ACC NOTES

ACC WELCOMES CAL, SMU AND STANFORD

■ The ACC Board of Directors voted on Sept. 1 to formally admit the University of California, Berkeley (Cal), Southern Methodist University (SMU) and Stanford University to the Atlantic Coast Conference. Cal, SMU and Stanford will join the ACC as full members with full voting participation effective July 1, 2024 (SMU) and Aug. 2, 2024 (Stanford and Cal). The decision followed the submission of letters of application from all three institutions.

■ The additions of Cal, SMU and Stanford enhance and strengthen the ACC academically, athletically and financially as well as create a true national conference that spans coast to coast. The incoming universities enrich the league's competitiveness in all sports and further demonstrate the ACC's commitment to broad-based programs for both women and men. More than 2,200 student-athletes from Cal, SMU and Stanford will join the nearly 10,000 current ACC student-athletes competing at the highest level of intercollegiate athletics.

GREATNESS IS WHAT WE DO

■ The ACC announced its new creative campaign, "ACCOMPLISH GREATNESS," a multi-part brand campaign highlighting the vast success of the ACC's athletics and academics alike. The campaign launched ahead of the ACC's official college football season on Week 1. The series will continue with multi-sport spots highlighting the ACC's incredible accomplishments in all sports throughout the academic year.

SEMINOLES ARE INTO THE ACC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

■ The Florida State Seminoles clinched a spot in the 2023 ACC Football Championship Game with their win over the Pitt Panthers last Saturday (Nov. 4). The nationally ranked Seminoles are 9-0 overall and 7-0 in ACC play this season.

■ It marks the Seminoles' sixth trip to the ACC Football Championship Game and the first since 2014 (2004, 2010, 2012, 2013 and 2014) when they won their third consecutive ACC Championship title with a 37-35 win over Georgia Tech.

■ The 2023 ACC Football Championship Game will kick off at 8 p.m. on ABC on Saturday, Dec. 2, at Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte, North Carolina.

2024-30 FOOTBALL SCHEDULE MODEL ANNOUNCED

■ The Atlantic Coast Conference announced its future football schedule model for the next seven years, 2024 through 2030. With the addition of the ACC's three new member institutions next summer – University of California (Cal), Southern Methodist University (SMU) and Stanford University – the new football scheduling model will go into effect beginning with the 2024 season.

■ The new schedule will continue with no divisions, feature 17 schools and will increase the number of annual conference matchups from 56 to 68. The top two teams based on conference winning percentage will compete in the ACC Football Championship Game on the first Saturday in December at Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte, North Carolina.

■ The approved format will continue to have each member institution play eight conference games per season, with all 17 teams playing each other at least twice over the next seven seasons – once at home and once on the road. The current 14 conference teams will play a total of three times each in California over the seven years and none will travel west to California in back-to-back seasons.

■ The new scheduling model protects 16 annual matchups. Of the 16 matchups, 11 are retained from the current 3-5-5 schedule model, two are restored rivalries from the divisional format in Miami-Virginia Tech and NC State-Wake Forest and the three new schools fill the remaining three.

■ The annual protected matchups are Boston College-Syracuse, Boston College-Pitt, Syracuse-Pitt, North Carolina-Virginia, North Carolina-Duke, North Carolina-NC State, NC State-Wake Forest, NC State-Duke, Duke-Wake Forest, Virginia Tech-Virginia, Florida State-Clemson, Miami-Florida State, Miami-Virginia Tech, Stanford-Cal, Stanford-SMU, and Cal-SMU.

SEMINOLES STAND STRONG

■ Florida State is 9-0 overall and 7-0 in ACC play to start the season, the Noles' best start since 2014 when they started 13-0 and posted a perfect 8-0 ACC record.

■ The Seminoles are one of just seven undefeated teams remaining in FBS this season (*counting James Madison, which is in its second year of transition to the FBS level*).

MULTIPLE ACC TEAMS RANKED IN TOP 25 IN WEEK 11

■ For the 10th consecutive week, the Florida State Seminoles were ranked in the top five of the Associated Press Top 25 poll, once again at No. 4 overall. Joining Florida State in the AP Top 25 poll was Louisville, which moved up four spots to No. 11 overall, and North Carolina at No. 24. Duke, Clemson, and NC State all received votes.

■ Three ACC teams were ranked in the *USA Today* AFCA Coaches Poll this week, nearly mirroring the AP Poll. Florida State remained in the top five, coming in at No. 4 overall, while Louisville came in at No. 11. North Carolina remained in the poll, coming in at No. 23 this week. Duke and NC State also received votes in the coaches poll.

VERSUS THEIR PEERS

■ The ACC has posted a 50.55 winning percentage versus Power 5 opponents this season - conference and non-conference combined - the second-best winning percentage among all Power 5 conferences.

■ The ACC has 46 wins over Power 5 teams - conference and non-conference combined - tied for the third-most among all Power 5 conferences.

■ The ACC is one of just two conferences in all of FBS with a winning record over Power 5 opponents - conference and non-conference games combined.

■ ACC teams have a combined 12 wins over the top 25 nationally ranked opponents this season, tied for the second-most among all FBS conferences.

CLOSE CALLS

■ The ACC overall has 13 wins in close games this season (4 points or less) - tied for the second-most among Power 5 conferences.

■ The ACC overall has 24 wins in one TD games this season (8 points or less) - tied for the most among Power 5 conferences.

■ 42.1 percent of the ACC's conference games (16-of-38) have been decided by one score or less (8 points or less) this season, the second-highest among all Power 5 conferences.

NON-CONFERENCE SUCCESS

■ The ACC has been solid in non-conference play this season, going 36-14 (.720) overall in non-conference play over the first 10 weeks.

■ The ACC has posted the second-most non-conference wins among all FBS conferences with 36 through 10 weeks.

■ The ACC has 10 non-conference Power 5 wins, the most among all FBS conferences.

■ ACC teams are 8-5 combined against the SEC and Big Ten, with the ACC recording four wins over each of the two conferences. The rest of FBS is 9-46 overall versus the two Power 5 conferences.

■ The ACC has also handed Notre Dame two of their three losses this season - Louisville (33-20) on Oct. 7 and Clemson (31-23) on Nov. 4.

BOWL-ELIGIBLE TEAMS

■ Heading into Week 11 (Nov. 6-11), there are 51 bowl-eligible teams in FBS, including seven teams from the ACC in Florida State, Louisville, North Carolina, Miami, Boston College, Duke and NC State.

■ No conference has more bowl-eligible teams to date than the ACC with its seven teams.

■ Two more teams in Clemson (5-4) and Georgia Tech (5-4) are just one win away from becoming bowl eligible, while three other teams in Virginia Tech (4-5), Wake Forest (4-5) and Syracuse (4-5) are two wins away.

■ Since 2017, the ACC has averaged 10 bowl-eligible teams each year, including a high of 11 teams in 2018. Last season, the ACC had nine teams play in a bowl game.

ACC ON ABC/ESPN

■ During the first 10 weeks of the season, the ACC had six games on ABC's "Saturday Night Football" as well as a total of 32 appearances on ABC, ESPN, and ESPN2.

■ Overall, the ACC has had 15 ABC/ACC broadcasts on the season to date, the most of any conference.

■ Overall, the ACC will have had six games on ABC's "Saturday Night Football" – the most of any FBS conference – and will host its ninth ABC Saturday Noon Game when Clemson welcomes Georgia Tech to Death Valley this Saturday, Nov. 11 - also the most of any FCS conference.

