ACC NOTES

ACC WELCOMES CAL, SMU AND STANFORD

■ The ACC Board of Directors voted on Sept. 1 to formally admit the University of California (Cal), Southern Methodist University (SMU) and Stanford University to the Atlantic Coast Conference. Cal, SMU and Stanford will join the ACC as full members with full voting participation effective July 1, 2024 (SMU) and Aug. 2, 2024 (Stanford and Cal). The decision followed the submission of letters of application from all three institutions.

■ The additions of Cal, SMU and Stanford enhance and strengthen the ACC academically, athletically and financially as well as create a true national conference that spans coast to coast. The incoming universities enrich the league's competitiveness in all sports and further demonstrate the ACC's commitment to broad-based programs for both women and men. More than 2,200 student-athletes from Cal, SMU and Stanford will join the nearly 10,000 current ACC student-athletes competing at the highest level of intercollegiate athletics.

GREATNESS IS WHAT WE DO

■ The ACC announced its new creative campaign, "ACCOMPLISH GREATNESS," a multi-part brand campaign highlighting the vast success of the ACC's athletics and academics alike. The campaign launched ahead of the ACC's official college football season on Week 1. The series will continue with multi-sport spots highlighting the ACC's incredible accomplishments in all sports throughout the academic year.

THE 2023 ACC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME IS SET

■ The top two teams in the Atlantic Coast Conference – No. 5 Florida State and No. 9 Louisville – will face off in the 2023 ACC Football Championship Game on Saturday, Dec. 2, at 8 p.m., at Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte, North Carolina.

■ The Seminoles will make their sixth trip to the ACC Football Championship Game and the first since 2014, when they won their third consecutive ACC Championship title with a 37-35 win over Georgia Tech.

■ It will mark the Cardinals' first-ever trip to the ACC Football Championship Game.

MULTIPLE ACC TEAMS RANKED IN TOP 25 IN WEEK 13

■ For the 12th consecutive week, the Florida State Seminoles were ranked in the top five of the Associated Press Top 25 poll, coming in at No. 5 overall. Joining Florida State in the AP Top 25 poll was Louisville, which remained at No. 9 overall. NC State, North Carolina, and Clemson all received votes.

■ Three ACC teams were ranked in the *USA Today* AFCA Coaches Poll this week. Florida State remained in the top five, coming in at No. 5 overall, while Louisville came in at No. 9. For the first time all season, NC State was in the top 25 coaches poll, breaking in at No. 24. North Carolina and Clemson also received votes.

BOWL-ELIGIBLE TEAMS

■ Heading into the final week of regular-season play, there are 67 bowl-eligible teams in FBS, including nine teams from the ACC in Florida State, Louisville, North Carolina, Miami, Boston College, Duke, NC State, Clemson, and Georgia Tech.

■ The nine ACC bowl-eligible teams to date are tied for the most among all FBS conferences.

■ Two more teams in Virginia Tech (5-6) and Syracuse (5-6) are just one win away from becoming bowl eligible.

■ Since 2017, the ACC has averaged 10 bowl-eligible teams each year, including a high of 11 teams in 2018. Last season, the ACC had nine teams play in a bowl game.

SEMINOLES STAND STRONG

■ Florida State is 11-0 overall and 8-0 in ACC play, the Noles' best start since 2014 when they started 13-0 and posted a perfect 8-0 ACC record.

■ The Seminoles are one of just six undefeated teams remaining in FBS this season.

■ The ACC had six teams start the season at 4-0, which was tied for the most teams in a Power 5 conference to start 4-0 in a single season in the AP Poll Era (since 1936).

VERSUS THEIR PEERS

■ The ACC has posted a 50.43 winning percentage versus Power 5 opponents this season - conference and non-conference combined - the second-best winning percentage among all Power 5 conferences.

■ The ACC has 59 wins over Power 5 teams - conference and non-conference combined - the third-most among all Power 5 conferences.

■ The ACC is one of just two conferences in all of FBS with a winning record over Power 5 opponents - conference and non-conference games combined.

■ ACC teams have a combined 13 wins over the top 25 nationally ranked opponents this season - the third-most among all Power 5 conferences.

■ The ACC has recorded a combined 24 wins over teams with an RPI in the top 30 (1-30) - the most wins among all FBS conferences.

■ ACC teams have a combined 33 wins over teams with a record over .500 - the most among all FBS conferences.

CLOSE CALLS

■ The ACC overall has 15 wins in close games this season (4 points or less) - the third-most among Power 5 conferences.

■ The ACC overall has 31 wins in one TD games this season (8 points or less) - the most among all Power 5 conferences.

■ 45.1 percent of the ACC's conference games (23-of-51) have been decided by one score or less (8 points) this season, the most among all Power 5 conferences.

NON-CONFERENCE SUCCESS

■ The ACC has been solid in non-conference play this season, going 37-15 (.712) overall in non-conference play going into the final week of the regular season.

■ The ACC's 37 non-conference wins are the second-most non-conference wins among all FBS conferences.

■ The ACC has 10 non-conference Power 5 wins - which includes two wins over Notre Dame - the most among all FBS conferences.

■ ACC teams are 8-5 combined against the SEC and Big Ten, with the ACC recording four wins over each of the two conferences. The rest of FBS is 10-50 overall versus the two Power 5 conferences.

■ The ACC has also handed Notre Dame two of their three losses this season - Louisville (33-20) on Oct. 7 and Clemson (31-23) on Nov. 4.

■ In Week 13, the ACC has four non-conference matchups, all coming against the SEC.

ACC ON ABC/ESPN

■ During the first 12 weeks of the season, the ACC had six games on ABC's "Saturday Night Football" as well as a total of 38 appearances on ABC, ESPN, and ESPN2.

■ Overall, the ACC has had 17 ABC/ACC broadcasts on the season to date, the most of any conference.

■ With three games listed for ABC in Week 13, the ACC will have had seven games on ABC's "Saturday Night Football" as Georgia Tech hosts Georgia (Nov. 25) this week - the most of any FBS conference - and will host 12 ABC Noon Games with two games this weekend in Miami at Boston College (Friday, Nov. 24) and Kentucky at Louisville (Saturday, Nov. 25) - also the most of any FBS conference.

■ The ACC has already made 38 appearances on ABC, ESPN, and ESPN2 over the first 12 weeks of the season. To date, 24 ACC contests are scheduled for national ABC broadcasts, with all 14 league programs featured.

■ In addition to the games already played, the ACC will be featured in five games on ABC and ESPN over the next two weeks of the season.

STANDING OUT ON BOTH SIDES OF THE BALL

■ Florida State ranks in the top 15 nationally in both scoring offense and scoring defense - offense (7th, 40.1 ppg) and defense (12th, 16.9 ppg) - one of seven teams in all of FBS.

■ Louisville also ranks in the top 30 in both scoring defense and scoring offense - defense (17th, 18.4 ppg) and offense (26th, 33.2 ppg) - one of 13 teams in all of FBS.

■ FSU also ranks in the top 20 in both red zone offense and red zone defense - offense (17th, 91.3 percent) and defense (16th, 75.0 percent) - one of five teams in all of FBS.

■ North Carolina ranks in the top 25 in both red zone offense (25th, 90.6 percent) and red zone defense (15th, 74.4 percent) - one of just eight teams in all of FBS.

■ Pitt, like FSU and UNC, ranks in the top 25 in both red zone offense (21st, 90.9 percent) and red zone defense (14th, 73.7 percent) - one of just eight teams in all of FBS.

■ FSU ranks in the top 25 in both total offense and total defense - offense (17th, 451.7 ypg) and defense (24th, 323.1 ypg) - one of only five teams in all of FBS.

■ Like FSU, Louisville ranks in the top 25 nationally in both total defense and total offense - defense (21st, 317.0 ypg) and offense (22nd, 441.8 ypg) - one of only five teams in all of FBS.

■ Miami ranks in the top 35 in both total defense and total offense - defense (28th, 326.8 ypg) and offense (32nd, 432.9 ypg).

■ FSU ranks in the top 20 in both passing defense and passing offense - defense (15th, 183.5 ypg) and offense (17th, 289.5 ypg) - one of two teams in all of FBS.

■ The Seminoles rank first in the ACC and in the top 20 nationally in both team passing efficiency (17th, 160.43) and team passing efficiency defense (5th, 100.87).

