Steve Fuller (1975), Willie Jordan (1975), Patrick Sapp (1992), Nealson Greene (1994), Deshaun Watson (2014), Trevor Lawrence (2018) and DJ Uiagalelei (2020).

-- NO. 22 WR COLE TURNER --

HOLY MOLY, COLE(Y)

Clemson freshman Cole Turner turned heads when he had three receptions for 101 yards in Clemson's ACC Championship Game victory over North Carolina. It was the first 100-yard receiving game for a Clemson player in 2022.

Turner, whom Clemson's coaches had opted to save for the stretch run of his redshirt season in 2022, had played just eight offensive snaps in one game all year before his performance against the Tar Heels. He recorded one catch for nine yards in those eight snaps against Miami (Fla.) two weeks earlier.

But, against the Tar Heels, the younger brother of former Clemson All-American Nolan Turner had a 68-yard reception to set up a score and had another catch for 29 yards. He reached the 100-yard mark with a four-yard catch in the fourth quarter.

With a 100-yard receiving performance in just his second career game, Turner tied a Clemson record for fewest games needed to record a 100-yard receiving game. Current Clemson graduate assistant Artavis Scott had 164 yards on six receptions against South Carolina State in his second game as a freshman in 2014, and Justyn Ross did it in his second game as a freshman in 2018 when he caught three passes for 103 yards.

Sammy Watkins reached the 100-yard barrier in his third game, a 10-catch, 155-yard performance against Auburn in 2011, and Derrick Hamilton did it in his fifth game, an eight-reception, 106-yard effort against NC State in 2001. Jim Lanzendoen, a junior college transfer, did it in his fifth game as a junior against Virginia in 1973.

Turner became the 66th different Clemson player ever to record a 100-yard receiving game.

-- NO. 80 WR BEAUX COLLINS --

IT'S BEAUX TIME

As a true freshman last season, wide receiver Beaux Collins debuted a touchdown celebration in which he pointed to an invisible watch on his wrist. The message? "It's Beaux Time."

The clever play on the "It's Bo Time" motto of fast food giant Bojangles was on display early this season, as Collins caught a touchdown pass in each of the Tigers' first four games, becoming the first Clemson player to record a receiving touchdown in each of the first four games of a season since freshman phenom Sammy Watkins in 2011.

After being held out of the end zone for the first time in Clemson's fifth game of the season, Collins scored his fifth touchdown of the season in Clemson's sixth game, a prime-time win at Boston College. In doing so, Collins became the first Clemson player to catch a touchdown in five of the first six games of a season since 2012 when

DeAndre Hopkins accomplished the feat as part of his ACC-record 18-touchdown campaign.

-- NO. 84 TE DAVIS ALLEN --

ALLEN ASCENDING

With a touchdown reception at Florida State on Oct. 15, tight end Davis Allen became the sixth tight end in Clemson history to reach double-digit career touchdown receptions. He has since moved into a tie for second in career touchdown receptions by Clemson tight ends.

Allen and his tight end running mate Jake Briningstool were key in Clemson's 51-45 double-overtime win against Wake Forest on Sept. 24. Allen caught two touchdown passes among his 36 yards on four receptions while Briningstool posted career highs with six catches for 72 yards and another score. A week later, Allen and Briningstool combined for eight catches for 75 yards and a touchdown in a win vs. No. 10 NC State.

The duo gives Clemson as significant a 1-2 punch as it has had at tight end under Dabo Swinney, as Allen and Briningstool's performances this year mark the first time in Clemson history that two tight ends have each caught at least four touchdown passes in a single season. Clemson entered bowl season as one of five teams in the FBS with multiple tight ends with four or more touchdown receptions this season (Ball State, Penn State, SMU and Utah).

AXE MAN JR. COMIN'

For 12 seasons, NFL offenses attempted in vain to limit opportunities for four-time Pro Bowler Jeremiah "Axe Man" Trotter to trot out his signature axe chopping celebration after big stops. With the next generation of the Trotter middle linebacker bloodline — Jeremiah Trotter Jr. — now patrolling the box at Clemson, the college football world shared in their pain in 2022.

Jeremiah Jr., about whom both Head Coach Dabo Swinney and Defensive Coordinator Wes Goodwin joked "has been a middle linebacker since he was in diapers," elevated his game in the second half of Clemson's 2022 season. After producing 18 tackles (3.0 for loss) in Clemson's first six games, the coaches credited Axe Man Jr. with 56 stops (6.0 for loss), including four games with nine or more tackles, in Clemson's final six regular season contests. He added to that total with a team-high-tying nine tackles with 3.0 sacks in the ACC Championship Game.

Though he was snubbed by conference media, Trotter collected second-team All-America honors from the Associated Press, third-team All-America status from Pro Football Focus and collected All-ACC honors from select individual outlets.

Trotter recorded 2.0 sacks against South Carolina (in addition to scoring on a 35-yard interception return), and a week later, he set an ACC Championship Game record with 3.0 sacks against North Carolina. He

became the first Clemson player with at least 2.0 sacks in consecutive games since former No. 4 overall pick Clelin Ferrell early in the 2018 season. He joined a bevy of Clemson legends (and early round NFL Draft picks), nearly all of whom were primarily pass rushers rather than middle linebackers, to record multiple games in a season since 2000 with 2.0 or more sacks.

AVENGERS BRIEFLY ASSEMBLE

Clemson's dominant 2018 defensive line that featured three first-round picks (Clelin Ferrell, Christian Wilkins and Dexter Lawrence) and a fourth-round pick (Austin Bryant) famously had its Power Rangers alter-ego. Clemson's highly lauded 2022 group was in search of its own identity and took on the identity of The Avengers.