■ The ACC has made 32 appearances on ABC, ESPN, and ESPN2 over the first 10 weeks of the season. To date, 21 ACC contests are scheduled for national ABC broadcasts, with 13 different league programs featured.

■ In addition to the games already played, the ACC will be featured in six games on ABC and ESPN over the next two weeks, Week 11 and 12.

TALKING OFFENSE

■ Entering Week 11 of the 2023 season, the ACC has five teams ranked in the SportSource Analytics relative scoring offense percentage rankings top 30 - Florida State (7th, 160.06%), North Carolina (15th, 143.46%), Georgia Tech (18th, 139.46%), Louisville (23rd, 133.57%), and Miami (30th, 128.98%) - the second-most of any FBS conference.

■ A total of five ACC teams rank in the top 35 nationally in total offense - North Carolina (3rd, 518.8 ypg), Georgia Tech (14th, 465.3 ypg), Florida State (17th, 458.3 ypg), Louisville (29th, 439.8 ypg), and Miami (31st, 437.9 ypg).

■ Four ACC teams rank in the top 30 nationally in scoring offense - Florida State (9th, 39.6 ppg), North Carolina (12th, 39.1 ppg), Georgia Tech (28th, 33.2 ppg), and Louisville (30th, 32.9 ppg) - tied for the most of any FBS conference.

■ North Carolina's offense ranks in the top 20 nationally in both passing offense (8th, 319.7 ypg) and rushing offense (16th, 199.1 ypg).

DISCUSSING DEFENSE

■ On defense, the ACC has four teams ranked in the top 25 in total defense - Clemson (6th, 273.8 ypg), Louisville (12th, 285.2 ypg), Miami (19th, 311.4 ypg), and Virginia Tech (21st, 323.3 ypg) - tied for the second-most of any FBS conference.

■ Three ACC teams rank in the top 25 in scoring defense - Duke (7th, 15.7 ppg), Louisville (13th, 16.3 ppg), and Florida State (16th, 17.0 ppg) - tied for the second-most of any FBS conference.

■ Five ACC teams rank in the top 25 in red zone defense - Duke (2nd, 65.4%), Louisville (4th, 66.7%), Florida State (16th, 74.1%), North Carolina (19th, 75.0%), and Syracuse (24th, 75.8%) - tied for the most of any FBS conference.

■ A total of four teams rank in the top 20 nationally in rushing defense - Louisville (7th, 88.8 ypg), Miami (8th, 89.2 ypg), Clemson (19th, 108.4 ypg), and NC State (20th, 110.7 ypg) - the second-most of any FBS conference.

■ Five ACC teams also rank in the top 25 in passing defense - Virginia Tech (7th, 163.8 ypg), Clemson (8th, 165.3 ypg), Duke (15th, 179.3 ypg), Boston College (18th, 181.7 ypg), and Florida State (24th, 192.3 ypg) - tied for the second-most of all FBS conferences.

PREVIEWING WEEK 11

■ Week 11 of the 2023 season will see all 14 ACC teams in action across seven league matchups, highlighted by a Thursday night contest with Virginia at Louisville (7:30 p.m./ESPN).

■ Virginia Tech will play at Boston College (Noon, ACCN), with both teams looking to stay near the top of the ACC regular-season standings with just two losses.

■ Georgia Tech and Clemson will meet at Noon (ABC) in Death Valley, as each team is looking for its sixth overall win of the season to become bowl eligible.

■ Saturday's competition will continue with NC State traveling to Wake Forest (2 p.m., The CW), as the Wolfpack are on a two-game winning streak while the Demon Deacons will look to snap a two-game losing streak.

■ Miami will try to play the spoiler versus rival Florida State on Saturday at 3:30 p.m. (ABC), as the Seminoles will look to remain unbeaten on the season with a win at Hard Rock Stadium.

■ The Orange are in search of their first ACC win of the season when Pitt visits on Saturday (3:30 p.m., ACCN), as both teams will look to snap its current losing streak.

■ The nightcap features the Victory Bell rivalry between Duke and North Carolina (8 p.m., ACCN), with both teams entering the matchup at 3-2 in league play and trying to stay alive in the chase for a spot in the 2023 ACC Football Championship Game.

■ While Florida State has already clinched a spot in the 2023 ACC Football Championship Game on Dec. 2, the other spot is still up for grabs with seven teams with one or two conference losses entering the week of play.

WEEK 10 RECAP

■ Week 10 of the regular season saw Florida State clinch a spot in the 2023 ACC Football Championship Game with one conference game left to play, Clemson take down No. 12 Notre Dame in non-conference play, and not one but two head coaches become the winningest coaches at their schools with wins this week.

■ Duke and Wake Forest kicked off the week with an exciting down-to-the-wire finish on Thursday night in Durham, North Carolina, as Duke's Todd Pelinio hit a 26-yard field goal as time expired to give the Blue Devils a 24-21 win.

■ Boston College pushed its winning streak to five consecutive wins with a 17-10 win on the road at Syracuse, as quarterback Thomas Castellanos scored on a seven-yard run with 2:23 left to go in the contest.

■ North Carolina stepped out of conference play to defeat Campbell 59-7, as quarterback Drake Maye threw four touchdown passes and Omarion Hampton ran for two touchdowns to help the Tar Heels snap a two-game losing streak.

■ Clemson's Dabo Swinney became the Tigers' all-time winningest coach, as he picked up his 166th career win at Clemson with the Tigers' 31-23 win over No. 12 Notre Dame on Saturday. Running back Phil Mafah ran for a career-high 186 yards and two touchdowns in relief of the injured Will Shipley.

■ Georgia Tech won its second game in a row, ending a season-long pattern of alternating wins and losses, and moved within a victory of qualifying for a bowl game with a 45-17 road win at Virginia.

■ In what was a showdown for second place in the ACC standings, Louisville picked up three touchdowns from Isaac Guerendo on offense and held the Virginia Tech offense to just 140 yards on defense to roll to a 34-3 win over the Hokies.

■ Florida State quarterback Jordan Travis passed for a season-high 360 yards, throwing for a touchdown and running for another as the Seminoles earned a trip to Charlotte on the first Saturday in December for the first time since 2014 with a 24-7 win at Pitt in league play.

■ NC State used its defense to force four Miami turnovers and didn't allow a touchdown to become bowl eligible with a 20-6 home win over the Hurricanes. The win gave Wolfpack head coach Dave Doeren his 78th career win at NCSU, making him the winningest coach in Pack history.

STREAKIN'

■ Florida State enters the week on a 15-game winning streak, which is the third-longest winning streak and FBS to date.

■ In addition to the Seminoles' 15-game overall winning streak, the Noles have won 10 straight ACC conference games heading into play this week versus Miami, which is the fourth-longest conference winning streak to date.

■ FSU also has a seven-game home win streak, the eighth-best in all of FBS, and a six-game road win streak, which ranks sixth nationally.

■ Wake Forest has won 12 straight non-conference games, the second-longest streak behind only Georgia and the Bulldogs' 20-straight non-conference wins.

■ Louisville has posted an ACC-best 10-game home win streak, the fifth-best in the FBS to date. The Cards host Virginia this Thursday at 7:30 p.m. on ESPN.

■ Virginia Tech nearly saw its streak of consecutive games scored end last week with three points in a 34-3 loss at No. 15 Louisville. However, with their field goal, the Hokies have scored in 366 consecutive games, the fourth-longest streak in FBS history.

