CLEMSON AGAIN TAKES LABOR DAY STAGE FOR SEASON OPENER

Clemson will open a season on Labor Day evening for the second straight year when the ninth-ranked Tigers face the Duke Blue Devils on Monday, Sept. 4. Kickoff at Wallace Wade Stadium in Durham, N.C., is scheduled for 8 p.m. ET.

Clemson enters the game as the reigning ACC champions after winning its league-leading 21st all-time ACC title last season. The Tigers are 15-4-1 all-time in conference openers of seasons following ACC titles, a mark that includes wins in conference openers following each of Clemson's six ACC titles from 2015-20.

A year ago, Clemson opened its 2022 ACC title-winning campaign on Labor Day night, defeating Georgia Tech, 41-10, at Mercedes-Benz Stadium in Atlanta. Clemson's final offensive play of the contest was a three-yard touchdown pass by Cade Klubnik, his first career touchdown pass in his first career game. On Monday, Klubnik is expected to make his first career regular season start, as last December he became the first Clemson quarterback since the modernization of Clemson's quarterback position in 1953 to make his first career start in a postseason game.

Clemson Head Coach Dabo Swinney enters the game with a 99-19 record in ACC regular season play. With a win on Monday, he would become only the second coach ever to lead a program to 100 career regular season conference victories as head of an ACC program, joining Bobby Bowden, whose more than 300 career wins at Florida State included 117 conference wins following the Seminoles' addition to the conference in 1992.

Swinney and his staff placed a renewed emphasis and focus on accountability during the 2023 offseason.

Swinney saw the results of that focus as fall approached.

"All of the metrics in our program and our indicators for success are at an all-time high for us," Swinney said in July. "Our guys have really done what they've needed to do — strength, speed, conditioning, weights, accountability, leadership initiatives. Those are great indicators of the type of team that you have and I'm really proud of what this group has done."

Clemson enters the season as the nation's No. 9 team according to both the AP Poll and USA Today Coaches Poll. The last team to win a national championship after opening the season at No. 9 in the AP Poll was the 1992 Alabama Crimson Tide, a team which included a senior wideout by the name of Dabo Swinney.

WHAT TO WATCH FOR THIS SEASON

- Clemson (789-468-45) needing 11 more wins to become the first ACC program — and 14th FBS program ever — to record 800 all-time victories.

- Clemson attempting to become the first program to win 22 ACC titles. Since helping form the conference in 1953, Clemson leads the ACC with 21 titles all-time, including 20 outright.

- Clemson (six) attempting to become only the second team to earn seven College Football Playoff berths since the institution of the postseason format in 2014 (Alabama, 7).

- Clemson attempting to extend its school record by winning 10 games for a 13th consecutive season. Clemson is presently one of three FBS programs ever to post 12 consecutive 10-win seasons alongside Alabama (15 from 2008-22) and Florida State (14 from 1987-2000). Clemson is already the only school to win 10 games in double-digit consecutive seasons as a member of the ACC, as only the final nine of Florida State's 14-straight 10-win seasons came during the Seminoles' tenure in the ACC.

- Clemson attempting to win a postseason game (conference championship, bowl game and/or national championship game) for a 13th consecutive season. Clemson's current 12-year streak is the longest streak on record in major college football history.

- Clemson's senior class (31-8 since 2020) needing nine wins to become the 11th Clemson senior class to average at least 10 wins a year over a four-year span, joining the 1990, 2014, 2015, 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019, 2020, 2021 and 2022 senior groups.

- Clemson's senior class (31-8 since 2020) needing 14 wins to become the ninth Clemson senior class (and ninth straight Clemson senior class) to win at least 45 games over a four-year span, joining the 2015 (46), 2016 (49), 2017 (50), 2018 (55), 2019 (55), 2020 (51), 2021 (49) and 2022 (45) seniors.

- Clemson's senior class (22-3 from 2020-22) needing an 8-0 regular season conference record to become only the sixth Clemson class to reach 30 ACC regular season wins in a four-year span, joining the 2018 (30), 2019 (30), 2020 (31), 2021 (30) and 2022 (30) classes.

- Clemson's senior class (18-1 at home since 2020) needing a 7-0 home record to become the 10th senior class in school history to win 25 games at home in a four-year span, joining every senior class from 2014-22.

- Clemson attempting to win at least six home games to add to its active 12-year streak of winning at least six games at Memorial Stadium. The next longest streak of six-plus home wins in the country entering 2023 is three years (Coastal Carolina).

- Clemson facing 10 Power Five Conference opponents in regular season play. During Clemson's active 12-year streak of 10-win seasons, Clemson has played 142 games against Power Five foes — the most in the country — and leads the nation with 119 wins against Power Five teams in that span. The 2023 season will be Clemson's 22nd consecutive season facing at least 10 Power Five opponents.

- Clemson attempting to win at least six regular season conference games for a 13th straight year to pull within one of the longest streak of six-plus-win conference seasons in ACC history (Florida State, 14 from 1992-2005). Clemson's longest streak in school history prior to the current 12-year streak was three (1981-83).

- Clemson entering the season having won its most recent meeting with nine of the 12 teams on its schedule. Clemson has active winning streaks against Wake Forest (14), Georgia Tech (eight), Florida State

(seven), Duke (five), North Carolina (five), Syracuse (five), Miami (four), Florida Atlantic (one) and NC State (one). Clemson will face Charleston Southern for the first time in 2023 and will have opportunities to respond to 2022 defeats by Notre Dame and South Carolina.

- Clemson (494) needing six more appearances in the AP Top 25 to become the 18th program ever to be ranked in 500 AP Polls all-time.

- Head Coach Dabo Swinney (161-39) entering the season four wins shy of tying (and five wins shy of breaking) Frank Howard's school record of 165 career head coaching victories.

- Swinney attempting to join a group of six active Power Five coaches who entered 2023 as their program's all-time wins leader: Iowa's Kirk Ferentz (186), Oklahoma State's Mike Gundy (156), Utah's Kyle Whittingham (154), North Carolina's Mack Brown (98), Rutgers' Greg Schiano (80) and Kentucky's Mark Stoops (66).

- Swinney (161) needing 12 wins to tie or 13 wins to break Bobby Bowden's conference record (173) for head coaching wins leading an ACC program. Bowden recorded 173 of his 377 career wins during Florida State's membership in the ACC.

- Swinney (99-19 in ACC regular season play) needing one conference victory to join Bobby Bowden (117) as the only coaches in history to win at least 100 games in ACC regular season competition.

- Swinney attempting to win his ninth ACC championship. His eight current ACC titles (all outright) are second only to Florida State's Bobby Bowden (12, including 10 outright).

- Swinney attempting to win his ninth conference championship to pass Frank Howard for sole possession of the most in Clemson history. Howard won two Southern Conference titles (1940,48) and six ACC titles (1956,58,59,65,66,67) in his 30-year run with the Tigers.

- Swinney (ACC-record 19) attempting to become the first coach in ACC history to lead a team in 20 bowl games.

- Swinney (11) sitting one bowl victory (including CFP National Championship Games) shy of breaking Bobby Bowden's ACC record (11) for the most career bowl wins leading an ACC program.

- Swinney coaching his 16th season to move into sole possession of the sixth-most seasons coached in ACC history, behind George Welsh (19), Bobby Bowden (18), Bill Dooley (17), Earle Edwards (17) and Frank Howard (17).

- Clemson playing two separate three-game homestands. They will be Clemson's 34th and 35th homestands of three or more games in school history (1911, 1920, 1922, 1949, 1959, 1962, 1969, 1974, 1979, 1982, 1983, 1987, 1988, 1989, 1990, 1991 (2), 1993, 1998, 2000, 2001, 2002, 2003, 2004, 2006, 2007, 2008, 2011, 2012, 2014, 2015, 2020 and 2022).

- Clemson playing multiple three-game homestands in a season for the second time in history, joining the Tigers' 1991 ACC championship campaign in which Clemson went 3-0 in its season-opening homestand and 2-0-1 in a midseason homestand. (Note: Clemson also had a six-game homestand midseason in 1987.)

- After not playing on a five-day turnaround at any point from 2017-21, Clemson playing its second game of the season on a five-day turnaround for the second consecutive season. Clemson earned wins against Georgia Tech and Furman five days apart in 2022.

- Clemson not playing multiple SEC opponents in the regular season for only fourth time in the last 14 years. Clemson has played multiple SEC foes in regular season

play every year since 2010 with exception of 2015, 2020, 2022 and 2023, all years in which Clemson's schedule included Notre Dame as part of the Irish's ACC scheduling agreement. Including postseason play, Clemson has faced multiple SEC opponents 16 times in the last 17 years, dating to 2006, with the lone exception coming in 2020 when the SEC opted out of non-conference play in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic.

- Clemson facing four head coaches for the first time: Duke's Mike Elko, Charleston Southern's Gabe Giardina, Florida Atlantic's Tom Herman and Georgia Tech's Brent Key. Since 2011, Clemson is 42-6 against head coaches who are facing Clemson for the first time.

- Clemson entering the season having scored multiple defensive touchdowns in 13 straight seasons. The last time Clemson had fewer than two defensive touchdowns in a season was 2009, Dabo Swinney's first full season as head coach, when the Tigers supplemented a single defensive touchdown with six special teams touchdowns.

- Defensive tackle Tyler Davis attempting to become the fourth Clemson defensive lineman to earn All-America honors in multiple seasons since 2013, joining Vic Beasley (2013-14), Christian Wilkins (2016-18) and Clelin Ferrell (2017-18).

- Davis (three) attempting to join C.J. Spiller (five), Travis Etienne (five), Nelson Welch (four) and Mitch Hyatt (four) among the only players in school history to earn at least four career All-ACC selections. He is presently tied with Christian Wilkins, Dexter Lawrence and William Perry (three each) for the most by a defensive tackle in Clemson history.

- Davis (39 career starts) needing six starts to tie or seven starts to break Christian Wilkins' Clemson record for career starts by a defensive lineman (45 from 2015-18).

- Davis (39) needing 11 starts to join Mitch Hyatt (57 from 2015-18) as the only non-specialists to start 50 career games for Clemson. Including kickers and punters, he would be the fifth player to accomplish the feat, a list featuring Hyatt, kickers Chander Catanzaro and B.T. Potter and punter Will Spiers.

- Davis (15.5) needing six sacks to enter the Top 10 in Clemson history in career sacks (Chester McGlockton, 10th, 20.5).

- Defensive end Justin Mascoll (53) needing six games to break K.J. Henry's Clemson record for career games played by a Clemson defensive end (58 from 2018-22). Mascoll needs seven games to pass Christian Wilkins (59 from 2015-18) for the most by a Clemson defensive lineman.

- Safety Jalyn Phillips (51) sitting 14 games shy of the Clemson record for career games played by a safety (65, Nolan Turner from 2017-21).

- Offensive lineman Will Putnam (2,611) playing 389 more snaps to become the sixth player in school history to play 3,000 career snaps from scrimmage. He is 889 snaps shy of joining school-record-holder Mitch Hyatt (3,754) as the only players in school history to reach 3,500 career snaps from scrimmage.

- Running back Will Shipley (1,920) needing to rush for 580 yards to become the 12th player in school history to reach 2,500 career rushing yards. He needs 1,080 rushing yards to become the eighth Clemson player to reach 3,000 career rushing yards.