Injuries plagued various members of Clemson's 2022 group at various points of their careers. Since Bryan Bresee and Myles Murphy joined the unit in the class of 2020, four of the most high-profile members of the group in the eyes of NFL talent evaluators (Bresee, Murphy, Tyler Davis and Xavier Thomas) played only eight of a possible 38 games together. Clemson went 8-0 in those contests.

Clemson produced a fully assembled group of Avengers for the first time in 2022 on Oct. 15 at Florida State. Super senior Xavier Thomas made his return on Oct. 8 at Boston College after a foot injury in fall camp cost him the first five games of the season. He recorded 2.0 sacks and a forced fumble in only six snaps against Boston College, earning ACC Defensive Lineman of the Week. One week after Thomas produced two sacks and a forced fumble, Myles Murphy matched the stat line with two sacks and a forced fumble at Florida State to retake the lead as Clemson's active career sack leader.

One week later, Tyler Davis posted 2.0 sacks vs. Syracuse, becoming the third different member of the group in as many weeks to record 2.0 sacks in a game. It marked the first time Clemson has had three different players record 2.0 or more sacks in a game in a three-week span since 2016, when Ben Boulware (vs. South Carolina), Dexter Lawrence (vs. Virginia Tech) and Carlos Watkins (vs. Ohio State) accomplished the feat.

WELCOME BACK, POTTER

Head Coach Dabo Swinney joked on Signing Day in February that Clemson's biggest signee of its 2022 recruiting class wasn't a freshman or a transfer, it was placekicker B.T. Potter, who opted to use his extra year of eligibility and return for his super senior fifth season. Potter, a two-time Groza Award semifinalist, is Clemson's school record holder in career points by a kicker, career field goals of both 40-plus and 50-plus yards, field goal yardage and career PATs. He also ranks second in Clemson history in career points and career field goals.

Potter is the only player in ACC history to score 100 points in four different seasons, has been one of the nation's foremost kickoff specialists and holds the Clemson record for consecutive PATs made (122 from 2018-20).

Potter's 71 career field goals have covered a school-record 2,645 yards. He surpassed the 2,000-yard mark on made field goals in Clemson's season opener at Georgia Tech. With a 35-yard field goal at Boston College on Oct. 8, Potter broke the Clemson career field goal yardage record of 2,370, set by Nelson Welch from 1991-94.

THE OTHER SWINNEY DYNASTY

Like Colquitts punting at Tennessee, Swinneys holding at Clemson are becoming a dynasty of their own.

Head Coach Dabo Swinney's oldest son, Will, arrived at Clemson in 2017 and immediately earned Clemson's starting holder position on placekicks. He played five seasons and a record-tying 69 games at Clemson through 2021. In those five seasons, Clemson scored 565 points on placekicks, including field goals and PATs, and he held for 558 of those 565 points.

The only seven Clemson kicking points not held by Will in his career were instead held by his brother, Drew, now Clemson's starter at the position in 2022. Drew is joined on the roster this season by the youngest of the three Swinney boys, Clay, who could claim the role in future seasons. Clay's arrival creates a plausible scenario in which every Clemson placekick in a full 10-year span from 2017-26 could be held by a Swinney.

Clemson's last hold by any player outside the Swinney family was on the final point of Clemson's 2016 national championship, as Seth Ryan, coincidentally also the son of a famous long-time coach (Rex Ryan), held the PAT following Hunter Renfrow's game-winning touchdown with one second remaining.

WHEN IN DOUBT, CLEMSON RESPONDS

In Head Coach Dabo Swinney's tenure, the Tigers have routinely responded well following losses and following dips in the AP rankings.

Losses to Top 5 opponents Ohio State and Georgia across the 2020 and 2021 seasons ended a streak of 127 games since losing back-to-back contests, which had been the longest active streak in the nation and the longest in ACC history.

Previously, Clemson's last time losing back-to-back games had come in 2011. That also represents the last time Clemson has lost consecutive games in a single season, the longest active streak in the nation.

Under Swinney, Clemson is also 32-6 in games in which it enters ranked lower in the AP Poll than it did in its previous contest. This includes the 2014, 2016, 2017, 2018 and 2021 season openers in which Clemson opened the season lower than its ranking from the final game of the previous campaign.

STRENGTH OF RECORD

Clemson has lost only 12 games since 2015 and only eight games since 2018. Six of Clemson's 12 losses since 2015 have come against AP Top 5 teams, and those six were all College Football Playoff participants that season.

The opponents to whom Clemson has lost since 2015 have a combined final record of 120-33, a winning percentage of .784. Since 2018, opponents responsible for Clemson's defeats have a combined final record of 81-18 (.818).

Clemson has not lost to a team that finished with a losing record since 2017 and has not lost to a team with a losing record at the time of the game since losing to 2-5 Boston College in 2010, Dabo Swinney's second full season as head coach.

The approach to creating functional depth and rewarding players ready to play has been a key

philosophy for Head Coach Dabo Swinney, whose own collegiate playing career was hatched as a walk-on fighting for playing time in Alabama's receiving corps.

"We're fully committed to playing guys who deserve to play," Swinney said. "You commit to a guy early in the season, and even if a guy has only played 10 percent of the snaps, when you get to game eight or nine, they've got some good experience."

Clemson played 90 players in its 48-20 win against Louisiana Tech, one shy of cracking the Top 10 under Swinney.

YOUTH IS SERVED

In the first year of new redshirt regulations in 2018, Clemson played a then-school-record 20 true freshmen. Clemson immediately shattered that record in its 2019 season opener, with 27 true freshmen making their collegiate debuts in that contest. An additional eight true freshmen made their debuts to push that 2019 total to a school-record 36.

