NOTRE DAME VS. CLEMSON

WHAT TO WATCH FOR

TIGERS HOST NO. 12 NOTRE DAME

After meeting twice in South Bend and twice in postseason play in the previous five years, Clemson welcomes No. 12 Notre Dame back to Death Valley for the first time since 2015 when the teams square off at noon. Clemson holds a 4-3 lead in the series, including a 3-2 advantage since and including the 2015 meeting.

Notre Dame has visited Memorial Stadium only twice, first in 1977 and again in 2015. The Fighting Irish's 2015 visit was among the memorable contests in the facility's history, as No. 12 Clemson defeated No. 6 Notre Dame with ESPN College GameDay in town.

Amid a torrential downpour from the remnants of Hurricane Joaquin, Clemson jumped out to a 21-3 lead in the third quarter. The Tigers withstood a furious Notre Dame rally and snuffed out a two-point conversion attempt with seven seconds remaining to hold on for a 24-22 victory that spawned Head Coach Dabo Swinney's famous "Bring Your Own Guts" comments postgame.

Dabo Swinney is tied with College Football Hall of Famer Frank Howard for head coaching wins in Tiger history. Swinney tied Howard with his 165th career victory in a 17-12 win against Wake Forest on Oct. 7.

Clemson has a rushing touchdown in 50 consecutive games at Death Valley, the nation's longest active home

streak. The last team to hold Clemson without a rushing touchdown at Memorial Stadium was Troy in the 2016

One of the bright lights of an otherwise disappointing two-week span for Clemson has been the emerging productivity of its tight ends. At Miami (Fla.) on Oct. 21, Jake Briningstool set the Clemson tight-end record with 126 receiving yards while posting the first multi-

touchdown game of his career. Last week at NC State, he added a career-high eight receptions, and his 93 receiving yards combined with Sage Ennis' 28-yard reception gave the unit 121 receiving yards against the Wolfpack. Clemson's last two games rank No. 1 and 3, respectively, for the most combined receiving yards by tight ends in a game during Swinney's head-coaching tenure at Clemson.

TODAY'S HONOREES

BLOCK C HONORARY CAPTAINS

Ben Boulware was the leading tackler (131) on Clemson's 2016 national championship team. That total included 10 tackles in the national championship game against Alabama, when he was named defensive MVP. He was the winner of the 2016 Jack Lambert Award as the top linebacker in the nation and was voted as a team co-captain. He was named a second-team All-American by five services as well

Charone Peake was a co-captain of Clemson's 2015 team, the first Tiger squad to reach the College Football Playoff. Peake finished the 2015 season with 50 receptions for 716 yards, second on the team in both categories. A seventh-round draft pick by the New York Jets, Peake had a team-high six catches for 99 yards in the national championship game against Alabama at the end of the 2015 season.

PROFESSOR-OF-THE-GAME

Shima Clarke, Ph.D. is a professor in the College of Architecture, Art & Construction and the graduate programs director in Nieri Department of Construction Development & Planning. Clarke has been at Clemson University since 1998. Since then, she has persistently promoted opportunities for women in construction and has played a critical role in recruiting women, other non-traditional students and members of the construction industry to higher education opportunities.

Clarke has developed and implemented Clemson University summer camps for high school students, served on numerous committees with local K-12 school districts and developed study-abroad opportunities for Clemson students interested in learning Spanish for improved safety and construc-

tion workforce development purposes. As a result of her transformative efforts, the department recently received approval for a new Ph.D. program in construction management.

STAFF MEMBER-OF-THE-GAME

Lillian Burns is the administrative assistant for the School of Architecture. As the face many students and visitors see when arriving at the School of Architecture, Burns navigates their needs with commitment and grace. She identifies issues and proposes new ideas to ensure the school is operating efficiently.

Burns recently completed the CU Grow program, which provides a framework to support the personal and professional growth of Clemson University staff in full-time positions. She is currently working on entrepreneurial ideas she learned in the program to establish updated procedures for new hires and faculty information management.

STUDENT-OF-THE-GAME

Anna Maresca is a sophomore health sciences major from Aldie, Va. She chose Clemson due to its incredible atmosphere, both inside and outside of the classroom. She wanted a school that challenged her academically and pushed her out of her comfort zone, and Clemson was the obvious choice.

Maresca is a recipient of the Baltimore/Washington D.C. Clemson Club Endowed Scholarship, which made her dream of attending Clemson a reality. She is a member of Alpha Chi Omega and is involved in the Sales Innovation Program and Clemson Honors Student Ambassadors program.

TIGER & FIGHTING IRISH CONNECTIONS

- Frank Shaughnessy He holds the Notre Dame record for the longest play of any kind in school history. In 1904, the field was 110 yards long. Shaughnessy caught a mid-air Kansas fumble and raced 107 yards for a score. Just three years later, he was the head coach at Clemson. Shaughnessy's fascinating life included playing in the MLB, managing a team to the Stanley Cup Finals (NHL), serving as a minor league baseball manager in the Dodgers' organization and acting as president of the AAA International Baseball League when Jackie Robinson played in the league (1946). Among his many stops, he was the head coach at Clemson in 1907, leading the Tigers to a 4-4 record. He defeated John Heisman's Georgia Tech team in the season finale by a score of 6-5.
- Banks McFadden & Moose Krause Only eight athletes in history have earned All-America honors in football and basketball during their careers. Clemson and Notre Dame each had one of the eight. McFadden was an All-American in basketball first in 1938-39. when he took Clemson to the SoCon championship. He then earned All-America honors as a quarterback and defensive back in the fall of 1939, when he led Clemson to a 9-1 record and win in the Cotton Bowl Krause was better known for his basketball prowess and was a three-time All-American from 1931-33. He was the second three-time All-American in college basketball history. The first was Purdue's John Wooden, later the head coach at UCLA. Krause, who was recruited to play football by Knute Rockne before the legendary coach died in a plane crash, was an All-America tackle in 1932. Later as Notre Dame's director of athletics, Krause brokered the deal with Frank Howard for Clemson and Notre Dame to play a two-game series in 1977 and 1979.
- Frank Leahy He was the head coach at Boston College in 1939 and 1940. His first Boston College team lost to Clemson in the 1940 Cotton Bowl, the only bowl loss of his career. He won a bowl game as Boston College's head coach the next year over Tennessee, then went to Notre Dame as head coach

for the 1941 season. Notre Dame had a self-imposed ban on bowl participation his entire tenure (1941-53) with the Notre Dame program due to the school's academic schedule. He is still the second-winningest coach in college football history on a percentage basis, trailing only his mentor, Knute Rockne, but he was 0-1 in his career against Clemson.

- 1978 Final UPI Poll The only time Clemson tied another school in a final poll was 1978, when Clemson and Notre Dame tied for No. 6 in the nation in the UPI coaches poll. The two schools played in 1977 and 1979, but not 1978.
- Joe Montana & Dwight Clark Montana (Notre Dame, 1975-78) to Clark (Clemson, 1975-78) was one of the top passing combinations in the NFL from 1979-87. The duo combined on what is regarded as "The Catch" in the 1982 NFC Championship Game between the 49ers and Cowboys. Clark led the NFC in receiving in 1981 and 1982 and was the NFL MVP in 1982. They played on Super Bowl championship teams at the end of the 1981 and 1984 seasons. The two were on opposite sides of the field when the two schools met at Clemson in 1977.
- Ricky Gray The former DeMatha Catholic High School player, who lettered for both programs, enrolled at Clemson as a freshman in 1980 and lettered for the Tigers that season as a tight end. He transferred to Holy Cross College, a school across the street from the Notre Dame campus, in 1981, then matriculated to Notre Dame and lettered for the Fighting Irish from 1982-84 under Head Coach Gerry Faust.
- Troy & Thad Ridgley Troy Ridgley was a defensive lineman who was a letterman on Notre Dame's 1988 national title team. He also lettered in 1989 and 1991. Thad Ridgley, his brother, lettered at Clemson in 1992 and 1993. It is the only known brother combination to play for both schools in football.
- Chansi Stuckey Notre Dame Wide Receivers Coach Chansi Stuckey starred at Clemson from 2003-06, playing quarterback as a freshman before transitioning to wide receiver at the behest of Dabo Swinney, who was Clemson's wide receivers coach at the time. In his three seasons as a wideout, he totaled 139 receptions for 1,750 yards and seven touchdowns. After being drafted by the New York Jets and a successful NFL playing career, Stuckey served

as a graduate assistant at Clemson in 2019 and as an offensive player development assistant in 2020. In 2001, Swinney, who was part of a staff at Alabama that was let go after the 2000 season, attempted to get the wide receivers coaching job at Notre Dame vacated that offseason by new Bowling Green Head Coach Urban Meyer. Although Swinney never got the job, 21 years later, one of Swinney's wide receiver protegés, Stuckey, did.

PARKER WREAKING HAVOC

First-year freshman defensive end T.J. Parker has emphatically announced his arrival in the 2023 season. In his fifth career game, Parker recorded two sacks at Syracuse, factoring into three different sacks (one full sack, two half sacks). He became only the fourth Tiger freshman under Head Coach Dabo Swinney to record two sacks in a game. Two of the other three, Myles Murphy and Dexter Lawrence, were eventual first-round NFL draft picks.

Parker is a product of Central High School in Phenix City, Ala., a school that has become a Clemson hotbed in recent years. Parker became the Tigers' fourth signee (and fifth overall player, including walk-on safety Caleb Nix) from Central High School since 2018, a pipeline that started with Justyn Ross in Clemson's 2018 recruiting class.

Parker leads all freshmen nationally with 8.5 tackles for loss. Additionally, his four sacks are tied for third nationally among freshmen.

hen it comes to football, Barrett Carter is no stranger to the spotlight. A dynamic asset on the Tiger defensive unit, the junior linebacker has made his presence known over the past three years. He has played 34 games with 22 starts.

Following his outstanding 2022 season, he joined former Butkus Award winners Nakobe Dean (Georgia) and Isaiah Simmons (Clemson) in totaling 10 tackles for loss, five sacks and multiple caused fumbles and interceptions in a season. Head Coach Dabo Swinney credited him as being "one of the best pure football players" he has coached in the past 20 years. Considering the professional talent that Swinney has produced, this compliment speaks for itself.

Carter was born in Chicago, III., but he hails from Suwanee, Ga., where he has lived since he was seven years old. As a multiple-sport athlete, his love for football blossomed throughout his elementary and middle school years, as he started to realize his natural gift for the game. By the end of his sophomore year of high school, he had received over 60 offers from colleges across the nation.

Despite receiving offers from other top programs such as Alabama, Michigan and Oklahoma, Carter recounted his first visit to Clemson as feeling different than other schools he had visited.

"I had butterflies in my stomach. I didn't have that feeling anywhere else, and I couldn't let that feeling go."

Following that unparalleled first visit, he regarded his eventual decision to attend Clemson as an easy one, motivated by his appreciation of the family culture that has become so deeply synonymous with the Tiger program.