- Shipley (eight) needing two 100-yard rushing games to become the 11th player in school history to reach the 100-yard mark rushing in at least 10 career games.

- Shipley (26) needing four rushing touchdowns to become the eighth player in school history to record 30 career rushing touchdowns. He needs nine touchdowns to become the fourth Clemson player ever to rush for 35 or more rushing touchdowns.

- Shipley (11 in 2021, 15 in 2022) attempting to join Clemson's Travis Etienne and Louisville's Lamar Jackson as the only ACC players since 2000 to rush for at least 11 touchdowns in three consecutive seasons. Etienne did so in four straight years from 2017-20 while Jackson did it in three straight years from 2015-17.

- Shipley (2,982) needing 920 all-purpose yards to enter the Top 10 in Clemson history in career all-purpose yards. He needs 1,018 all-purpose yards to become the 10th Clemson player ever to record 4,000 career all-purpose yards.

- Shipley (704) needing 296 kickoff return yards to become the ninth player in Clemson history to record 1,000 career kickoff return yards.

- Defensive end Xavier Thomas (five) needing two forced fumbles to enter the Top 10 in Clemson history in career fumbles caused. Levon Kirkland (1988-91), Keith Adams (1998-2000) and Vic Beasley (2011-14) are presently tied for seventh with seven each. Jeff Davis (1978-81) and Ed McDaniel (1988-91) are tied

for the school record with 10 each.

- Thomas (14.5) needing six sacks to enter the Top 10 in Clemson history in career sacks (Chester McGlockton, 10th, 20.5).

WHAT TO WATCH FOR THIS WEEK

- Clemson playing its 27th Monday game all-time but only its 11th regular season Monday game in school history.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 16-11 all-time in Monday games, which would include an 8-3 record in Monday regular season games.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 96-24-8 all-time in season openers and give the Tigers victories in 13 of their last 15 season debuts.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 38-16-1 all-time against Duke and move to 16-12 in road games in Durham.

- Clemson attempting to win a sixth consecutive game against Duke. It would be the second-longest winning streak in series history by either team, joining Clemson's eight-game winning streak from 1981-88.

- Clemson and Duke playing a third consecutive night game in the series (2012, 2018 and 2023) after not playing any night games against one another in the series' first 52 contests.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 16-4-1 in conference openers the year after winning an ACC title. Clemson won its ACC debut in every year succeeding each of its six consecutive titles from 2015-20.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 28-6 in night games since the start of the 2018 season. A win would move Clemson to 47-9 at night since 2015.

- Clemson opening the season in prime time for the fifth consecutive season, the second-longest streak in school history behind Clemson's nine consecutive season debuts under the lights from 1948-56, all of which came against Presbyterian. Clemson will attempt to improve to 20-5 in season-opening night games all-time and give Dabo Swinney an 8-1 mark in those contests.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 32-7 in games following a loss under Swinney, including season openers following a loss in the previous season finale. Clemson has not lost back-to-back games in the same season since November 2011.

- Clemson entering the game having not lost to Duke since 2004, Dabo Swinney's second season as Clemson's wide receivers coach. The winning head coach that evening was Ted Roof, who went on to serve as a defensive consultant for Clemson in 2021.

- Clemson opening a season on the road for the fourth time since 2016, including No. 2 Clemson's 19-13 win at Auburn in 2016, No. 1 Clemson's 37-13 win at Wake Forest in 2020 and No. 4 Clemson's 41-10 win against Georgia Tech in 2022.

- Clemson opening conference play on the road for the 10th time in the last 12 years. Clemson has won each of its last eight conference openers since 2015, the longest conference-opener winning streak in school history.

- Clemson facing Duke in the Tigers' first ACC contest of a season for the first time since 1972.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 45-25-1 in conference openers since joining the ACC.

- Clemson opening a season against an ACC opponent for only the 16th time since the conference's founding in 1953. Clemson is 12-2-1 against ACC opponents in Week 1 contests all-time, but this will be the first time Clemson has opened a season against Duke.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 68-5 against ACC opponents (including postseason play) since the start of

the 2015 season. Clemson's .931 winning percentage against conference opponents in that span leads the nation.

- Clemson facing Duke Head Coach Mike Elko for the first time in his head coaching career. A win would improve Clemson to 43-6 when facing an opposing head coach for the first time since 2011 and 160-72-3 since 1950.

- Clemson attempting to remain undefeated against teams with Elko on staff, including a 3-0 mark against Elko during his time as defensive coordinator at Wake Forest from 2014-16 and a 2-0 mark during his tenure

as Texas A&M's defensive coordinator from 2018-21.

- Clemson attempting to win a 13th consecutive game against conference opponents, dating to 2021. It would add to Clemson's fourth-longest streak of wins against ACC opponents, trailing a 28-game streak from 2017-20, a 20-game streak from 1981-84 and a 15-game streak from 2015-16.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 87-8 in regular season play since the start of the 2015 season. Seven of Clemson's eight regular season losses in that span have been decided by a final margin of 10 or fewer points.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 125-15 against AP-unranked teams under Dabo Swinney and improve to 102-5 in those games since the start of the 2012 season.

- Clemson (34) attempting to add to the most road wins by any program in the nation since 2015.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 35-5 in true road games since 2015.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 30-2 in September games since 2015. Clemson's .935 winning percentage in September in that span ranks third in the country.

- Head Coach Dabo Swinney attempting to win his 162nd career game to pull within three victories of College Football Hall of Famer Frank Howard's career record at Clemson (165).

- Swinney (99-19) attempting to join Bobby Bowden (117) as the only coaches in history to win at least 100 games in ACC regular season competition.

- Swinney attempting to move to 4-0 all-time against Duke and keep the Blue Devils among the five ACC teams against whom Swinney is undefeated, a group that also includes Wake Forest (14-0), Louisville (8-0), Virginia Tech (6-0) and Virginia (5-0).

- Swinney attempting to improve to 36-3 all-time against teams from the state of North Carolina.

- Swinney attempting to improve to 19-4 in games played inside North Carolina state limits.

- Clemson playing its 155th consecutive game since losing back-to-back games in a single season. Clemson's 154-game streak dating to 2011 is the nation's longest active streak.

- Clemson entering the game having scored at least one rushing touchdown in a national-best 68 of its 69 games since the start of the 2018 season.

- Clemson attempting to rush for a touchdown in a 27th consecutive game.

- Clemson attempting to record at least four sacks in six consecutive games for the first time since the final three games of 1990 and the first three games of 1991.

- Clemson (493) attempting to record seven sacks to become the first program to record 500 sacks since 2012.

- Quarterback Cade Klubnik making his first career regular season start, as his lone career start to date came in the 2022 Orange Bowl. A win would make Clemson quarterbacks 10-2 in their regular season starting debuts since 2002, including wins by Charlie Whitehurst, Will Proctor, Cullen Harper, Kyle Parker, Tajh Boyd, Deshaun Watson, Kelly Bryant, Trevor Lawrence and DJ Uiagalelei. The wins by Whitehurst (2002) and Proctor (2005) were recorded against Duke.

- Running back Will Shipley (1,920) needing 80 rushing yards to reach 2,000 for his career. He would be the 21st Clemson player to reach that mark.

- Shipley (26) sitting one rushing touchdown shy of entering the Top 10 in school history in career rushing touchdowns. Cliff Austin and Woodrow Dantzler are currently tied for 10th with 27 each. He is also within reach of No. 9 Terry Allen (28 from 1978-82) and No. 8 Fred Cone (29 from 1948-50).

SEASON OPENERS

Clemson has won 30 of its last 38 season openers. Head Coach Dabo Swinney is 12-2 in openers in his career with his only losses coming to Georgia in 2014 and 2021. Swinney's 12 season-opening wins are second-most in school history, two ahead of Danny Ford (9) and 13 shy of Frank Howard's record of 25.

Clemson was no stranger to exciting season openers in the first few years after the turn of the century. In 2004, against Wake Forest, Clemson won a 37-30 overtime thriller on ABC. Clemson won at home in 2005, a 25-24 win over No. 17 Texas A&M on a 42-yard field goal by Jad Dean with two seconds left. Clemson also beat No. 19 Florida State in the 2007 season opener.

The Tigers are 95-24-8 (.780) in their first game in their previous 127 seasons. Clemson is 12-12-2 in season-opening games on the road, including a 14-6 win at Furman in 1896 in the first game in Clemson history.

Monday's contest will be Clemson's 56th night game since the start of the 2015 season. In that time, Clemson is 46-9 in night games, including a 27-6 mark since the start of the 2018 season.

Though the upcoming game will be played in Durham, Clemson has won its last 19 night games in Death Valley, a streak that dates to the middle of the 2013 season.

CLEMSON IN ACC OPENERS

The 2023 season marks Clemson's 71st year of membership in the ACC, dating back to the conference's first year of play in 1953. In its previous 70 seasons of ACC membership, Clemson has posted a 44-25-1 record in conference openers.

Clemson has won its last eight ACC openers. The 2019 conference opener broke a streak of seven consecutive years that Clemson had to travel to open ACC play. Clemson's 2021 home game against Georgia Tech represented only the second time in 10 years that Clemson opened ACC play at home.

Head Coach Dabo Swinney is 10-4 in ACC openers at Clemson, with all four losses coming to Top 20 opponents, including No. 15 Georgia Tech in 2009, No. 16 Miami (Fla.) in 2010, No. 4 Florida State in 2012 and No. 1 Florida State in 2014. Three of those four contests were on the road.

The Tigers are seeking a ninth consecutive victory in conference openers, which would add to the longest streak in school history. With a win on Monday, the 2023 senior class would become the 10th senior class in Clemson history to win all four of its ACC openers, joining 4-0 records posted by the 1983, 1984, 1989, 2005, 2018, 2019, 2020, 2021 and 2022 senior classes in ACC debuts.

Since 1950, Clemson is 159-72-3 against coaches facing Clemson for the first time. And though the game will be Clemson's first against Mike Elko as a head coach, the Tigers are 5-0 against teams with Elko on-staff, including a 3-0 mark against Elko during his time as defensive coordinator at Wake Forest from 2014-16 and a 2-0 mark during his tenure as Texas A&M's defensive coordinator from 2018-21.

-- ON THE OPPONENT --

SERIES HISTORY VS. DUKE

Clemson holds a 37-16-1 lead in the series with Duke, including a 20-4-1 lead in games played in Death Valley and a 15-12 advantage in road contests. The series also includes a 33-21 Clemson victory in Tokyo, Japan, as part of the Coca-Cola Classic in 1991, as well as a 3-0 neutral site win in the Oyster Bowl Norfolk, Va. in 1971, both of which were regular season contests.

Duke ran out to a 3-0 lead in the series from 1934-36 and pushed the advantage to 4-0 in 1957. Clemson is 37-12-1 in the 50 meetings since, including the Tigers' first win against the Blue Devils in 1959 en route to a 9-2 record and an ACC title.

Clemson is 10-1 in its last 11 meetings against Duke. That stretch includes a 4-1 record for the Tigers in Durham with victories in 2000, 2002, 2007 and 2012.

To date, Clemson has played only one road game at Duke during Head Coach Dabo Swinney's tenure, a 56-20 win in 2012. Tajh Boyd threw a school-record five first-half touchdown passes — three of them to DeAndre Hopkins in the first quarter — as ninth-ranked Clemson totaled 718 yards of offense in the first night game in the history of the series.