In 2020, Clemson played 27 true freshmen, tied for the most in the country at the end of the regular season. Twenty-two first-year freshmen made their debut for Clemson in 2021 and another 25 have debuted for Clemson already in 2022.

Coinciding with redshirt rule changes, Clemson's five most recent seasons have resulted in the most game action for first-year freshmen since 1982.

In the 2021 season opener against Georgia, Clemson started two true freshmen in the first game of a season for the first time under Dabo Swinney. Safety Andrew Mukuba became the first Clemson true freshman to start at defensive back in records back to 1973, and guard Marcus Tate became only the third true freshman offensive lineman to start a season opener at Clemson since 1973, joining center James Farr (1980) and tackle Mitch Hyatt (2015).

In 2022, true freshman Blake Miller added himself to the list, as his physical and mental preparedness impressed Clemson's veterans, including fellow offensive lineman Walker Parks.

"Blake came in in January, and we had to check his birth certificate because we thought he was 25 years old," Parks said. "That might be the most developed freshman we've ever seen, out-lifting dudes and out-running dudes... He's a great player, he's smart, picks things up fast and he's physical."

By starting the season opener against Georgia Tech, Miller became only the third true freshman offensive tackle to start a season opener for Clemson since 1944 (Hyatt in 2015, Phil Prince in 1944).

THIRD-DOWN SUCCESS

Clemson reliably produced a Top 30 national ranking in third-down conversion percentage every year from 2015-20, including three Top 15 rankings and two Top 10 finishes in that category. Then in 2021 with its offensive line and corps of playmakers besieged by injuries, Clemson plummeted to No. 87 in third-down conversion percentage.

This season, Clemson is back to its old ways on the money down, again ranking in the Top 25 in the nation at 48.7 percent.

That includes a historic 16-for-23 third-down performance at Wake Forest on Sept. 24. Clemson's 16 third-down conversions were a school single-game record, surpassing its 15 against Western Carolina in 1983. It marked only the 12th time since 2000 that an FBS team converted at least 16 third downs in a single game.

Clemson had another notable third-down performance in a Nov. 19 win against Miami. Clemson converted 14-of-19 on third downs (73.7 percent) in the game, Clemson's highest third-down percentage since 2018, when Clemson converted 87.5 percent against Louisville.

Clemson has reached 500 yards in 50 of those contests, including efforts of 521 and 559 yards, respectively, against Louisiana Tech and Wake Forest this season.

OFFENSIVE BALANCE

Clemson's distribution of talent throughout its offense and its willingness to adapt to how defenses are game planning has resulted in the Tigers fielding one of the nation's more balanced offenses in recent years. In 2018, Clemson set a school record with 3,723 rushing yards. In 2020, Clemson set a school record with 348.5 passing yards per game.

Clemson has exceeded both 200 passing yards and 200 rushing yards in 58 games under Dabo Swinney, posting a perfect record in those contests. Clemson's 24 such games since the start of the 2018 season are among the most in the country.

Clemson has averaged at least 200 rushing yards and 200 passing yards per game four times in school history, with two of those seasons occurring in the 2018 and 2019 campaigns. Clemson broke the 3,000-yard mark both rushing and passing in both 2018 and 2019, two of three 3,000/3,000 seasons in school history (2015).

YARDS PER PLAY

Clemson shattered its school record for yards per play in 2018 at 7.35, the program's first time exceeding seven yards per play in a season. That record stood for barely 12 months until Clemson broke it again in 2019 by averaging 7.38 yards per play. Including Clemson averaging 6.69 yards per play in 2020, Clemson's top three yards-per-play averages in school history have all come since 2018.

In 2018-19, Clemson became only the third school since 2000 to average 7.35 or better yards per play in back-to-back seasons, joining Alabama, which did it across 2018-19, and Oklahoma, which was in the midst of a four-year streak across the 2016-19 seasons.

Collectively, Clemson averaged 7.2 yards per play across the 2018-20 seasons, joining Oklahoma (7.9) and Alabama (7.8) as the only programs to average at least seven yards per play across those three seasons.

650-POINT SEASONS

Clemson remains responsible for two of the 22 650-point seasons in major college football history and two of only 16 since Division I split in 1978. Clemson was the first school with back-to-back 650-point seasons since Yale in 1888-89, predating the start of official NCAA recordkeeping in 1937 and the second year of which was coincidentally the year Clemson was founded.

POINTS OFF TURNOVERS

Clemson's offense and defense have both been dominant in possessions following turnovers since the 2018 ACC Championship Game. Since that time, the

Tigers hold a 413-131 advantage against opponents in points off turnovers, including a 81-38 margin in that category in 2022.

This season, the Tigers won the points-off-turnover battle, 21-3, against Louisiana Tech and also added a touchdown after a turnover on downs, accounting for 28 points in Clemson's 28-point win. Clemson also won the points-off-turnovers margin by a 10-0 mark against No. 10 NC State in a 10-point win.

Of Clemson's 38 points allowed off turnovers this season, only 24 have been surrendered by the Clemson defense, as 14 came on a 90-yard scoop-and-score by Syracuse and a 96-yard interception return by Notre Dame.

FINISH

In 2018, Clemson debuted a new version of its "This is Why We Work" fourth quarter video at Death Valley, a hype video imploring the team to finish and featuring Director of Strength and Conditioning Joey Batson bellowing:

"Let me tell you something right now: they don't put championship rings on smooth hands! You gotta go earn it! You gotta go earn it six seconds at a time! You win championships when the stadium is empty, when the band ain't playing, when the cheerleaders ain't cheering, when it's just you and your brothers right beside you. That's when you win championships! In the fourth quarter, that is when we shine!"