■ Louisville ranks in the top 30 in both team passing efficiency (24th, 155.99) and team passing efficiency defense (27th, 120.96).

■ The Cardinals also rank in the top 30 in both rushing defense and rushing offense - defense (12th, 98.0 ypg) and offense (28th, 185.5 ypg) - one of just 13 teams in all of FBS.

■ Clemson ranks in the top 15 nationally in most first downs converted on offense and fewest first downs allowed on defense - offensive first downs gained (14th, 261) and defensive first downs allowed (5th, 161) - one of just two teams nationally (Georgia).

■ North Carolina leads the ACC and ranks seventh nationally in turnover margin (0.91). The Tar Heels are second in the ACC and 10th nationally in takeaways (21) and second in the ACC and 19th in all of FBS in turnovers lost (11).

DISCUSSING DEFENSE

■ The ACC has four teams ranked in the top 25 in total defense - Clemson (10th, 288.6 ypg), Louisville (21st, 317.0 ypg), NC State (22nd, 318.0 ypg), and Florida State (24th, 323.1 ypg) - the second-most of any FBS conference.

■ Five ACC teams rank in the top 25 in red zone defense - Louisville (2nd, 66.7%), Pitt (14th, 73.7%), North Carolina (15th, 74.4%), Florida State (16th, 75.0%), and Duke (24th, 76.3%) - the most of any FBS conference.

■ Seven ACC teams rank in the top 45 in scoring defense - Florida State (12th, 16.9 ppg), Louisville (17th, 18.4 ppg), Duke (26th, 19.8 ppg), NC State (29th, 20.2 ppg), Clemson (37th, 21.1 ppg), Miami (44th, 22.3 ppg), and Syracuse (45th, 23.1 ppg) - tied for the second-most in all of FBS.

■ Clemson ranks first in the ACC and 10th in all of FBS in total defense, allowing just 288.6 yards per game. The Tigers' defense also ranks sixth nationally in both team passing efficiency defense (100.98) and in turnovers with 22 takeaways this season.

■ Clemson ranks in the top 35 nationally in both passing defense and rushing defense - passing defense (8th, 166.7 ypg) and rushing defense (31st, 121.9 ypg) - one of 15 teams in all of FBS.

■ Louisville's defense leads the ACC and ranks second nationally in red zone defense at 66.7 percent. The Cardinals' defense ranks 10th nationally in fewest first downs allowed this season (175) and 11th in all of FBS in third-down conversion percentage defense (29.5 percent).

■ Duke ranks 25th nationally in team passing efficiency defense (120.45) and 24th in red zone defense (76.3 percent).

■ Miami's defense ranks eighth nationally in all of FBS in sacks per game (3.0) and 13th overall in tackles-for-loss per game (7.3).

■ Boston College's defense ranks 21st nationally in fewest passing yards allowed, surrendering just 189.1 passing yards per game this season.

■ NC State's defense leads the national in third-down conversion percentage defense (26.6 percent). The Pack defense also ranks 10th nationally with 21 takeaways, including ranking fourth nationally in all of FBS with 15 interceptions, which also leads the ACC.

■ The Wolfpack defense also ranks 17th nationally in team sacks (2.82 per game), 16th in rushing defense (102.5 ypg), and 22nd in total defense (318.0 ypg).

■ Pitt ranks 14th nationally in tackles-for-loss (7.2 per game) and 17th in all of FBS in sacks (2.82 per game).

■ Virginia Tech, like Pitt, ranks in the top 20 in both sacks (12th, 2.91 per game) and tackles-for-loss (17th, 7.1 per game).

■ The Hokies' defense ranks seventh nationally in fewest passing yards allowed (166.5 per game) this season and 27th in total defense (325.5 yards per game).

■ The Florida State defense has not allowed 30 points in a game this season, one of just five teams to do that in all of FBS this year. The 11-game streak is the longest active in the ACC and third-longest in the country.

TALKING OFFENSE

■ The ACC has five teams ranked in the SportSource Analytics relative scoring offense percentage rankings top 30 - Florida State (10th, 151.81%), North Carolina (14th, 147.29%), Miami (21st, 136.88%), Georgia Tech (28th, 129.87%), and Louisville (29th, 129.85%). Clemson is just outside the top 30 at 31st (128.55%).

■ Five ACC teams rank in the top 35 nationally in total offense - North Carolina (3rd, 514.8 ypg), Florida State (17th, 451.7 ypg), Louisville (22nd, 441.8 ypg), Georgia Tech (30th, 435.1 ypg), and Miami (32nd, 432.9 ypg).

■ North Carolina's offense leads the ACC and ranks third nationally in total offense, with an average of 514.8 total yards of offense per game. The Tar Heels are one of just five teams in all of FBS averaging 500.0 yards or more of total offense on the season.

■ The Tar Heels rank eighth nationally and first in the ACC in passing offense at 311.6 passing yards per game and 12th nationally and first in the ACC in rushing offense at 203.2 rushing yards per game - one of just two teams in all of FBS to rank in the top 15 in both passing offense and rushing offense.

■ North Carolina's offense also ranks second in the ACC and 12th nationally in scoring offense, with an average of 38.1 points per game.

■ The UNC offense ranks first in the ACC and fourth nationally in most offensive first downs made (279) and ninth in third-down conversion percentage (49.7 percent).

■ Boston College's offense ranks second in the ACC and 17th nationally in rushing, averaging 198.1 rushing yards per game.

■ Georgia Tech's offense ranks 19th nationally in rushing yards per game at 196.4 yards per outing and 30th in all of FBS in total offense, averaging 435.1 yards per game.

STREAKIN'

■ Florida State enters the week on a 17-game winning streak, which is the third-longest winning streak and FBS to date.

■ The Noles have also won 11 straight ACC conference games, which is the fifth-longest conference winning streak to date. FSU also has a nine-game home win streak, the fifth-best in all of FBS, and a six-game road win streak, which ranks seventh nationally.

■ Louisville has posted an ACC-best 11-game home win streak, the fourth-best in the FBS to date.

■ Virginia Tech, who nearly saw its streak of consecutive games scored end with just three points at Louisville on Nov. 4, has scored in 368-consecutive games, the fourth-longest streak in FBS history.

PREVIEWING WEEK 13

■ The final week of the 2023 regular season will see five conference matchups - including Virginia Tech at Virginia and North Carolina at NC State - as well as four ACC versus SEC in-state matchups.

■ Boston College will host Miami in a conference matchup on Friday, Nov. 24 (Noon, ABC) with both teams looking to get back in the win column following multiple conference losses.

■ Pitt will travel to Duke in a battle of two defensive teams on Saturday, Nov. 25 (Noon, ACCN) as the Panthers look to end their season on a two-game winning streak while the Blue Devils look to snap a two-game skid heading into postseason play.

■ Wake Forest will be seeing its fifth win of the season when the Demon Deacons travel to Syracuse on Saturday (2 p.m., The CW), while the Orange will become bowl eligible with a home win on Senior Day.

■ After last year's game was cancelled, Virginia Tech and Virginia will meet for the first time in two years on Saturday (3:30 p.m., ACCN). The Hokies need one more win to become bowl eligible, while the Cavaliers will look to be the spoiler and cap their 2023 season with back-to-back home wins in ACC play.

■ North Carolina and NC State will face off in Raleigh, North Carolina, on Saturday night (8 p.m., ACCN) with both teams looking to take that next step in finishing the season with double-digit wins. Both teams enter the rivalry contest at 8-3 overall, as NC State has won four straight games, while North Carolina will look to rebound from a road loss at Clemson last week.

■ In non-conference play, the nationally-ranked No. 9 Louisville Cardinals will put its 11-game home winning streak on the line versus in-state foe Kentucky on Saturday (Noon, ABC). Louisville has dropped each of the last four meetings to the Wildcats in the Governor's Cup.

■ In the Sunshine Showdown, No. 5 Florida State will travel into the swamp without quarterback Jordan Travis to take on the Florida Gators. FSU will look to remain unbeaten and stay in the College Football Playoff hunt, while Florida is looking for a win to become bowl eligible and keep its season alive.

■ Clemson will hit the road for a non-conference matchup with South Carolina in the Palmetto Bowl on Saturday night (7:30 p.m., SECN), as the Tigers look to avenge a loss to the Gamecocks at home last season and push their current winning streak to four straight games to end the regular season. Like Florida, South Carolina needs a win to become bowl eligible.