SERIES HIGHLIGHTS

1971: Hootie Ingram gained his only win over a ranked team as Clemson coach when the Tigers defeated Duke 3-0 in a defensive struggle at the Oyster Bowl in Norfolk, Va. Duke was ranked 14th in the nation entering the contest.

1989: One of the more memorable games in Durham took place between Danny Ford's final Clemson team and the Steve Spurrier-led Blue Devils, as Duke came away with a 21-17 victory. Clemson entered the game with a 4-0 record, a No. 7 AP ranking and had recently won at Florida State. Duke went on to tie for the ACC Championship that year, its most recent ACC title. Clemson finished that year 10-2 and ranked in the Top 10 and was the ACC's highest-ranked team despite finishing third in the ACC standings.

1995: Raymond Priestler rushed for a school-record 263 yards to lead the Tiger offense in a 34-17 Tiger victory. On the other side of the line of scrimmage that day, Brian Dawkins had three interceptions in the first quarter to set a school record for interceptions in a quarter and in a half while tying the school record for interceptions in a single game. Clemson's second-most prolific rushing game also took place against Duke when Cliff Austin rushed for 260 yards in a Clemson victory in 1982.

1997: Clemson and Duke met in the first overtime game between two ACC teams. The Tigers won the contest by the unusual overtime score of 29-20. David Richardson

kicked a field goal on Clemson's possession, then Rahim Abdullah intercepted a pass and ran 63 yards for a score, giving Clemson the rare nine-point overtime win.

2002: Charlie Whitehurst made his first career start against the Blue Devils and completed 34-of-52 passes for 420 yards and four touchdowns. The 420 passing yards set a record that stood until Tajh Boyd's 428-yard day against Wake Forest in 2012.

2012: Clemson produced one of the most prolific offensive performances in school history in a 56-20 prime-time win at Duke. Clemson exceeded 700 yards of offense, including 300 both on the ground and through the air, while Tajh Boyd threw five first-half touchdown passes in the victory.

LAST MEETING

Clemson 35, Duke 6

(Nov. 17, 2018, Clemson, S.C.)

CLEMSON, S.C. – No. 2 Clemson emerged victorious over the Duke Blue Devils, 35-6, on Senior Day and Military Appreciation Day at Memorial Stadium. With the win, Clemson remained undefeated at 11-0 overall and wrapped up ACC play at 8-0, while Duke moved to 7-4 overall and 3-4 in the conference.

Trevor Lawrence completed 21-of-38 pass attempts for 251 yards and two touchdowns, and his top target was Justyn Ross, who amassed 76 yards with a score on four receptions. Travis Etienne added 81 yards and two touchdowns in nine carries on the ground. Leading the defensive effort was Clelin Ferrell, who had a team-high 2.5 tackles for loss and two of the Tigers' four sacks, pushing him into double-digit figures for sacks on the year.

Duke got on the board first on a 34-yard field goal. A second field goal, this one from 32 yards, gave the Blue Devils a 6-0 lead as the first quarter was expiring, but that ultimately proved to be the last of Duke's scoring for the night.

Clemson took a 7-6 lead just over two minutes into in the second quarter when Tavien Feaster rushed for a two-yard score, capping a drive highlighted by a Ross 41-yard reception the play before. Ross also hauled in a

Etienne broke away for both of the third quarter's touchdowns, the first a 27-yard run with 12:25 remaining in the quarter, and the second a 29-yard rush with 4:20 left that put the Tigers up 28-6 heading into the final 15 minutes.

The fourth quarter saw Lawrence connect with T.J. Chase on a 10-yard scoring pass, bringing the score to the final of 35-6.

LAST MEETING IN DURHAM

Clemson 56, Duke 20

(Nov. 3, 2012, Durham, N.C.)

DURHAM, N.C. — Tajh Boyd threw five first-half touchdown passes with DeAndre Hopkins hauling in three of them in the first quarter alone as No. 13/9 Clemson rolled up 718 yards of offense to thump Duke, 56-20, at Wallace Wade Stadium.

Clemson's 718 yards in the contest were one of six 700-yard games in school history and are the fifth-most by Clemson in a single game entering 2023.

The Tigers wasted little time scoring, as they marched 76 yards on their opening drive and found the end zone on a five-yard fade route from Boyd to Hopkins for a 7-0 lead. Boyd and Hopkins hooked up again for a 58-yard touchdown just four plays later to build the lead to 14-3.

After a long touchdown catch by Duke's Jamison Crowder, Clemson responded with another long touchdown of its own on a 45-yard bomb from Boyd to Hopkins. A 30-yard touchdown pass from Boyd to Sammy Watkins gave Clemson a 28-10 lead after the first quarter.

Boyd threw his fifth touchdown pass of the first half in the second quarter, hitting Martavis Bryant for a 41-yard score to give Clemson a 35-17 lead. Boyd accounted for another touchdown late in the first half, as he darted in from 21 yards out one play after Watkins set Clemson up in Duke territory with a 30-yard grab down the sideline.

A one-yard D.J. Howard touchdown run and a 12-yard touchdown pass from Cole Stoudt to Charone Peake completed Clemson's scoring as the Tigers exceeded 300 yards both rushing and passing for the second time in school history.

RUSHING SUCCESS VS. DUKE

Clemson's history against Duke includes a pair of 260-yard games that rank as the top two rushing performances in Clemson history. Raymond Priester had 263 yards against Duke in 1995, and Cliff Austin had 260 against the Blue Devils in 1982.

Kenny Flowers had three consecutive 100-yard rushing games against Duke in the 1980s, the first time a Clemson running back rushed for at least 100 yards three times in a career against the same opponent. Only Travis Etienne has since matched the feat, running for 100-plus yards against Wake Forest every year from 2018-20.

SCORING QUICKLY VS. DUKE

The top two instances of the quickest back-to-back touchdowns in Clemson history took place against Duke. In 2003, Derrick Hamilton caught scoring passes from Charlie Whitehurst just 14 seconds apart, a record for the quickest back-to-back touchdowns in Clemson history.

In 1999, Brian Wofford scored on an 18-yard touchdown pass from Brandon Streeter, then Terry Jolly ran an interception back from 20 yards out, scores that took place just 21 seconds apart, the second-fastest back-to-back touchdown scores in Clemson history.

In the 2007 game at Duke, Clemson scored 16 points in 39 seconds. The two touchdowns were 39 seconds apart with a safety in between.

- **Sept. 4, 2010:** Dawson Zimmerman booted a 79-yard punt in a victory over North Texas, the second-longest punt in Clemson history at the time. He finished the day with a 51.0-yard net average on six punts, best in Clemson history.

LABOR DAY

- **Sept. 3, 2007:** Clemson opened the season with a 24-18 victory over No. 19 Florida State on Labor Day evening. The nationally televised game on ESPN was only Clemson's second game on Labor Day all-time and its first on the holiday since 1982. Cullen Harper became the first Tiger quarterback in history to beat a ranked team in his first career start. It was Clemson's fourth win over Florida State in a five-year span and it was the fifth straight win for the Tigers over a top-25 team, tying a school record at the time.

- **Sept. 5, 2022:** Clemson recorded an interception on the game's first play from scrimmage and blocked two punts in a game for the first time in 15 years as the Tigers defeated Georgia Tech, 41-10, at Mercedes-Benz Stadium in Atlanta.

NOTES FROM 2022 SEASON FINALE

- Clemson finished the season 11-3. The 2022 season

was Clemson's 11th 11-win season in school history and its eighth in the last 11 years.

- Clemson's 11 wins in 2022 tied for the seventh-most in a season in school history.

- Dabo Swinney coached his 200th career game as head coach to join Frank Howard (295) as the only coaches in school history to coach 200 career games at Clemson.

- Swinney joined Florida State's Bobby Bowden (227) and Virginia's George Welsh (223) as the only coaches to lead an ACC program in at least 200 career games.

- Swinney is 161-39 through 200 career games, tying Oklahoma's Bob Stoops and Tennessee's Robert Neyland for the fifth-most victories through 200 games in FBS history.

- Swinney completed his 15th season (and 14th full season) as the second-winningest coach in FBS history through the first 15 seasons of a career (161). Swinney ranks second behind only Urban Meyer (165). Swinney's win total includes his interim season in which he only coached seven games.

- Swinney made his 19th bowl game appearance to break Bobby Bowden's ACC record (18) for the most career bowl appearances leading an ACC program.

- Clemson produced a season-high 34 first downs. It was Clemson's most first downs since recording 34 first downs against Miami (Fla.) in 2020.

- Clemson's 34 first downs were a school bowl record. Clemson's previous bowl record for first downs was 32, set against LSU in the 2012 Chick-fil-A Bowl.

- Clemson dropped to 31-3 since 1950 in games in which it has recorded 30 or more first downs. The game was Clemson's first loss in a contest in which it recorded 30 or more first downs since 2016 against Pitt (33).

- Eleven of Clemson's 14 drives crossed midfield. Clemson scored on three of those possessions.

- Clemson ran 101 plays, the most in Clemson bowl history, surpassing its 100 against LSU in the Chick-fil-A Bowl.

- Clemson's 101 plays were an Orange Bowl record, surpassing Clemson's 90 plays against Oklahoma in the 2015 Orange Bowl and Nebraska's 90 plays against Notre Dame in the 1973 Orange Bowl.

- Clemson 34 first downs and 101 plays were both the most in a loss in school history.

- Clemson's 56 team passing attempts set an Orange Bowl record and tied the Clemson bowl record set against Mississippi State in the Peach Bowl to end the 1999 season, the 2002 Tangerine Bowl against Texas Tech and the College Football Playoff National Championship Game against Alabama to end the 2016 season.

- Clemson forced five Tennessee three-and-outs. The Tigers also forced the Volunteers to punt a season-high eight times. Tennessee's season high in punts entering the game was six at Pitt in September. Tennessee punted 19 times in eight SEC games in 2022 and 14 times in two games against ACC opponents.

- Quarterback Cade Klubnik made his first career start and completed 30-of-54 passes for 320 yards. Klubnik's 54 pass attempts were an Orange Bowl record, surpassing Florida State's Chris Weinke's 51 passes against Oklahoma (and quarterback) Josh Heupel in the Orange Bowl to end the 2000 season.

- Klubnik also rushed 20 times for 51 yards with a touchdown. His 20 rushing attempts were the most by a Clemson quarterback since Kelly Bryant's 20 rushing attempts against NC State in 2017.

- Klubnik's 74 plays of total offense (combined rush attempts and pass attempts) were the fifth-most by an individual in Clemson history and Clemson's most since Deshaun Watson's 77 against Alabama to end the 2016 season.

- Klubnik's 74 plays of total offense were an Orange Bowl record, surpassing the 65 by Northern Illinois against Florida State to end the 2012 season.

- Klubnik became the first Clemson quarterback since the modernization of Clemson's quarterback position in 1953 to make his first career start in a postseason game.

- In facing No. 6 Tennessee, Klubnik became the first Clemson quarterback to make his first career start against an AP Top 6 opponent since his offensive coordinator, Brandon Streeter, did so against No. 5 Florida State in 1997.

- Klubnik became only the eighth true freshman to start at quarterback for Clemson since the NCAA instituted permanent freshman eligibility in 1972, joining Steve Fuller (1975), Willie Jordan (1975), Patrick Sapp (1992), Nealon Greene (1994), Deshaun Watson (2014), Trevor Lawrence (2018) and DJ Uiagalelei (2020).