TOP OF THE CLASS IN ACTIVE CAREER LEADERS

■ The Tigers' Will Shipley is second among all active players in the FBS in career all-purpose yards per game at 116.34. He has totaled 3,723 all-purpose yards in his career - 2,435 rushing, 478 receiving, and 810 kick return yards - over 32 games played.

■ Florida State's Jared Verse is fourth among active players in FBS in career tackles-for-loss per game at 1.12 and fourth in sacks per game at 0.64 for his career.

■ North Carolina quarterback Drake Maye ranks fifth in total offense per game at 304.7 yards per contest over his career.

■ NC State's Payton Wilson is fifth in total tackles with 369 career stops and in career total tackles per game with his career average of 8.58.

■ Boston College's Elijah Jones is third among all active players with 43 career passes defended, while North Carolina's Antavious Lane is tied for third in career interceptions with 11.

■ Miami's Kamren Kitchen ranks third in interceptions per game at 0.32 and is tied for fifth with 10 career interceptions.

■ Syracuse's Marlowe Wax and Duke's DeWayne Carter are tied for fifth among all active FBS players with seven career forced fumbles.

■ The Orange's Trebor Pena ranks fifth among all FBS players with a career kickoff return average of 27.0 yards.

■ Miami placekicker Andres Borregales is tied for fourth among all active players with a 1.55 career field goals made per game average.

200 ON THE GROUND

■ This season, there has been a total of 21 games in FBS with a player rushing for 200 yards or more on the ground, two of which have come in the ACC.

■ North Carolina's Omarion Hampton rushed for a career-high 234 yards in a 40-34 overtime win over App State on Oct. 9.

■ Florida State's Trey Benson ran the ball for 200 yards on just 11 carries in the Seminoles' 39-17 home win over Virginia Tech on Oct. 7.

BEST MONEY ON YOUR RETURN

■ The ACC boasts three of the top eight kick returners regarding yards per kick return in Brashard Smith (Miami), Bhayshul Tuten (Virginia Tech), and Julian Gray (NC State). Smith leads all of FBS with an average of 32.9 yards per kick return this season, while Tuten and Gray rank fifth and seventh, respectively, with averages of 28.6 and 27.9 yards per return this year.

■ Virginia Tech's Tucker Holloway is fifth in all of FBS in punt return average at 18.7 yards per return this season.

■ Of the 24 kick returns returned for touchdowns this season in all of FBS, six have come from the ACC - the most of any FBS conference - with one each from Deuce Spann (FSU), Demond Claiborne (Wake Forest), Kenny Johnson (Pitt), Bhayshul Tuten (Virginia Tech), Smith (Miami), and Gray (NC State).

ALL-PURPOSE GUYS

■ The ACC has three student-athletes who rank in the top 20 in all-purpose yards per game this season in Malik Washington (Virginia), Omarion Hampton (North Carolina), and Jawhar Jordan (Louisville).

■ Washington of UVA ranks fifth nationally in all-purpose yards per game this season at 145.22 yards per game, with 1,044 receiving yards, 254 kick return yards, and nine rushing yards.

■ Hampton of UNC ranks ninth nationally at 136.00 all-purpose yards per game, with 1,067 rushing yards and 157 receiving yards on the season.

■ Jordan of Louisville is 19th overall in all of FBS with an average of 124.67 all-purpose yards per contest. He has recorded 881 rushing yards, 178 receiving yards, and 63 kickoff return yards this season.

■ The ACC trio are three of only 21 players in all of FBS to have over 1,000 all-purpose yards so far this season - Washington (1,307 yards), Hampton (1,224 yards), and Jordan (1,122 yards).

A TON OF WASHINGTON

■ Virginia wideout Malik Washington has done it all for the Cavaliers this season, as the transfer ranks in the top three nationally in three offensive categories in addition to his all-purpose yards. Washington ranks second in all of FBS in receptions per game (8.8) and third in both receiving yards (1,044) and receiving yards per game (116.0) this year.

O'MY OMARION

■ UNC running back Omarion Hampton leads the ACC and is tied for fourth nationally in rushing yards per game at 118.6. He also ranks fourth nationally and leads the league with 1,067 rushing yards on the season.

■ He is also leads the ACC with 12 rushing touchdowns and 13 total touchdowns this season, which is tied for sixth nationally.

MAYE DAY

■ North Carolina quarterback Drake Maye ranks third in all of FBS in total offense with an average of 339.7 yards per game. He is also third nationally with an average of 311.4 passing yards per game and fourth in total passing yards with 2,803 this season.

■ The UNC signal-caller also ranks ninth nationally in both points responsible for (156) and points responsible for per game (17.3).

JORDAN RULES

■ Florida State quarterback Jordan Travis has the longest active streaks in the nation in two different categories - 16 games accounting for multiple touchdowns (one behind 2020 Heisman Trophy finalist Trevor Lawrence for the longest ACC streak in the last 20 years) and four consecutive games with at least one rushing and one passing touchdown (joining 2016 Heisman Trophy winner Lamar Jackson as the only ACC players in the Playoff Era with two four-game streaks in their career).

■ FSU's Travis is tied with Drake Maye of North Carolina in points responsible for (156) and points responsible for per game (17.3), which both rank ninth nationally.

SCORING KING

■ Georgia Tech quarterback Haynes King has found the end zone more often than not this year, as he leads the ACC and ranks in the top 10 in several scoring categories.

■ King leads the ACC and ranks seventh nationally in both points responsible for (164) and points responsible for per game (18.2). He also leads the ACC and ranks eighth nationally in passing touchdowns (22).

■ The GT quarterback also ranks second in the ACC and seventh nationally in total offense, averaging 319.4 yards per game this season.

LEADER OF THE PACK

■ NC State linebacker Payton Wilson leads the ACC and ranks fifth nationally in total tackles per game with an average of 11.7 per contest. The defensive leader has recorded double-digit tackles in seven of the Wolfpack's nine games on the season, including a season-high 16 tackles last time out versus Miami (Nov. 4) and 14 tackles against both Notre Dame (Sept. 9) and Marshall (Oct. 7).

FULL HOUSE

■ The ACC has five defenders that rank in the top 25 in sacks per game this season, all of which have totaled 6.5 sacks or more on the year.

■ Virginia Tech's Antwaun Powell-Ryland Jr. (9.0) leads the way with an average of 1.00 sacks per game, which is fifth nationally, while Ashton Gillotte of Louisville (8.5) is tied for seventh overall with an average of 0.94 sacks per contest.

■ Kaimon Rucker of North Carolina (8.0) is tied for ninth nationally with an average of 0.89 sacks per outing, Miami's Rueben Bain Jr. (6.5) and Jasheen Davis of Wake Forest (6.5) are tied for 24th overall with an average of 0.72 sacks per contest.

THREE OF A KIND

■ A trio of ACC defensive backs rank in the top 25 nationally in passes defender in Elijah Jones (Boston College), Kamren Kinchens (Miami), and M.J. Devonshire (Pitt).

■ Jones is tied for the nation's lead with five interceptions and is third in all of FBS with 13 passes defended this season (8 PBU, 5 INT).

■ Kinchens is tied for third nationally with four picks and 21st overall with nine total passes defended (5 PBU, 4 INT).

■ Devonshire is tied for ninth overall with 11 total passes defended (9 PBU, 2 INT) and in pass breakups with nine.