"I'm big on family relationships, and Clemson shows that they have a family environment. They welcomed me and expressed how I could be successful as a football player. That was something that was important to me and something I didn't really get from other schools."

Over the past three years, Carter has epitomized the definition of a successful football player. As a sophomore in 2022, he was named a fourth-team All-American and First-Team All-ACC selection. He has also garnered two ACC Academic Honor Roll selections and was most recently named a Lott IMPACT Trophy quarterfinalist. The latter accolade is given annually to the top defensive player in college football and equally

weighs the player's character with his athletic performance.

While these achievements already make him a standout Tiger, there is another unique detail that also allows him to stand out. Carter is the first Clemson football player to sport the jersey #0.

"I wore #1 in high school, and that number was taken when I committed, so I wanted to carry on that tradition of wearing a single-digit number. I texted Coach Swinney and asked which numbers were available, and he said #0 was the only one. I decided to go with it, and now I'm the first Clemson player to ever wear that number."

If Carter's story were to end here, only mentioning his football prowess and

athletic accomplishments, one would see him as a talented linebacker who achieved his dream of playing football at the next level. However, Carter's story does not end with just football, as his dreams extend far beyond the gridiron.

Aside from football, Carter has an unrivaled passion for reaching, investing into and impacting younger generations. He recalled that this passion stems from the way he watched older athletes pour their time into his own generation when he was younger.

"I remember when I was a little kid, older football players would come into my classes to read with us, hang out with us during recess and eat lunch with us just to spend time with us. That was al-



ways so cool to me, how they would take time out of their day to spend hours with younger kids and try to give them some wisdom.

"Now that I'm in that position of being an older, experienced football player, I see myself as having no choice but to do that very thing and give back to younger generations."

Since he arrived at Clemson in 2021, Carter has made it his goal to spend time at local elementary schools, something he has stayed true to despite attaining the football spotlight. Carter does not want the spotlight here...he just wants to make a difference. Although his time spent in the classrooms may look different when he visits schools, reading books, telling stories or answering questions, he is confident that every minute has been worth it.

"Seeing how their faces light up with smiles is awesome. I've always had a passion for kids because I put myself in their shoes. The 30-45 minutes I spend with them can really impact their lives. It's an escape. I'm surrounded by the sport of football, so to take some time out of my day to give back to the kids, that escape from football, you have to have that."

Desiring to give back in more ways than just within the classroom, Carter also volunteers with a Georgia nonprofit and charity, Our Friend Christopher. This foundation was started as a way to honor Christopher Miles, a friend and teammate of Carter during his time at North Gwinnett High School. Miles passed away from a brain tumor in 2020, and the organization is dedicated to provid-

ing college scholarships, promoting awareness towards brain cancer and providing support to families and individuals battling cancer. "Christopher was a couple years older than me, and he was always a role model to me. He was invested in our school and in our athletic programs, and he was someone who always gave back. I am now thankfully able to be a part of this nonprofit to help raise awareness towards brain cancer."

Carter has also been heavily involved with Clemson's P.A.W. Journey program during the years he has spent as a Tiger. He recalled that it was one of the things that set Clemson's program apart from every other program he visited.

"When I came on a visit here, they gave us a lecture about P.A.W. Journey, and I thought it was the coolest thing. I was on a football visit, but the fact that they created time to show us how they want to invest and help develop us as not just an athlete, but also as a man, spoke a lot about the culture of this football program.

"Being an ambassador has really allowed me to grow. I'm all about growth and continuing to take one step forward regardless of adversities, and P.A.W. Journey has given me the opportunity to do that. I appreciate the P.A.W. Journey staff members for their dedication and efforts to instill knowledge and growth into young athletes."

Following his time at Clemson, Carter plans to pursue a career in the NFL. Once his time in the NFL comes to a end, he aspires to open up a training facility for young kids in order to give back and equip them with the tools and skills needed to succeed as both an athlete and in life.

"I'm alright at football, but once I take the helmet off, that's the true Barrett Carter. I want my impact in life to be much greater without the helmet than with it."



eremiah Trotter Jr. grew up living and breathing sports. While he played baseball and basketball during his youth, it was never a surprise that football became his true passion. After all, his father spent 11 years dominating the NFL as a linebacker with Philadelphia, Washington and Tampa Bay. It is safe to say that athletic excellence runs in the Trotter family.

When his father, who wore #54 like his son, retired from the NFL following the 2009 season, he was just seven years old. Nonetheless, watching his father's highlights and spending time around the game as a kid ensured that football would be his calling. Trotter always admired his father's physical and aggressive style of play, sometimes so much so that it would limit his performance in other sports. This is one of the many reasons why football was always his preference.

"I wanted to play a sport that I could be aggressive in. I enjoy the contact aspect of football. I knew basketball was not for me because I would always foul out. Of course, my dad also taught me how to play the game of football since I was young, and I really grew to love it."

Trotter remembered attending his father's games as a kid, but his induction into the Philadelphia Eagles Hall of Fame in 2016 sticks out the most. The appreciation that was shown to his father on that day inspires him to work as hard as he possibly can.

"Attending my father's induction ceremony to the Eagles Hall of Fame had a



huge impact on me. They really showed what kind of player he was and the tough mentality he brought to the field every game. The ceremony inspired me to play the game hard like my dad did. He inspires me to represent the Trotter name to the best of my ability."

Often times, it can be seen as a lot to live up to when an athlete's father has such an impressive career in professional sports, but the younger Trotter does not look at it that way. More than anything, he sees his father's success as a reason to work harder.

"I don't feel pressure to live up to my

of myself. God has blessed me with the talent to play the game of football, so I feel like I need to go out there, rely on my technique and put in all the hard work. If I do that, I believe the rest will work out on its own."

In high school, Trotter already seemed to have the makings of an excellent football player. At one point, he was rated as the No. 7 overall player in the nation by ESPN. Nonetheless, some schools doubted his ability to perform in the long run as a linebacker. Clemson was not one of them.

"One of the main reasons why I chose

doubted me. Clemson recognized my talent and had confidence that I could develop into the player I am now. They believed in me."

Trotter was also extremely impressed by how the coaches and team handled themselves when he first visited Clemson. He believes that what the team preaches has always aligned with his beliefs.

"The culture at Clemson was something that impressed me during my visit. Everyone always gives 110 percent, whether it's practice or a game.'

so far. It was my first championship here

"I'd rather play in the warm weather of the South than in the cold. That made the transition from the North easier."

Once he arrived at Clemson, Trotter felt the team welcomed him with open arms. It was easy for him to embrace being a Tiger thanks to how supportive and hard-working his coaches and teammates were. The leadership of former Tiger linebackers Baylon Spector and James Skalski stood out the most.

'Two guys who always gave me great advice were Baylon Spector and James Skalski. They were both great linebackers here at Clemson before me. They really poured into me when I first got here as a freshman and taught me the importance of studying film as well as other important aspects of preparation. They set a pathway for how I need to handle myself and how to get better every day as a linebacker. Both of them exemplified what it means to be a leader."

Now in his third season with the Tigers, Trotter has been able to make some long-lasting memories with his teammates. While he loves team-bonding activities off the field, such as spending time at the lake, there is one moment that stands out to him the most.

"The ACC Championship Game last year against North Carolina was definitely my favorite moment on the field

in that game was electric. We were performing in all areas of the game. The feeling of going out there and winning a championship in that fashion is something that I'll always remember."

Trotter is well aware that linebacker can be a very physically demanding position. As a result, he is extremely meticulous in his preparation each week. Clemson has many excellent resources to ensure that players keep their bodies in great shape, and Trotter makes sure to take advantage of them.

"I try to make sure I take care of my body the best I can. I'm always in the cold tub and utilizing Clemson's facilities. I'm always at what we call 'The CASL' (Clemson Applied Science Lab), where the training room is. That's where we focus on helping our bodies recover. Each game, I want to make sure that my body is fresh and ready to go."

Mindset is another important aspect for Trotter each week. Football can often times be a mental game, so while it is imperative to prepare physically, that is not where the work stops.

"We have a one-game mentality. We focus on one opponent at a time. If we do that, there's no doubt that we'll finish off this season strong."

Trotter quickly emerged as an essential part of the Tiger defense. He has consistently performed at a high level from the moment he stepped on the field at Clemson and has no plans of looking back. Even with all his success, he certainly is not one to let it get to his head.

"My family, and especially my dad, has always preached humility and the importance of it. He always makes sure that I am level-headed, but when he needs to get on me, he'll get on me. I appreciate that from him."

Trotter is a shining example of humility and dedication. He has embraced his family legacy and every challenge that he has faced to this point. It goes without saying that the future is exceptionally bright for #54. *





raham Neff was named Clemson University's 14th director of athletics on Dec. 23, 2021 in the midst of his ninth year at Clemson and is now in his second year in the role

His first year in Tigertown was at full speed, as he oversaw significant facility development, including investments at football and a women's sport expansion project to house Clemson's new lacrosse and gymnastics teams. Neff led the bringing of Clemson's multimedia rights in-house, developed a comprehensive NIL program and launched a streaming service, Clemson+. IPTAY has seen record-breaking growth in the past year, which included the largest gift in IPTAY history.

The 39-year-old has been in senior leadership positions within Clemson athletics since 2013, including as chief financial officer and director of capital projects prior to his most recent role as deputy director of athletics. Neff has



helped oversee the building and financing of more than \$200 million in facility improvements, has aided in the contin-

ued development of IPTAY and served as a sport administrator for football and men's basketball.

Neff works consistently with key university stakeholders, including the university's Executive Leadership Team, Board of Trustees, IPTAY Board of Directors, Athletics Council and several university committees and appointments.

During his time as a sport supervisor, the football program won two national titles and the men's basketball program made two NCAA Tournament appearances, including a Sweet 16 run in 2018. Academically, Clemson's graduation success rate has been above 91 percent for seven consecutive years, and student-athlete total GPA has been above 3.0 for nine straight semesters.

Neff has helped develop several key areas of the department, including the financial philosophy, fundraising, student-athlete welfare and external operations management. In 2019, he was named one of Sports Business Daily's Power Players and in 2021 was named to SBJ's 40 Under 40 list.

Prior to his role as deputy director of athletics, he joined Clemson in 2013 as associate athletic director of finance and facilities. Before Clemson, Neff served more than two years in several senior administrative roles with Middle Tennessee athletics, with emphasis in finance, facilities and external operations.

A civil engineering graduate of Georgia Tech, he served as a student manager for Paul Hewitt and the men's basketball program, advancing to a Final Four in 2004. He worked in the financial advisory services group at Deloitte & Touche from 2006 to 2008 prior to returning to a finance and ticketing role at the Georgia Tech Athletic Association. He earned an MBA from Georgia Tech in 2010. He and his wife, Kristin, have three sons, Grady and twins Emmett and Nolan.

n illustrious coaching heritage is embedded in the foundation of Clemson football. At the dawn of the 20th century, the Tigers were led by future College Football Hall of Famer John Heisman. Hall of Famers Jess Neely, Frank Howard and Danny Ford followed in Heisman's winning tradition.