- Klubnik rushed for his second touchdown of the season and his second touchdown in as many games on a four-yard carry in the fourth quarter.

- With Klubnik's rushing touchdown, Clemson has now scored at least one rushing touchdown in a national-best 68 of its 69 games since the start of the 2018 season. Clemson has rushed for a touchdown in 26 consecutive games.

- Running back Will Shipley scored Clemson's fourth two-point conversion of the season in the fourth quarter. Clemson's four two-point conversions this season are Clemson's most since 2012 (four).

- Shipley rushed 17 times for 72 yards. Shipley finished the year with 1,182 rushing yards, 11th-most in a season in Clemson history.

- Wide receiver Joseph Ngata caught a career-high eight passes for 84 yards.

- With four catches for 49 yards by Davis Allen and three catches for 29 yards by Jake Briningstool, Clemson's tight ends finished the year with 67 catches, 748 yards and 10 touchdowns. The 67 catches exceeded the group's 65 in 2011 for its most under Dabo Swinney.

- Defensive tackle Ruke Orhororo ended Tennessee's first drive with a third-down sack, adding to his single-season career high with his fourth sack of the season.

- Defensive tackle Bryan Bresee pushed his season sack total to 3.5 with a second-quarter sack.

- Defensive tackle Tyler Davis recorded a sack on a third down late in the first half. It pushed his season sack total to 5.5, tying his single-season career high from 2019, and pushed his single-season career high in tackles for loss to 9.5, surpassing his 9.0 in 2019.

- Linebacker Barrett Carter pushed his season sack total to 5.5 with a third-quarter sack, Clemson's fourth sack of the game.

- Clemson has now recorded at least four sacks in five consecutive games for the first time since a six-game streak across the final three games of 1990 and the first three games of 1991.

- Linebacker Wade Woodaz recorded a career-high 2.0 tackles for loss.

- Placekicker B.T. Potter appeared in his 69th career game to tie Clemson's program record for career games played shared by James Skalski, Will Spiers and Will Swinney. Potter's 69 career games are the most of any active player at any level of NCAA football.

- Potter made his 54th career start at placekicker to add to his Clemson position record set in the ACC Championship Game.

- Potter scored in a 54th consecutive game to break the Clemson record set by Chandler Catanzaro (53) from 2010-13. Potter scored in every game since earning the starting placekicking job prior to the 2019 season after serving as the team's kickoff specialist in 2018.

- On a 40-yard third-quarter field goal, his second field

goal of the game, Potter (73) passed Nelson Welch (72 from 1991-94) for the Clemson record for career field goals.

- Potter finished his collegiate career with Clemson's records for field goals of 40 yards or more (34) and 50 yards or more (nine).

- Clemson faced its second AP Top 10 opponent of the season and has now faced multiple AP Top 10 teams in a season seven times in the last eight years.

- Clemson faced Tennessee for the 20th time in school history, a series that dates to John Heisman's Tigers facing the Volunteers at Knoxville's Chilhowee Park in 1901.

- Clemson played its eighth night game of 2022, tying the 2017 and 2019 campaigns for the second-most in a season in Clemson history.

- Clemson dropped to 4-3 all-time in Orange Bowl play.

- With a win in the ACC Championship Game prior to the Orange Bowl, Clemson entered the game having won a postseason game (conference championship, bowl game and/or national championship game) for 12 consecutive seasons. Clemson's current 12-year streak is the longest active streak in the country and passed 1985-95 Florida State for the longest streak on record back to 1980, according to Stats Perform.

- The defeat ended Clemson's 16-game winning streak in December games, a streak that dated to Clemson's 2011 ACC Championship Game victory against Virginia Tech. Clemson dropped to 27-14 all-time in December games, including postseason play.

- Clemson finished the season 4-1 against AP Top 25 opponents (at kickoff) this season.

- Clemson played its 154th consecutive game since losing back-to-back games in a single season. Clemson's 154-game streak dating to 2011 is the nation's longest active streak.

- Clemson voted on its permanent captains for the 2022 season prior to the contest. Clemson's captains for the game and season were tight end Davis Allen, defensive tackle Tyler Davis, defensive end K.J. Henry, offensive tackle Jordan McFadden and safety Jalyn Phillips.

-- BEST IS THE STANDARD --

ONE OF THE ERA'S WINNINGEST PROGRAMS

Alabama and Clemson rank No. 1 and 2 in the country in wins since 2015, with the two teams combining for five out of eight national championships in that time frame. With a dominating win in the 2022 ACC Championship Game, Clemson became only the second program in the FBS to win 100 games since 2015.

Clemson's lofty perch in that ranking reflects not only its dominance against middle- and lower-tier

opponents, but also its success in matchups with other premier programs. Since 2011, 37 different programs currently in Power Five conferences entered 2023 with at least 85 wins in that span. Clemson has played 15 of those 37 programs since 2011 and is 62-19 (.765) in those contests and is .500 or better against 14 of the 15 teams.

Narrowed further among that group, Clemson is 12-8 (.600) against the top 10 teams and 22-11 (.667) against the top 25.

10-WIN SEASONS

The FBS record for consecutive 10-win seasons is 15, as Alabama's 15th consecutive 10-win season in 2022 broke Florida State's record of 14 from 1987-2000. SENIOR SUCCESS

Every January, Head Coach Dabo Swinney conducts his first official meeting with his new team. The first order of business in the meeting is to "reset the room," reorganizing the seating arrangement with seniors in front and all succeeding classes in order behind them in the team auditorium.

Several of Swinney's senior classes placed themselves among select company in college football history. The 2017, 2018, 2019 and 2020 Clemson seniors account for four of only 13 four-year classes in FBS history to reach 50 career wins. That includes the 2018 and 2019 groups that are tied with the 2018 Alabama seniors for the most wins in FBS history (55 wins in four years).

HISTORIC CONFERENCE REIGN

After a one-year hiccup in 2021, Clemson reclaimed the ACC throne with "A"nother "C"lemson "C"hampionship in 2022. The conference title was Clemson's seventh in eight years, as the Tigers became the first team in an active Power Five conference to win seven outright conference titles in an eight-year span since Alabama won eight SEC titles in nine seasons from 1971-79.

Two years earlier, Clemson became the first program ever to win 20 ACC Championships. That year, Clemson became the first program in the conference championship game era to win six straight conference championship games. Clemson also became the first ACC program to win six consecutive outright titles, as Florida State had a streak of nine straight ACC titles, but that streak included two co-championships that prevented Bobby Bowden's Seminoles from ever winning more than three straight titles outright.

Including titles from its days as a member of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association and Southern Conference, Clemson has 27 conference championships overall, also the most of any current ACC school. Duke ranks second among the ACC's current membership with 18 overall conference titles, including 11 Southern Conference titles and seven ACC titles.

The Tigers won the 1900, 1902 and 1903 SIAA Conference championships under John Heisman, then the 1906 SIAA title under Bob Williams. Clemson also won the 1940 and 1948 Southern Conference titles under Frank Howard. Howard won eight total conference titles, including two in the Southern Conference and six in the ACC. Swinney matched Howard with his eighth conference title in 2022.

RETIRING WITH THE ATLANTIC BELT

With the ACC dissolving its divisional format after 2022, it was a point of pride for Dabo Swinney that the ACC Atlantic Division crown that had so frequently made its residence in Clemson resided in Clemson for good.

"That was actually one of my personal goals," Swinney said last November. "It's always a goal to win the division but it was even a little bit more [of a goal] this year because we're not going to have any more divisions. This is the last one, so it's really fitting that it's here at Clemson."

Including shared titles, Clemson won nine Atlantic Division titles (2009, 2011, 2012, 2015, 2016, 2017, 2018, 2019 and 2022) since the ACC instituted the

division structure in 2005. Clemson also earned an ACC Championship Game berth in a divisionless season impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020.

Clemson played 97 games against Atlantic Division opponents in the divisional era spanning the 2005-22 seasons (including games against traditional Atlantic Division teams in 2020). Clemson went 80-17 (.825) against division teams in that span, including a 14-4 record against Boston College, 12-5 record against Florida State, 8-0 record against Louisville, 6-3 record against Maryland, 15-2 record against NC State, 9-1 record against Syracuse and a 16-2 record against Wake Forest. Clemson finished the divisional era with more ACC Championship Game berths (nine, including 2022) than losses to any single divisional opponent in that span (led by five wins by Florida State).

Clemson's intra-divisional dominance was particularly pronounced in the division's final years. Clemson closed the ACC's divisional era by winning 48 of its last 50 games against Atlantic Division teams.

POWER OVER THE POWER FIVE

Early in his head coaching tenure, Dabo Swinney laid out his belief to then-Clemson athletic director Terry Don Phillips that the Tigers needed to add tough non-conference challenges on top of their tests in ACC play to serve as a foundation for the program's growth.

"I had a conversation with Terry Don and said, 'Terry Don, I know we are not very good right now, but we need to play people because that is going to help me teach and help me develop the culture and the mindset that you have to have to win at the highest level,'" recounted Swinney. "I didn't think we had that, and that's what we committed to. That's what we've done."

That scheduling philosophy and culture change has resonated in the Clemson program, and since 2013, no team can claim more wins against Power Five Conference opponents than the Tigers. On Nov. 12, 2022, Clemson became the first program to reach 100 victories against Power Five opponents since 2013.

Clemson's national-best 102 Power Five wins since 2013 include victories against Boston College (10), Wake Forest (10), Georgia Tech (9), Syracuse (9), NC State (8), Louisville (8), Florida State (7), South Carolina (7), Miami (4), North Carolina (4), Notre Dame (3), Ohio State (3), Virginia (3), Virginia Tech (3), Alabama (2), Pitt (2), Auburn (2), Oklahoma (2), Texas A&M (2), Georgia (1), Duke (1), Maryland (1) and Iowa State (1).

On a year-by-year basis, Clemson has finished the season atop the country in wins against Power Five opponents four times since the institution of the College Football Playoff in 2014, including four of the last seven years. That includes 13 wins against Power Five opponents in 2018, the first team ever to reach that figure.

SIGN AND DEVELOP

While proud of his incoming classes, Head Coach Dabo Swinney has long stated that a true ranking of a recruiting class cannot and should not be published until four years later when the group can be evaluated on performance rather than potential.

Much to Swinney's delight, The Athletic has annually assumed that role in recent years, re-ranking every recruiting class four years later to account for on-field performance.

For its re-rankings, The Athletic uses the following grading scale: 5 points: All-American, award winner, top-50 NFL Draft pick; 4: Multi-year starter, all-conference honors; 3: One-year starter or key reserve; 2: Career backup; 0: Minor or no contribution, left the program. The outlet also adds a bonus to each program's class average, derived from its total number of wins from 2017 through 2020 (e.g.: For re-ranking the Class of 2017, Clemson won 51 games, so its class average received a bonus of 0.51).

Even in its current stretch of recruiting success, Swinney has often pointed out Clemson drops in rankings as its commitment to not oversigning leads to smaller recruiting classes, as well as noting that much of Clemson's on-field success is a function of the program's development, citing All-Americans like former three-star Isaiah Simmons or former two-star Nolan Turner. The re-rankings illustrate Clemson's sterling track record of talent identification, culture fit, resource allocation and player development.