THE CONFERENCE OF QUARTERBACKS

■ Through the first 10 weeks of the season, there have been eight different ACC Quarterback of the Week Award winners.

HISTORICAL TOP-10 WINS

■ In the Labor Day primetime game on Sept. 4, the Duke Blue Devils upended No. 9 Clemson 28-7 in Wallace Wade Stadium in the two teams' season opener. The win was the first time the Blue Devils had beaten a top-10 team since defeating then-No. 7 Clemson in 1989, snapping a losing streak of 28 straight games to top-10 teams.

■ On Sept. 3, the No. 8 Florida State Seminoles defeated No. 5 LSU 45-24 in the Camping World Kickoff in Orlando, Fla. FSU's 45 points were tied for the most in a season opener against an AP top-5 teams in the Poll era (since 1936). As the lower-ranked team, the Seminoles also recorded the first 20+ point win over an AP top-5 team since 1988 with the season-opening victory.

■ Louisville posted a 33-20 home win over No. 10 Notre Dame on Oct. 7, the program's second-straight win over a top-10 foe in the last two years and the eighth overall in school history. With the Cardinals' win over Notre Dame, the victory snapped the Fighting Irish's 30-game regular-season winning streak versus ACC opponents dating back to 2017.

■ Virginia held No. 10 North Carolina to just 27 points, well below the Tar Heels' average of 37.5 points per game on the season, to erase a 10-point second-half deficit in a 31-27 ACC road win on Oct. 21. The win was Virginia's first-ever win on the road against a nationally-ranked top-10 opponent.

MILESTONE WINS IN 2023

■ North Carolina head coach Mack Brown recorded his 100th career win as the head coach for the Tar Heels with the 31-17 win over South Carolina on Sept. 2.

■ With his 100th win at UNC, Brown etched his name in the college football record books as the only coach to have won 100 games or more at two different FBS schools. He totaled 158 wins at Texas in 16 seasons from 1998-2014.

■ Wake Forest head coach Dave Clawson picked up his 150th career win as a collegiate head coach with the Demon Deacons' 37-17 win over Elon on Aug. 31. The season-opening victory was Clawson's 60th at Wake.

■ Louisville first-year head coach and alumnus Jeff Brohm recorded his first career win as the head coach of his alma mater with a 39-34 victory over Georgia Tech at the Aflac Kickoff Game on Sept. 1. The win also marked Brohm's first conference win in the ACC.

■ Clemson's Dabo Swinney recorded his 100th ACC regular-season conference win with the Tigers' 31-14 road win at Syracuse on Sept. 30. He joined Bobby Bowden (117) as the only two head coaches to have 100 or more conference regular-season wins in the ACC.

■ NC State's Dave Doeren registered his 100th career win as a collegiate head coach with the Wolfpack's 24-17 win over Clemson on Oct. 28. His 100th career victory was also his 77th win at NC State, which at the time tied him with Earle Edward (1954-70) for the most victories in program history.

BIG MEN ON CAMPUS

■ Dabo Swinney became the all-time winningest coach in Clemson football history with the Tigers' 31-23 win over No. 12 Notre Dame on Nov. 4. His 166th career win passed College Football Hall of Famer Frank Howard (165 from 1940-69) for sole possession of the Clemson record for career head coaching wins.

■ Dave Doeren became NC State's winningest coach in program history with the Wolfpack's 20-6 win over Miami on Nov. 4. With his 78th career win as the leader of the Pack, he passed Earle Edwards (76 from 1954-70) for the most victories in program history.

ACC COACHING NOTES

■ Two new football coaches were hired in the ACC for the 2023 season: Georgia Tech's Brent Key and Louisville's Jeff Brohm. Key was hired after going 4-4 as the Yellow Jackets' interim head coach in 2022. Brohm returned to his alma mater after a six-year stint at Purdue.

■ Among active head coaches, the ACC's Dabo Swinney (Clemson), Mack Brown (North Carolina), Mike Norvell (Florida State), and Dave Doeren (NC State) rank among the top 40 in the nation in career winning percentage. Brown is second among all active coaches with 281 wins.

■ Clemson's Swinney owns 166 career wins, the 11th-most among active coaches. Swinney joins Bobby Bowden (173) as the only head coach ever to lead an ACC program to 150 wins.

■ Two of the five active coaches to win a national title reside in the ACC. Dabo Swinney led Clemson to national titles in 2016 and 2018. North Carolina's Mack Brown won a national title at Texas in 2005.

■ Four current league coaches have won ACC Coach of the Year honors - North Carolina's Mack Brown (1996), Clemson's Dabo Swinney (2015 & 2018), Wake Forest's Dave Clawson (2021) and Duke's Mike Elko (2022).

ESPN'S BEST LABOR DAY SUNDAY

■ ESPN's Labor Day Showdown Between No. 5 LSU and No. 8 FSU registered 9.5 million viewers on ABC during the Seminoles win.

■ The game was the most-watched Labor Day Sunday game since Notre Dame and Texas in 2016 and the second-most watched on record, having peaked at 10.3 million viewers.

ALL EYES ON THE ACC

■ In Week 1 of the 2023 season, the ACC captivated the national audience, averaging an astounding 5.1 million viewers over their 12 contests, per ESPN.

■ The 5.1 million average viewers were more than double all other conferences in the highest average per game viewership for the week of college football games.

■ Overall, the ACC was part of three of the top seven most-watched games for Week 1.

■ Through the first two weeks of the season, the ACC had three home broadcasts with 4M+ viewers - no other conference had more than one.

■ Week 4 of the 2023 season saw Florida State and Clemson average 6.7 million viewers (Sept. 23), making it the most watched ACC Noon kickoff game since 2014. It was also the most watched regular-season ABC Noon kickoff game since 2019.

NOTING THE SCHEDULE FOR 2023

■ This marks the league's first and only year under a 3-5-5 scheduling model - with the addition of the three new schools in Cal, SMU, and Stanford prior to the start of the 2024 season. This season, each team will play three primary opponents annually and face the other 10 league teams twice during the four-year cycle, once at home and once on the road. The schedule allows for each team to face all 13 conference opponents home and away at least once over the four-year period.

■ The season schedule will feature 56 league games and 56 non-conference contests. Each team will play eight league contests

■ The model eliminates divisions with the top two teams based on winning percentage playing in the ACC Football Championship Game on the first Saturday in December. The 2023 schedule includes one open date for each team, and at least one conference contest is scheduled each week.

■ Once again, the ACC's non-conference schedule is arguably the most difficult in the country. In addition to 23 games against Power 5 opponents, the ACC will play 11 non-conference games against teams ranked in the preseason 2023 AP Top 25 poll. A total of 13 of the 14 ACC teams play at least one Power 5 non-conference opponent (including Notre Dame), while eight schools - Clemson, Duke, Florida State, Georgia Tech, North Carolina, Virginia, Virginia Tech and Wake Forest - play two. Pitt and Louisville both play three non-conference Power 5 foes and are two of just six teams to play 11 games against the Power 5 conferences this season.

■ This season, ACC teams will play 27 games against opponents that appeared in a bowl game last year in 2022.

■ DE Jared Verse (Florida State) and S Kam Kinchens (Miami) were named Preseason First-Team All-Americans by the Associated Press.