The video and the speech became a part of Clemson lore, buoyed by its playing during Clemson's comeback win against Syracuse that year en route to a 15-0 national championship season. Over the years, the video has changed but the speech remains the same, with many Clemson fans yelling it in unison as it plays.

Clemson's fixation on finishing has led to the Tigers owning the fourth quarter, with Clemson holding a 127-3 record since 2011 when leading after three quarters.

And though Head Coach Dabo Swinney frequently reiterates the phrase, "There is nothing less important than the score at halftime," Clemson has the best winning percentage in the nation among Power Five teams since 2017 in games in which it leads at halftime.

Entering the final week of the 2022 regular season, Clemson (64-0) and Ohio State (52-1) were a combined 116-1 since 2017 when leading at halftime until both were unable to hold onto halftime leads against South Carolina and Michigan, respectively.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

- Through the summer of 2022, of 328 eligible players who completed their athletic eligibility at Clemson and/or graduated early in Dabo Swinney's 13+ full years as head coach, 322 (98 percent) have earned a degree during their time at Clemson.

- Clemson broke program multi-year APR records in three straight years from 2017-19 (987 in 2016-17, 992 in 2017-18 and 993 in 2018-19) before the NCAA suspended APR reporting during the COVID-19 pandemic. Upon reinstatement of APR reporting in

June 2022, Clemson shattered its multi-year APR record with a 999 covering the 2017-18 through 2020-21 academic years.

- Clemson's 999 APR in that span tied Ole Miss for the FBS lead and finished tied for second nationally across all of Division I, trailing only Columbia University of the Ivy League. Clemson lofty academic success in that period coincided with on-field excellence that included four ACC titles, four College Football Playoff berths, two national championship game berths and the 2018 national championship.

- Clemson, Air Force, Navy, Northwestern and Washington are the only FBS programs to produce a 985+ multi-year APR in each of the last four reported cycles.

- Clemson is the only program in the country to have finished in both the Top 10 percent of NCAA APR data AND the AP Top 25 in 10 of the last 11 academic cycles.

- Clemson is the only FBS program since the NCAA created the APR metric in 2003 to win a national championship and an APR Public Recognition Award in the same year multiple times. Alabama is the only other school to accomplish the title/APR double in a single year once (2011-12 academic year).

Clemson's national academic success has understandably resulted in the shattering of its own internal metrics:

- Clemson posted a program-record 3.11 cumulative GPA in Spring 2022, including a record 81 of 109 players earning a 3.0 or better, far exceeding the previous spring record of 63. Of the 81 with a 3.0 or better, 14 earned a perfect 4.0.

- According to current projections by Clemson's academic staff, 31 different players on Clemson's current roster are expected to have completed their degree program prior to bowl season. Entering the bowl season of its 2018 national championship campaign, Clemson's roster featured 26 graduates, the most of any bowl team that year.

ALL EYES ON CLEMSON

"Where the Blue Ridge yawns its greatness, where the Tigers play..."

Those are the opening words to Clemson's alma mater. In recent years, "where the Tigers play" has also been where eyes and television sets inevitably turn.

From 2018-21, Clemson games accounted four of the five most-watched college football games and five of the 12 most-watched games in that span.

The interest in watching Clemson play hasn't been limited to television broadcasts. Clemson continues to provide one of the marquee in-venue experiences in all of sports, as Clemson enters 2022 having been ranked in the Top 20 in the nation average home attendance at Memorial Stadium for 41 straight seasons.

DEATH VALLEY RENOVATIONS

Clemson's home opener against Furman on Sept. 10 also represented the debut of a substantial number of enhancements to Memorial Stadium and the gameday experience at Death Valley. Among the most recent updates:

- Clemson's videoboard got its first major upgrade since 2005, with nearly five times the surface area of the previous board, which was last updated before the 2012 season. The new video system, affectionately and unofficially nicknamed "DaboTron," measures 126 feet wide by 56.5 feet tall, eighth-largest in the NCAA. It also sits 20 feet off the ground, giving fans a 365-day open view into the stadium. The new board also features color LED fixtures on the inside and custom portal LED lights for the team entrance. Ribbon boards on the north, south, and west, along with new corner video boards in the west were also upgraded to be higher quality, easier to read, and more immersive.

- The eight main stadium light poles were updated to an LED system, which allows for individual light fixture control, spotlighting of Howard's Rock, and higher-quality field lighting.

- A Tiger has sat atop the video board since the 1970s, and a new Tiger will debut this season, measuring nearly 17 feet wide, with eyes that light up and a tail that wags. The Tiger will also be able to be raised and lowered out of the board as needed. Later this season, the previous Tiger is expected to be available as an interactive element at Tigertown Tailgate. Fans will be able to take a photo with the Tiger and have the tail wag and eyes light up.

- The west side of the stadium received a facelift with the addition of IPTAY's Masters Club, a 688-seat premium area on the concourse level. As part of this renovation, concessions and restrooms in the west were relocated and expanded to the terraces, allowing easier pedestrian flow and access.

- Clemson Athletics partnered with Kulture City to

make all its venues and all the programs and events that those venues host sensory inclusive. This new initiative promotes an accommodating and positive experience for all guests and fans with a sensory issue that visits athletic events at Clemson University. Clemson is the first school in the country to be Sensory Certified at every venue. Memorial Stadium, Historic Riggs Field, Littlejohn Coliseum, Jervey Gym, Doug Kingsmore Stadium, and McWhorter Stadium will all carry the Certification and will have available sensory bags, noise canceling headphones, fidget tools, verbal cue cards, and strobe reduction glasses to guests, at Guest Services Stands while attending Events in Clemson Athletic Venues.