Now in his 16th season (and 15th full season) as Clemson's head coach, Dabo Swinney has already carved his name into that foundation, elevating himself amid a pantheon of Tiger greats by becoming the first coach in program history to lead Clemson to multiple national championships.

Swinney's stratospheric start to his head coaching career placed his record not only among Clemson legends, but also among the names of the winningest leaders in the 150+ years of major college football.

Swinney coached the 200th game of his career in the 2022 Orange Bowl, and his 161-39 record through 200 career games positioned him alongside College Football Hall of Famers Bob Stoops and Robert Neyland for the fifth-most wins through 200 games in FBS history.

At 161-39 (.805), Swinney entered the 2023 season as the winningest active FBS head coach by percentage among coaches with at least 10 seasons of head coaching experience. With an initial hire date of Oct. 13, 2008, he is the senior member of the ACC's head coaching fraternity and entered 2023 as the seventh-longest-tenured FBS head coach.

Clemson's success on the gridiron has been matched by its prowess in the classroom, as prior to the NCAA suspending APR reporting during the COVID-19 pandemic, Clemson was one of only three programs to earn top-10 percent APR recognition from the NCAA in at least nine of the previous 10 years, joining Duke and Northwestern, Clemson was in the top 10 of APR scores and the final top 25 of the AP and USA Today polls from 2011-15, the only FBS program that could make that claim.

Swinney's 2022 squad had an 11-3 record and returned the Tigers to the ACC throne, earning a 39-10 victory in the ACC Championship Game against North Carolina to give the Tigers their seventh ACC title in eight years. Clemson became the first program in an active Power Five Conference to win seven outright titles in an eight-year span since Alabama won eight out of nine SEC titles outright from 1971-79.

Clemson's 2022 squad extended its streak of consecutive 10-win seasons to 12, becoming only the third FBS program ever to record double-digit wins in 12 consecutive seasons. The ACC title also gave Clemson's 2021 and 2022 recruiting classes their first conference title, ensuring that every recruiting class in Swinney's tenure as head coach has won at least one ACC championship in

In 2021, Swinney's final win of the season in the Cheez-It Bowl was his

150th career win in his 186th game as head coach. In terms of games, Swinney became the sixth-fastest coach in FBS history, and the fourth-fastest in the modern era, to register 150 career victories. At the conclusion of that season, only 16 coaches in FBS history (including Swinney) had accomplished the feat within 200 games, and 14 of the 16 had been inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame, with the lone exceptions being Swinney and Urban Meyer, both of whom are not yet eligible.

Though other seasons resulted in more hardware, analysts and observers opined that 2021 might have been Swinney's best coaching job, as the Tiger mentor guided his team through adversity and attrition to overcome a 2-2 start and finish 10-3. Clemson entered that October as one of 28 Power Five Conference teams with two or more losses, yet it concluded the season as one of only two of those 28 programs to finish the season having reached 10 wins.

A year earlier, Swinney's squad accomplished its "double-double mission"





in 2020, going 10-2 in a condensed season to give the Tigers 10 consecutive 10-win seasons. Clemson became only the third program in FBS history to accomplish the feat and became the first school to win 10 games in 10 straight seasons as a member of the ACC, as only the final nine of Florida State's record 14-straight 10-win seasons came during the Seminoles' tenure in the ACC.

The pandemic-affected 2020 campaign was a historic one for the Tigers both as a team and individually, as Trevor Lawrence ascended to become the winningest quarterback in school history (34-2) and running back Travis Etienne added the ACC's all-time rushing crown (4,952 yards) to his arsenal of school and conference records. Etienne's versatility as a rusher and receiver earned

him consensus All-America honors as an all-purpose selection, while Lawrence became the second Heisman Trophy finalist in program history, tying Deshaun Watson (second in 2016) for the highest finish in Heisman Trophy voting in school history.

The prolific duo under Swinney's tutelage helped guide Clemson to its sixth consecutive outright conference title with a 34-10 win against Notre Dame in the ACC Championship Game. That day, Clemson and Oklahoma's six-year streaks of outright conference titles made the two programs the first among current Power Five Conference programs to win at least six straight outright championships since Oklahoma (12 from 1948-59) as part of the now-dissolved Big 8 Conference.

The conference title helped Clemson secure its sixth College Football Playoff berth, becoming the first program to reach the postseason tournament in six consecutive seasons. Clemson is 6-4 all-time in College Football Playoff games, the second-most wins of any program since the format's inception.

Clemson entered the third decade of the 21st century in 2020 after Swinney helped author one of the most prolific 10-year periods in the history of the sport. The Tigers posted a 117-22 record under Swinney's leadership in the 2010s, and the program's 117 wins trailed only Penn (124 in the 1890s) and Alabama (124 in the 2010s) to tie for the third most in a decade in major college football since 1890

Before a pandemicshortened 2020 season, Clemson won at least 12 games in five straight years from 2015-19, tied for the longest streak in the modern era and only

two seasons shy of Penn's record sevenseason streak from 1892-98. Clemson won 69 games during that five-year span, the most in a five-year stretch in the AP poll era.

In 2019, the Tigers earned their fifthstraight College Football Playoff berth following their fifth-consecutive ACC title, becoming the first team in history to win five straight conference champion-

ship games since conference title games were created in 1992.

Clemson posted a 14-1 record that year, earning its fourth appearance in the College Football Playoff National Championship Game in five years. Prior to the season finale, Clemson extended its school-record winning streak to 29 games, tied with Florida State (2012-14) for the longest streak in ACC history and tied for 12th longest in FBS history.

Clemson produced the 2018 William V. Campbell Trophy winner (known colloquially as the "Academic Heisman") in Christian Wilkins and won the program's first AFCA Academic Achievement Award. Clemson repeated as an AFCA Academic Achievement Award recipient in 2019, becoming the only school in the country to repeat, doing so while appearing in the national championship game in both seasons.

Swinney and Clemson's 2018 season was one for which statistics and superlatives accumulated in historic fashion. The Tigers became the first major college football team in the modern era (and the first since Penn in 1897) to finish a season with a 15-0 record.

Clemson's 15 wins included a school-record 12 against teams who finished with a winning record. Clemson won by an average margin of 31.1 points per game, highest in the nation and second highest in school history, trailing only a 35.3-point average margin in 1900. Among the seasons it passed was a 30.4-point average margin in 1901, a season in which Clemson won one of its five games by a score of 122-0.



With Lawrence leading Swinney's Tigers, Clemson took flight. After a dramatic 27-23 comeback win against Syracuse, the Tigers rattled off 10 consecutive wins of 20+ points to conclude the season, including blowout wins of No. 3 Notre Dame in the Cotton Bowl and No. 1 Alabama in the College Football Playoff National Championship Game.

Seven Tigers earned first or secondteam All-America honors, including a school-record three players who collected consensus honors. The 2018 Tigers produced a program-record 18 All-ACC picks and became the first team to produce the ACC Player-of-the-Year, ACC Offensive Player-of-the-Year, ACC Defensive Player-of-the-Year, ACC Offensive Rookie-of-the-Year and ACC Coach-ofthe-Year in a season since Florida State in 1997.

Accolades also accumulated for Swinney, who earned his second career ACC Coach-of-the-Year honor and brought home the Woody Hayes Award as national coach-of-the-year. Less than a week after winning the national title, he also won the Bear Bryant Award, becoming the first three-time winner of the award. Including the 2018 Bryant and Hayes Awards, he has won national coach-of-the-year honors from at least one organization in five of the last 10

In 2017, Clemson was on a mission to prove that it was built to last. He guided the team to a 12-2 record, an ACC title and a College Football Playoff berth despite having only six scholarship seniors and losing players who accounted for 77 percent of the offense during the 2016 national championship season.

Despite a setback in the Sugar Bowl to the eventual national champion. Alabama, Clemson finished ranked No. 4 in both polls. Swinney was inducted into the Alabama Sports Hall of Fame following the season.

The Tiger-record six wins over top-25 teams in 2017, also a national high, included a school-record four on opponents' home fields and five away from home. The defense, including three defensive linemen, featured four players who were named All-American, helping Clemson finish in the top four in the nation in scoring defense (No. 2) and total defense (No. 4). Clemson led the ACC

The 2016 Tigers lived up to their hype after compiling a 14-1 record and earning a spot in the College Football Playoff for the second-straight year. Along the way, Clemson knocked off five top-25 foes.

Clemson defeated the top two teams in the national polls in consecutive games in the College Football Playoff at the end of the season. The Tigers blanked Ohio State 31-0 in the Fiesta Bowl, the first shutout suffered by Head Coach Urban Meyer in his career and the first for Ohio State since 1993.

The Tigers then earned a rematch with No. 1 Alabama, and for the first time in school history, took down the top-ranked team in a second epic battle with the storied Crimson Tide program. Deshaun Watson's touchdown pass to

on the clock gave Clemson a dramatic 35-31 victory in Tampa, Fla. Swinney received the Bear Bryant Award as national coach-of-the-year for the second consecutive season.

Swinney coached Watson to two record-setting seasons in 2015 and 2016. The two-time Heisman Trophy finalist became the first player in FBS history to total 4,000 passing yards and 1,000 rushing yards in a season in 2015, and he followed by setting an ACC record with 41 passing touchdowns in 2016. Watson won both the Davey O'Brien Award and Manning Award in back-toback seasons.

Swinney guided Clemson to the No. 1 national ranking in every College Football Playoff poll in 2015 and led the Tigers to their first national championship game appearance under the new format after his team defeated Oklahoma 37-

led Alabama in the fourth quarter of the championship contest, but came up just short (45-40) in an epic game in Glendale, Ariz.

Following the team's 14-1 record and No. 2 final ranking, he was the recipient of 10 national and two ACC Coach-ofthe-Year honors.

In 2015, a then-Tiger-record 17 players were named to one of three All-ACC teams, including all five starting offensive linemen for the first time in school history. In 2016, 15 players were honored, including a school-record three First-Team All-ACC offensive line picks.

The 2012, 2013 and 2014 seasons were also noteworthy, with three top-15 final rankings.

With a 40-6 Russell Athletic Bowl victory over Oklahoma in 2014, Swinney became the first coach in history to win three bowl games in consecutive seasons



over teams whose head coaches had previously won the national title. He upped that mark to five years in a row in 2016.

Clemson capped off the 2013 season with a thrilling 40-35 victory over No. 6 Ohio State in the Orange Bowl. The Tigers had an 11-2 record after finishing 7-1 in ACC games. It marked Clemson's first back-to-back 11-win seasons in school history.

The 2012 season (11-2) gave Clemson back-to-back 10-win seasons for the first time in 22 years. Its seven conference regular-season wins set a school record, and Clemson was co-champion of the ACC Atlantic Division.