■ Eight ACC players were named to Preseason AP Second-Team All-America: QB Drake Maye (UNC), OG Christian Mahogany (BC), TE Oronde Gadsden II (Syracuse), All-Purpose Will Shipley (Clemson), DL Tyler Davis (Clemson), LB Jeremiah Trotter Jr. (Clemson), LB Barrett Carter (Clemson) and LB Cedric Gray (UNC).

■ Nine ACC players earned Sporting News Preseason All-America status. Athlete Will Shipley (Clemson), DL Jared Verse (FSU), LB Jeremiah Trotter Jr. (Clemson) and S Kam Kinchens (Miami) earned first-team honors. QB Drake Maye (UNC), WR Johnny Wilson (FSU), TE Oronde Gadsden II (Syracuse), OL Graham Barton (Duke) and LB Cedric Gray (UNC) notched second-team laurels.

■ Verse, Carter and Kinchens were named to ESPN's Preseason All-America Team.

2023 ACC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME SET FOR 8 P.M.

■ The 2023 Atlantic Coast Conference Football Championship Game will kick off at 8 p.m. on ABC on Saturday, Dec. 2, at Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte, North Carolina. The game will feature the top two teams based on regular-season conference winning percentage.

■ This is the 14th time in the last 15 years that the game will be held in primetime. Twelve different teams have competed in the game since it began in 2005. Last season, No. 9 Clemson rolled to a 39-10 win over No. 24 North Carolina for its seventh ACC title in the last eight seasons.

■ Bank of America Stadium, home of the NFL's Carolina Panthers, has been the site of 12 of the last 13 ACC Football Championship Games. In 2018, the ACC and the Charlotte Sports Foundation reached an agreement to keep the game in Charlotte through 2030. Not including the 2020 game, which had limited attendance due to the pandemic, ACC Football Championship Games played at Bank of America Stadium have had an average attendance of nearly 70,000 fans. The ACC has the second-highest average attendance of any Power 5 conference championship game since 2010.

■ The winner of the conference championship game has gone on to play in the National Championship Game or compete in the College Football Playoff in eight of the last 10 seasons, including two teams in 2020. The ACC has the second most CFP appearances of any conference.

ACC PLAYERS IN THE NFL

■ More than 280 former ACC football players were listed on NFL rosters prior to Week 1 of the 2023-24 NFL season. All 14 ACC schools were represented with Clemson leading the way with 42 former players.

■ A total of 283 former ACC standouts were on the NFL's active roster, physically unable to perform lists and practice squads, with 213 players on active 53-man rosters.

■ Following Clemson's conference-best 42 players, Miami ranks second with 30 players, while Pitt and Virginia Tech each have 27 players in the NFL.

ALBERTO RIVERON NAMED ACC SUPERVISOR OF FOOTBALL OFFICIALS

■ Alberto Riveron was named the ACC's new Supervisor of Football Officials on Nov. 30, 2022. Riveron, who served as the NFL's Senior Vice President of Officiating from 2017-20 and currently works as an NFL Rules analyst, has compiled a distinguished 30-year career as both an on-field official and an officiating administrator in the NCAA and NFL.

■ Among his duties, Riveron is responsible for managing the oversight, supervision, leadership, training and development of an ACC officiating staff that includes on-field officials, instant replay officials, instant replay communicators, position coaches, evaluators and assistant supervisors. He serves as the day-to-day administrator of the ACC's Football Officiating Alliance and develops conference football officiating schedules and assignments.

SIAC JOINS LEAGUE'S FOOTBALL OFFICIATING ALLIANCE

■ The ACC and the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (SIAC) announced that the SIAC has joined the ACC's football officiating alliance that includes the ACC, Big South Conference and Ohio Valley Conference (OVC), Coastal Athletic Association (CAA), Ivy League, Northeast Conference (NEC) and Patriot League.

■ The SIAC joining the alliance is a first of its kind, as the SIAC becomes the first college athletic conference that consists mostly of historically black colleges and universities (HBCUs) to join a football officiating alliance. Formed in 1913, the SIAC is affiliated with the National Collegiate Athletics Association (NCAA) at the Division II level, with all but one member located in the Southern United States.

■ The football officiating alliance enables all eight conferences to work together on a wide range of officiating matters, including training, development, recruitment, retention, scheduling, and evaluation. The mission of the alliance is to increase proficiency and consistency among officials across the collegiate football officiating landscape, to aid in the development of less experienced officials, and to increase diversity throughout the profession.

ACC WITH THREE NAMED TO 2023 GOOD WORKS TEAM

■ The ACC had three student-athletes from three different institutions named to the Allstate AFCA Good Works Team this week. Will Shipley of Clemson, Ja'Mion Franklin of Duke and Gavin Bartholomew of Pitt were three of the 11 student-athletes chosen for the FBS Good Works Team.

DUKE'S CARTER A 2023 CAMPBELL TROPHY FINALIST

■ Duke defensive tackle DeWayne Carter is one of 16 finalists for the 2023 William V. Campbell Trophy, which is presented annually by the National Football Foundation and the College Football Hall of Fame to the best football scholar-athlete in the nation for his combined academic success, football performance and exemplary leadership.

AROUND THE ACC

◆ **Boston College:** Boston College earned its fifth consecutive victory with a 17-10 win at Syracuse last week to improve to 6-3 overall and become bowl eligible. The five-game win streak is the longest such streak for BC since the 2010 season. BC's bowl eligibility comes in its ninth game - the fastest since the 2018 season when the Eagles won their sixth contest in eight tries. The Eagles' last 1-3 start-to-bowl eligibility came during the 2017 campaign.

◆ **Clemson:** With Clemson's 31-23 win over No. 12 Notre Dame last Saturday, the Tigers have recorded at least one win against an AP Top 20 team in Death Valley in nine consecutive seasons. Clemson's last season without a win against a top-20 squad in Death Valley was 2014.

◆ **Duke:** Freshman quarterback Grayson Loftis made his first career start last week versus Wake Forest, tossing his first career touchdown pass, a 29-yard strike to Jordan Moore in the fourth quarter. He became the first true freshman quarterback in Duke history to win his starting debut since Mike Dunn led the Blue Devils to a 21-10 win over Army West Point on Oct. 11, 1975. Additionally, Loftis is the first Duke true freshman to win a starting debut against a conference opponent since Jerry Barger won his first start over South Carolina on Sept. 22, 1951.

◆ **Florida State:** Despite missing two Biletnikoff Award candidates in Keon Coleman and Johnny Wilson, quarterback Jordan Travis was 22-for-36 for a season-high 360 yards, a 22-yard touchdown pass, and a 1-yard touchdown run in the win over Pitt last week. He completed passes to eight receivers. Travis has thrown a touchdown pass in 21 straight games, FSU's longest stretch since 2013 Heisman Trophy winner Jameis Winston (27, 2013-14).

◆ **Georgia Tech:** The Yellow Jackets finished with 514 yards of total offense last week in the road win at Virginia, just one week after amassing 635 total yards in the win over No. 17 North Carolina two weeks ago. It marks the first time that Tech has totaled 500 yards of offense in consecutive games since it totaled 532 and 554 yards versus Bowling Green and at Louisville on Sept. 29 and Oct. 5, 2018.

◆ **Louisville:** With the Cardinals' 34-3 win over Virginia Tech last week, Louisville has held back-to-back opponents without a touchdown for the first time since beating Cincinnati 20-0 and Southern Miss 6-3 in November 1980. The Cardinals have held five straight opponents under 300 yards of total offense and five straight opponents to under 100 rushing yards.