- As part of the stadium facade updates, Clemson installed new signage honoring the all-time greats, championship years, and backlighting the traditional "Clemson Welcomes You To Death Valley" signage.

Clemson will begin Phase II of renovations following the 2022 season, including a new gameday locker room and a complete reimagining of Lot 5 and the Tiger Walk experience as a 365-day destination for Clemson fans.

NEW CONTRACT FOR SWINNEY

Clemson Director of Athletics Graham Neff announced on Sept. 8 that Clemson and Dabo Swinney had agreed to a new, enhanced contract. The terms of the agreement, approved by the Clemson University Board of Trustees Compensation Committee that day, extended Swinney's contract through the 2031 football season.

The contract reflects both Swinney's status as one of the nation's elite coaches and Clemson's continued commitment to its storied football program. Swinney, who has led Clemson to two of its three national titles in school history, is one of only two active head coaches with multiple FBS national championships.

Clemson's football success has mirrored Clemson University's continued ascent as one of the nation's premier public universities. As Clemson has made six College Football Playoff appearances in the last seven years, the University set records in applications, fundraising and numerous academic benchmarks while being named in August as one of the nation's three most-trusted public universities.

Quotes from key figures are included below:

Director of Athletics Graham Neff: "I am appreciative of the support from the Board of Trustees to President Clements to ensure we can continue to build on a firm foundation, as Clemson football and Coach Swinney's leadership are a key driver for our university. Coach Swinney and his family's impact on our community and department cannot be understated, and his success and stability nationally is truly uncommon. It is critical that Clemson continue to invest in our football program, and ensure our head coach is at Clemson for a long, long time. The best is yet to come."

Head Coach Dabo Swinney: "It is hard for me to believe I am in my 14th full season as your head coach, and I remain eternally grateful and honored for the opportunity to continue coaching and developing young people of excellence at Clemson. This agreement is representative of what has been collectively built here and the success we've had both academically and athletically. It is a reflection of the ALL IN commitment of so many people, including our players, our staff, our fans, our administration and our University leadership. While I am certainly proud of our accomplishments on the field, the most rewarding part remains the relationships forged within this program and the ability to positively impact those around us. I am appreciative of the leadership of President Jim Clements, our Board

of Trustees and Director of Athletics Graham Neff, and I am thankful for their continued faith in me as well as their steadfast commitment to the future of Clemson Football. Our core mission remains unchanged: Graduate our players, equip them with the tools they need for life, give them a great college experience, and win championships. I do not take for granted the Clemson Family's unwavering love and support and its faith in our program to carry out that mission every day. It is a blessing to be your head coach and to call Clemson our home."

Clemson University President Jim Clements: "Over the past 20 years, Coach Swinney has impacted our football program, our university and the entire Clemson area community, in profound ways. Las Vegas Raiders wide receiver Hunter Renfrow enjoyed a career year, catching a team-high 103 passes for 1,038 yards and nine touchdowns, including two scores in a playoff-clinching prime-time win in Week 18. Renfrow joined Pro Football Hall of Famers Tim Brown and Jerry Rice as the only wide receivers in Raiders history to record 90 or more catches in a season.

Los Angeles Chargers wide receiver Mike Williams posted career highs in receiving yards (1,146) and receptions (76) while adding nine touchdowns. And despite playing two fewer games than the year before, Cincinnati Bengals wide receiver Tee Higgins put up career numbers with 74 catches for 1,091 yards and added six touchdown catches for a second straight regular season before catching two touchdowns in Super Bowl LVI.

ATLANTA — No. 4 Clemson defeated Georgia Tech, 41-10, at Mercedes-Benz Stadium on Labor Day night. Clemson's special teams had a superlative performance, as Carson Donnelly and Wade Woodaz both blocked punts to give Clemson multiple punt blocks in a single game for the first time since 2007.

Clemson's defense made an impact on the game's first play from scrimmage, as pressure from defensive end K.J. Henry resulted in safety Andrew Mukuba's first career interception.

In the second quarter, after its first punt block, Clemson opened the scoring on a one-yard touchdown run by running back Will Shipley. Clemson then drove 67 yards in eight plays and extended the lead on a six-yard touchdown pass from quarterback DJ Uiagalelei to wide receiver Beaux Collins. Clemson would carry a 14-3 lead into halftime.

Georgia Tech drew to within four on a 13-yard touchdown pass early in the third quarter. The Tiger offense provided a quick answer to take a 17-10 lead, as B.T. Potter hit a 29-yard field goal with 5:41 to play in the third quarter, capping a 12-play, 63-yard drive.

The field goal started Clemson's run of 27 unanswered points down the stretch to earn the win. Potter converted field goal attempts of 29 and 32 yards, and the first-team offense added rushing touchdowns by Uiagalelei and Shipley before ceding to the second unit, when true freshman quarterback Cade Klubnik led Clemson 66 yards and found Will Taylor in the end zone for a three-yard touchdown pass, pushing the final margin to 41-10.

CLEMSON, S.C. — No. 5/4 Clemson scored touchdowns on five of its first six drives in a 35-12 win against Furman. Clemson debuted new renovations to Memorial Stadium, including its 7,100-plus-square-foot videoboard, on a cool, overcast afternoon.

The win was Clemson's 35th consecutive victory at home, only the 15th home winning streak of 35 games or more in FBS history.

Quarterback DJ Uiagalelei completed 21-for-27 passes for 231 yards for a career-high 166.7 passer rating. Clemson rushed for 147 yards on 28 carries, led by Will Shipley, who scored two touchdowns.