Swinney's 2011 squad, which ended the season ranked No. 22 in the nation, captured Clemson's first ACC title since 1991 when it beat No. 3 Virginia Tech 38-10 in the ACC Championship Game. It gave Clemson its first 10-win season since 1990. For his efforts, Swinney was named Bobby Dodd National Coach-of-the-Year in 2011 to become the first Tiger head coach to win a national coach-of-the-year award since Ford in 1981.

The 2010 schedule was one of the most challenging in school history, as nine bowl teams were on the regular-season slate and two non-conference opponents were ranked in the top 25.

In 2009, his first full season as head coach at Clemson, he led the Tigers to their first ACC Atlantic Division title. The Tigers came just six points short of winning their first ACC title in 18 years. Swinney was named ACC Coach-of-the-Year by Sporting News and was a Liberty Mutual Coach-of-the-Year finalist.

In October 2008, Swinney was named Clemson's interim head coach, replacing Bowden, who had been his po-

sition coach as a player at Alabama and was Clemson's head coach since 1999. Swinney led the Tigers to a 4-2 record during the rest of the 2008 regular season, including a win over South Carolina in the regular-season finale to earn a Gator Bowl bid against Nebraska.

On Dec. 1, 2008, his interim tag was removed and he was named head coach. At the time, there had been 28 interim head coaches at the FBS level since 1970, and those coaches had combined for a 26-86-2 record. Only one of those 28 interim coaches posted a winning

record, and that was Swinney. When he was hired as head coach, he became just the second interim coach to be elevated to the head coach position at the same school during that time period.

He has demonstrated his dedication to the community through Dabo's All In Team Foundation. Since 2009, the Swinney family and Dabo's All In Team Foundation have given more than \$9.6 million back to communities and programs in the state, a number expected to exceed \$10 million by the end of 2023.

In 2022, the foundation distributed approximately \$1.6 million in financial support to its core focus areas, with \$1.15 million of that total being distributed to more than 230 deserving organizations and non-profits through the foundation's grant program. In total, the foundation's grant program has issued more than \$6.2 million to worthy applicants in 15 years.

The 1993 Alabama graduate joined the Clemson staff prior to the 2003 season. In his first 20 years as an assistant or head coach, the Tigers finished in the top 25 of the polls 16 times and totaled 46 wins over top-25 teams.

In his 20 seasons at Clemson, a Tiger wide receiver has earned All-ACC status in 17 of those years, including a First or Second-Team All-ACC selection in 16 of those 20 seasons. In 2021, three of his protegés (Mike Williams, Tee Higgins, Renfrow) recorded 1,000-yard seasons in the NFL, while another (Chansi Stuckey) has gone on to serve as wide receivers coach at Baylor and Notre Dame.

The Alabama native has a reputation as one of the top recruiters in the nation. In 2006, he was listed as the No. 5 recruiter in the nation by Rivals. He signed 38 players in his five recruiting seasons as an assistant coach and was a major reason the 2008 recruiting class was No. 2 in the nation by ESPN when he signed 11 players. The 2020 class was a consensus top-three class, earn-

ing the top ranking from ESPN, No. 2 by Rivals and No. 3 in the 247 Composite.

Swinney received a commerce & business administration degree from Alabama in 1993 after lettering three times (1990-92). A walk-on who went on to earn a scholarship, Swinney was a wide receiver on Alabama's 1992 national championship team. He was also named Academic All-SEC along with being an SEC Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll member in 1990 and 1992.

After his playing career, he was a graduate assistant at Alabama from 1993-95. He received a master's degree in business administration from Alabama in 1995.

Swinney became a full-time assistant coach at Alabama in 1996 under Head Coach Gene Stallings and coached five seasons there on a full-time basis. He was assigned to coach the Crimson Tide's wideouts and tight ends in 1996, a season that saw Alabama win the SEC West Division title. The following year, he solely coached the tight ends.

During his time at Alabama, Swinney was a part of six teams with double-digit wins, five top-10 finishes, one national title (1992), three SEC championships (1989,92,99) and five SEC West Division titles (1992,93,94,96,99) as a player and coach.

Swinney married the former Kathleen Bassett in 1994. They have three sons, Will, Drew and Clay, and a daughterin-law, Mary Crosby, Drew's wife. Will played for Clemson from 2017-21, appearing in 69 games and holding for 558 career kicking points while also scoring two touchdowns of his own. Drew was a core special teams player for Clemson from 2018-22 who served as the starting holder in his final campaign and had 14 career receptions. Both Will and Drew earned All-ACC Academic selections during their playing careers. Clay is a redshirt freshman on the 2023 Tiger football team. #

STADIUM INFORMATION



ADA

ADA entrances are at gates 1, 5 and 13.

CLEAR BAGS

Fans are encouraged to not bring bags. Clear bags that do not exceed 12" x 6" x 12" are permissible.

CONCESSION STANDS

Concession stands open two hours prior to kickoff and remain open through the end of the fourth quarter.

FIRST AID

First-aid stations are located at portal TDK on the north upper deck, portal TDE on the south upper deck, portal J on the south concourse and the Meyer Family Clinic is located at portal T on the north concourse. Trained nurses and doctors are on hand. For emergencies, call 911.

LOST & FOUND

Report any item to the Clemson University Police Department.

METAL DETECTORS

Walkthrough metal detectors are at all stadium entrances.

PASSOUTS

Passouts are allowed at Memorial Stadium, but fans must go through the same level of security screening as upon entering. Fans must acquire a re-entry voucher upon exit and present the voucher and a valid game ticket for re-entry.

PROHIBITED ITEMS

Alcoholic beverages, artificial noisemakers, backpacks, bags (large) of any kind, banners, chairbacks with arms, coolers, flags, flagpoles, food and beverages from

outside, umbrellas, video cameras and weapons of any kind are prohibited at Memorial Stadium.

SENSORY INCLUSION

Sensory sensitivities or challenges with sensory regulation are often experienced by individuals (one in six) with autism, dementia, PTSD and other similar conditions. Clemson athletic staff are now sensory certified. Sensory bags are free for fans to check out at all guest services booths for anyone with sensory needs.

SOLICITATIONS

Solicitation for any purpose is prohibited at an athletic contest on the campus of Clemson University.

TIGER TRACKER

Fans can visit a guest service stand (gates 1, 5, 9, 11, 13, 16, 20) to receive a Tiger Tracker wristband for vulnerable guests. It helps identify guests in the event they become separated from the rest of their party.

TOBACCO POLICY

Clemson University is a tobacco-free campus. Tobacco products are prohibited on Clemson University property.

lemson's Memorial Stadium has been held in high esteem for many years. Whether it is players from the 1940s and 1950s, opposing players from the 1970s and 1980s or even professional players in the 1990s, the ambiance of this special setting is what college football is all about.

Clemson has finished in the top 20 in the country in average home attendance for 42 straight seasons. Clemson ranked third in the country and first in the ACC in total attendance in 2020 and led the conference (and finished 14th in the nation) in average attendance in 2022.

The storied edifice added to its legend when the first meeting of father-andson head coaches (Bowden Bowl I) took place before a record crowd of 86,092 in 1999. The legend was further enhanced from 2016-22, when the Tigers had an ACC-record 40-game home winning streak, tied for eighth longest in FBS history. Since the advent of the College Football Playoff in 2014, Clemson is 59-2 at home, tied for the highest home winning percentage in the nation.

The facility's mystique is derived from its many traditions, which date to its opening in the 1942 season, the legendary games and players and Clemson's corresponding rate of success. Entering 2023, the Tigers have totaled 334 wins in 81 years and have won 76.0 percent of the contests (334-103-7). Visiting defending national champions are 0-3 all-time at Memorial Stadium as well.

The stadium has definitely been good to the Tigers, but it was constructed against the advice of at least one coach. Before Jess Neely left for Rice after the

1939 season, he gave Clemson a message.

"Don't ever let them talk you into building a big stadium," he said. "Put about 10,000 seats behind the YMCA. That's all you'll ever need."

Instead of following Neely's advice, Clemson officials decided to build the new stadium in a valley on the western part of campus. The crews went to work, clearing, cutting, pouring and forming. On Sept. 19, 1942, Memorial Stadium opened with Clemson defeating Presbyterian by a score of 32-13. Those 20,000 seats installed for the opener would soon grow.

When the original part of the stadium was built in the early 1940s, much of

the work was done by scholarship student-athletes, including football players. The first staking out of the stadium was done by two members of the football team, A.N. Cameron and Hugh Webb. Webb returned to Clemson years later to become an architecture professor and Cameron went on to become a civil engineer in Louisiana.

The construction of Memorial Stadium did not proceed without problems. One afternoon during the clearing of the land, a young player proudly announced that he was not allergic to poison oak. He then proceeded to attack the poison oak with a swing blade, throwing the plants to and fro. The next day, the boy was swollen twice his size and was hospitalized.

There are many other stories about the stadium, including one that Frank Howard put a chew of tobacco in each corner of the stadium as the concrete was poured.

Howard said that the seeding of the grass caused a few problems.

"About 40 people and I laid sod on the field," he said. "After three weeks on July 15, we had only gotten about halfway through. I told them that it had taken us three weeks to get that far and I would give them three more weeks' pay for however long it took to finish. I also told them we would have 50 gallons of ice cream when we got through.

"After that, it took them three days to do the rest of the field. Then we sat down in the middle of the field and ate up that whole 50 gallons."

Howard said on the day of the first game in the stadium, "The gates were hung at $1\ \text{p.m.}$, and we played at $2\ \text{p.m.}$ "





In 1958, 18,000 sideline seats were added, and in 1960, 5,658 west end-zone seats were added in response to increasing attendance. With the large east endzone ("Green Grass" section), this expansion increased capacity to 53,000.

Later, upper decks were added to each side of the stadium as crowds swelled, the first in 1978 and the second in 1983. It increased capacity to over 80,000, which makes it one of

the largest on-campus stadiums in the country. In 2006, the WestZone was added.

The original part of Memorial Stadium was built at a cost of \$125,000, or \$6.25 per seat. Memorial Stadium's newest upper deck was finished in 1983 at a cost of \$13.5 million, or \$866 per seat.

In 2022, Clemson debuted several stadium enhancements. The videoboard received its first major upgrade since 2005, installing the new affectionately and

unofficially nicknamed "DaboTron" that measures 126 feet wide by 56.5 feet tall, eighth largest in the NCAA at the time of its installation. The eight main stadium light poles were updated to an LED system, allowing for light fixture control, spotlighting of Howard's Rock and higher-quality field lighting.

The west side of the stadium received a facelift with the addition of IPTAY's Masters Club, a 688-seat premium area on the concourse level. Clemson also

installed new signage honoring the alltime greats, championship seasons and backlighting of the traditional "Clemson Welcomes You to Death Valley" signage.

Clemson began Phase II of renovations after the 2022 season. The renovations included a new gameday locker room and a complete reimagining of Lot 5 and the Tiger Walk experience as a 365-day destination for Clemson fans.