◆ **Miami:** Freshman running back Mark Fletcher Jr. made the first start of his collegiate career count last Saturday, rushing for a career-high 115 yards on a career-best 23 carries in Miami's game at NC State. Fletcher posted the first 100-yard game of his career and added three catches totaling 17 yards out of the backfield.

◆ **North Carolina:** Quarterback Drake Maye completed 16-of-23 for 244 yards and four touchdowns last week in the Tar Heels' 59-7 win over Campbell. Maye passed Bryn Renner for fifth in UNC career total offense yards, as he now has 8,227 total yards (rushing and passing). With his four touchdown passes versus the Camels, Maye has 59 career passing touchdowns and passed T.J. Yates for fourth in UNC history in career touchdown passes.

◆ **NC State:** The Wolfpack defense set the tone in the home win over Miami last week, as the Pack created four turnovers, which included three interceptions, totaled three sacks and seven quarterback hurries, and held the Hurricanes to just six points without allowing a touchdown in a 20-6 win. It is the first time the Wolfpack defense has held an ACC opponent without a touchdown since Nov. 5, 2011, when NC State defeated North Carolina 13-0 at Carter-Finley Stadium.

◆ **Pitt:** Through nine contests, Pitt has compiled 25 sacks. The Panthers' average of 2.78 sacks per game ranks 21st nationally and fourth in the ACC. The Panthers' defense also ranks 11th nationally in tackles-for-loss with an average of 7.4 per game this season.

◆ **Syracuse:** Sophomore running back LeQuint Allen Jr. had a career day for the Orange last week versus longtime rival Boston College, as he ran for a career-best 142 yards on 18 carries and averaged 7.9 yards per rush for the game. Allen's 56-yard run in the third quarter was Syracuse's longest run of the season and put him over 100 rushing yards for the fourth time this year.

◆ **Virginia:** Wide receiver Malik Washington caught 11 passes for 109 yards, his fourth-straight 100-yard game, in the loss to Georgia Tech last week. He is the first player in UVA history to record four consecutive 100-yard receiving games. He also became just the sixth player in UVA history to go over the 1,000-yard receiving mark and is the fastest Virginia player (nine games) with 1,000 receiving yards. Washington has recorded double-digit receptions in three-straight games and has caught a pass in 34-straight games dating back to his time at Northwestern.

◆ **Virginia Tech:** Placekicker John Love's field goal in the second quarter for the Hokies against Louisville marked the 366th consecutive game during which Virginia Tech has scored. This moved the Hokies into fourth place in both the all-time and active scoring streaks. The 44-yard field goal was also Love's career-long, surpassing his previous high of 43 yards, which he made two weeks ago versus Syracuse.

◆ **Wake Forest:** Quarterback Mitch Griffis went 16-of-19 for 241 yards through the air and rushed for 55 yards with a pair of rushing touchdowns versus Duke last week. His two rushing scores marked the first time a Wake Forest QB has rushed for two touchdowns in a game since Sam Hartman at North Carolina on Nov. 6, 2021. Griffis, who completed his first 12 pass attempts of the game, posted an 84.2 completion percentage for the game, one of the best completion percentage games in program history.

ACC TIEBREAKERS - NEW FOR 2023

With the elimination of divisions this season, the ACC Football Champion will be decided by a game between the top two postseason-eligible teams.

The two teams with the highest percentage of wins during all regular-season Conference competition shall play in the Championship Game.

If three or more such teams are tied with the highest percentage of wins or two or more teams are tied with the second-highest percentage of wins, the following tiebreaker procedure shall be administered to determine the representative(s) in the Championship Game.

The team with the highest win percentage, either outright or after application of the tiebreaker, shall be declared the No. 1 seed for the Championship Game.

A. Two-Team Tie

1. Head-to-head competition between the two tied teams.
2. Win-percentage versus all common opponents.
3. Win-percentage versus common opponents based upon their order of finish (overall conference win-percentage, with ties broken) and proceeding through other common opponents based upon their order of finish.
4. Combined win-percentage of conference opponents.
5. The tied team with the higher ranking by the Team Rating Score metric provided by SportSource Analytics following the conclusion of regular season games.
6. The representative shall be chosen by a draw as administered by the Commissioner or Commissioner's designee.

B. Three (or More) Teams Tie

Three teams (or more) tiebreaker procedure will first be used to identify one Championship Game representative. Once that team is determined, the tiebreaker procedures restart for the remaining tied teams.

1. Combined head-to-head win percentage among the tied teams if all tied teams are common opponents.
2. If all the tied teams are not common opponents, the tied team that defeated each of the other tied teams.
3. Win-percentage versus all common opponents.
4. Win-percentage versus common opponents based upon their order of finish (overall conference win-percentage, with ties broken) and proceeding through other common opponents based upon their order of finish.
5. Combined win percentage of conference opponents.
6. The tied team with the highest ranking by the Team Rating Score metric provided by SportSource Analytics following the conclusion of regular season games.
7. The representative shall be chosen by a draw as administered by the Commissioner or Commissioner's designee.

**Note: Conference games against otherwise postseason ineligible teams will always be counted in the league standings and in application of the tiebreaker policies.*

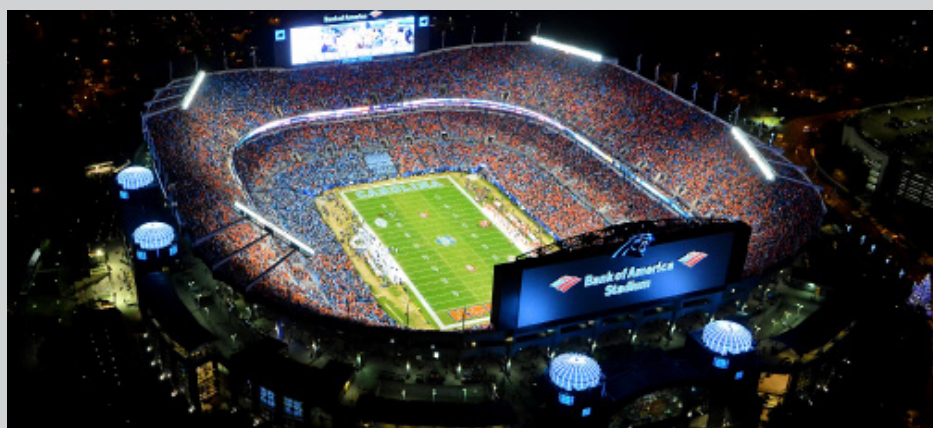

• The Rose Bowl and the Allstate Sugar Bowl are national semifinal sites for the 2023 season. There is no limit on how many teams from one conference can appear in the CFP. If the ACC Champion is in the top four of the final CFP rankings, it will play in one of the national semifinal games. Additional ACC teams could also be selected for the CFP.

• The Capital One Orange Bowl will host the ACC Champion (or next highest-ranked ACC team if the ACC Champion is in the top four of the final CFP rankings) against the highest-ranked available non-champion team from the Big Ten or SEC, or Notre Dame.

• Following the Capital One Orange Bowl selection process, additional ACC teams could also be selected for the Goodyear Cotton Bowl or Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl as at-large representatives.

• The ACC and its non-CFP bowl partners will make team selections based on several factors, including geographic proximity, avoiding repeat appearances and matchups, and regular-season won-loss records.