On average, Clemson ranked 11.5 in the 247 Composite team rankings across the 2014-19 recruiting cycles. Upon re-ranking those groups, despite having little room for improvement while recruiting at a Top 15 clip in that span, Clemson ranked 3.5 on average in the re-rankings, a ratings bump of eight spots. Each of those Clemson classes averaged at least 11 wins a season during their careers.

ESTEEMED COMPANY

Head Coach Dabo Swinney's run of excellence in his tenure at Clemson has placed him in the company of college football legends.

Swinney boasts a career winning percentage of .805, sitting as one of only 14 head coaches in history with at least 10 seasons of FBS head coaching experience to post a mark of .800 or better.

CHASING HOWARD'S CLEMSON RECORD

Dabo Swinney's 161 wins rank second by a head coach in Clemson history, trailing the 165 wins compiled in 30 seasons by College Football Hall of Famer Frank Howard. Howard, known as "The Bashful Baron of Barlow Bend," compiled a 165-118-12 in 30 seasons at Clemson from 1940-69.

Swinney sits four games shy of Howard's perch as the winningest coach in school history despite having coached 95 fewer games.

THROUGH 200 GAMES

The 2022 Orange Bowl was the 200th game in Dabo Swinney's head coaching career. Among coaches who qualify for the NCAA FBS record book by virtue of five years or 50 wins as a major college head coach, 17 coaches had earned at least 150 victories in their first 200 career games as head coach as of the conclusion of the 2022 season.

At 161-39 through 200 games, Swinney tied Bob Stoops and Robert Neyland (162 each) for the fifth-most wins through 200 career games in major college football history.

Four previous Clemson head coaches earned 150+

FBS wins in their careers: John Heisman (186), Jess Neely (207), Frank Howard (165) and Ken Hatfield (168). Howard, a College Football Hall of Famer, recorded his 150th victory in his 273rd career game, in a 14-10 victory against Maryland in 1966 that clinched a piece of what later became an outright ACC title. Heisman earned win No. 150 in game No. 203, Neely earned it in game No. 268, and Hatfield did it in game 259, though none of those three won more than 43 games in their Clemson tenures.

FIRST 15 SEASONS

Dabo Swinney completed his 15th season (and his 14th full season) in 2022 with a 161-39 record. HEAD COACH CONTINUITY

Over the last decade, Clemson became a beacon of stability in the increasingly unstable environment of college football. Clemson Head Coach Dabo Swinney is in his 21st overall season at Clemson in 2023, including his 15th full season as head coach (and his 16th including an interim stint in 2008).

From the start of Swinney's first season as full-time head coach in 2009 through 2022, there were more than 435 head coaching tenures in the FBS (excluding those by interims) but only one such tenure at Clemson.

Clemson is the only school in the ACC with only one head coach since the start of the 2009 season, and among the 14 schools ever to qualify for the College Football Playoff, only Clemson and Alabama have had only one head coach since 2009.

SIX "FINAL FOURS" FOR SWINNEY

While the term "Final Four" may still be the linguistic property of college basketball, since the advent of the four-team College Football Playoff in 2014, Head Coach Dabo Swinney had Clemson among the sport's final four teams six times from 2015-20, becoming the first coach to lead a team to six consecutive College Football Playoffs since the format's institution in 2014.

The NCAA men's college basketball tournament dates to 1939. In the history of that tournament, only John Wooden of UCLA (nine from 1967-75) and Mike Krzyzewski of Duke (five from 1988-92) coached teams to at least five consecutive Final Fours. With his sixth "Final Four" appearance in 2020, Swinney joined basketball's Wooden as the only college football or men's basketball coaches to take teams to six consecutive Final Fours in their respective sports.

Swinney is among only nine coaches in football and men's basketball to record six career Final Four berths. He is one of only six with a winning record in Final Four games.

Swinney's ability to place his team among the nation's elite quartet has also been illustrated by the polls. Clemson finished first in the AP Poll in 2016 and 2018, second in 2015 and 2019, third in 2020 and fourth in 2017. Swinney became just the fourth coach to record at least six consecutive top four finishes since the AP Poll began in 1936, an exclusive list that also includes Florida State's Bobby Bowden (13), USC's Pete Carroll (seven) and Oklahoma's Bud Wilkinson (six).

Clemson's streak represented the fifth time a program has had a run of at least six top four finishes in the AP Poll. Miami (Fla.) had a seven-year run from 1986-92 with two different head coaches leading the program.

Clemson has dominated its conference more than any other FBS program in recent years. Clemson's .931 winning percentage against conference competition since 2015, including postseason play, leads the nation.

Clemson's longest winning streak against unranked teams came across the 2012-16 seasons, when Clemson won 46 in a row starting with a season-opening win against Auburn in 2012 and ending with an upset loss to Pitt in 2016.

Clemson is 124-15 against AP-unranked teams under Dabo Swinney, including wins in 101 of 106 games against those unranked teams since the start of the 2012 season.

-- OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR --

CLEMSON WELCOMES GARRETT RILEY

On Jan. 9, Garrett Riley coached Cinderella TCU in the College Football Playoff National Championship Game. On Jan. 13, he was formally announced as Clemson's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for 2023.

"Garrett has an incredible track record," Head Coach Dabo Swinney said. His body of work — including this past season when his ninth-ranked scoring offense helped TCU transform from a five-win team into a 13-win national championship game finalist in their coaching staff's first season — speaks for itself. As I contemplated this change, Garrett was at the top of my list. I am thankful that he shared my belief in Clemson University and our football program, and I am thankful that he wants to be part of our tradition and family. He is a dynamic, young offensive coordinator who will bring a lot of excitement and explosiveness to the Clemson offense... I am excited to see what we can accomplish with the young quarterbacks and dynamic playmakers we have on our roster here at Clemson and hopefully light up the scoreboard at Death Valley in 2023."

After two years as offensive coordinator of SMU's prolific offenses from 2020-21, Riley arrived at TCU following a 2021 campaign in which the Horned Frogs finished 5-7 and produced the nation's 65th-ranked scoring offense. In his lone season in Fort Worth, he transformed the unit into the nation's ninth-ranked scoring offense at 38.8 points per game as the Horned Frogs went 13-2 with a berth in the national championship game.

Riley's tutelage led quarterback Max Duggan to a multitude of honors for his play in 2022, including the Davey O'Brien Award as the nation's top quarterback, a runner-up finish in Heisman Trophy voting, All-America honors from several selectors and Big 12 Offensive Player of the Year.

All three offenses coordinated by Riley prior to his arrival at Clemson finished in the top 15 nationally in scoring offense. His units as coordinator at SMU and TCU

from 2020-22 combined would rank third in the nation in points per game in that span.

Though rooted in Air Raid principles learned in his time as a quarterback under Mike Leach at Texas Tech, Riley's offense has assumed the moniker of "Clemson Dirt Raid" or "CDR." The name reflects Riley's run game philosophies and commitment, both of which he partially credits to his experience as running backs coach at Appalachian State in 2019.

-- HEROES WEARING ZEROES --

NO. 0 WR ANTONIO WILLIAMS

Despite not turning 18 until July 2022 and not enrolling in January like much of his recruiting class, Antonio Williams immediately turned teammates' heads upon his arrival that summer. Clemson coaches and players alike complimented his natural route-running and football instincts, and Clemson's coaching staff has said that he is further along than Clemson legend and NFL Pro Bowler Hunter Renfrow was at the same point in his collegiate career.

Williams caught 56 passes for 604 yards with four touchdowns in 690 offensive snaps over 14 games (10 starts) in 2022, leading the Tigers in both receptions and receiving yards. His 10 starts were the most by a Clemson freshman receiver since Hunter Renfrow's redshirt freshman season (10 in 2015) and the most by a true freshman receiver at Clemson since Sammy Watkins (10 in 2011). He recorded the first 50-catch season by a Clemson freshman since 2014 (76, Artavis Scott) and He joined DeAndre Hopkins (2010), Sammy Watkins (2011) and Scott (2014) as the only four Clemson freshmen since 2010 to catch 50 passes.

NO. 0 LB BARRETT CARTER

Head Coach Dabo Swinney has routinely sung the praises of the versatility of linebacker Barrett Carter, a 2023 preseason All-American.

"He's one of the best football players in my 20 years at Clemson," Swinney said. "He's a pure *football player*. I mean, the guy can play anywhere. He could go play tailback, he could play corner, he can play safety, he can play Nickel/Sam, he can play Mike, he can play Will. He's special... He's so smart and he's got unbelievable instincts for the game."

Close observers of Clemson in 2022 quickly recognized Carter's impact in his first year as a starter, but Carter served notice of his arrival to the country with a signature performance against Louisville last November. In that game, Carter recorded eight tackles (3.5 for loss), two sacks, an interception and a pass breakup, becoming the first player to record 3.5 or more tackles for loss, 2.0 or more sacks and an interception in a game between two Power Five teams since South Carolina's Melvin Ingram against Auburn in 2011.

Carter finished 2022 credited by the coaching staff with 77 tackles (10.5 for loss), tied for third-most on the team, with 5.5 sacks, eight pass breakups, two interceptions and two forced fumbles in a unit-high 832 snaps over 13 games (all starts). His 832 snaps were the sixth-most by a Clemson linebacker on record.

Carter was one of only three players in the Power Five with at least 10 tackles for loss, 5.0 sacks, multiple interceptions and multiple forced fumbles in 2022. Before Carter and two others reached the marks in 2022, the last two Power Five players to reach Carter's numbers in all four categories were both Butkus Award winners: Georgia's Nakobe Dean (2021) and Clemson's Isaiah Simmons (2019).

-- NO. 1 RB WILL SHIPLEY --

SHIP HAPPENS

Running back Will Shipley returned to Clemson in 2023 as one of the offense's unquestioned heartbeats and one of the nation's most versatile threats.

On top of being a 2022 Hornung Award finalist and the first Clemson running back ever to earn Academic All-America status, Shipley ranked second in the ACC and among the top 15 in the nation in rushing touchdowns in 2022. His consistency made him one of only six players

nationally to rush for a touchdown in at least 11 different games in 2022.

SHIPLEY: 2022 IN REVIEW

Shipley was named in 2022 as one of four finalists for the Paul Hornung Award, presented annually to the nation's most versatile player. SHIP'S MAIDEN VOYAGE IN 2021

Despite missing three games of his debut season due to multiple injuries, Shipley led Clemson in rushing touchdowns (11), total touchdowns (11), rushing attempts (149) and rushing yards (738) as a true freshman in 2021.

Shipley's freshman performance in 2021 was another entry in Clemson's recent history of feature backs declaring their arrival immediately. Clemson was led in rushing yards in each of the previous seven years by either Wayne Gallman (2014-16) or Travis Etienne (2017-20), both of whom led Clemson in rushing in their freshman seasons (Gallman's redshirt freshman season in 2014 and Etienne's true freshman season in 2017). Before Shipley, the last time someone other than Etienne or Gallman led Clemson in rushing in a season was 2013 (Rod McDowell), when Shipley was in fifth grade.

Shipley's 2021 performance ranked second in rushing touchdowns by a Clemson true freshman since 1972.

300+ IN FIRST CAREER START

In the 2022 Orange Bowl, Cade Klubnik completed 30-of-54 passes for 320 yards and also rushed 20 times for 51 yards with a touchdown. His 74 plays of total offense (combined rush attempts and pass attempts) were the fifth-most by an individual in Clemson history.