Through the years, Memorial Stadium has become known as "Death Valley"

across the country. It was tagged by Presbyterian Head Coach Lonnie McMillian during the late 1940s. After bringing his teams to Clemson for many years and getting whipped, he said the place was like "Death Valley." A few years later, the name stuck.

In 1974, the playing surface was named Frank Howard Field for the legendary coach and his long service and dedication to Clemson. Luckily, it wasn't built behind the YMCA.





hat has been described by television commentator Brent Musburger as "the most exciting 25 seconds in college football" from a color and pageantry standpoint actually started out as a matter-of-fact entrance, mainly because of necessity.

The first 20,000 seats in Memorial Stadium were built and ready for use before the 1942 season, less than a year after Pearl Harbor was bombed and the U.S. was drawn into World War II.

The shortest entry into Memorial Stadium was a short walk down Williamson Road from Fike Fieldhouse's dressing rooms to a gate at the top of the Hill, located behind the east endzone. There were no dressing facilities inside the west endzone...there was only a giant clock, where the hands turned, and a scoreboard that was operated by hand.

Players would dress in Fike liamson Road, enter at the gate Fieldhouse, walk down Wilunderneath where the score-HOWARD'S ROCK FROM DEATH VALLEY, CA

board now stands and jog down the Hill for their warmup exercises. There was little fanfare, no cannon shot fired, no Tiger Paw flag and no "Tiger Rag" played...just the team making its entrance and lining up to do the side-straddle hop. That is the way things went for the next 25 years.

In 1964 or 1965, Sam Jones (Clemson class of 1919) made a trip to California. He stopped at a spot in Death Valley and picked up a white flint rock. After it traveled across the country, Jones presented the rock to legendary Head Coach Frank Howard as being from Death Valley, California to Death Valley, South Carolina.

The rock laid on Howard's office floor in Fike Fieldhouse for months. One day, he was cleaning up his office and told Gene Willimon (IPTAY executive secretary) to "take this rock and throw it over the fence or out in the ditch...do something with it, but get it out of my office!"

Willimon did not think that was the way a rock should be treated. After all, it had been brought over 1,900 miles by a very sincere Tiger fan.

By the mid 1960s, Memorial Stadium was living up to its moniker ("Death Valley"), because of the number of Tiger victories that had been recorded there. Actually, the name was first used by Lonnie McMillian, head coach at Presbyterian during the 1940s and 1950s.

McMillian and the other Blue Hose coaches before him opened each season by playing at Clemson. Seldom scoring (24 shutouts in 39 games) and with only three wins and four ties, his teams were getting "killed" by the Tigers regularly.

In 1948, McMillian made the remark to the press that he was taking his team to play Clemson in "Death Valley." An occasional reference to Memorial Stadium by that name could be heard for the next four years, but when Howard started calling it "Death Valley" in the 1950s, the name took off like wildfire. Clemson celebrated its 81st year in the "Valley" in 2022 with a 6-1 home record.

But getting back to Howard's Rock.

It was mounted on a pedestal at the top of the Hill on the east side of Memorial Stadium. It was unveiled Sept. 24, 1966, when Clemson played Virginia. The Tigers trailed by 18 points with 17 minutes remaining in the game and came back to win 40-35 on a 75-yard pass from Jimmy Addison to Jacky Jackson in the fourth quarter. That was quite a debut for Howard's Rock.

The team members started rubbing Howard's Rock prior to running down the Hill on Sept. 23, 1967, a day when Clemson defeated Wake Forest 23-6.

Prior to running down the Hill, Howard told his players, "If you're going to give

110 percent, you can rub that Rock. If you're not, keep your filthy hands off my

Howard told of the incident the following day on his television show, and the story became legend.

When Hootie Ingram succeeded Howard as head coach in 1970, he made the logical decision that the team would make its final entrance out of the new dressing room in the west endzone.

In all home games in 1970 and 1971 and the first four games of 1972 when the Tigers did not run down the Hill, their combined record was 6-9.

The seniors, led by Ben Anderson, decided to come down the Hill prior to the South Carolina game, the 1972 finale. The result, in a cold, freezing rain, was a 7-6 victory when Jimmy Williamson knocked down a two-point conversion attempt, which preserved the narrow win.


Clemson has made the entrance before every home contest since 1942, except for the years mentioned and the first game of 1973 (428 times entering 2023).

After final warmups, the team gathers in its dressing room under the west endzone stands for its final pregame instructions. Ten minutes prior to kickoff,

the players and coaches board multiple buses, ride around the north stands to the east endzone and disembark to the top of the Hill behind Howard's Rock.

At the appointed time, the cannon booms, and led by a giant Tiger Paw flag carried by cheerleaders and Rally Cats, the band forms two lines for the team to run between and strikes up "Tiger Rag." The frenzy starts in all sincerity and usually lasts three hours.

It is a tradition that has inspired Clemson players for many years. USA Today agreed, as it rated it the best entrance in the nation in 2017.

CLEMSON'S STATE-OF-THE-ART PLAYER FACILITY HOUSES ALL OPERATIONS FOR TIGER FOOTBALL AND IS THE NATIONAL STANDARD FOR EXCELLENCE.

ead Coach Dabo Swinney and Tiger athletics sought to build "the forever home of Clemson football" when envisioning what would become the Allen N. Reeves Football Complex, which opened in January 2017. Six years later, the facility remains among the gold standards of performance facilities, not just in college football, but in all of sports worldwide.

While discussion about the \$55 million facility spanning in excess of 142,000 square feet often centers around its bells and whistles, its design offers unparalleled functionality. During the facility's ideation, Clemson staff toured more than 35 sports performance facilities, pulling the best, most innovative ideas from every location and using the gleaned insight to create what 247Sports ranked as the nation's No. 1 facility as recently as 2021.

Upon entry into the main lobby of Allen N. Reeves Football Complex, the first thing visitors see are national championship trophies sitting in front of a video

screen flanked by massive trophy cases housing additional hardware from Clemson's history. The lobby also displays a

scaled replica of Howard's Rock and the Hill from Memorial Stadium, which also includes a button to play audio of Brent Musburger describing college football's grandest entrance prior to Clemson's 2013 game against Georgia.



At the behest of Swinney's original design, immediately visible on the lobby's right side is the home of P.A.W. Journey, a program that cultivates leadership on the team through four main pillars...personal growth, life skills and community service, career and professional development and former player engagement under the guidance of former All-American Jeff Davis.

Next to it, a corridor lined with all of the rings won in Clemson history leads to Hendrix Family Paw Bistro, the bestin-class dining facility whose cuisine is cited by many current and former players as their favorite part of the facility.

Despite national praise for the young facility, Clemson has not rested in its pursuit of making the facility the nation's standard-bearer. In the last several years, the Tigers have continued to invest in the facility's ability to meet the needs of the modern student-athlete, both on and off the field.

In 2023, Clemson completed the addition of Allen N. Reeves Clemson Athletics Branding Institute, a 12,000-square-foot, two-story area on the west end of Betty Sheppard Poe & William Maxwell Poe Indoor Facility and steps from Clemson's spacious weight room.

The institute, described in detail on pages 84 and 85 and known colloquially as "The CAB," contains two spacious photo and video studios, a customizable lighting grid, an audio studio, editing space, office space, meeting space and more to provide on-site resources for student-athletes choosing to pursue sponsorship opportunities and content generation. The lower lever of the facility is also home to Smart Family Media Center for press conferences.

A balcony on the top level of the institute overlooks Poe Indoor Facility, an 80,000-square-foot, \$10 million structure completed in late 2012. Clemson updated the facility in the spring of 2023, replacing the decade-old playing surface with a Hellas Matrix Helix monofilament synthetic turf system with RealFill rubber atop its Cushdrain drain-

age and shock pad. The surface helps to minimize wear and tear on Tiger players while allowing the team to continue its preparation in the event of inclement weather.

The facility also received an aesthetic and functional facelift in 2023, with new photos and graphics adorning the walls and the addition of new storage areas for equipment staff. The facility also includes raised video platforms, a game-ready scoreboard, four play clocks, a videoboard and a sound system.

A year earlier, Clemson invested significantly in the holistic health and wellness of its student-athletes with the completion of its "100 Yards of Wellness" area inside Allen N. Reeves Football Complex in 2022. Detailed further on pages 88-89, the project has become a central hub and hotbed of student-athlete activity as modern athletes continue to buy into the concept of "prehab," load management and active recovery. The collaboration of Clemson's Director of





Applied Science Dr. Alex Bina and Head Athletic Trainer Pat Richards, two young, dynamic leaders in their respective fields, has kept Clemson at the forefront as one of the world's top sports science facilities.

In addition to being a free resource for Clemson's active student-athletes, the space has become a draw for Tiger alumni in the NFL. With Clemson's professional-grade-or-better training areas, Tigers in the NFL have routinely returned and brought their NFL teammates to train in Clemson's facilities during summers between minicamp and training camp. The facility, including the 100

Yards of Wellness area, has inspired both awe and jealousy from NFL players who played collegiately at other programs.




Adjacent to the dining area and 100 Yards of Wellness are the outdoor player village and indoor player lounge. The


outdoor area includes a nine-hole miniature golf course, an artificial-surface wiffle ball diamond, a sand volleyball

facility, pickleball court, horseshoe pit, fountain with a Tiger Paw monument, outdoor kitchen and lounge area.

The indoor player lounge is complete with a two-lane bowling alley, Pop-A-Shot, three different video-game console centers, multiple ping-pong and pool tables, a shuffleboard table and Super Bikes motorcycle arcade game. Adjacent to the ping-pong tables is a golf simulator, where studentathletes can play many great golf courses from around the world and learn the game (and professional networking tool) in a comfortable setting.

Down the corridor from the golf simulator is an expanded and renovated barber shop with a pedicure station and massage chairs. The shop's





science graduate who served as an assistant superintendent on the renovation project prior to his final season at Clemson. Next to the barber shop is the nap room, designed to offer players a designated space to combat one of the largest obstacles to good mental health...lack of

Clemson's enormous weight room covers 23,000 square feet and debuted as the country's largest football-only weight room. The entire team can work out at once in the area that includes 20 inlay platforms, numerous machines, fatbells, kettlebells and dumbbells, as well as a well-equipped cardio deck overlooking the lifting area. It also houses the offices of Director of Performance Nutrition Meaghan Turcotte and her staff as well as a nutritional fuel bar.

Clemson's hydrotherapy areas include a large horizontal 47-degree cold tub that can handle 61 players at one time. Next to the locker room, it sits adjacent to the hydrotherapy portion of the 100 Yards of Wellness area that hosts a lap pool and four therapy pools.

The second floor houses offices and meeting spaces for Clemson football personnel, including Swinney's office, which is in the corner with accrued career memorabilia that serves for invited guests as a de facto museum of Clemson football and the future College Football Hall of Famer's career journey.

seats 180 people. The second level also features a movie theater with 20 lounge chairs.