HOME OF THE ACC

NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

- No conference has won more NCAA national championships in the last two academic years than the ACC. The league's nine titles in 2022-23 shattered the league record of seven, set in 2021-22 and 2009-10.
- The ACC brought home NCAA Championships in 2022-23 in Women's Cross Country (NC State), Field Hockey (North Carolina), Men's Soccer (Syracuse), Women's Swimming & Diving (Virginia), Fencing (Notre Dame), Women's Tennis (North Carolina), Men's Tennis (Virginia), Men's Lacrosse (Notre Dame) and Women's Golf (Wake Forest). In addition, North Carolina women's tennis won the 2023 ITA National Indoor Championship. ACC student-athletes also won 29 individual national titles in 2022-23.
- The ACC has won seven national championships in football, men's basketball, women's basketball and baseball since 2015. The ACC is the only conference to win each of those four titles over that stretch.
- The ACC has won three of the last 10 football national titles and three of the last eight men's basketball national championships (most of any conference).
- Clemson (15-0) won the league's eighth football national championship in 2018 with a 44-16 win over previously unbeaten Alabama. The 28-point margin of victory was the largest over a No. 1 ranked team in ACC history.

ACC SUCCESS IN 2022-23

- Sixteen ACC programs finished the 2022-23 season ranked either No. 1 or No. 2 in their respective sports, and all 15 member schools captured either an ACC championship or an ACC regular-season championship.
- Six ACC schools placed among the top 20 of the final Division I LEARNFIELD College Directors' Cup standings. Virginia finished fourth and was joined in the top 10 by North Carolina, which placed eighth. Duke (16th), Florida State (17th), NC State (19th) and Notre Dame (20th) completed the ACC's top-20 contingent. Louisville (32nd), Wake Forest (42nd), Syracuse (45th) and Miami (49th) gave the ACC 10 institutions among the top 50. The feat marked the 21st straight year that four or more ACC schools placed among the top 30 in the final rankings.
- The ACC had the most Honda Award winners of any conference in 2022-23 with four – North Carolina's Fiona Crawley (tennis), Virginia's Kate Douglass (swimming), North Carolina's Erin Matson (field hockey) and NC State's Katelyn Tuohy (cross country).

ACC EXPANSION

- The ACC Board of Directors voted on Sept. 1 to formally admit the University of California, Berkeley (Cal), Southern Methodist University (SMU) and Stanford University to the Atlantic Coast Conference. Cal, SMU and Stanford will join the ACC as full members with full voting participation effective July 1, 2024 (SMU) and August 2, 2024 (Stanford and Cal). The decision followed the submission of letters of application from all three institutions.
- The additions of Cal, SMU and Stanford enhance and strengthen the ACC academically, athletically and financially as well as create a true national conference that spans coast to coast. The incoming universities enrich the league's competitiveness in all sports and further demonstrate the ACC's commitment to broad-based programs for both women and men. More than 2,200 student-athletes from Cal, SMU and Stanford will join the nearly 10,000 current ACC student-athletes competing at the highest level of intercollegiate athletics.
- Cal, SMU and Stanford will begin competing in the ACC across their respective sponsored sports beginning in the 2024-2025 academic year. The ACC leads all Autonomy 5 conferences with 15 women's sports offerings and no conference offers more than the league's 28 total sponsored sports.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS

- A player from a current ACC school has won the William V. Campbell Trophy® five times, including three times in the last nine years. That is the most of any conference over that span. The award recognizes an individual as the absolute best football scholar-athlete in the nation for his combined academic success, football performance and exemplary leadership.
- Eight ACC Football teams earned a graduation success rate (GSR) at or above the FBS average based on the report released by the NCAA in November 2022.
- The ACC remains the only conference to have multiple teams register GSR scores of 90 or higher every year since 2005. Boston College (97), Clemson (92), Duke (95), Louisville (94), Pitt (94) and Wake Forest (93) reached that plateau in this year's report.
- For the 17th consecutive year, the ACC led the way among FBS conferences in the "Best Colleges" rankings released by U.S. News & World Report on Sept. 18, 2023.
- ACC teams continue to stand out among those from Division I colleges and universities that meet standards and excel academically, as evidenced by the annual Academic Progress Rate (APR) team data released by the NCAA in January 2022. All ACC football, men's basketball, women's basketball and baseball programs exceeded the NCAA's required APR. In football, 12 ACC teams have an APR above the Division I average of 968, which is the most among peer conferences).

ACC STUDENT-ATHLETE PROGRAMS & SERVICES

- The ACC's Committee for Racial and Social Justice (CORE - Champions of Racial Equity) continued its mission to promote and encourage inclusion, racial equity and social justice through education, partnerships, engagement and advocacy.
- Among CORE's accomplishments in 2022-23 were the second annual UNITE Award Class; the ACC's Fall, Winter and Spring UNITY Weeks (theme: "PRIDE, the fight against antisemitism and other causes"); mandatory staff education and the ACC Unity Tour in Washington, D.C. in July, 2023.
- The ACC conducted a Health and Safety Summit in Durham in May, in partnership with the ACC Healthcare Advisory Group, bringing together athletic trainers, team physicians, dietitians, mental health practitioners, sports performance coaches, and others within the ACC's health and sports performance community to collaborate and to share best practices.
- The ACC continued to provide leadership development programming to ACC coaches through the "Coaching the Whole Athlete Academy". The Coaching Academy is an eight-week virtual and immersive development program established by the league office that equips coaches with information, tools, and skills of a humanistic approach to better support the needs of the student-athlete.
- The ACC organized the first ACC Career Trek in Charlotte, N.C., in May 2022. The trek included 27 student-athletes from 12 ACC schools. The trek allowed student-athletes to explore potential careers, network with professionals, and gain insights into what employers are seeking in potential candidates.
- The 2021 ACC/Big Ten Basketball Challenge used the series of 28 men's and women's games to bring awareness to the importance of mental health and help to break down any stigma related to mental health struggles.
- The ACC hosted its fourth annual Fall Unity Week on Oct. 14-22. The theme for the 2023-24 academic year is "Civic Engagement," chosen by CORE in conjunction with the ACC Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) to encourage their respective community's involvement in the lead-up to the general election in 2024.

FOOTBALL SUCCESS

■ The ACC has had a team in either the College Football Playoff or the BCS National Championship Game in eight of the last 10 years, including two teams in 2020. The ACC has the second most CFP appearances of any conference.

■ The ACC placed nine teams in football postseason bowl games in 2022. It is the 22nd consecutive season in which the ACC earned at least six bowl bids. Not including the pandemic-affected 2020 season, the ACC has sent at least nine teams to a bowl every year since 2016. Since 2013, the ACC is second among all conferences with 100 postseason appearances.

■ Three ACC teams finished the 2022 season ranked in the national top 25. In the AP poll, Florida State finished No. 11, its highest ranking since 2016. ACC Champion Clemson finished No. 13, while Pitt was No. 22. In the Coaches poll, FSU was No. 10, Clemson No. 12 and Pitt No. 22.

■ Three ACC teams earned spots in the top 25 of the Preseason Associated Press poll, led by Florida State (No. 8) and Clemson (No. 9) in the top 10. The Seminoles and Tigers were joined by North Carolina, which is No. 21. Pitt, Louisville, Duke and NC State received votes.

■ Led by unanimous first-team All-America defensive tackle Calijah Kancey of Pitt, the ACC placed 11 players – representing six different schools – on NCAA-recognized 2022 All-America teams. NC State place-kicker Christopher Dunn was a consensus All-America honoree. Pitt led the league with three selections. The NCAA recognizes the All-America teams selected by AP, FWAA, The Sporting News, AFCA and Walter Camp to determine consensus All-Americans.