■ Georgia Tech, which became bowl eligible for the first time since 2018 with a victory over Syracuse last week, will play host to No. 1 Georgia in Clean, Old-Fashioned Hate. The Bulldogs have won five straight over the Yellow Jackets, with Tech's last win in the series coming back in 2016 in Athens.

WEEK 12 RECAP

■ Week 12 saw six of the eight games won by the home team, while four of the eight contests were decided by eight points or less.

■ No. 10 Louisville came from behind to defeat Miami 38-31 and clinch a spot in its first-ever ACC Football Championship Game. The Cardinals will take on No. 4 Florida State in the championship game on Dec. 2.

■ The Seminoles overcame a slow start and a devastating injury to starting quarterback Travis Jordan in the first quarter to trounce North Alabama 58-13 and remain undefeated heading into this week's rivalry contest with the Florida Gators.

■ Pitt and Virginia both picked up their second conference wins of the season with home wins. Pitt slowed down the Boston College offensive running attack to defeat the Eagles 24-16 on Thursday night, while the Cavaliers got a big game from freshman quarterback Anthony Colandrea to upend the Duke Blue Devils 30-27.

■ The Clemson Tigers defense held the high-octane North Carolina offense to its fewest points and total yards of the season in a 31-20 home win to extend their winning streak to three straight games.

■ Behind Brennan Armstrong's big day, NC State scored 35 points in Blacksburg, Virginia, to defeat the Virginia Tech Hokies. The Wolfpack have now won four straight games and eight games on the season for the fourth consecutive year.

■ Georgia Tech's defense held Syracuse to just 259 yards overall, including only 53 passing yards, to beat the Orange 31-22. The win made the Yellow Jackets bowl eligible for the first time since 2018.

■ Wake Forest had its non-conference winning streak snapped at 12 consecutive games, as the Demon Deacons fell on the road at No. 19 Notre Dame 45-7.

O'MY OMARION

■ UNC running back Omarion Hampton leads the ACC and is tied for first nationally in rushing yards per game at 128.5. He is also tied for first nationally and leads the league with 1,414 rushing yards on the season.

■ He also leads the ACC with 14 rushing touchdowns, which ranks fifth nationally, and 16 total touchdowns this season, which is sixth nationally.

■ Hampton's six 100-yard rushing games this season lead the nation.

■ The UNC running back also ranks fourth nationally in all-purpose yards per game with an average of 147.09.

A TON OF WASHINGTON

■ Virginia wideout Malik Washington not only ranks fifth nationally in all-purpose yards per game (144.64), but he also ranks second nationally in three offensive categories.

■ Washington ranks second in all of FBS in receptions per game (8.7), receiving yards (1,311), and receiving yards per game (119.2) this year.

■ In his lone year at Virginia, Washington broke the program's single-season receiving yards record and the program's single-season receptions record.

MAYE DAY

■ North Carolina quarterback Drake Maye leads the ACC and ranks second in all of FBS in total offense with an average of 336.1 yards per game.

■ Maye also leads the ACC and ranks sixth nationally with an average of 304.9 passing yards per game and in total passing yards with 3,354 this season.

■ The UNC signal-caller also ranks 15th nationally in points responsible for (182) and points responsible for per game (16.5).

JORDAN RULES

■ Florida State quarterback Jordan Travis was having an outstanding season to add to his record-setting career. This season, he is one of three players nationally with at least 20 touchdown passes and two or fewer interceptions.

■ This year, Travis ranks in the top three in the ACC in passing efficiency (154.5), passing touchdowns (20), passing yards (2,756), passing yards per game (250.5), passing yards per completion (13.31), completion percentage (63.9), points responsible for (162), points responsible for per game (14.7), yards per pass attempt (8.51), and total offense yards per game (266.5).

■ FSU's Travis ranks first in FSU's career record books in touchdowns responsible for (97) and total offense (10,554 yards). He also ranks second all-time in FSU history in touchdown passes (65) and career passing yards (8,644).

SCORING KING

■ Georgia Tech quarterback Haynes King has found the end zone more often than not this year, as he leads the ACC and ranks in the top 10 nationally in several scoring categories.

■ King leads the ACC and ranks sixth nationally in points responsible for (200) and seventh in all of FBS in points responsible for per game (18.2). He also leads the ACC and ranks 10th nationally in passing touchdowns (26).

■ The GT quarterback also ranks second in the ACC and 18th nationally in total offense, averaging 292.8 yards per game this season.

TREY'S TIME

■ Florida State running back Trey Benson has been Mr. Consistent for the Seminoles this season out of the offensive backfield.

■ Benson ranks in the top three in the ACC and in the top 25 in all of FBS in rushing touchdowns (11), total touchdowns (12), and rushing yards per carry (6.24).

BEST MONEY ON YOUR RETURN

■ The ACC boasts three of the top 10 kick returners regarding yards per kick return in Brashard Smith (Miami), Julian Gray (NC State), and Bhayshul Tuten (Virginia Tech). Smith ranks second in all of FBS with an average of 30.2 yards per kick return this season, while Gray ranks seventh at 27.9 yards per return. Tuten is ninth overall with his kick return average of 26.3 yards per return.

■ In addition to the kick returners, Virginia Tech's Tucker Holloway is fourth in all of FBS in punt return average at 16.2 yards per return this season, while Keon Coleman of Florida State is tied for 11th at 11.1 yards per punt return.

■ Of the 32 kick returns returned for touchdowns this season in all of FBS, six have come from the ACC - the most of any FBS conference.

ALL-PURPOSE GUYS

■ The ACC has four student-athletes who rank in the top 40 in all-purpose yards per game this season in Omarion Hampton (North Carolina), Malik Washington (Virginia), Jawhar Jordan (Louisville), and Bhayshul Tuten (Virginia Tech).

■ Hampton of UNC ranks fourth nationally at 147.09 all-purpose yards per game, with 1,414 rushing yards and 204 receiving yards on the season.

■ Washington of UVA ranks fifth nationally in all-purpose yards per game this season at 144.64 yards per game, with 1,311 receiving yards, 273 kick return yards, and seven rushing yards.

■ Jordan of Louisville is 28th overall in all of FBS with an average of 115.64 all-purpose yards per contest. He has recorded 1,006 rushing yards, 200 receiving yards, and 63 kickoff return yards this season.

■ Tuten of Virginia Tech ranks 36th nationally with his average of 111.18 all-purpose yards per game. The Hokie has tallied 610 rushing yards, 218 receiving yards, and 395 kick return yards this year.

LEADER OF THE PACK

■ NC State linebacker Payton Wilson leads the ACC and ranks sixth nationally in total tackles on the season with 123 and tackles per game with an average of 11.2 per contest.

■ The defensive leader has recorded double-digit tackles in eight of the Wolfpack's 11 games on the season, including a season-high 16 tackles last time out versus Miami (Nov. 4) and 14 tackles against both Notre Dame (Sept. 9) and Marshall (Oct. 7).

FULL HOUSE

■ The ACC has five defenders that rank in the top 25 in sacks per game this season, all of which have totaled 7.5 sacks or more on the year.

■ Louisville's Ashton Gillotte leads the way with an average of 0.91 sacks per game and 10.0 total sacks on the season, which is tied for eighth nationally.

■ Also in the top 15 nationally is Virginia Tech's Antwaun Powell-Ryland, Jr., who is tied for 11th nationally with an average of 0.82 sacks per game with his 9.0 sacks over 11 games.

■ Kaimon Rucker of North Carolina (8.5) is tied for 16th nationally with an average of 0.77 sacks per outing, Florida State's Kalen DeLoach (7.5) is tied for 24th overall with an average of 0.70 sacks per contest, and Jasheen Davis of Wake Forest (7.5) is tied for 25th in all of FBS with his average of 0.68 sacks per game.

NO FLY ZONE

■ Boston College cornerback Elijah Jones and Miami safety Kamren Kinchens both have five interceptions on the season, which lead the ACC and are tied for second in all of FBS football.

■ Louisville safety Devin Neal and Georgia Tech defensive back Jaylon King are both tied for 14th nationally with four interceptions apiece on the year.

■ Jones also ranks fourth nationally in passes defended per game (1.4) and 10th in total passes defended (13).

POINTS, POINTS, AND MORE POINTS

■ The ACC has four players - three kickers and a running back - that rank in the top 25 overall in points per game this season.