Clemson's defense held Furman to 12 points, forced two turnovers and recorded two fourth-down stops. The unit registered nine tackles for loss. Five different Clemson players registered at least seven tackles, including LaVonta Bentley, who had three tackles for loss.

Clemson scored touchdowns on each of its first three possessions with two touchdown runs by Shipley bookending a two-yard touchdown pass from Uiagalelei to Jake Briningstool, giving the Tigers a 21-3 lead early in the second quarter. The teams traded touchdowns in the final two minutes of the first half to enter halftime with a 28-9 Clemson advantage.

Clemson opened the second half with a stop on Barrett Carter's first career interception. On the ensuing drive, Beaux Collins toe-tapped a nine-yard pass from Uiagalelei in the right side of the end zone to give Clemson a 35-9 lead. Furman added a field goal with 48 seconds to play in the third quarter, and a scoreless fourth quarter resulted in the 35-12 final score.

CLEMSON, S.C. — Sophomore running back Will Shipley rushed 12 times for a career-high 139 yards and two touchdowns as Clemson used a 35-point second half in a 48-20 victory over Louisiana Tech. Clemson gained 521 total yards, including 280 on the ground, and forced four turnovers, leading to 21 Tiger points.

The Tigers' defense kept the Bulldogs out of the end zone for the first three quarters and held Louisiana Tech to only six total rushing yards. Quarterback DJ Uiagalelei was 17-of-29 for 221 yards and two scores through the air and picked up 62 yards on the ground on nine carries.

Clemson scored on eight of its 13 drives, not including running out the clock on its final possession. With the game set at 13-6 entering the second half, Clemson exploded for three touchdowns, including a twice scoring 32-yard touchdowns on one-play drives.

Shipley's performance made him the first Clemson player on record back to 1950 to score multiple rushing touchdowns in each of the first three games of a season. He averaged 11.6 yards per carry and became the first Clemson player to average at least 10 yards per carry on at least 10 attempts since Travis Etienne in the 2020 ACC Championship Game against Notre Dame.

R.J. Mickens, Jeremiah Trotter Jr. and Malcolm Greene all recorded interceptions in the contest, while Kevin Swint recorded his first career fumble recovery on a wild snap.

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. – No. 5 Clemson earned a dramatic double-overtime win at No. 21/16 Wake Forest, 51-45. Quarterback DJ Uiagalelei completed 26-of-41 passes for a season-high 371 passing yards and a career-high five touchdown passes in the win.

Clemson accumulated 559 total yards. The Tigers converted 16-of-23 third downs, breaking the school record of 15 third down conversions set against Western Carolina in 1983.

Clemson ran out to an early 14-0 lead on touchdown passes from Uiagalelei in the first quarter. Two Wake Forest touchdowns and two B.T. Potter field goals brought the halftime score to 20-14.

A prolific third quarter by Wake Forest with three touchdown passes gave the Demon Deacons a 35-28 lead entering the fourth quarter. Down 38-35, Potter nailed a 52-yarder with 4:01 remaining in regulation and the Clemson defense then held to force overtime.

The teams traded touchdowns and two-point conversions in the first overtime. Uiagalelei then hit Davis Allen for Allen's second touchdown of the game in the second overtime. A beleaguered Clemson secondary then sealed the win with a fourth-down pass breakup on Wake Forest's possession to give the Tigers their first road overtime win since 2009.

CLEMSON, S.C. – In the first Top 10 matchup in the 90-game history of the Clemson-NC State rivalry, No. 5 Clemson defeated No. 10 NC State at an electric, sold-out Memorial Stadium. Clemson recorded its 37th consecutive home win, tying the longest home winning streak in ACC history.

Clemson's defense recorded three sacks and two turnovers while holding NC State to only 34 rushing yards on 21 carries, the Wolfpack's worst yards-per-carry average (1.6) in ACC play since 2016. Offensively, quarterback DJ Uiagalelei passed for 209 yards and a score and ran for a career-high 73 yards and two touchdowns in the victory.

The teams traded long drives and 20-yard field goals on their opening possessions. NC State took a 10-6 lead in the second quarter, but Uiagalelei drove Clemson 75 yards in 1:20 in a two-minute situation to give Clemson a 13-10 halftime lead.

Coming out of halftime, Clemson forced an NC State three-and-out as Barrett Carter and Myles Murphy both registered sacks. On Clemson's ensuing possession, Uiagalelei rushed 39 yards inside the NC State 10-yard line. Uiagalelei then completed a seven-yard touchdown pass to Jake Briningstool, increasing Clemson's lead to 20-10 early in the third quarter.

Toriano Pride Jr. later recorded his first career interception, setting up B.T. Potter's third field goal of the night to increase Clemson's lead to 23-13. A sneaky playaction bootleg by Uiagalelei for his second rushing touchdown of the night extended the lead to 30-13 until a late NC State touchdown brought the final score to 30-20.

CHESTNUT HILL, Mass. – No. 5 Clemson scored touchdowns on either side of halftime to pull away from Boston College, 31-3, at Alumni Stadium. The Tigers held the Eagles to 34 rushing yards, piled up 11 tackles for loss and four sacks, broke up eight passes and registered 13 quarterback hurries in the victory.

The Tigers scored 28 unanswered points in the game's final 31 minutes to earn the victory. Clemson shut out the Eagles in the second half, allowing just 86 total yards after halftime. Clemson's three points allowed were its fewest surrendered in its series with Boston College since 1952 when the Tigers shut out the Eagles at Braves Field.

Defensive end Xavier Thomas earned the Leather Helmet Award as the game's most valuable player after a career-high-tying 2.0 sacks in the victory despite playing only six snaps in his return to action from a foot injury suffered in fall camp.