But most famously, connecting the second-floor meeting spaces down to the locker room, weight room and prac-

tice fields is Clemson's renowned slide, which represents the most efficient

means to get Tiger players from meetings to practice in a timely manner.





he "Best" in "Best is the Standard" got better in early 2023, as Clemson opened Allen N. Reeves Clemson Athletics Branding Institute to provide Clemson student-athletes best-in-class facilities and resources for branding, marketing, sponsorship, content creation and more.

Attached to the west end of Poe Indoor Facility, the new 12,000-squarefoot, two-story facility houses two photo and video studios, an audio studio, editing space, a conference room and the office of Name, Image and Likeness Coordinator C.D. Davies, all intended to provide on-site resources for studentathletes choosing to pursue sponsorship opportunities and content generation. The facility is also home to Smart Family Media Center

From its ideation, "The CAB," as Head Coach Dabo Swinney nicknamed it, has been intended as a destination for student-athletes seeking branding guidance and resources to help elevate themselves among a crowded marketplace. "The CAB" is a part of Clemson

athletics NIL programming, dubbed "Reign."

"We're going to call it 'The CAB' because what does a cab do?...It gives you


a lift to your destination," said Swinney.

it because it's a living, breathing space where our guys know they can go for expertise.

"If you're injured, you go to the training room. If you want to get stronger, you go to the weight room. This was an opportunity for our guys to know that if they want help with branding and sponsorship and NIL and tax education and finances and all of these very real-world issues, you go to 'The CAB,' where we have a dedicated space with people ready to help them."

According to Davies, that real-world experience is indispensable and a part of Clemson's educational mission.

"This is a great education for them," said Davies of the opportunity for student-athletes to monetize their name, image and likeness. "They're getting an education that a lot of business schools don't get to give young people as far as actually being in the midst of doing these deals and negotiating for themselves, and we're giving them all the tools we can to make sure our players are in control of these transactions."





At the top of the stairs to the second floor of the new facility is a conference room overlooking Clemson's indoor practice field, providing a location for potential sponsors and collectives like Tiger-Impact and Dear Old Clemson to meet with Clemson student-athletes.

Down the walkway overlooking the practice field sit three studio spaces for content creation. The first includes a 625-square-foot infinity wall plus permanently installed customizable lighting to provide Clemson content creators and others quick, turnkey options for professional-grade studio space. It also includes a feature wall adorned with a neon-backlit Clemson logo.

The second studio is a blank canvas to provide greater flexibility for creation of custom photo and video sets. The third is a soundproof studio complete with top-of-the-line RODECaster equipment for the production of audio content, such as podcasts.

The ground level is home to Smart Family Media Center, which serves as a central hub for Clemson's award-winning media operations. The 1,200-square-foot center includes wired workspace for 40 media members to work comfortably and efficiently while interviewing Tiger personnel seated in front of the stage's 163-inch video branding wall, which can be customized for each student-athlete.

The creation of Smart Family Media Center is the latest illustration of Clemson's larger commitment to serving local and national media members and helping them tell the stories of Tiger studentathletes.

Clemson's athletic communications staff has won 10 Super 11 awards, presented annually by the Football Writers Association of America to the FBS' most helpful sports information departments, tied for the most in the award's history. The Tiger coaches' and student-athletes' helpfulness and authenticity with the media resulted in Clemson becoming the first program to earn the honor in eight straight years, doing so from 2015-22.

At the entry point to the top level is the office for Davies, whose addition during the summer of 2022 gave Clemson student-athletes a direct line to a resource with more than 30 years

of executive leadership in the financial services sector.

"I guarantee you there is no one in the country that has someone like C.D. Davies as their NIL Coordinator," stated Swinney. "He is overkill qualified, but it is a blessing for us at Clemson and a blessing for our team. He's been a CEO at major companies and corporations all throughout his career.

"This is all elementary to him compared to the world he comes from, but to our players, he is a major asset when it comes to finances, taxes, contracts, LLCs...anything that could come up in this space...for them to be able to have a good resource and sounding board and guidance and fulfill what we're trying to do, which is protect our players, train our players and truly educate them so they can maximize and navigate this NIL space."

In addition to his Clemson role, Davies serves as the chief executive officer for Figure Acquisition Corporation. His impressive business background also includes successful tenures as the CEO of CitiMortgage and head of Citi Global Mortgage, CEO of LendingTree, Wachovia Mortgage and QBE First as well as the head of Capital One Home Loans.

Building construction and renovations for "The CAB" also included the creation of updated spaces for professional scouts and for returning Tiger football players. The pro scout room has nine workstations for NFL scouts to watch tape, write reports and meet with Clemson personnel. A few yards away is the NFL locker room, a dedicated space for NFL players to dress and shower upon their returns to Clemson to train in the offseason.



lemson's path to the forefront of elite athlete recovery started with a culture change. For generations, despite the best efforts and cheeriest dispositions of athletic trainers, an unfortunate mis-

conception lingered...the athletic training room is for the injured, and for the injured, the athletic training room is not a happy place to be.

"We really wanted to get away from the mentality of the 'Training Room'," said Head Coach Dabo Swinney. "We wanted to get away from the idea that it was only for guys who are injured and don't want to be in there."

Enter Jeanne & Brian Penner 100 Yards of Wellness, Clemson's new \$4.9-million wellness space at Allen N. Reeves Football Complex spanning roughly 300 feet in length that has become a central hub of activity and major point of pride for Clemson football.

Completed in 2022, 100 Yards of Wellness represents the natural evolution of Tiger football's long-time commitment to student-athlete health and wellness. By literally and figuratively breaking down walls that divided the focus areas, the new space combines Clemson's athletic training and rehabilitation expertise with its continued innovation in active recovery and applied science.

"Now it's a total wellness commitment, the mental side, the wellness side, the 'prehab' side, the applied science side, your stretching, your nutrition...all of it combined in this one big space," said Swinney. "It has created an environment where the guys want to be there all the time."

In 2018, Clemson enclosed what was previously an outdoor patio area to create Clemson Applied Science Lab (or CASL, pronounced "castle"). The area served a two-fold mission. It served as the hub of Clemson's data and performance analysis as well as a space for "prehab" and recovery.



As Clemson student-athletes bought in, the space became one of Allen N. Reeves Football Complex's most heavily trafficked areas. With demand quickly outgrowing the footprint, Clemson embarked upon the renovation and expansion immediately after the team's final practice of the spring in 2022.

Whereas walls previously divided the athletic training room from the recovery space, the new open-concept area features Clemson's medical diagnostic and treatment area to the north and the recovery space to the south, bisected by a nutrition bar. Visitors are often surprised to find an almost club-like atmosphere with upbeat music and moving colored lights creating a welcoming environment rather than a stale, clini-

cal one.

The center has created additional collaboration between Clemson's athletic training staff, led by Head Athletic Trainer Pat Richards, and Clemson's applied science group, pioneered by Dr. Alex Bina.

"There is no one in the country I would rather have caring for

our student-athletes in these positions than the duo of Pat Richards and Alex Bina," said Swinney. "Pat is incredibly well respected and is a young, dynamic leader in the athletic training industry.

"Alex is an example of blooming where you're planted. He was a student volunteer who went from working from a laptop on a weight room stool to creating an applied science department that operates college football's premier recovery facility. Those two are the best in the business, and that shows in how much our players love them and trust them."

Clemson's treatment and athletic training room area includes all requisite athletic training resources, including a diagnostic office with a full digital X-

ray space and diagnostic ultrasound, general medical exam room, 30 yards of turf and hydrotherapy areas, including two underwater treadmills. Among the features of Clemson's recovery center are:

- A cryotherapy chamber for muscle recovery through extreme cold temperature exposure.
- A sensory deprivation float tank that houses 1,200 pounds of Epsom salt dissolved in water at skin temperature to remove athletes from light, sound and some gravitational force.
- Infrared hyperthermic Cocoon pods for far-infrared light therapy and vibrational massage.

 Photobiomodulation therapy beds that leverage multiple wavelengths of infrared light to reduce oxidative stress.

- A hyperbaric chamber to create a pressurized environment for concentrated oxygen intake.
- Numerous massage chairs, including both percussive massage and hydromassage options.
- Percussive Hypervolt massage guns.
- Dedicated tables and space for practioner-assisted stretching, percussive massage gun therapy, and Normatec compressive sleeves provided to each player prior to the season.
- Functional testing equipment to obtain objective information on studentathlete muscle and joint function that can be used for injury prevention and return-to-play purposes.

The renovations also included updating the outdoor basketball court into an indoor basketball court, which, in addi-

tion to being a source of friendly competition, now can be transformed following games into a movement studio for active recovery modalities like yoga.

Clemson Applied Science Lab also became a nap destination, but the high-energy vibes and heavy traffic of the subsequent 100 Yards of Wellness space required an additional solution. Atop a portion of the south end of the recovery area is what the team calls "Tranquility Tower," an upstairs, quiet location with much of the same recovery equipment, but in a serene, peaceful environment conducive to rest and away from the social activity of the main floor.

Clemson's recovery resources have become a source of envy for its former players. Two-time All-American and NFL wide receiver Sammy Watkins remarked to Swinney that he routinely spends more than \$50,000 annually on services to maintain his body now provided to Clemson student-athletes for free.

lemson Applied Science Lab ("The CASL") has a very simple mission... "Carry out the vision of the head football coach by providing confidence to studentathletes that their physical and technical development is constantly advancing."

Director of Applied Science Dr. Alex Bina has done everything in his power to ensure that those words ring true and Tiger student-athletes are given every possible opportunity to both improve performance and physically recover, using any and all modern technologies available.

The two key focuses of "The CASL" are maximizing performance and expediting recovery.

The ultimate goal is quantifying human performance. Once the body and its abilities are put into numerical terms, it becomes considerably easier to determine what needs to be improved and the best possible route to enhance it.

Throughout the yearly training cycle, athletes are evaluated using technologies that leverage motion capture, force plates, sensory station, augmented reality, force transducers and GPS sensors in order to quantify athletic development. Through this process, an athlete's body composition, movement efficiency, vertical jump performance, cognitive reasoning skills, specific muscle strength, joint range of motion and on-field speed become clear to coach and athlete alike.

By building a database of the "Clemson Effect" on athlete development and performance, the Clemson football staff can continue to build championship

squads for future generations of Tiger players.

Not only does "The CASL" provide coaches and student-athletes with quantitative data with which they can analyze performance, it also is a key resource for student-athletes to use during the recovery process and injury risk mitigation protocols. Bina stressed that quick and healthy recovery is the priority of the staff at "The CASL."

The path to success in recovery is a two-step process. The first is communication and collaboration between the student-athlete and his strength & conditioning coach, nutrition and sports medicine experts and his sports psychologist. The second is using the established baseline scores of the student-athlete as targets for return-to-play protocols and as a foundation for injury-prevention training.

In 2022, through a collaborative effort with the sports medicine staff, "The CASL" launched an injury-risk-mitigation protocol that leverages data analysis to inform athlete-specific interventions. After each training cycle (winter, spring, summer), the entire roster is evaluated for strength and mobility deficiencies or imbalances. These deficiencies inspire tune-up exercises carried out by the sports medicine staff to attack issues before they become long-term injuries.