■ North Carolina kicker Noah Burdette, who is 18-of-19 in field goal tries this year, ranks fourth nationally in points per game at 10.4. He is one of just six players to average double-digit points per game this season.

■ North Carolina running back Omarion Hampton and Florida State kicker Ryan Fitzgerald are tied for 19th overall with an average of 8.7 points per game this year.

■ Miami placekicker Andres Borregales ranks 22nd nationally with his average of 8.6 points per game on the year.

TOP OF THE CLASS IN ACTIVE CAREER LEADERS

■ The Tigers' Will Shipley ranks first among all active players in the FBS in career all-purpose yards per game at 117.91. He has totaled 4,009 all-purpose yards in his career - 2,638 rushing, 561 receiving, and 810 kick return yards - over 34 games played.

■ Boston College's Elijah Jones is tied for third among all active players with 43 career passes defended.

■ Miami's Kamren Kinchens and North Carolina's Antavious Lane are tied for third with 11 career interceptions. Kinchens also ranks third among all FBS players with a career average of 0.33 interceptions per game.

■ North Carolina quarterback Drake Maye ranks fourth in all of FBS in total offense per game at 305.8 yards per contest over his career.

■ NC State's Payton Wilson is fifth in total tackles with 387 career stops and in career total tackles per game with his career average of 8.60.

■ Syracuse's Marlowe Wax is tied for third among all active FBS players with eight career forced fumbles.

■ Virginia Tech's Tucker Holloway leads all active FBS players in punt return average at 18.0 yards per return for his career.

■ The Orange's Trebor Pena ranks fourth among all FBS players with a career kickoff return average of 27.0 yards.

■ North Carolina placekicker Noah Burnette is tied for third among all active players with an average of 8.5 points per game for his career.

■ Miami placekicker Andres Borregales ranks fifth among all active players with a 1.54 career field goals made per game average.

HISTORICAL TOP-10 WINS

■ In the Labor Day primetime game on Sept. 4, the Duke Blue Devils upended No. 9 Clemson 28-7 in Wallace Wade Stadium in the two teams' season opener. The win was the first time the Blue Devils had beaten a top-10 team since defeating then-No. 7 Clemson in 1989, snapping a losing streak of 28 straight games to top-10 teams.

■ On Sept. 3, the No. 8 Florida State Seminoles defeated No. 5 LSU 45-24 in the Camping World Kickoff in Orlando, Fla. FSU's 45 points were tied for the most in a season opener against an AP top-5 teams in the Poll era (since 1936). As the lower-ranked team, the Seminoles also recorded the first 20+ point win over an AP top-5 team since 1988 with the season-opening victory.

■ Louisville posted a 33-20 home win over No. 10 Notre Dame on Oct. 7, the program's second-straight win over a top-10 foe in the last two years and the eighth overall in school history. With the Cardinals' win over Notre Dame, the victory snapped the Fighting Irish's 30-game regular-season winning streak versus ACC opponents dating back to 2017.

■ Virginia held No. 10 North Carolina to just 27 points, well below the Tar Heels' average of 37.5 points per game on the season, to erase a 10-point second-half deficit in a 31-27 ACC road win on Oct. 21. The win was Virginia's first-ever win on the road against a nationally-ranked top-10 opponent.

MILESTONE WINS IN 2023

■ North Carolina head coach Mack Brown recorded his 100th career win as the head coach for the Tar Heels with the 31-17 win over South Carolina on Sept. 2.

■ With his 100th win at UNC, Brown etched his name in the college football record books as the only coach to have won 100 games or more at two different FBS schools. He totaled 158 wins at Texas in 16 seasons from 1998-2014.

■ Wake Forest head coach Dave Clawson picked up his 150th career win as a collegiate head coach with the Demon Deacons' 37-17 win over Elon on Aug. 31. The season-opening victory was Clawson's 60th at Wake.

■ Louisville first-year head coach and alumnus Jeff Brohm recorded his first career win as the head coach of his alma mater with a 39-34 victory over Georgia Tech at the Aflac Kickoff Game on Sept. 1. The win also marked Brohm's first conference win in the ACC.

■ Clemson's Dabo Swinney recorded his 100th ACC regular-season conference win with the Tigers' 31-14 road win at Syracuse on Sept. 30. He joined Bobby Bowden (117) as the only two head coaches to have 100 or more conference regular-season wins in the ACC.

■ NC State's Dave Doeren registered his 100th career win as a collegiate head coach with the Wolfpack's 24-17 win over Clemson on Oct. 28. His 100th career victory was also his 77th win at NC State, which at the time tied him with Earle Edward (1954-70) for the most victories in program history.

BIG MEN ON CAMPUS

■ Dabo Swinney became the all-time winningest coach in Clemson football history with the Tigers' 31-23 win over No. 12 Notre Dame on Nov. 4. His 166th career win passed College Football Hall of Famer Frank Howard (165 from 1940-69) for sole possession of the Clemson record for career head coaching wins. He now has 168 career wins at Clemson and counting.

■ Dave Doeren became NC State's winningest coach in program history with the Wolfpack's 20-6 win over Miami on Nov. 4. With his 78th career win as the leader of the Pack, he passed Earle Edwards (76 from 1954-70) for the most victories in program history. He now has 80 career wins at NC State and counting.

ACC COACHING NOTES

■ Two new football coaches were hired in the ACC for the 2023 season: Georgia Tech's Brent Key and Louisville's Jeff Brohm. Key was hired after going 4-4 as the Yellow Jackets' interim head coach in 2022. Brohm returned to his alma mater after a six-year stint at Purdue.

■ Among active head coaches, the ACC's Dabo Swinney (Clemson), Mack Brown (North Carolina), Mike Norvell (Florida State), Mike Elko (Duke), and Dave Doeren (NC State) rank among the top 40 in the nation in career winning percentage. Brown is second among all active coaches with 282 wins.

■ Clemson's Swinney owns 168 career wins, the 11th-most among active coaches. Swinney joins Bobby Bowden (173) as the only head coach ever to lead an ACC program to 150 wins.

■ Two of the five active coaches to win a national title reside in the ACC. Dabo Swinney led Clemson to national titles in 2016 and 2018. North Carolina's Mack Brown won a national title at Texas in 2005.

■ Four current league coaches have won ACC Coach of the Year honors - North Carolina's Mack Brown (1996), Clemson's Dabo Swinney (2015 & 2018), Wake Forest's Dave Clawson (2021) and Duke's Mike Elko (2022).

2023 ACC FOOTBALL HONORS CLASS ANNOUNCED

■ On Tuesday, Nov. 7, the 2023 ACC Football Honors Class was announced on ACC PM. The class includes a Heisman Trophy winner, multiple Super Bowl Champions, Hall of Famers, All-Americans, and several NFL standouts.

■ This year's class will be celebrated during the ACC Football Honors program presented by the Charlotte Sports Foundation at the Belk Theater in Uptown Charlotte on the evening of Friday, Dec. 1, and during the on-field pregame festivities at the 2023 ACC Football Championship Game, set for 8 p.m. on Saturday, Dec. 2, at Bank of America Stadium. ACC Network will air the ACC Football Honors production on Dec. 15 at 7 p.m.

2024-30 FOOTBALL SCHEDULE MODEL ANNOUNCED

■ The ACC announced its future football schedule model for the next seven years, 2024-2030. With the addition of the ACC's three new member institutions next summer - University of California (Cal), Southern Methodist University (SMU) and Stanford University - the new model will go into effect beginning with the 2024 season.

■ The new schedule will continue with no divisions, feature 17 schools and will increase the number of annual conference matchups from 56 to 68. The top two teams based on conference winning percentage will compete in the ACC Football Championship Game on the first Saturday in December at Bank of America Stadium.

■ The approved format will continue to have each member institution play eight conference games per season, with all 17 teams playing each other at least twice over the next seven seasons - once at home and once on the road. The current 14 conference teams will play a total of three times each in California over the seven years and none will travel west to California in back-to-back seasons.

■ The new model protects 16 annual matchups. Of the 16 matchups, 11 are retained from the current 3-5-5 schedule model, two are restored rivalries from the divisional format in Miami-Virginia Tech and NC State-Wake Forest and the three new schools fill the remaining three. The annual protected matchups are Boston College-Syracuse, Boston College-Pitt, Syracuse-Pitt, North Carolina-Virginia, North Carolina-Duke, North Carolina-NC State, NC State-Wake Forest, NC State-Duke, Duke-Wake Forest, Virginia Tech-Virginia, Florida State-Clemson, Miami-Florida State, Miami-Virginia Tech, Stanford-Cal, Stanford-SMU, and Cal-SMU.