Quarterback DJ Uiagalelei threw for 220 yards and three scores and led the Tigers in rushing for a second consecutive game with 69 yards on 12 carries.

Running back Will Shipley gave Clemson a 10-3 advantage with 45 seconds to play in the first half. Coming out of half, the Tigers came up with a quick stop and then Uiagalelei led the Tigers 73 yards on five plays, hitting Joseph Ngata in stride for a 38-yard score. Clemson added to its lead on the first play of the fourth quarter, as Uiagalelei found Beau Collins alone in the end zone for a 10-yard score to push the lead to 24-3.

Uiagalelei hit Brannon Spector for a 13-yard touchdown in the fourth quarter, his third touchdown pass of the day to his third different receiver. Uiagalelei had a key rush during the series, picking up 40 yards on third-and-3 to help set up the score.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. – No. 4/5 Clemson scored 17 points in a two-minute span on either side of halftime to take command of a 34-28 win at Florida State. Running back Will Shipley tallied a career-best 238 all-purpose yards (121 rushing, 48 receiving, 69 kickoff return).

Defensively, Clemson allowed touchdowns on two of the first three drives before settling in and holding the Seminoles scoreless for its next six drives, which included three fourth-down stops. Myles Murphy had six tackles, including 3.5 for loss, and two sacks.

DJ Uiagalelei accounted for four total touchdowns (three passing, one rushing), was 15-of-23 through the air for 203 yards, and added a five-yard rushing touchdown.

After Florida State struck first, Uiagalelei avoided a sack, stepped up in the pocket, and threw a 59-yard touchdown to Antonio Williams on Clemson's second drive.

The Seminoles took a 14-7 lead on a 15-play, 93-yard touchdown drive, but Clemson responded with 27 consecutive points to take a 34-14 lead, as tight ends Jake Briningstool and Davis Allen added scores in addition to Uiagalelei's touchdown on the ground. B.T. Potter also added field goals 47 yards and 34 yards, and with his second extra point of the game, he passed Chandler Catanzaro (404 from 2010-13) to become the highest-scoring kicker in Clemson history.

The Seminoles scored two touchdowns in the fourth quarter to bring the score to 34-28. Brannon Spector then recovered a Florida State onside kick attempt, enabling Clemson to run out the clock for the win.

CLEMSON, S.C. — No. 5 Clemson overcame four turnovers and an early 14-point deficit to earn a 27-21 win against No. 14 Syracuse at Memorial Stadium. The victory was Clemson's 38th in a row at home, breaking the ACC record set by Florida State from 1992-2001.

Running back Will Shipley had another career day, recording 242 all-purpose yards including a career-high 172 rushing yards on a career-high 27 carries with two touchdowns to spark Clemson's 293 rushing yards. Clemson's defense recorded a season-high five sacks and shut out the Orange in the second half as Clemson scored 20 unanswered points for the win.

Clemson took a 7-0 lead on a one-yard touchdown run by Shipley on its opening possession. Syracuse responded with a 75-yard touchdown drive to tie the game at seven.

Clemson's next two possessions resulted in turnovers. Ja'Had Carter intercepted DJ Uiagalelei to terminate one possession, and on Clemson's next drive, the Tigers drove to the Syracuse three-yard line, but Carter returned an Uiagalelei fumble 90 yards for a 14-7 Syracuse lead. A Garrett Shrader touchdown run later in the quarter pushed the Orange to a 21-7 lead. BT Potter cut the Clemson deficit to 21-10 with a 44-yard field goal before halftime.

A scoreless third quarter was not without drama. After Uiagalelei's second interception of the day, Clemson inserted Cade Klubnik at quarterback. Klubnik and the Clemson ground game led Clemson to touchdown drives of 80 yards and 61 yards to give Clemson a 24-21 lead. An additional Potter field goal and a game-winning interception by R.J. Mickens sealed the 26-21 victory.

The win was Clemson's first in a game in which it trailed by 11 or more points in the fourth quarter since the 2012 Chick-fil-A Bowl against LSU.

The loss snapped Clemson's nation-leading 14-game winning streak. Earlier in the evening, by virtue of Pitt's win over Syracuse, Clemson clinched a place in the ACC Championship Game, which takes place in Charlotte on Dec. 3.

With 9:08 left in the first quarter, Notre Dame's Prince Kollie returned a blocked punt 17 yards for a Notre Dame touchdown. The Irish would score another touchdown with 38 seconds left in the first half, making the score 14-0 at the half.

Cade Klubnik entered the game at quarterback with 1:30 left in the third quarter, but an interception on his first pass attempt gave Notre Dame the ball on the Clemson 14-yard line. The Irish scored three plays later to take a 21-0 lead.

DJ Uiagalelei returned at quarterback on Clemson's following possession and led the Tigers 56 yards before Benjamin Morrison intercepted his pass and returned it 96 yards for a touchdown, increasing Notre Dame's lead to 28-0 with 12:58 left to play. Running back Will Shipley got the Tigers on the scoreboard with 10:14 left in the fourth quarter, punching the ball into the end zone with a one-yard rushing touchdown.

Notre Dame added one more touchdown with 4:16 left in the fourth quarter, and Clemson scored the game's final points when Uiagalelei threw a four-yard touchdown pass to Joseph Ngata.

The contest marked Clemson's first time since 2007 surrendering touchdowns on offense, defense and special teams in a single game.

CLEMSON, S.C. – No. 12 Clemson clinched the final ACC Atlantic Division crown outright with a 31-16 victory against Louisville on Nov. 12. The win extended Clemson's home winning streak six full calendar years since its last home loss.