Klubnik's 320 yards were the fourth-most by a Clemson quarterback making his first career start since 1953, as he became only the fourth Clemson quarterback to exceed 300 passing yards in their first start.

Klubnik became the first Clemson freshman quarterback on record to make his starting debut in postseason play. He also became the first Clemson quarterback to make his first career start against an AP Top 6 opponent since his former offensive coordinator, Brandon Streeter, did so against No. 5 Florida State in 1997.

Klubnik became only the eighth true freshman to start at quarterback for Clemson since the NCAA instituted permanent freshman eligibility in 1972, joining Steve Fuller (1975), Willie Jordan (1975), Patrick Sapp (1992), Nealon Greene (1994), Deshaun Watson (2014), Trevor Lawrence (2018) and DJ Uiagalelei (2020).

Though Clemson fell to Tennessee in Klubnik's debut start, Clemson quarterbacks are 9-3 in their first career starts since 2002. Clemson is 27-19-1 in debut starts for its quarterbacks since 1953.

FROM THE SIDELINE TO THE STAGE

Klubnik's national breakout came in the 2022 ACC Championship Game against North Carolina. He entered the game on Clemson's third possession and completed 20-of-24 passes for 279 yards and a passing touchdown and added seven carries for 30 yards and a rushing touchdown. His 83.3 completion percentage set an ACC Championship Game record and led to his selection as the game's Most Valuable Player in Clemson's 39-10 victory. He became the third freshman (and second true freshman) in the game's history to earn the honor.

-- NO. 22 WR COLE TURNER --

COLE WORLD

Then-true-freshman Cole Turner turned heads when he had three receptions for 101 yards in Clemson's 2022 ACC Championship Game victory over North Carolina. It was the first 100-yard receiving game for a Clemson player in 2022.

Turner, whom Clemson's coaches had opted to save for the stretch run of his redshirt season in 2022, had played just eight offensive snaps in one game all year before his performance against the Tar Heels. He recorded one catch for nine yards in those eight snaps against Miami (Fla.) two weeks earlier.

But, against the Tar Heels, the younger brother of former Clemson All-American Nolan Turner had a 68-yard reception to set up a score and had another catch for 29 yards. He reached the 100-yard mark with a four-yard catch in the fourth quarter.

With a 100-yard receiving performance in just his second career game, Turner tied a Clemson record for the fewest games needed to record a 100-yard receiving game. Current Clemson graduate assistant Artavis Scott had 164 yards on six receptions against South Carolina State in his second game as a freshman in 2014, and Justyn Ross did it in his second game as a freshman in 2018 when he caught three passes for 103 yards.

Sammy Watkins reached the 100-yard barrier in his third game, a 10-catch, 155-yard performance against Auburn in 2011, and Derrick Hamilton did it in his fifth game, an eight-reception, 106-yard effort against NC State in 2001. Jim Lanzendoen, a junior college transfer, did it in his fifth game as a junior against Virginia in 1973.

Turner became the 66th different Clemson player ever to record a 100-yard receiving game.

-- NO. 80 WR BEAUX COLLINS --

IT'S BEAUX TIME

As a true freshman in 2021, wide receiver Beaux Collins debuted a touchdown celebration in which he pointed to an invisible watch on his wrist. The message? "It's Beaux Time."

The clever play on the "It's Bo Time" motto of fast food giant Bojangles was on display early in the 2022 season, as Collins caught a touchdown pass in each of the Tigers' first four games that year. In doing so, he became the first Clemson player to record a receiving touchdown in each of the first four games of a season since freshman phenom Sammy Watkins in 2011.

After being held out of the end zone for the first time in Clemson's fifth game of the season, Collins scored his fifth touchdown of the season in Clemson's sixth game of 2022, a prime-time win at Boston College. With the score, Collins became the first Clemson player to catch a touchdown in five of the first six games of a season since 2012 when DeAndre Hopkins accomplished the feat as part of his ACC-record 18-touchdown campaign.

-- TIGHT ENDS --

TIGHT END RENAISSANCE

Clemson enjoyed a renaissance from its tight ends in 2022, when the unit produced 67 catches (most by a tight end unit under Dabo Swinney) and 10 touchdowns (tied for its most under Swinney). Jake Briningstool, a junior on Clemson's 2023 squad, joined current Los Angeles Ram Davis Allen to mark the first time in Clemson history that two tight ends caught at least four touchdown passes in a single season.

In 2022, Clemson largely avoided the rotating cast of characters and musical chairs along the offensive line it faced in 2021, when Clemson had seven different starting offensive line combinations in 13 games. Clemson's offensive line started the same five players at the same position in each of its first nine games in 2022 before a concussion to Walker Parks resulted in Clemson's first starting lineup change at the position in Clemson's 10th game of the season.

AXE MAN JR. COMIN'

For 12 seasons, NFL offenses attempted in vain to limit opportunities for four-time Pro Bowler Jeremiah "Axe Man" Trotter to trot out his signature axe chopping celebration after big stops. With the next generation of the Trotter middle linebacker bloodline — Jeremiah Trotter Jr. — now patrolling the box at Clemson, the college football world shared in their pain in 2022.

Jeremiah Jr., about whom both Head Coach Dabo Swinney and Defensive Coordinator Wes Goodwin joked "has been a middle linebacker since he was in diapers," elevated his game in the second half of Clemson's 2022 season. After producing 18 tackles (3.0 for loss) in Clemson's first six games, the coaches credited Axe Man Jr. with 74 stops (10.5 for loss), including six games with nine or more tackles, in Clemson's final eight contests, including with a team-high-tying nine tackles in the ACC Championship Game.

Though he was snubbed in official conference balloting, Trotter collected second-team All-America honors from the Associated Press, third-team All-America status from Pro Football Focus and collected All-ACC honors from select individual outlets.

In the 2022 regular season finale, Trotter recorded 2.0 sacks against South Carolina (in addition to scoring

on a 35-yard interception return), and a week later, he set an ACC Championship Game record with 3.0 sacks against North Carolina. He became the first Clemson player with at least 2.0 sacks in consecutive games since former No. 4 overall pick Clelin Ferrell early in the 2018 season. He joined a bevy of Clemson legends (and early round NFL Draft picks), nearly all of whom were primarily pass rushers rather than middle linebackers, to record multiple games in a season since 2000 with 2.0 or more sacks.

SURPRISE RETURNS ALONG D-LINE

Clemson's defensive line got a boost when defensive tackles Tyler Davis and Ruke Orhoro and defensive end Xavier Thomas all elected to return to Clemson for 2023 despite receiving draftable grades and feedback from NFL talent evaluators prior to the 2023 NFL Draft.

The returns of Davis (15.5 sacks from 2019-22) and Thomas (14.5 from 2018-22) made Clemson the only Power Five program to return multiple players with at least 14.0 career sacks for 2023. The addition of Orhoro's 7.0 sacks from 2019-22 gave the Tigers 37.0 returning career sacks from a trio that was previously presumed NFL-bound.

Injury limited Thomas to only three games in 2022. After missing the first five games of the season, he returned to action at Boston College, where despite playing only six snaps, he earned ACC Defensive Lineman of the Week after posting two sacks, a forced fumble and an additional quarterback hit, collecting the Leather Helmet Award from the Boston College Gridiron Club as the game's MVP.

Davis was a 2022 FWAA and Phil Steele All-American and is already a three-time All-ACC selection (2019, 2021 and 2022). Davis' three career All-ACC selections are tied with Christian Wilkins (2016-18), Dexter Lawrence (2016-18) and William "Refrigerator" Perry (1982-84) for the most by a defensive tackle in Clemson history, company befitting a player nicknamed "Baby Dex" by Dabo Swinney and "Mini Fridge" by former teammate K.J. Henry.

Defensive end Justin Mascoll, a veteran of 53 career games, also elected to return for his sixth season.

THE OTHER SWINNEY DYNASTY

Like Colquitts punting at Tennessee, Swinneys holding at Clemson are becoming a dynasty of their own.

Head Coach Dabo Swinney's oldest son, Will, arrived at Clemson in 2017 and immediately earned Clemson's starting holder position on placekicks. He played five seasons and a record-tying 69 games at Clemson through 2021. In those five seasons, Clemson scored 565 points on placekicks, including field goals and PATs, and he held for 554 of those 565 points. The only 11 Clemson kicking points not held by Will in his career were instead held by his brother, Drew, who was Clemson's starter at the position in 2022.

Will and Drew are succeeded by the youngest of the three Swinney boys, Clay, a redshirt freshman who exited camp as Clemson's holder for 2023. Clay's presence creates a plausible scenario in which every Clemson placekick in a full 10-year span from 2017-26 could be held by a Swinney.

Clemson's last hold by any player outside the Swinney family was on the final point of Clemson's 2016 national championship, as Seth Ryan, coincidentally also the son of a famous long-time coach (Rex Ryan), held the PAT following Hunter Renfrow's game-winning touchdown with one second remaining.

Losses to Top 5 opponents Ohio State and Georgia across the 2020 and 2021 seasons ended a streak of 127 games since losing back-to-back contests, which had been the longest active streak in the nation and the longest in ACC history.

Under Swinney, Clemson is also 32-6 in games in which it enters ranked lower in the AP Poll than it did in its previous contest. This includes the 2014, 2016, 2017, 2018 and 2021 season openers in which Clemson opened the season lower than its ranking from the final game of the previous campaign.

STRENGTH OF RECORD

Clemson has lost only 13 games since 2015. Six of Clemson's 13 losses since 2015 have come against AP Top 5 teams, and those six were all College Football Playoff participants that season.

The opponents to whom Clemson has lost since 2015 have a combined final record of 132-36, a winning percentage of .786. Clemson has not lost to a team that finished with a losing record since 2017 and has not lost to a team with a losing record at the time of the game since losing to 2-5 Boston College in 2010, Dabo Swinney's second full season as head coach.

Clemson opened the 2022 season a perfect 36-for-36 in red zone scoring until finally being stopped in the red zone in the second quarter of the team's eighth game of the season against Syracuse. According to research assistance furnished by Stats Perform, Clemson's streak of scoring in 36 consecutive red zone drives was the program's longest of the last 12 seasons.

OWNING THE "MIDDLE EIGHT"

Since 2015, Clemson has frequently won one of the hidden "games within the game" on each side of halftime. Clemson's Middle Eight performance was critical in its most complete performances in 2022. Clemson surged to a 30-20 victory against No. 10 NC State on Oct. 1 thanks to a 14-7 advantage in the Middle Eight that turned a four-point deficit (after a late second-quarter Wolfpack touchdown) into a 10-point Clemson lead. A week later, Clemson outscored Boston College, 14-0, in the Middle Eight. On Oct. 15, Clemson outscored 17-0 in that window to seize control of a tight game at Florida State.

Prior to the 2021 season in which Clemson's playing rotations were limited by significant attrition, the last time Clemson did not lead Power Five teams in that category was in 2016, when Clemson finished second in that category.

Clemson has not only often led the nation in that category but has typically lapped the field. In 2019, Clemson played an average of 76.0 players per game, an average that far exceeded all Power Five programs by more than 11 players — a *full unit* — per game.

Clemson ranked among the top 20 in the Power Five in average players per game in 2022 but ranked fifth in the Power Five in total players played.