ESPN'S BEST LABOR DAY SUNDAY

■ ESPN's Labor Day Showdown Between No. 5 LSU and No. 8 FSU registered 9.5 million viewers on ABC during the Seminoles win.

■ The game was the most-watched Labor Day Sunday game since Notre Dame and Texas in 2016 and the second-most watched on record, having peaked at 10.3 million viewers.

NOTING THE SCHEDULE FOR 2023

■ This marks the league's first and only year under a 3-5-5 scheduling model - with the addition of the three new schools in Cal, SMU, and Stanford prior to the start of the 2024 season. This season, each team will play three primary opponents annually and face the other 10 league teams twice during the four-year cycle, once at home and once on the road. The schedule allows for each team to face all 13 conference opponents home and away at least once over the four-year period.

■ The season schedule will feature 56 league games and 56 non-conference contests. Each team will play eight league contests

■ The model eliminates divisions with the top two teams based on winning percentage playing in the ACC Football Championship Game on the first Saturday in December. The 2023 schedule includes one open date for each team, and at least one conference contest is scheduled each week.

■ Once again, the ACC's non-conference schedule is arguably the most difficult in the country. In addition to 23 games against Power 5 opponents, the ACC will play 11 non-conference games against teams ranked in the preseason 2023 AP Top 25 poll. A total of 13 of the 14 ACC teams play at least one Power 5 non-conference opponent (including Notre Dame), while eight schools - Clemson, Duke, Florida State, Georgia Tech, North Carolina, Virginia, Virginia Tech and Wake Forest - play two. Pitt and Louisville both play three non-conference Power 5 foes and are two of just six teams to play 11 games against the Power 5 conferences this season.

■ This season, ACC teams will play 27 games against opponents that appeared in a bowl game last year in 2022.

2023 ACC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME SET FOR 8 P.M.

■ The 2023 Atlantic Coast Conference Football Championship Game will kick off at 8 p.m. on ABC on Saturday, Dec. 2, at Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte, North Carolina. The game will feature the top two teams based on regular-season conference winning percentage.

■ This is the 14th time in the last 15 years that the game will be held in primetime. Twelve different teams have competed in the game since it began in 2005. Last season, No. 9 Clemson rolled to a 39-10 win over No. 24 North Carolina for its seventh ACC title in the last eight seasons.

■ Bank of America Stadium, home of the NFL's Carolina Panthers, has been the site of 12 of the last 13 ACC Football Championship Games. In 2018, the ACC and the Charlotte Sports Foundation reached an agreement to keep the game in Charlotte through 2030. Not including the 2020 game, which had limited attendance due to the pandemic, ACC Football Championship Games played at Bank of America Stadium have had an average attendance of nearly 70,000 fans. The ACC has the second-highest average attendance of any Power 5 conference championship game since 2010.

■ The winner of the conference championship game has gone on to play in the National Championship Game or compete in the College Football Playoff in eight of the last 10 seasons, including two teams in 2020. The ACC has the second most CFP appearances of any conference.

ACC PLAYERS IN THE NFL

■ More than 280 former ACC football players were listed on NFL rosters prior to Week 1 of the 2023-24 NFL season. All 14 ACC schools were represented with Clemson leading the way with 42 former players.

■ A total of 283 former ACC standouts were on the NFL's active roster, physically unable to perform lists and practice squads, with 213 players on active 53-man rosters.

■ Following Clemson's conference-best 42 players, Miami ranks second with 30 players, while Pitt and Virginia Tech each have 27 players in the NFL.

CLEMSON FAVORED IN 2023 ACC PRESEASON POLL

■ Clemson is favored to win the 2023 ACC football title for the eighth time in the last nine years, according to a preseason poll of 176 media voters.

■ DE Jared Verse (Florida State) and S Kam Kinchens (Miami) were named Preseason First-Team All-Americans by the Associated Press.

■ Eight ACC players were named to Preseason AP Second-Team All-America: QB Drake Maye (UNC), OG Christian Mahogany (BC), TE Oronde Gadsden II (Syracuse), All-Purpose Will Shipley (Clemson), DL Tyler Davis (Clemson), LB Jeremiah Trotter Jr. (Clemson), LB Barrett Carter (Clemson) and LB Cedric Gray (UNC).

■ Nine ACC players earned Sporting News Preseason All-America status. Athlete Will Shipley (Clemson), DL Jared Verse (FSU), LB Jeremiah Trotter Jr. (Clemson) and S Kam Kinchens (Miami) earned first-team honors. QB Drake Maye (UNC), WR Johnny Wilson (FSU), TE Oronde Gadsden II (Syracuse), OL Graham Barton (Duke) and LB Cedric Gray (UNC) notched second-team laurels.

■ Verse, Carter and Kinchens were named to ESPN's Preseason All-America Team.

ALBERTO RIVERON NAMED ACC SUPERVISOR OF FOOTBALL OFFICIALS

■ Alberto Riveron was named the ACC's new Supervisor of Football Officials on Nov. 30, 2022. Riveron, who served as the NFL's Senior Vice President of Officiating from 2017-20 and currently works as an NFL Rules analyst, has compiled a distinguished 30-year career as both an on-field official and an officiating administrator in the NCAA and NFL.

■ Among his duties, Riveron is responsible for managing the oversight, supervision, leadership, training and development of an ACC officiating staff that includes on-field officials, instant replay officials, instant replay communicators, position coaches, evaluators and assistant supervisors. He serves as the day-to-day administrator of the ACC's Football Officiating Alliance and develops conference football officiating schedules and assignments.

SIAC JOINS LEAGUE'S FOOTBALL OFFICIATING ALLIANCE

■ The ACC and the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (SIAC) announced that the SIAC has joined the ACC's football officiating alliance that includes the ACC, Big South Conference and Ohio Valley Conference (OVC), Coastal Athletic Association (CAA), Ivy League, Northeast Conference (NEC) and Patriot League.

■ The SIAC joining the alliance is a first of its kind, as the SIAC becomes the first college athletic conference that consists mostly of historically black colleges and universities (HBCUs) to join a football officiating alliance. Formed in 1913, the SIAC is affiliated with the National Collegiate Athletics Association (NCAA) at the Division II level, with all but one member located in the Southern United States.

■ The football officiating alliance enables all eight conferences to work together on a wide range of officiating matters, including training, development, recruitment, retention, scheduling, and evaluation. The mission of the alliance is to increase proficiency and consistency among officials across the collegiate football officiating landscape, to aid in the development of less experienced officials, and to increase diversity throughout the profession.

ACC WITH THREE NAMED TO 2023 GOOD WORKS TEAM

■ The ACC had three student-athletes from three different institutions named to the Allstate AFCA Good Works Team this week. Will Shipley of Clemson, Ja'Mion Franklin of Duke and Gavin Bartholomew of Pitt were three of the 11 student-athletes chosen for the FBS Good Works Team.

DUKE'S CARTER A 2023 CAMPBELL TROPHY FINALIST

■ Duke defensive tackle DeWayne Carter is one of 16 finalists for the 2023 William V. Campbell Trophy, which is presented annually by the National Football Foundation and the College Football Hall of Fame to the best football scholar-athlete in the nation for his combined academic success, football performance and exemplary leadership.

■ The 16 finalists were selected from a record number of 201 semifinalists nationwide from among all NCAA divisions and the NAIA.

■ An ACC player has won the Campbell Trophy in three of the last nine seasons. Previous Campbell Trophy winners from current ACC schools are Clemson's Christian Wilkins in 2018, Virginia's Micah Kiser in 2017, Duke's David Helton in 2014, Miami's Joaquin Gonzalez in 2001 and Virginia's Thomas Burns in 1993.

AROUND THE ACC

◆ **Boston College:** The Eagles rank 17th nationally in rushing offense this season with an average of 198.1 rushing yard per game. Quarterback Thomas Castellanos is second in the country for the most rushing yards by a quarterback with 827, which is 45th among all rushers. His 10 rushing TDs are tied for 30th in all of FBS and the sixth-most by a quarterback.