Wide receiver Antonio Williams registered a career-high 106 all-purpose yards including 83 yards on a Clemson-freshman-record-tying 10 receptions and added a six-yard pass completion as well. Running backs Phil Mafah (106 yards) and Will Shipley (97) led the Tigers to 248 rushing yards on the day.

Clemson's defense registered four sacks and nine tackles for loss. Linebacker Barrett Carter posted eight tackles, 3.5 tackles for loss, two sacks and an interception. He became the first player in the country to register at least 3.5 tackles for loss, 2.0 sacks and an interception in a game between Power Five teams since 2011.

DJ Uiagalelei opened the scoring with an 11-yard rushing touchdown on Clemson's opening drive, and a B.T. Potter field goal extended the lead to 10. A touchdown run by Tiyon Evans got the Cardinals on the board early in the second quarter, but a touchdown pass from Uiagalelei to Williams put Clemson up 17-7 at the half.

Shipley extended Clemson's lead on a highlight reel 25-yard touchdown run in the third quarter, hurdling a defender at the 10-yard line and splitting two more for the score. After a Louisville field goal, Mafah helped seal the victory in the fourth quarter with a 39-yard touchdown for Clemson late in the fourth quarter. Louisville threw a touchdown pass on the game's final play to bring the final score to 31-16.

CLEMSON, S.C. – No. 9 Clemson secured its 12th consecutive 10-win season with a 40-10 Senior Day victory against Miami at Memorial Stadium. The win was Clemson's 40th consecutive victory at home and gave Clemson its first lead in its all-time series with Miami.

Clemson held the Hurricanes to just 98 yards of total offense, Miami's third-lowest offensive output in school history. Clemson's balanced offensive attack produced 201 rushing yards and 246 passing yards, as the Tigers tallied 27 first downs to just six for Miami.

DJ Uiagalelei threw and rushed for a touchdown on Clemson's first two possessions, including a seven-yard passing touchdown to Davis Allen and an eight-yard scamper, to give Clemson a 14-0 lead after one quarter. A three-yard touchdown pass to super senior Luke Price and a 32-yard B.T. Potter field goal gave Clemson a 24-0 advantage at halftime.

A low-scoring third quarter featured a 44-yard field goal from Miami's Andres Borregales and a sack for a safety by Clemson's Toriano Pride Jr. Early in the fourth quarter, Miami's briefly cut the lead to two scores with a one-yard touchdown pass that made the score 26-10.

Clemson, however, put together two scoring drives for the game's final 14 points, including a three-yard touchdown run by Will Shipley and a one-yard touchdown run by Kobe Pace.

Linebacker Trenton Simpson recorded 2.0 of Clemson's season-high-tying five sacks on the game. Miami only ran 42 offensive plays, the fewest by a Clemson opponent since 1992 (North Carolina, 42). It marked only the eighth time since 1954 that a Clemson opponent ran 42 or fewer plays in a game.

Clemson ran for 237 yards but committed three critical turnovers. With 132 rushing yards on 15 carries on Saturday, running back Will Shipley reached 1,000 rushing yards on the season to record the 23rd 1,000-yard rushing season in school history.

Clemson scored first on a 35-yard pick-six by Jeremiah Trotter Jr. Trotter finished the game with eight tackles, 3.0 tackles for loss, 2.0 sacks and an interception return for a touchdown. A DJ Uiagalelei nine-yard rushing touchdown putting Clemson up 14-0 with 5:52 left in the first quarter.

A four-yard second-quarter touchdown pass on fourth-and-goal got South Carolina on the board, and a Clemson safety on an intentional grounding made the score 16-7. Clemson fumbled the ensuing free kick, and a South Carolina touchdown pulled it to 16-14. An Antonio Williams touchdown and a goal-line interception by R.J. Mickens made it a 26-14 Clemson lead at the half.

Touchdowns by South Carolina's Jaheim Bell and Antwane Wells Jr. bookended an 11-yard Shipley touchdown in the third quarter, and South Carolina took its first lead in the fourth quarter on a 35-yard field goal.

Clemson's defense forced late stops. However, a fumble on Clemson's final punt return gave South Carolina the ball back with 2:05 left to play, and a first down on 3rd-and-4 and sealed the 31-30 victory for the Gamecocks.

CHARLOTTE, N.C. – No. 10 Clemson earned a decisive 39-10 victory over No. 22 North Carolina to claim the 2022 ACC Championship at Bank of America Stadium. With the win, Clemson claimed its seventh conference championship in the past eight years.

Freshman quarterback Cade Klubnik entered the game on Clemson's third drive, leading the Tigers to scores on five of his first six drives. Klubnik finished the game 20-for-24 passing with 274 passing yards and added 30 rushing yards and 19 receiving yards to be named the game's Most Valuable Player. Nate Wiggins blocked a field goal attempt and returned an interception 98 yards for a touchdown.

Clemson's defense came away with a touchdown, three takeaways, four sacks, eight quarterback hurries and seven tackles for a loss. Special teams contributed a blocked field goal and B.T. Potter was perfect on a 52-yard field goal and 4-for-4 on extra points, becoming the first player in ACC history to record 100 or more points in four different seasons.

The Tar Heels struck first with a three-yard rushing touchdown, but their momentum would be short-lived. Klubnik led a nine-play touchdown drive on his first possession to tie the game. Rushing touchdowns by Phil Mafah and Klubnik on later possessions and an exchange of field goals made the score 24-10 at the half.

Clemson outscored North Carolina 15-0 in the third, including the touchdown by Wiggins, two-point conversion by Drew Swinney and rushing touchdown by Will Shipley to bring the final score to 39-10.