The approach to creating functional depth and

rewarding players ready to play has been a key philosophy for Head Coach Dabo Swinney, whose own collegiate playing career was hatched as a walk-on fighting for playing time in Alabama's receiving corps.

"We're fully committed to playing guys who deserve to play," Swinney said. "You commit to a guy early in the season, and even if a guy has only played 10 percent of the snaps, when you get to game eight or nine, they've got some good experience."

YOUTH IS SERVED

In the first year of new redshirt regulations in 2018, Clemson played a then-school-record 20 true freshmen. Clemson immediately shattered that record in its 2019 season opener, with 27 true freshmen making their collegiate debuts in that contest. An additional eight true freshmen made their debuts to push that 2019 total to a school-record 36.

In 2020, Clemson played 27 true freshmen, tied for the most in the country at the end of the regular season. Twenty-two first-year freshmen made their debut for Clemson in 2021, and 26 debuted for Clemson in 2022.

Coinciding with redshirt rule changes, Clemson's five most recent seasons have resulted in the most game action for first-year freshmen since 1982.

In the 2021 season opener against Georgia, Clemson started two true freshmen in the first game of a season for the first time under Dabo Swinney. Safety Andrew Mukuba became the first Clemson true freshman to

start at defensive back in records back to 1973, and guard Marcus Tate became only the third true freshman offensive lineman to start a season opener at Clemson since 1973, joining center James Farr (1980) and tackle Mitch Hyatt (2015).

In 2022, true freshman Blake Miller added himself to the list, as his physical and mental preparedness impressed Clemson's veterans, including fellow offensive lineman Walker Parks.

"Blake came in in January, and we had to check his birth certificate because we thought he was 25 years old," Parks said. "That might be the most developed freshman we've ever seen, out-lifting dudes and out-running dudes... He's a great player, he's smart, picks things up fast and he's physical."

By starting the 2022 season opener against Georgia Tech, Miller became only the third true freshman offensive tackle to start a season opener for Clemson since 1944 (Hyatt in 2015, Phil Prince in 1944).

THIRD-DOWN SUCCESS

Clemson reliably produced a Top 30 national ranking in third-down conversion percentage every year from 2015-20, including three Top 15 rankings and two Top 10 finishes in that category. Then in 2021 with its offensive line and corps of playmakers besieged by injuries, Clemson plummeted to No. 87 in third-down conversion percentage.

Clemson returned to its usual ways on the money down in 2022, again ranking in the Top 25 in the nation at 47.64 percent.

That 2022 percentage included a historic 16-for-23 third-down performance at Wake Forest on Sept. 24. Clemson's 16 third-down conversions were a school single-game record, surpassing its 15 against Western Carolina in 1983. It marked only the 12th time since 2000 that an FBS team converted at least 16 third downs in a single game.

OFFENSIVE BALANCE

Clemson has fielded one of the nation's most balanced offenses over the last five years. In 2018, Clemson set a school record with 3,723 rushing yards. In 2020, Clemson set a school record with 348.5 passing yards per game.

Clemson has exceeded both 200 passing yards and 200 rushing yards in 58 games under Dabo Swinney, posting a perfect record in those contests. Clemson's 24 such games since the start of the 2018 season are among the most in the country.

From 2018-22, Clemson was one of only three programs in the nation to both rush for at least 13,000 rushing yards and pass for at least 18,000 passing yards. Clemson was also the only program in the country to rush for 175+ rushing touchdowns (184) and throw 140+ passing touchdowns (144) in that span.

Clemson has averaged at least 200 rushing yards and 200 passing yards per game four times in school history, with two of those seasons occurring in the 2018 and 2019 campaigns. Clemson broke the 3,000-yard mark both rushing and passing in both 2018 and 2019, two of three 3,000/3,000 seasons in school history (2015).

650-POINT SEASONS

Clemson remains responsible for two of the 22 650-point seasons in major college football history and two of only 16 since Division I split in 1978. Clemson was the first school with back-to-back 650-point seasons since Yale in 1888-89, predating the start of official NCAA recordkeeping in 1937 and the second year of which was coincidentally the year Clemson was founded.

FINISH

In 2018, Clemson debuted a new version of its "This is Why We Work" fourth quarter video at Death Valley, a hype video imploring the team to finish and featuring Director of Strength and Conditioning Joey Batson bellowing:

"Let me tell you something right now: they don't put championship rings on smooth hands! You gotta go earn it! You gotta go earn it six seconds at a time! You win championships when the stadium is empty, when the band ain't playing, when the cheerleaders ain't cheering, when it's just you and your brothers right beside you. That's when you win championships! In the fourth quarter, that is when we shine!"

The video and the speech became a part of Clemson lore, buoyed by its playing during Clemson's comeback win against Syracuse that year en route to a 15-0 national championship season. Over the years, the video has changed but the speech remains the same, with many Clemson fans yelling it in unison as it plays.

Clemson's fixation on finishing has led to the Tigers owning the fourth quarter, with Clemson holding a 127-3 record since 2011 when leading after three quarters.

And though Head Coach Dabo Swinney frequently reiterates the phrase, "There is nothing less important than the score at halftime," Clemson has the best winning percentage in the nation among Power Five teams since 2017 in games in which it leads at halftime.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

- Through the summer of 2023, of 357 eligible players who completed their athletic eligibility at Clemson and/or graduated early in Dabo Swinney's 14+ full years as head coach, 351 (98 percent) have earned a degree during their time at Clemson.

- Clemson broke program multi-year APR records in three straight years from 2017-19 (987 in 2016-17, 992 in 2017-18 and 993 in 2018-19) before the NCAA suspended APR reporting during the COVID-19 pandemic. Upon reinstatement of APR reporting in June 2022, Clemson shattered its multi-year APR record with a 999 covering the 2017-18 through 2020-21 academic years.

- Most recently, Clemson posted a 995 multi-year APR covering 2018-19 through 2021-22, tied for third in the FBS and trailing only Northwestern and Wisconsin (996). Clemson's lofty academic success in that period coincided with on-field excellence that included three ACC titles, three College Football Playoff berths, two national championship game berths and the 2018 national championship.

- Clemson, Air Force and Northwestern are the only FBS programs to produce a 990+ multi-year APR in each of the last four reported cycles.

- Clemson is the only program in the country to finish among the Top 25 in APR rate among FBS schools and the AP Top 25 in each of the last 12 years.

- Prior to the suspension of APR Public Recognition Awards during the COVID-19 pandemic, the NCAA recognized Clemson with its annual honor, which is bestowed upon programs ranking in the Top 10 percent of their respective sports, for nine of the award's last 10 reported academic cycles. Only 37 of the 130 FBS programs earned at least one APR recognition across the 2009-10 through 2018-19 academic years. Only 30 programs earned it multiple times. Clemson, Duke and Northwestern were the only ones to earn the award 9+ times in that 10-year span.

- With its award for the 2018-19 academic year, Clemson became the only FBS program since the NCAA created the APR metric in 2003 to win a national championship and an APR Public Recognition Award in the same year multiple times. Alabama is the only other school to accomplish the title/APR double in a single year once (2011-12 academic year).

Clemson's national academic success has understandably resulted in the shattering of its own internal metrics. Clemson posted a program-record 90 players with a 3.0 GPA or better during the Fall 2022 term. Of the 90 players, 30 earned a 3.5 GPA or better and 17 earned a 4.0. Clemson's team GPA of 3.04 was a program record for a fall semester and its second-highest on record across all semesters behind its 3.11 GPA for the spring of 2022.

ALL EYES ON CLEMSON

"Where the Blue Ridge yawns its greatness, where the Tigers play..."

Those are the opening words to Clemson's alma mater. In recent years, "where the Tigers play" has also been where eyes and television sets inevitably turn.

From 2018-22, Clemson games accounted for four of the seven most-watched college football games and five of the 16 most-watched games in that span.

The interest in watching Clemson play hasn't been limited to television broadcasts. Clemson continues to provide one of the marquee in-venue experiences in all of sports, as Clemson enters 2023 having been ranked in the Top 20 in the nation average home attendance at Memorial Stadium for 42 straight seasons.

DEATH VALLEY RENOVATIONS

Clemson embarked on a two-year improvement cycle for Memorial Stadium during the 2022 and 2023 offseasons.

New in 2023 is an expanded gameday locker room behind Memorial Stadium's west end zone. In addition to a visual facelift, the expansion increased the space's footprint from roughly 6,400 square feet to approximately 8,100 square feet. The space connects to a new tunnel directly behind the west goalposts for the team to use for field ingress and egress at all times other than the team's famous pregame run down the Hill.

Outside the stadium, Clemson turned Lot 5 — the parking lot immediately to the west of the stadium — into a 365-day Tiger Walk destination honoring the team's history. Upon being promoted to interim head coach on Oct. 13, 2008, one of Dabo Swinney's first actions was to create Tiger Walk, which has since become a staple of the Clemson gameday experience. Rather than the previous procedure of buses dropping the team directly at the stadium's entrance, Swinney sought the support of Clemson officials to instead drop them amid throngs of fans at the entrance to the parking lot, allowing the team to further immerse itself in Clemson's legendary gameday atmosphere. That pregame tradition will now take place in the updated plaza lined with the names of every captain in Clemson football history, including era-specific jersey graphics.

In 2022, Clemson's videoboard got its first major upgrade since 2005, with nearly five times the surface area of the previous board, which was last updated before the 2012 season. The new video system, affectionately and unofficially nicknamed "DaboTron," measures 126 feet wide by 56.5 feet tall, eighth-largest in the NCAA. It also sits 20 feet off the ground, giving fans a 365-day open view into the stadium. The new board also features color LED fixtures on the inside and custom portal LED lights for the team entrance. Ribbon boards on the north, south, and west, along with new corner video boards in the west were also upgraded to be higher quality, easier to read, and more immersive.

That year, the eight main stadium light poles were updated to an LED system, which allows for individual light fixture control, spotlighting of Howard's Rock, and higher-quality field lighting. As part of stadium facade updates, Clemson also installed new signage honoring the all-time greats, championship years, and backlighting the traditional "Clemson Welcomes You To Death Valley" signage.

Renovations in 2022 also included the addition of IPTAY's Masters Club, a 688-seat premium area on the concourse level of the stadium's west side. Concessions

and restrooms in the west were also relocated and expanded to the terraces, allowing easier pedestrian flow and access.

ALL-ACC SELECTIONS IN 2022

Clemson once again led the ACC in all-conference selections in 2022, as 10 different players recorded a total of 12 All-ACC selections. Will Shipley earned first-team honors as a running back, return specialist and all-purpose selection, becoming the first player in ACC history to earn first-team honors at three different positions in a single season.

ATLANTA — No. 4 Clemson defeated Georgia Tech, 41-10, at Mercedes-Benz Stadium on Labor Day night. Clemson's special teams had a superlative performance, as Carson Donnelly and Wade Woodaz both blocked punts to give Clemson multiple punt blocks in a single game for the first time since 2007.

Clemson's defense made an impact on the game's first play from scrimmage, as pressure from defensive end K.J. Henry resulted in safety Andrew Mukuba's first career interception.

In the second quarter, after its first punt block, Clemson opened the scoring on a one-yard touchdown run by running back Will Shipley. Clemson then drove 67 yards in eight plays and extended the lead on a six-yard touchdown pass from quarterback DJ Uiagalelei to wide receiver Beaux Collins. Clemson would carry a 14-3 lead into halftime.