◆ **Clemson:** Over the last three games - wins versus No. 15 Notre Dame, Georgia Tech, and No. 20 North Carolina - Clemson has combined for 1,216 total yards of offense (405.3 ypg) and held its opponents to just 1,040 total yards of offense (346.7 ypg). Over the three-game winning streak, Clemson has turned the ball over five times while forcing 10 turnovers and recorded 10.0 sacks compared to allowing just 3.0 sacks.

◆ **Duke:** Duke's Moore duo of Jordan Moore (WR) and Jaquez Moore (RB) both posted 100-yard games last week at Virginia. Junior wide receiver Jordan Moore hauled in nine catches for 117 yards, marking his second career 100+ yard receiving game. Junior running back Jaquez Moore recorded nine rushes for 100 yards, including a 58-yard scoring run. The touchdown was his fifth of the season and marked his second career 100-plus yard rushing game.

◆ **Florida State:** FSU's Jarrian Jones became the first player in FSU history with a sack, tackle-for-loss, forced fumble, fumble recovery, and interception in the same game last week versus North Alabama. He had a career-high 3.0 tackles-for-loss, a strip sack that he recovered, and his team-leading third interception of the season.

◆ **Georgia Tech:** Georgia Tech quarterback Haynes King led the Yellow Jackets to the postseason for the first time since 2018 by completing a season-best 80 percent of his passes (16-of-20) for 138 yards and two touchdowns and running for a team-high-tying 82 yards on 11 carries and a score in GT's win over Syracuse.

◆ **Louisville:** Quarterback Jack Plummer completed 24-of-37 passes for 308 yards and three scores in the win over Miami — the third time this season that he has thrown three or more touchdowns passes in a game and the 12th time in his career. Plummer threw the game winner with 4:17 left in the fourth quarter when he connected with Kevin Coleman on a 58-yard pass to put the Cardinals up 38-31.

◆ **Miami:** Miami wide receiver Xavier Restrepo posted a career-high 193 yards on eight catches with one touchdown in Miami's game against Louisville last week. Restrepo, Miami's leading receiver on the year, paces the Hurricanes in both receptions (68) and yards (876). His game against the Cardinals marked the junior's fourth 100-yard game of the season.

◆ **North Carolina:** Running back Omarion Hampton is currently tied nationally for the most rushing yards per game this season with his average of 128.6 yards on the ground per outing. He has rushed for 100 yards in six straight games and is the first Tar Heel to rush for 100 yards in six-straight games since Don McCauley rushed for 100-yards in eight-straight games in 1970.

◆ **NC State:** NC State leads the ACC in total defense and scoring defense in conference play, holding its ACC foes to just 308.4 yards and 16.4 points per game. In the last nine games, the Wolfpack defense has allowed just 88.5 rushing yards per game. During that span, three opponents have rushed for less than 100 yards (VMI 10, Louisville 20, and Wake Forest 7). Overall, the Wolfpack defense ranks in the top 25 of the FBS in 10 defensive categories.

◆ **Pitt:** The Panthers safety Donovan McMillon has compiled a team-high 99 tackles this season, the most by a Pitt defender since safety Jordan Whitehead had 109 in 2015. His 99 tackles are 23 more than the next Pitt defender.

◆ **Syracuse:** Running back LeQuint Allen Jr. increased his season rushing total to 918 yards with 120 yards on the ground at Georgia Tech. Allen Jr. needs 82 more yards to post the 19th 1,000-yard rushing season in program history. It would be the third-straight season 'Cuse has a back reach the 1,000-yard mark after Sean Tucker did it in 2021 and 2022.

◆ **Virginia:** Wide receiver Malik Washington broke UVA's single-season receiving yards record and the program's single-season receptions record last week with eight catches for 112 yards and two touchdowns versus Duke. For the season, he has 96 catches, 1,311 yards receiving and nine touchdowns. Washington is tied for ninth-most receptions by an ACC player (96) in a single season. He needs 36 receiving yards to crack the ACC's top-10 single-season receiving yardage list. Washington extended his consecutive games with a reception to 36 straight games.

◆ **Virginia Tech:** The Hokies Keonta Jenkins registered eight tackles with five solo takedowns at nose tackle versus NC State. Jenkins finished with 2.0 tackles-for-loss and registered quarterback hurry. The senior has recorded a tackle-for-loss in each of the last five games and recorded a season-high 12 tackles against Wake Forest, which also marked the last contest he had 2.0 TFLs.

◆ **Wake Forest:** After coming in as a graduate transfer from NC A&T, Jacob Roberts has made an immediate impact for the Demon Deacons' defense. Going into Week 13, Roberts leads the Demon Deacons with 76 tackles and ranks second with 6.0 sacks on the season.

ACC TIEBREAKERS - NEW FOR 2023

With the elimination of divisions this season, the ACC Football Champion will be decided by a game between the top two postseason-eligible teams.

The two teams with the highest percentage of wins during all regular-season Conference competition shall play in the Championship Game.

If three or more such teams are tied with the highest percentage of wins or two or more teams are tied with the second-highest percentage of wins, the following tiebreaker procedure shall be administered to determine the representative(s) in the Championship Game.

The team with the highest win percentage, either outright or after application of the tiebreaker, shall be declared the No. 1 seed for the Championship Game.

A. Two-Team Tie

1. Head-to-head competition between the two tied teams.
2. Win-percentage versus all common opponents.
3. Win-percentage versus common opponents based upon their order of finish (overall conference win-percentage, with ties broken) and proceeding through other common opponents based upon their order of finish.
4. Combined win-percentage of conference opponents.
5. The tied team with the higher ranking by the Team Rating Score metric provided by SportSource Analytics following the conclusion of regular season games.
6. The representative shall be chosen by a draw as administered by the Commissioner or Commissioner's designee.

B. Three (or More) Teams Tie

- Three teams (or more) tiebreaker procedure will first be used to identify one Championship Game representative. Once that team is determined, the tiebreaker procedures restart for the remaining tied teams.
1. Combined head-to-head win percentage among the tied teams if all tied teams are common opponents.
 2. If all the tied teams are not common opponents, the tied team that defeated each of the other tied teams.
 3. Win-percentage versus all common opponents.
 4. Win-percentage versus common opponents based upon their order of finish (overall conference win-percentage, with ties broken) and proceeding through other common opponents based upon their order of finish.
 5. Combined win percentage of conference opponents.
 6. The tied team with the highest ranking by the Team Rating Score metric provided by SportSource Analytics following the conclusion of regular season games.
 7. The representative shall be chosen by a draw as administered by the Commissioner or Commissioner's designee.

**Note: Conference games against otherwise postseason ineligible teams will always be counted in the league standings and in application of the tiebreaker policies.*

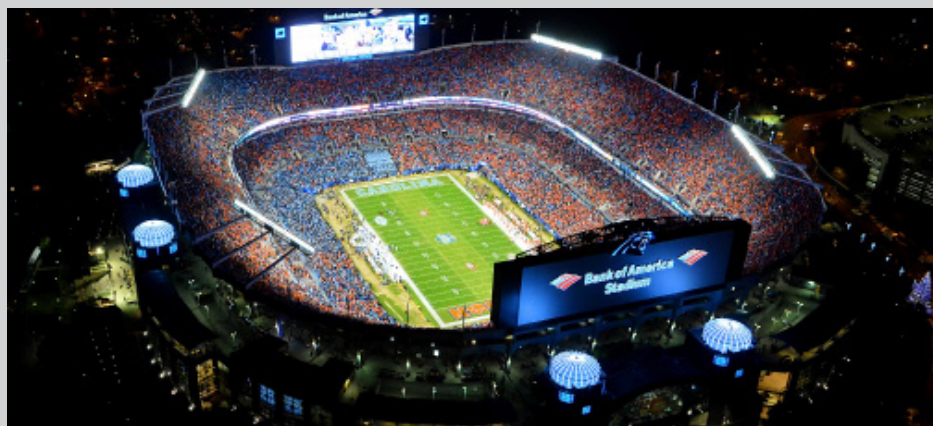

• The Capital One Orange Bowl will host the ACC Champion (or next highest-ranked ACC team if the ACC Champion is in the top four of the final CFP rankings) against the highest-ranked available non-champion team from the Big Ten or SEC, or Notre Dame.

• Following the Capital One Orange Bowl selection process, additional ACC teams could also be selected for the Goodyear Cotton Bowl or Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl as at-large representatives.

• The ACC and its non-CFP bowl partners will make team selections based on several factors, including geographic proximity, avoiding repeat appearances and matchups, and regular-season won-loss records.