The injury-risk-mitigation program carried out in "The CASL" was made possible through a cornerstone gift donated by Clemson alum and former Student Athletic Trainer Brook T. Smith

('89) to ensure that Clemson studentathletes can benefit from leading innovations occurring in human performance development.

Bina has always been interested in bioengineering, which is the degree he earned from Penn State. Bina, who received his Ph.D. from Clemson, is implementing a simple plan, which is to "learn how the body works as a machine and put students in a position to manipulate that machine to improve recovery and performance."

Tiger players have been responding very positively to the work that Bina and

"The CASL" have done for them, and as a program, Clemson has seen tremendous success in terms of both its players' short and long-term recoveries.

Bina wants to ensure that "everything possible is being done for them" to get them back to their peak performance as healthily and as quickly as possible.

As far as long-term and overarching goals and aspirations for "The CASL," Bina offered the following.

"When we talk about, 'Best is the Standard,' that means in all ways possible. This is just another piece of that puzzle."



The facility is attached to the indoor football facility and faces the outdoor practice facility, making for the most convenient and efficient facility in the nation.









hen Nieri Family Student-Athlete Enrichment Center officially opened on the west side of Memorial Stadium on Aug. 9, 2017, it became the new home of Clemson student-athlete enrichment services. The facility was a result of a \$2.5 million cornerstone gift pledged to Tiger athletics by Michael (Clemson '86) and Robyn Nieri and their family.

Nieri Family Student-Athlete Enrichment Center houses 25 full-time staff members in athletic academic advising, educational services and student-athlete development, as well as multiple graduate assistants and over 100 student employees who serve as content tutors and strategic mentors.

It is the mission of the entire staff to help our student-athletes succeed and maintain high standards academically, to reach their goals in the classroom and with career planning and to prepare them for a future in the working world.

In addition to staff offices, the 43,000 square-foot facility includes 44 tutor rooms, abundant study hall space, a computer lab, a large auditorium and several quiet spaces for free study. In 2023, Nieri CAB (Clemson Athletics Branding Institute) was constructed and four mental health and sport psychologist professionals joined the staff.

The center and its staff offer countless resources for Clemson studentathletes to enable and enhance their academic success. Athletic academic

coordinators meet weekly with students to assist in course tracking, to discuss academic progress and to teach productive classroom behaviors, organization, time management and study habits. Coordinators also support the student-athletes in major exploration along with registration and course selection, which includes priority registration.

The educational services staff develops and implements individualized aca-

demic success plans to help identified Clemson student-athletes strengthen their academic skills through research-

based learning strategies and study skills. This department also trains and works with content-specific tutors and strategic mentors to assist Tiger student-athletes in their specific areas of study, as well as to provide additional support as the student-athletes grow their organization and time-management skills.

The Tiger student-athlete development program is dedicated to the holistic development of Clemson student-athletes, propelling them toward success, not only during college, but in life, through career development, community service and outreach, leadership devel-

opment and personal enhancement and

responsibility.

Student-athletes are prepared for career readiness via professional development programs, internship placement, resumé assistance and mock interviews. They are encouraged to establish partnerships with the community by participating in individual and team service opportunities and outreach projects. Additional programming supports studentathletes' development as individuals and leaders.

Since its inception in 1991, the department, initially located in Vickery Hall on Clemson's campus until the move to Nieri Family Student-Athlete Enrichment Center in 2017, has seen its name and location evolve over 32 years. However, its continued commitment and dedication to Clemson student-athletes and their pursuit of excellence has remained unwavering. #



A BOOSTER INCLUDES ANYONE WHO:

INTERACTION WITH CURRENT STUDENT-ATHLETES

CAN'T



Provide ANY type of gift or benefit to a Clemson student-athlete or his/ her family members. Examples include money in any form, discounts, lodging, transportation, meals, gifts (of any value) and complimentary tickets.



Use a current studentathlete's name, image or likeness (NIL) to promote products or services without a quid pro quo (i.e., something for something) arrangement. For example, extra benefits remain impermissible. However, student-athlete may receive compensation for use of his/her NIL.



Provide summer employment for the studentathlete (with prior compliance approval), so long as he/she is paid for work actually performed, paid for hours actually worked, paid at the same rate as anyone doing the same job or not used in promotions for an employer.



Collect autographs and photos with our team. However, no payment or gifts may be involved unless there is NIL activity with a guid pro guo. Also, NIL activity must be separate and distinct from team-mandated activities.

ulie Coin, a three-time All-American on Clemson's Final Four women's tennis teams of 2004 and 2005, was inducted into the Clemson Ring of Honor this weekend. Coin is the second women's tennis player to be presented with the highest honor bestowed by the Clemson athletic department, as All-American Susan Hill was inducted in 2011.

The Clemson women's tennis squads of 2004 and 2005 are still the only women's athletics teams in school history to reach the Final Four of an NCAA Tournament in any sport.

As a sophomore in 2003-04, Coin won the Frank Howard Award, the department-wide accolade for bringing honor to Clemson. The following year, she was named IPTAY Athlete-of-the-Year, another department-wide award that takes into account athletic and academic excellence

"Julie Coin lives up to her name...she is a jewel," said former Clemson Head Coach Nancy Harris. "She has been a great ambassador for Clemson, her country (France) and her family.

"Julie and her teammates were part of the legacy team at Clemson, and I am happy they are all coming back to be a part of this event this weekend.

"Julie was a quiet leader who was smart as a whip. We would be on a road trip and all of a sudden she would yell from the back of the van, 'Nance, you just missed a turn'."

Coin graduated with a degree in mathematics in just three years and was a three-time member of the ACC Academic Honor Roll, including 2003-04, when she was on the Dean's List.

Coin finished her Clemson career with a 101-20 singles record. Her 83.5 winning percentage is still second to Hill's among players who were on the Tiger team more than one year. Coin is the only Clemson women's tennis player to reach the Elite Eight of the NCAA Individual Singles Tournament twice. She also finished 90-27 in doubles play in her three years.

As a freshman in 2003, Coin was the 2003 ITA Southeast Region doubles champion and was named All-ACC. She posted a 31-6 singles record as Clemson's No. 1 singles player. Harris knew she had a talented player from the first time she saw her at Clemson.

"I still remember the first day I practiced with her at Hoke Sloan Tennis Center," recalled Harris. "She was attacking the ball on every shot, which is what great players do. At one point, I brought her to the net and told her she could one day be a top-60 player in the world.



"She smiled back and went right back to work. I think I put a little seed in her that day.

"Julie had a ferocious appetite to learn and live up to a high standard. She came so alive on the tennis court and gave everything she had."

In 2004. Coin won two individual ACC championships, one in singles and one in doubles, and was named MVP of the ACC. She finished the year as the

and reached the Final Four of the NCAA Singles Tournament. Her 32-9 record included a 4-1 record in the NCAA Individual Tournament.

That 2004 season, Clemson won the ACC championship and had a 26-4 overall record, including a 7-0 mark in the ACC. The team was ranked No. 5 in the final poll, still the highest ranking in program history.

No. 8 player in the nation in the ITA poll



In her final season (2005), Coin posted a 38-5 singles record and 32-8 doubles mark. She was named an All-American in singles and doubles competition and reached the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament. She was ranked No. 2 in the final ITA singles rankings and reached the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament.

During her career, Clemson had a 67-19 overall record, including 22-3 in ACC play. Twenty-two of the wins were over top-25 teams.

"What made her a great player was that she was tall and fast," explained Harris. "She was like a gazelle on the tennis court. But, she was very powerful. Her serve was clocked at 120 miles per hour

"She was also very coachable and very focused. When we had meetings in the locker room, she would take notes and listen '

Coin turned professional in 2005 and retired in 2016. She is now a teaching professional in France, where she lives with her husband and children.

Coin's most famous accomplishment as a professional took place at the 2008 U.S. Open, where, as the No. 188 player in the world, she defeated top-ranked Ana Ivanovic. It marked the first time a man or woman had come through qualifying to defeat the top seed in the first or second round of the U.S. Open.

"I will always remember going to the media area with her after she won," added Harris. "There were two media sessions going on, and Rafa Nadal was in the other room. Just about everyone was with Julie." #

nyone who has played or watched sports enough has heard, repeated or firmly believed the old adage, "ball is life."

It will be one more avenue through which they can add value in the form of wealth, influence and impact in the present and future.

From the symposium, Adam Randall, a P.A.W. Journey ambassador who serves his community at home in Horry County through his family's Randall Foundation Inc., participated in this past summer's P.A.W. It was important for Carter to experience enjoyment in a new way during his Spring Break by personally growing through lessons learned from some of the leading companies and professionals in athletics, entertainment, technology, marketing and real estate about how they turned their dreams into a reality in the work they do every day. 2023 BRIAN DAWKINS LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD RECIPIENT

PATRICK SAPP

ince 2013, Head Coach Dabo Swinney has presented the Brian Dawkins Lifetime Achievement Award to a former Tiger who has consistently demonstrated the qualities of leadership, community service and other high qualities that are consistent with excellence since graduating from Clemson.

Dawkins won the first Clemson Lifetime Achievement Award and has continued to represent the university with dignity in his post-playing career. He became the first former Tiger inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2018.

This year's recipient is truly someone close to Dawkins' heart. You could make the case that Dawkins would not have come to Clemson had it not been for Patrick Sapp. In fact, Dawkins made that statement during the announcement of the award.

Sapp was a highly recruited quarterback from Jacksonville, Fla. in the early 1990s. In the process of recruiting Sapp, Clemson coaches became impressed with Dawkins, Sapp's close friend and teammate on the gridiron and the basketball court at William M. Raines High School.

This long-standing close relationship was one reason Sapp was emotional about winning the award, especially the day of the Clemson football postseason banquet last January.

"I was surprised how emotional I was at the banquet," admitted Sapp. "Seeing all the people there who had meant a lot to me for many years at Clemson gave me a lot of self-reflection. Having grown up with Brian, I was honored to celebrate his image by winning this award.

"Brian and I go back to the seventh grade. We rode the same school bus in middle school and played on the same



AAU teams and the same basketball and football teams.

"But on top of that, my family was at the banquet, including my son, Josh, who is on the Clemson football team now, and my youngest son, Miles. It was a surreal moment."

In 1992, they both entered Clemson, Sapp as a quarterback and Dawkins as a defensive back.

Sapp must be considered one of the finest all-around athletes at Clemson since college football adopted the two-platoon substitution system in 1965. In the last 50 years, Sapp is one of just six players to start over the course of a season on both sides of the ball. Sapp is the only Tiger on record to total 2,000+

passing yards on offense and 50+ tackles on defense in a career.

He also played on the Clemson basketball team for Head Coach Rick Barnes during the 1994-95 season.