■ The ACC continued to establish itself as the Conference of Quarterbacks in 2022, and many of the leading players return this season, including nine players with at least 10 career starts, highlighted by 2022 All-ACC honorees Drake Maye of North Carolina (first team) and Jordan Travis of Florida State (second team).

■ Twelve different quarterbacks from ACC schools started at least one game in the NFL last season in 2022 – most of any conference.

■ Among active head coaches, the ACC's Dabo Swinney (Clemson), Mike Elko (Duke), Mack Brown (North Carolina), Mike Norvell (Florida State), Dave Doeren (NC State), Pat Narduzzi (Pitt) and Jeff Brohm (Louisville) rank among the top 40 in the nation in career winning percentage. Swinney's .794 winning percentage ranks eighth in the nation. Brown is second among all active coaches with 281 victories, while Swinney is 11th with 166.

■ Seven ACC players have finished in the top three of the Heisman Trophy voting in the last 10 years, including 2013 winner Jameis Winston of FSU and 2016 winner Lamar Jackson of Louisville. Clemson's Trevor Lawrence finished second in 2020, while Pitt's Kenny Pickett was third in 2021.

ACC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME & BOWL SUCCESS

■ In April 2018, the ACC and the Charlotte Sports Foundation announced a 10-year agreement that will keep the ACC Football Championship Game in Charlotte through the 2030 season. The game will be played annually at Bank of America Stadium on the first Saturday in December.

■ The ACC Football Championship Game has sold out five times in Charlotte (2010, 2011, 2015, 2017 and 2020).

■ Eleven different ACC teams have played in the ACC Football Championship Game since its inception in 2005. Clemson leads all teams with nine appearances, followed by Virginia Tech (6) and Florida State (5).

■ The ACC is in the 10th year of a 12-year agreement with the Capital One Orange Bowl, which will host an ACC team – either its champion or next available team – in all years when the Orange Bowl is not a semifinal site for the College Football Playoff. The opponent will be the highest-ranked available team from the SEC, Big Ten, or Notre Dame.

■ Six different ACC teams have played in the prestigious Capital One Orange Bowl since 2013 – Clemson in 2013, 2015 and 2023, Georgia Tech in 2014, Florida State in 2016, Miami in 2017, Virginia in 2019 and North Carolina in 2020.

■ The ACC's current bowl lineup includes the Holiday Bowl, Pop-Tarts Bowl, TaxSlayer Gator Bowl, Bad Boy Mowers Pinstripe Bowl, Duke's Mayo Bowl, Tony the Tiger Sun Bowl, Military Bowl, Wasabi Fenway Bowl, Union Home Mortgage Gasparilla Bowl and TicketSmarter Birmingham Bowl. In addition, the ACC will send a team to the Reliaquest Bowl if the league's opponent in a non-semifinal Capital One Orange Bowl is from the Big Ten.



ACC & THE NFL DRAFT

■ Since the 2005 season, the ACC has had 666 players chosen in the NFL Draft, including 103 first-round picks, the second-highest total of any conference.

■ Four ACC players were selected in the first round of the 2023 NFL Draft in Kansas City, led by Pitt All-America defensive tackle Calijah Kancey who was the No. 19 overall pick to the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. He was joined in the first round by Boston College WR Zay Flowers (22nd, Baltimore Ravens), Clemson DE Myles Murphy (28th, Cincinnati Bengals) and Clemson DT Bryan Bresee (29th, New Orleans Saints). Syracuse OT Matthew Bergeron, GT Edge Keion White and Miami CB Tyrique Stevenson were taken in the second round. Five ACC players were third-round picks, while 20 were selected in rounds four through seven.

■ The ACC's 32 picks in 2023 represented 13 different institutions.

■ The ACC has had 385 players selected since 2013 - the second-highest total among all conferences - and has had 40 or more players picked in five of the last 10 drafts. The ACC's 45 draftees in 2018 was its third-highest ever.

■ Current ACC teams have had a total of nine players chosen as the first overall selection in the NFL Draft. The most recent was Clemson's Trevor Lawrence, who was tabbed first in 2021 by the Jacksonville Jaguars. Miami (Vinny Testaverde, 1987, Tampa Bay; and Russell Maryland, 1991, Dallas) and Virginia Tech (Bruce Smith, 1985, Buffalo; and Michael Vick, 2001, Atlanta) each had two top selections while Clemson (Lawrence, 2021, Jaguars), Florida State (Jameis Winston, 2015, Tampa Bay), NC State (Mario Williams, 2006, Houston), Virginia (Bill Dudley, 1942, Pittsburgh) and Syracuse (Ernie Davis, 1962, Washington) each had one. Also, NC State's Roman Gabriel, the No. 2 overall selection in the 1962 draft, was chosen No. 1 in the AFL Draft by the Oakland Raiders.

ACC NETWORK

■ ACC Network supports the ACC's 24/7/365 football initiative with year-long coverage throughout its live event and studio coverage, original programming, and content on its social platforms.

■ Along with a full slate of season-long football games on ACCN, the network provides wall-to-wall coverage every Saturday throughout the fall. The ACC Huddle, ACCN's franchise football studio show leads into the action with an hour pregame show (11 a.m. – noon ET), provides coverage at halftime and between games, as well as a primetime show leading into ACC Primetime Football and an hour-long postgame show. The ACC Huddle also appears on ACCN around other tentpole football events – ACC Football Kickoff, Pro Days, Signing Day, CFP and select bowl games.

■ For the third consecutive year, ACCN embarked on a 14-campus ACC Football tour throughout August (2023) to kick off the football season. ACC Football Road Trip featured 14 one-hour shows airing in primetime over three weeks from campuses across the conference. ACC Football Road Trip previewed each team's upcoming season and included exclusive interviews with head coaches and student-athletes while showcasing unique aspects of those 14 football campuses.

■ ACC Huddle and ACC PM took to the road for a number of stops at campuses throughout the 2022 football regular season including North Carolina (vs. Florida A&M), Virginia Tech (vs. Boston College), Florida State (vs. Boston College), NC State (vs. Wake Forest), Syracuse (vs. Florida State) and Wake Forest (vs. Syracuse), in addition to being onsite at the 2022 Subway ACC Football Championship Game and the Capital One Orange Bowl.

■ This season, two of ACC Network's signature programs, ACC Huddle and ACC PM, have hit the road and traveled to college football game sites every week of the regular season this fall for the first time in the Network's history. Either ACC Huddle or ACC PM, if not both, have been on a college campus each week. In Week 1, ACC PM was at both Wake Forest and Virginia Tech, while ACC Huddle was live at Virginia Tech, in Orlando for FSU and LSU, and at Duke. The rest of the season to date has seen both shows at eight different schools - Week 2 - Florida State, Week 3 - Clemson, Week 4 - Pitt, Week 5 - Virginia Tech, Week 6 - Miami, Week 7 - Duke, Week 8 - Miami, Week 9 - Georgia Tech, Week 10 - NC State, and Week 11 - North Carolina.

■ ACCN's football analyst roster includes four former NFL players Tim Hasselbeck, Mark Herzlich, EJ Manuel and Eddie Royal, College Football Hall of Fame Coach Mark Richt and former Clemson and Georgia Tech standouts Eric Mac Lain and Roddy Jones.