HOME OF THE ACC

NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

- No conference has won more NCAA national championships in the last two academic years than the ACC. The league's nine titles in 2022-23 shattered the league record of seven, set in 2021-22 and 2009-10.
- The ACC brought home NCAA Championships in 2022-23 in Women's Cross Country (NC State), Field Hockey (North Carolina), Men's Soccer (Syracuse), Women's Swimming & Diving (Virginia), Fencing (Notre Dame), Women's Tennis (North Carolina), Men's Tennis (Virginia), Men's Lacrosse (Notre Dame) and Women's Golf (Wake Forest). In addition, North Carolina women's tennis won the 2023 ITA National Indoor Championship. ACC student-athletes also won 29 individual national titles in 2022-23.
- This year, 2023-24, the ACC has already captured two NCAA national championships with NC State women's cross country winning its third-straight title and North Carolina's field hockey team going repeating at national champion.
- The ACC has won seven national championships in football, men's basketball, women's basketball and baseball since 2015. The ACC is the only conference to win each of those four titles over that stretch.
- The ACC has won three of the last 10 football national titles and three of the last eight men's basketball national championships (most of any conference).
- Clemson (15-0) won the league's eighth football national championship in 2018 with a 44-16 win over previously unbeaten Alabama. The 28-point margin of victory was the largest over a No. 1 ranked team in ACC history.

ACC SUCCESS IN 2022-23

- Sixteen ACC programs finished the 2022-23 season ranked either No. 1 or No. 2 in their respective sports, and all 15 member schools captured either an ACC championship or an ACC regular-season championship.
- Six ACC schools placed among the top 20 of the final Division I LEARFIELD College Directors' Cup standings. Virginia finished fourth and was joined in the top 10 by North Carolina, which placed eighth. Duke (16th), Florida State (17th), NC State (19th) and Notre Dame (20th) completed the ACC's top-20 contingent. Louisville (32nd), Wake Forest (42nd), Syracuse (45th) and Miami (49th) gave the ACC 10 institutions among the top 50. The feat marked the 21st straight year that four or more ACC schools placed among the top 30 in the final rankings.
- The ACC had the most Honda Award winners of any conference in 2022-23 with four – North Carolina's Fiona Crawley (tennis), Virginia's Kate Douglass (swimming), North Carolina's Erin Matson (field hockey) and NC State's Katelyn Tuohy (cross country).

ACC EXPANSION

- The ACC Board of Directors voted on Sept. 1 to formally admit the University of California, Berkeley (Cal), Southern Methodist University (SMU) and Stanford University to the Atlantic Coast Conference. Cal, SMU and Stanford will join the ACC as full members with full voting participation effective July 1, 2024 (SMU) and August 2, 2024 (Stanford and Cal). The decision followed the submission of letters of application from all three institutions.
- The additions of Cal, SMU and Stanford enhance and strengthen the ACC academically, athletically and financially as well as create a true national conference that spans coast to coast. The incoming universities enrich the league's competitiveness in all sports and further demonstrate the ACC's commitment to broad-based programs for both women and men. More than 2,200 student-athletes from Cal, SMU and Stanford will join the nearly 10,000 current ACC student-athletes competing at the highest level of intercollegiate athletics.
- Cal, SMU and Stanford will begin competing in the ACC across their respective sponsored sports beginning in the 2024-2025 academic year. The ACC leads all Autonomy 5 conferences with 15 women's sports offerings and no conference offers more than the league's 28 total sponsored sports.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS

- A player from a current ACC school has won the William V. Campbell Trophy® five times, including three times in the last nine years. That is the most of any conference over that span. The award recognizes an individual as the absolute best football scholar-athlete in the nation for his combined academic success, football performance and exemplary leadership.
- Eight ACC Football teams earned a graduation success rate (GSR) at or above the FBS average based on the report released by the NCAA in November 2022.
- The ACC remains the only conference to have multiple teams register GSR scores of 90 or higher every year since 2005. Boston College (97), Clemson (92), Duke (95), Louisville (94), Pitt (94) and Wake Forest (93) reached that plateau in this year's report.
- For the 17th consecutive year, the ACC led the way among FBS conferences in the "Best Colleges" rankings released by U.S. News & World Report on Sept. 18, 2023.
- ACC teams continue to stand out among those from Division I colleges and universities that meet standards and excel academically, as evidenced by the annual Academic Progress Rate (APR) team data released by the NCAA in January 2022. All ACC football, men's basketball, women's basketball and baseball programs exceeded the NCAA's required APR. In football, 12 ACC teams have an APR above the Division I average of 968, which is the most among peer conferences).

ACC STUDENT-ATHLETE PROGRAMS & SERVICES

- The ACC's Committee for Racial and Social Justice (CORE - Champions of Racial Equity) continued its mission to promote and encourage inclusion, racial equity and social justice through education, partnerships, engagement and advocacy.
- Among CORE's accomplishments in 2022-23 were the second annual UNITE Award Class; the ACC's Fall, Winter and Spring UNITY Weeks (theme: "PRIDE, the fight against antisemitism and other causes"); mandatory staff education and the ACC Unity Tour in Washington, D.C. in July, 2023.
- The ACC conducted a Health and Safety Summit in Durham in May, in partnership with the ACC Healthcare Advisory Group, bringing together athletic trainers, team physicians, dietitians, mental health practitioners, sports performance coaches, and others within the ACC's health and sports performance community to collaborate and to share best practices.
- The ACC continued to provide leadership development programming to ACC coaches through the "Coaching the Whole Athlete Academy". The Coaching Academy is an eight-week virtual and immersive development program established by the league office that equips coaches with information, tools, and skills of a humanistic approach to better support the needs of the student-athlete.
- The ACC organized the first ACC Career Trek in Charlotte, N.C., in May 2022. The trek included 27 student-athletes from 12 ACC schools. The trek allowed student-athletes to explore potential careers, network with professionals, and gain insights into what employers are seeking in potential candidates.
- The 2021 ACC/Big Ten Basketball Challenge used the series of 28 men's and women's games to bring awareness to the importance of mental health and help to break down any stigma related to mental health struggles.
- The ACC hosted its fourth annual Fall Unity Week on Oct. 14-22. The theme for the 2023-24 academic year is "Civic Engagement," chosen by CORE in conjunction with the ACC Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) to encourage their respective community's involvement in the lead-up to the general election in 2024.

FOOTBALL SUCCESS

■ The ACC has had a team in either the College Football Playoff or the BCS National Championship Game in eight of the last 10 years, including two teams in 2020. The ACC has the second most CFP appearances of any conference.

■ The ACC placed nine teams in football postseason bowl games in 2022. It is the 22nd consecutive season in which the ACC earned at least six bowl bids. Not including the pandemic-affected 2020 season, the ACC has sent at least nine teams to a bowl every year since 2016. Since 2013, the ACC is second among all conferences with 100 postseason appearances.

■ Three ACC teams finished the 2022 season ranked in the national top 25. In the AP poll, Florida State finished No. 11, its highest ranking since 2016. ACC Champion Clemson finished No. 13, while Pitt was No. 22. In the Coaches poll, FSU was No. 10, Clemson No. 12 and Pitt No. 22.

■ Three ACC teams earned spots in the top 25 of the Preseason Associated Press poll, led by Florida State (No. 8) and Clemson (No. 9) in the top 10. The Seminoles and Tigers were joined by North Carolina, which is No. 21. Pitt, Louisville, Duke and NC State received votes.

■ Led by unanimous first-team All-America defensive tackle Calijah Kancey of Pitt, the ACC placed 11 players – representing six different schools – on NCAA-recognized 2022 All-America teams. NC State place-kicker Christopher Dunn was a consensus All-America honoree. Pitt led the league with three selections. The NCAA recognizes the All-America teams selected by AP, FWAA, The Sporting News, AFCA and Walter Camp to determine consensus All-Americans.

■ The ACC continued to establish itself as the Conference of Quarterbacks in 2022, and many of the leading players return this season, including nine players with at least 10 career starts, highlighted by 2022 All-ACC honorees Drake Maye of North Carolina (first team) and Jordan Travis of Florida State (second team).

■ Twelve different quarterbacks from ACC schools started at least one game in the NFL last season in 2022 – most of any conference.