A quarterback for the Tigers his first three years, Sapp led Clemson to a 33-point win over a top-20 North Carolina squad as a freshman in 1992, then threw the game-winning touchdown pass to Terry Smith to beat Kentucky by one point in the 1993 Peach Bowl.

In 1995, Sapp moved to linebacker, where he started 12 games for the Gator Bowl team. He finished that season fifth on the squad in tackles (53), including nine tackles for loss. In the spring of 1996, despite playing just one season

on defense, Sapp was the No. 50 overall selection of the NFL draft by the San Diego Chargers.

Patrick Sapp

Sapp played the 1996 and 1997 seasons with the Chargers and the 1998 and 1999 seasons with the Arizona Cardinals. He finished his career with 100 tackles, including a career-high 35 tackles during his final season.

After graduation, Sapp returned to Clemson to work in university administration in 2006 as director of major gifts & alumni engagement. He served in that role for 14 years.

Today, he is vice president of development for Rosemont Holdings Skore Hotel. He is also CEO of Universal Therapeutic Services in Greenville, S.C., a company that partners with the community to provide human resource services, including mental health.

Additionally, Sapp has been involved in many community service projects. He served as chair of Leaders R Us in Greenville. He is the co-founder of the Greenville Red Raider Youth Organization and is a founder of the One Clemson Board. He also served as a board member of Greenville Technical College and serves as board chair for the Brian Dawkins Impact Foundation.

THE "HURRICANE GAME" CAME DOWN TO THE FINAL MINUTE, WITH CLEMSON PRESERVING THE TWO-POINT VICTORY. BY TIM BOURRET

Editor's Note - For each program in 2023, Tim Bourret chronicles an epic game in the history of Memorial Stadium. Today is the fifth installment.

hen you ask Clemson fans for a list of the epic games they have seen in the history of Memorial Stadium, many stand out, and I have tried to bring back those memories through this program series in 2023.

However, one game that is on the list for all rabid Tiger fans 15 years of age and older is the Oct. 3, 2015 game against Notre Dame. It had all the elements you are looking for in a game you will remember for the rest of your life.

First, it had pregame hype. Notre Dame was ranked No. 6 in the AP poll and the Tigers were No. 12, as both teams were undefeated. The matchup attracted ESPN College GameDay.

Second, the weather was a contributing factor. Hurricane Joaquin was scheduled to hit the Upstate over the weekend and bring upwards of 10 inches of rain to the area. The guest picker for ESPN College GameDay was Jim Cantore of The Weather Channel.

For Clemson and Notre Dame fans, this game will forever be known as the "Hurricane Game."

Third, the talent level for both teams was off the charts. A look to the rosters shows that 27 Fighting Irish players and 25 Tiger players went on to play in the NFL, and most became NFL starters. As far as players who played in the 2015 game, 20 Clemson players and 19 Notre Dame players went on to play in the NFL, including both quarterbacks, Deshaun Watson and DeShone Kizer.

And fourth, this game lived up to the hype with a thrilling comeback that came down to the last minute.

It did not appear this would be a close game in the first half. Watson ran 38 yards on the first play of the game and later in the drive completed a sixyard touchdown pass to Jordan Leggett. On the next possession, Watson hit Artavis Scott on a 13-yard touchdown pass for a 14-0 Tiger advantage.

Notre Dame got the ball to start the second half, but on the kickoff, C.J. Sanders was hit by Tiger placekicker Ammon Lakip, one of the few caused fumbles in school history by a kicker. The Tigers recovered and Watson ran 21

yards for a score to give Clemson a 21-3 lead.

Meanwhile, Clemson's defense was doing an outstanding job, holding the Fighting Irish ground attack well below its rushing average thanks to nine tackles for loss. Shaq Lawson, in a personal matchup with Notre Dame All-America offensive tackle Ronnie Stanley, had 3.5 of those nine tackles for loss.

Notre Dame is famous for its comebacks, and the Fighting Irish put together a good one in the fourth quarter.

C.J. Prosise caught a 56-yard touchdown pass from Kizer. Prosise, who came into the game with 600 rushing yards, the most ever by a Notre Dame player in the first four games of a season, was held to 50 yards on 15 carries in the game. However, he finished with four receptions for 100 yards, the first Notre Dame running back to have 100 yards receiving in a game since 1970.

Mysteriously, Notre Dame Head Coach Brian Kelly decided to go for two points. But a pass intended for Corey Robinson, son of former NBA great David Robinson (who was at the game), was incomplete, and the Tigers led 21-9.

The Tigers then drove for a Greg Huegel field goal and a 24-9 lead with 10:56 left in the game.

The Fighting Irish started completing crossing routes and Kizer scored on a three-yard run with 9:03 left to bring the score to 24-16.

Notre Dame's defense, led by future pro Jaylon Smith, stopped Clemson in the fourth quarter. But Notre Dame turned the ball over twice in the last seven minutes. B.J. Goodson had an interception and a recovered fumble in that time period. The fumble was committed by wideout Chris Brown, the only South Carolina native on Notre Dame's roster.

Incredibly, it was the first time a Tiger had two takeaways in the fourth quarter of a game decided by a touchdown or less since 1979, when Terry Kinard accomplished the feat...at Notre Dame.

Notre Dame got the ball back for one last chance and made the most of it. Kizer, who finished with 321 passing yards, drove the Fighting Irish to the Clemson one. He hit wide receiver Torii Hunter Jr., son of the great major leaguer, with a one-yard passing touchdown with just seven seconds left.

With the score 24-22, the Fighting Irish went for two points. Kelly called a running play with Kizer going to his right. It made sense, because Notre Dame had an offensive line that featured four future NFL players, Stanley, Mike McGlinchey, Nick Martin and Alex Bars. But Clemson had four future NFL players on its defensive line in Carlos Watkins, Christian Wilkins, Lawson and Kevin Dodd. Watkins, with help from Ben Boulware and others, stopped Kizer short of the endzone.

Clemson recovered the onside kick and the Tigers had a landmark victory, the first epic win of Clemson's six-year run in the College Football Playoff.

"Tonight was BYOG...bring your own guts," said Head Coach Dabo Swinney in his postgame interview on the field. "They brought some guts and heart, and they never quit until the last play." #

CHANSI STUCKEY

n Jan. 13, 2022, the day after he was named the new wide receivers coach at Notre Dame, I received a text from Chansi Stuckey.

"Where should I live?"

It certainly brought a smile to my face, because not only was Stuckey one of my favorite players to deal with when it came to media relations, he also worked as an intern in the sports information office for a semester.

Now, he was going to be full-time coach at my alma mater.

In less than two years, Stuckey has been a key member of Head Coach Marcus Freeman's staff as wide receivers coach, helping the Fighting Irish to a 9-4 record in 2022 and a 7-2 mark so far in 2023


It has been an interesting journey for Stuckey, who turned 40 one month ago.

I knew Stuckey would be successful regardless of his career path just by the way he interacted with the other student assistants in our office. He was inquisitive about the job and he was not going through the motions for course credit.

"I learned a lot," said Stuckey. "I didn't know anything about sports information when I started. I thought all that information came out of thin air. I saw a lot of work by many people involved."

Stuckey came to Clemson from Warner Robins, Ga. and was recruited to Clemson by Assistant Coach Rodney Allison. He also considered Tennessee, where he was recruited by Woody Mc-Corvey, now Head Coach Dabo Swinney's right-hand man when it comes to the administration of the Tiger program.

Stuckey had a great career, earning All-ACC honors as a wide receiver, and was an all-purpose player during



his time as a Tiger player. During his freshman year (2003), he was a reserve quarterback in seven games and had two passing touchdowns. He scored the last touchdown on a 33-yard run in Clemson's 63-17 win at South Carolina.

He further showed his talents as a punt returner and is one of the few players in Tiger history with a passing touchdown (2), rushing touchdown (1), receiving touchdown (7) and punt return touchdown (1).

He is 15th in Tiger history in career catches (141), two more than Clemson Ring of Honor member Jerry Butler had.

"One of my most memorable moments at Clemson was the punt return against Texas A&M."

The Tigers won the game 25-24, and Stuckey's 47-yard punt return was the Tigers' only touchdown of the game.

Stuckey had seven 100-yard receiving games, including 11 receptions for 156 yards in 2005 against a Florida State team that went on to win the ACC championship.

After the 2006 season, Stuckey was drafted in the seventh round by the New York Jets, and he went on to a four-year NFL career. He finished with 106 receptions for 1,062 yards and five touchdowns in the NFL.

After his playing days were over, Stuckey moved to California and searched for his next calling. He spent time with former Clemson teammate Jock McKissic, who was a television actor. Stuckey spent some time in that profession as well.

His life path changed in January 2019, and his alma mater's success on the gridiron had a lot to do with it.

"I was living in California and Clemson was in the national championship game against Alabama in Santa Clara. Jock and I decided to go to the game and we met with Coach Swinney.

"Coach Swinney brought us in to meet the team and all the families. I had not thought about going into coaching at that point, but meeting those players and seeing the family atmosphere again made me think.

"When you are in the NFL, you see coaches grinding and looking at film to all hours of the morning. That trip to the national title game tugged at my heart. I couldn't stop thinking about it."

Stuckey came to Clemson in the winter of 2019 for Junior Day, and he talked seriously about coming to Clemson in some capacity. Swinney had one position open for a video graduate assistant. "Coach Swinney didn't think I would take it. He had talked to me in 2017 about joining the recruiting office, but it just wasn't the right time."

But this time, Stuckey was all in and came to Clemson for the 2019 season, a year the Tigers again reached the national championship game.

Stuckey was then elevated to a development coach for the 2020 season, another College Football Playoff season for the Tigers. At the end of the year, he was named wide receivers coach at Baylor.

"Coach Swinney told me once I got into the profession, I would be on the fast track. He gave me confidence and I learned so much from him and the other coaches on the staff."

After Baylor had a 12-2 season and finished No. 5 in the AP poll thanks in part to the performance of Stuckey's wide receivers, Freeman came calling.

"It has been a great opportunity to work for Coach Freeman at Notre Dame. I see so many similarities between Coach Freeman and Coach Swinney when it comes to the culture of the program, the importance of player development and their approach to recruiting.

"I have been so fortunate that both coaches took chances on me." *



The grassroots efforts of the Clemson Family coming together to raise support have bolstered the prominence of the IPTAY brand and where it stands today among the nation's leaders. During the 2023 membership year, more than 22,000 donors collectively supported over 550 Tiger student-athletes. Contributions to the "One-IPTAY" enterprise totaled \$137.2 million in cash and pledges, marking a historic year of the highest donor participation and most funds raised to support the myriad of initiatives enhancing the experience and opportunities for our Clemson Tigers. In the realm of competition, our teams collected four ACC championships – the most since 1998-99. Other highlights of the year include our first national player of the year in softball, Valerie Cagle, and our first national champion in the 60m hurdles, Giano Roberts. Many programs also competed in NCAA postseason. competition, and we cannot wait to witness the growth of our most recently added programs; women's lacrosse and gymnastics.