Georgia Tech drew to within four on a 13-yard touchdown pass early in the third quarter. The Tiger offense provided a quick answer to take a 17-10 lead, as B.T. Potter hit a 29-yard field goal with 5:41 to play in the third quarter, capping a 12-play, 63-yard drive.

The field goal started Clemson's run of 27 unanswered points down the stretch to earn the win. Potter converted field goal attempts of 29 and 32 yards, and the first-team offense added rushing touchdowns by Uiagalelei and Shipley before ceding to the second unit, when true freshman quarterback Cade Klubnik led Clemson 66 yards and found Will Taylor in the end zone for a three-yard touchdown pass, pushing the final margin to 41-10.

CLEMSON, S.C. — No. 5/4 Clemson scored touchdowns on five of its first six drives in a 35-12 win against Furman. Clemson debuted new renovations to Memorial Stadium, including its 7,100-plus-square-foot videoboard, on a cool, overcast afternoon.

The win was Clemson's 35th consecutive victory at home, only the 15th home winning streak of 35 games or more in FBS history.

Quarterback DJ Uiagalelei completed 21-for-27 passes for 231 yards for a career-high 166.7 passer rating. Clemson rushed for 147 yards on 28 carries, led by Will Shipley, who scored two touchdowns.

Clemson's defense held Furman to 12 points, forced two turnovers and recorded two fourth-down stops. The unit registered nine tackles for loss. Five different Clemson players registered at least seven tackles, including LaVonta Bentley, who had three tackles for loss.

Clemson scored touchdowns on each of its first three possessions with two touchdown runs by Shipley bookending a two-yard touchdown pass from Uiagalelei to Jake Briningstool, giving the Tigers a 21-3 lead early in the second quarter. The teams traded touchdowns in the final two minutes of the first half to enter halftime with a 28-9 Clemson advantage.

Clemson opened the second half with a stop on Barrett Carter's first career interception. On the ensuing drive, Beaux Collins toe-tapped a nine-yard pass from Uiagalelei in the right side of the end zone to give Clemson a 35-9 lead. Furman added a field goal with 48 seconds to play in the third quarter, and a scoreless fourth quarter resulted in the 35-12 final score.

CLEMSON, S.C. — Sophomore running back Will Shipley rushed 12 times for a career-high 139 yards and two touchdowns as Clemson used a 35-point second half in a 48-20 victory over Louisiana Tech. Clemson gained 521 total yards, including 280 on the ground, and forced four turnovers, leading to 21 Tiger points.

The Tigers' defense kept the Bulldogs out of the end zone for the first three quarters and held Louisiana Tech to only six total rushing yards. Quarterback DJ Uiagalelei was 17-of-29 for 221 yards and two scores through the air and picked up 62 yards on the ground on nine carries.

Clemson scored on eight of its 13 drives, not including running out the clock on its final possession. With the game set at 13-6 entering the second half, Clemson exploded for three touchdowns, including a twice scoring 32-yard touchdowns on one-play drives.

Shipley's performance made him the first Clemson player on record back to 1950 to score multiple rushing touchdowns in each of the first three games of a season. He averaged 11.6 yards per carry and became the first Clemson player to average at least 10 yards per carry on at least 10 attempts since Travis Etienne in the 2020 ACC Championship Game against Notre Dame.

R.J. Mickens, Jeremiah Trotter Jr. and Malcolm Greene all recorded interceptions in the contest, while Kevin Swint recorded his first career fumble recovery on a wild snap.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. – No. 4/5 Clemson scored 17 points in a two-minute span on either side of halftime to take command of a 34-28 win at Florida State. Running back Will Shipley tallied a career-best 238 all-purpose yards (121 rushing, 48 receiving, 69 kickoff return).

Defensively, Clemson allowed touchdowns on two of the first three drives before settling in and holding the Seminoles scoreless for its next six drives, which included three fourth-down stops. Myles Murphy had six tackles, including 3.5 for loss, and two sacks.

DJ Uiagalelei accounted for four total touchdowns (three passing, one rushing), was 15-of-23 through the air for 203 yards, and added a five-yard rushing touchdown.

After Florida State struck first, Uiagalelei avoided a sack, stepped up in the pocket, and threw a 59-yard touchdown to Antonio Williams on Clemson's second drive.

The Seminoles took a 14-7 lead on a 15-play, 93-yard touchdown drive, but Clemson responded with 27 consecutive points to take a 34-14 lead, as tight ends Jake Briningstool and Davis Allen added scores in addition to Uiagalelei's touchdown on the ground. B.T. Potter also added field goals 47 yards and 34 yards, and with his second extra point of the game, he passed Chandler Catanzaro (404 from 2010-13) to become the highest-scoring kicker in Clemson history.

The Seminoles scored two touchdowns in the fourth quarter to bring the score to 34-28. Brannon Spector then recovered a Florida State onside kick attempt, enabling Clemson to run out the clock for the win.

CLEMSON, S.C. — No. 5 Clemson overcame four turnovers and an early 14-point deficit to earn a 27-21 win against No. 14 Syracuse at Memorial Stadium. The victory was Clemson's 38th in a row at home, breaking the ACC record set by Florida State from 1992-2001.

Running back Will Shipley had another career day, recording 242 all-purpose yards including a career-high 172 rushing yards on a career-high 27 carries with two touchdowns to spark Clemson's 293 rushing yards. Clemson's defense recorded a season-high five sacks and shut out the Orange in the second half as Clemson scored 20 unanswered points for the win.

Clemson took a 7-0 lead on a one-yard touchdown run by Shipley on its opening possession. Syracuse responded with a 75-yard touchdown drive to tie the game at seven.

Clemson's next two possessions resulted in turnovers. Ja'Had Carter intercepted DJ Uiagalelei to terminate one possession, and on Clemson's next drive, the Tigers drove to the Syracuse three-yard line, but Carter returned an Uiagalelei fumble 90 yards for a 14-7 Syracuse lead. A Garrett Shrader touchdown run later in the quarter pushed the Orange to a 21-7 lead. BT Potter cut the Clemson deficit to 21-10 with a 44-yard field goal before halftime.

A scoreless third quarter was not without drama. After Uiagalelei's second interception of the day, Clemson inserted Cade Klubnik at quarterback. Klubnik and the Clemson ground game led Clemson to touchdown drives of 80 yards and 61 yards to give Clemson a 24-21 lead. An additional Potter field goal and a game-winning interception by R.J. Mickens sealed the 26-21 victory.

The win was Clemson's first in a game in which it trailed by 11 or more points in the fourth quarter since the 2012 Chick-fil-A Bowl against LSU.

NOTRE DAME, Ind. – Notre Dame took advantage of a pair of non-offensive touchdowns and an interception deep in Tiger territory that led to another score to defeat No. 5/5 Clemson, 35-14, at Notre Dame Stadium. The loss snapped Clemson's nation-leading 14-game winning streak. Earlier in the evening, by virtue of Pitt's win over Syracuse, Clemson clinched a place in the ACC Championship Game, which takes place in Charlotte on Dec. 3.

With 9:08 left in the first quarter, Notre Dame's Prince Kolliie returned a blocked punt 17 yards for a Notre Dame touchdown. The Irish would score another touchdown with 38 seconds left in the first half, making the score 14-0 at the half.

Cade Klubnik entered the game at quarterback with 1:30 left in the third quarter, but an interception on his first pass attempt gave Notre Dame the ball on the Clemson 14-yard line. The Irish scored three plays later to take a 21-0 lead.

DJ Uiagalelei returned at quarterback on Clemson's following possession and led the Tigers 56 yards before Benjamin Morrison intercepted his pass and returned it 96 yards for a touchdown, increasing Notre Dame's lead to 28-0 with 12:58 left to play. Running back Will Shipley got the Tigers on the scoreboard with 10:14 left in the fourth quarter, punching the ball into the end zone with a one-yard rushing touchdown.

Notre Dame added one more touchdown with 4:16 left in the fourth quarter, and Clemson scored the game's final points when Uiagalelei threw a four-yard touchdown pass to Joseph Ngata.

The contest marked Clemson's first time since 2007 surrendering touchdowns on offense, defense and special teams in a single game.

CHARLOTTE, N.C. – No. 10 Clemson earned a decisive 39-10 victory over No. 22 North Carolina to claim the 2022 ACC Championship at Bank of America Stadium. With the win, Clemson claimed its seventh conference championship in the past eight years.

Freshman quarterback Cade Klubnik entered the game on Clemson's third drive, leading the Tigers to scores on five of his first six drives. Klubnik finished the game 20-for-24 passing with 274 passing yards and added 30 rushing yards and 19 receiving yards to be named the game's Most Valuable Player. Nate Wiggins blocked a field goal attempt and returned an interception 98 yards for a touchdown.

Clemson's defense came away with a touchdown, three takeaways, four sacks, eight quarterback hurries and seven tackles for a loss. Special teams contributed a blocked field goal and B.T. Potter was perfect on a 52-yard field goal and 4-for-4 on extra points, becoming the first player in ACC history to record 100 or more points in four different seasons.

The Tar Heels struck first with a three-yard rushing touchdown, but their momentum would be short-lived. Klubnik led a nine-play touchdown drive on his first possession to tie the game. Rushing touchdowns by Phil Mafah and Klubnik on later possessions and an exchange of field goals made the score 24-10 at the half.

Clemson outscored North Carolina 15-0 in the third, including the touchdown by Wiggins, two-point conversion by Drew Swinney and rushing touchdown by Will Shipley to bring the final score to 39-10.

MIAMI GARDENS, Fla. – CFP No. 7 Clemson fell, 31-14, to No. 6 Tennessee at the Capital One Orange Bowl at Hard Rock Stadium. The Tigers ran 101 plays, the second-highest mark in school history, and produced 34 first downs, both school bowl records, in the defeat.

Clemson freshman quarterback Cade Klubnik completed 30-for-54 passes for 320 yards and rushed 20 times for 51 yards and a touchdown in his first career start. On defense, Clemson forced five Tennessee three-and-outs, registered four sacks and produced eight tackles for loss. The Tigers also forced the Volunteers to punt a season-high eight times.

The Volunteers opened the scoring on their second drive on Joe Milton's 16-yard touchdown pass to Bru McCoy. Each of Clemson's first eight drives advanced into Tennessee territory, but the Tigers were unable to convert any of the possessions into touchdowns. Clemson missed three field goals and wasn't able to convert a fake field goal, which allowed Tennessee to take a 14-0 Volunteer lead on a two-yard touchdown run with 9:03 to play in the second quarter.

B.T. Potter converted a 31-yard field goal at the conclusion of a 10-play, 46-yard drive as Clemson trailed 14-3 at the end of the first half despite outgaining the Volunteers, 273-19. Potter added another three points on the board with a 40-yard field goal in the third quarter, his 73rd career field goal to break the Clemson record held previously by Nelson Welch.

Tennessee increased its lead to 21-6 with five seconds remaining in the third quarter. In the fourth, Klubnik rushed four yards for a touchdown and Will Shipley added a two-point conversion to cut the lead to 21-14. But Tennessee responded with a 46-yard touchdown from Milton to Ramel Keyton pass to take a 28-14 advantage. A late Tennessee field goal brought the final score to 31-14.