■ Among active head coaches, the ACC's Dabo Swinney (Clemson), Mike Elko (Duke), Mack Brown (North Carolina), Mike Norvell (Florida State), Dave Doeren (NC State) and Jeff Brohm (Louisville) rank among the top 40 in the nation in career winning percentage. Swinney's .796 winning percentage ranks eighth in the nation. Brown is second among all active coaches with 282 victories, while Swinney is 11th with 168.

■ Seven ACC players have finished in the top three of the Heisman Trophy voting in the last 10 years, including 2013 winner Jameis Winston of FSU and 2016 winner Lamar Jackson of Louisville. Clemson's Trevor Lawrence finished second in 2020, while Pitt's Kenny Pickett was third in 2021.

ACC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME & BOWL SUCCESS

■ The top two teams in the Atlantic Coast Conference – No. 4 Florida State and No. 10 Louisville – will face off in the 2023 ACC Football Championship Game on Saturday, Dec. 2, at 8 p.m., at Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte, North Carolina.

■ The ACC Football Championship Game has sold out five times in Charlotte (2010, 2011, 2015, 2017 and 2020).

■ With Louisville making its first appearance in the championship game this year, 12 different ACC teams have played in the ACC Football Championship Game since its inception in 2005. Clemson leads all teams with nine appearances, followed by Virginia Tech (6) and Florida State (6).

■ In April 2018, the ACC and the Charlotte Sports Foundation announced a 10-year agreement that will keep the ACC Football Championship Game in Charlotte through the 2030 season. The game will be played annually at Bank of America Stadium on the first Saturday in December.

■ The ACC is in the 10th year of a 12-year agreement with the Capital One Orange Bowl, which will host an ACC team – either its champion or next available team – in all years when the Orange Bowl is not a semifinal site for the College Football Playoff. The opponent will be the highest-ranked available team from the SEC, Big Ten, or Notre Dame.

■ Six different ACC teams have played in the prestigious Capital One Orange Bowl since 2013 – Clemson in 2013, 2015 and 2023, Georgia Tech in 2014, Florida State in 2016, Miami in 2017, Virginia in 2019 and North Carolina in 2020.

■ The ACC's current bowl lineup includes the Holiday Bowl, Pop-Tarts Bowl, TaxSlayer Gator Bowl, Bad Boy Mowers Pinstripe Bowl, Duke's Mayo Bowl, Tony the Tiger Sun Bowl, Military Bowl, Wasabi Fenway Bowl, Union Home Mortgage Gasparilla Bowl and TicketSmarter Birmingham Bowl. In addition, the ACC will send a team to the Reliaquest Bowl if the league's opponent in a non-semifinal Capital One Orange Bowl is from the Big Ten.



ACC & THE NFL DRAFT

- Since the 2005 season, the ACC has had 666 players chosen in the NFL Draft, including 103 first-round picks, the second-highest total of any conference.
- Four ACC players were selected in the first round of the 2023 NFL Draft in Kansas City, led by Pitt All-America defensive tackle Calijah Kancey who was the No. 19 overall pick to the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. He was joined in the first round by Boston College WR Zay Flowers (22nd, Baltimore Ravens), Clemson DE Myles Murphy (28th, Cincinnati Bengals) and Clemson DT Bryan Bresee (29th, New Orleans Saints). Syracuse OT Matthew Bergeron, GT Edge Keion White and Miami CB Tyrique Stevenson were taken in the second round. Five ACC players were third-round picks, while 20 were selected in rounds four through seven.
- The ACC's 32 picks in 2023 represented 13 different institutions.
- The ACC has had 385 players selected since 2013 - the second-highest total among all conferences - and has had 40 or more players picked in five of the last 10 drafts. The ACC's 45 draftees in 2018 was its third-highest ever.
- Current ACC teams have had a total of nine players chosen as the first overall selection in the NFL Draft. The most recent was Clemson's Trevor Lawrence, who was tabbed first in 2021 by the Jacksonville Jaguars. Miami (Vinny Testaverde, 1987, Tampa Bay; and Russell Maryland, 1991, Dallas) and Virginia Tech (Bruce Smith, 1985, Buffalo; and Michael Vick, 2001, Atlanta) each had two top selections while Clemson (Lawrence, 2021, Jaguars), Florida State (Jameis Winston, 2015, Tampa Bay), NC State (Mario Williams, 2006, Houston), Virginia (Bill Dudley, 1942, Pittsburgh) and Syracuse (Ernie Davis, 1962, Washington) each had one. Also, NC State's Roman Gabriel, the No. 2 overall selection in the 1962 draft, was chosen No. 1 in the AFL Draft by the Oakland Raiders.

ACC NETWORK

- ACC Network supports the ACC's 24/7/365 football initiative with year-long coverage throughout its live event and studio coverage, original programming, and content on its social platforms.
- Along with a full slate of season-long football games on ACCN, the network provides wall-to-wall coverage every Saturday throughout the fall. The ACC Huddle, ACCN's franchise football studio show leads into the action with an hour pregame show (11 a.m. – noon ET), provides coverage at halftime and between games, as well as a primetime show leading into ACC Primetime Football and an hour-long postgame show. The ACC Huddle also appears on ACCN around other tentpole football events – ACC Football Kickoff, Pro Days, Signing Day, CFP and select bowl games.
- For the third consecutive year, ACCN embarked on a 14-campus ACC Football tour throughout August (2023) to kick off the football season. ACC Football Road Trip featured 14 one-hour shows airing in primetime over three weeks from campuses across the conference. ACC Football Road Trip previewed each team's upcoming season and included exclusive interviews with head coaches and student-athletes while showcasing unique aspects of those 14 football campuses.
- ACC Huddle and ACC PM took to the road for a number of stops at campuses throughout the 2022 football regular season including North Carolina (vs. Florida A&M), Virginia Tech (vs. Boston College), Florida State (vs. Boston College), NC State (vs. Wake Forest), Syracuse (vs. Florida State) and Wake Forest (vs. Syracuse), in addition to being onsite at the 2022 Subway ACC Football Championship Game and the Capital One Orange Bowl.
- This season, two of ACC Network's signature programs, ACC Huddle and ACC PM, have hit the road and traveled to college football game sites every week of the regular season this fall for the first time in the Network's history. Either ACC Huddle or ACC PM, if not both, have been on a college campus each week. In Week 1, ACC PM was at both Wake Forest and Virginia Tech, while ACC Huddle was live at Virginia Tech, in Orlando for FSU and LSU, and at Duke. The rest of the season to date has seen both shows at eight different schools - Week 2 - Florida State, Week 3 - Clemson, Week 4 - Pitt, Week 5 - Virginia Tech, Week 6 - Miami, Week 7 - Duke, Week 8 - Miami, Week 9 - Georgia Tech, Week 10 - NC State, Week 11 - North Carolina, Week 12 - Georgia Tech, and Week 13 - NC State.
- ACCN's football analyst roster includes four former NFL players Tim Hasselbeck, Mark Herzlich, EJ Manuel and Eddie Royal, College Football Hall of Fame Coach Mark Richt and former Clemson and Georgia Tech standouts Eric Mac Lain and Roddy Jones.

- Georgia has won the Governor's Cup Trophy and the Clean, Old-Fashioned Hate matchup each of the last five years. The Bulldogs have also won 11 straight meetings over the Yellow Jackets in Atlanta.
- GT has won three of its last four games and completed its conference schedule at 5-3, the first winning ACC record since 2018.
- The high-powered Georgia Tech offense ranks 19th nationally in rushing yards per game at 196.4 yards per outing and 30th in all of FBS in total offense, averaging 435.1 yards per game.
- Georgia's defense ranks 14th nationally in passing defense, allowing 178.2 yards per game, 21st in rushing defense at 109.9 yards per game, and ninth in total defense at 288.1 yards per game.

- Saturday's game will mark the 113th meeting in the series between the Wolfpack and the Tar Heels. The rivalry, which began in 1894, is the Wolfpack's oldest among ACC teams and the fourth-most played series in the ACC.
- North Carolina holds a 68-38-6 overall lead over NC State in the all-time series.
- The last two matchups between the Tar Heels and Wolfpack have been decided by four points or less. The Pack won in Raleigh 34-30 in 2021 and in a double overtime thriller in Chapel Hill last season, 30-27.
- North Carolina's offense leads the ACC and ranks third nationally in total offense, with an average of 514.8 total yards of offense per game.
- NC State leads the ACC in total defense and scoring defense versus league opponents, allowing just 308.4 yards per game and 16.4 points per game in conference play.
