ACC NOTES

ACC WELCOMES CAL, SMU AND STANFORD

■ The ACC Board of Directors voted on Sept. 1 to formally admit the University of California (Cal), Southern Methodist University (SMU) and Stanford University to the Atlantic Coast Conference. Cal, SMU and Stanford will join the ACC as full members with full voting participation effective July 1, 2024 (SMU) and Aug. 2, 2024 (Stanford and Cal). The decision followed the submission of letters of application from all three institutions.

■ The additions of Cal, SMU and Stanford enhance and strengthen the ACC academically, athletically and financially as well as create a true national conference that spans coast to coast. The incoming universities enrich the league's competitiveness in all sports and further demonstrate the ACC's commitment to broad-based programs for both women and men. More than 2,200 student-athletes from Cal, SMU and Stanford will join the nearly 10,000 current ACC student-athletes competing at the highest level of intercollegiate athletics.

GREATNESS IS WHAT WE DO

■ The ACC announced its new creative campaign, "ACCOMPLISH GREATNESS," a multi-part brand campaign highlighting the vast success of the ACC's athletics and academics alike. The campaign launched ahead of the ACC's official college football season on Week 1. The series will continue with multi-sport spots highlighting the ACC's incredible accomplishments in all sports throughout the academic year.

BOWL-ELIGIBLE TEAMS

■ Over two-thirds of the ACC is bowl eligible, as 11 of the 14 teams are bowl eligible - Florida State (13-0), Louisville (10-3), NC State (9-3), Clemson (8-4), North Carolina (8-4), Duke (7-5), Miami (7-5), Georgia Tech (6-6), Virginia Tech (6-6), Boston College (6-6), and Syracuse (6-6).

■ The 11 ACC bowl-eligible teams are the most among all Power 5 conferences.

■ The 11 ACC bowl-eligible teams also match a conference high from 2018.

■ Heading into this season, the ACC has averaged 10 bowl-eligible teams each year since 2017, including a high of 11 teams in 2018. Last season in 2022, the ACC had nine teams play in a bowl game.

ACC GOING BOWLING

■ After claiming its 16th ACC Championship, No. 5 Florida State (13-0, 8-0 ACC) will compete against No. 6 Georgia in the Capital One Orange Bowl for the 11th time in program history. Florida State has won its last two trips to the Orange Bowl and boasts five Orange Bowl victories all-time, including the 1993 National Championship. The New Year's Six meeting between the Seminoles and Bulldogs will be the 12th all-time matchup and the first between the two schools since the 2003 Sugar Bowl. The Bulldogs lead the overall series 6-4-1 over the Seminoles.

■ Under first-year head coach Jeff Brohm, No. 15 Louisville (10-3, 7-1 ACC) will compete in a bowl game for the third straight season. The trip to the DirecTV Holiday Bowl in San Diego, California, will be the first for the Cardinals, who are 12-12-1 all-time over 25 bowl appearances. Last season, the Cardinals posted a 24-7 win over Cincinnati in the Wasabi Fenway Bowl. Louisville will meet Southern California in a bowl game for the first time.

■ No. 18 NC State (9-3, 6-2 ACC) will be making its 35th bowl appearance in program history and its second straight trip to the postseason with the Wolfpack's trip to the Pop-Tarts Bowl. Entering the final College Football Playoff rankings, the Wolfpack were ranked 18th and will meet No. 25 Kansas State for the first time in Orlando, Florida. NC State is 17-16-1 overall in bowl play.

■ No. 22 Clemson (8-4, 4-4 ACC) will be making a bowl appearance for the 19th consecutive year, adding to its current school record that began in 2005. It is the longest current active streak among ACC teams and the fifth-longest in the nation. The Tigers will head south to the Sunshine State to compete in the TaxSlayer Gator Bowl for the 10th time. The matchup against Kentucky will be the Tigers' 46th bowl game in program history, as the Tigers have a 26-23 overall bowl record. Kentucky leads 8-5 in the all-time series with Clemson.

■ For the fifth straight season, North Carolina (8-4, 4-4 ACC) will head to the postseason with a berth versus West Virginia in the Duke's Mayo Bowl in Charlotte, North Carolina. It will mark the sixth time that the Tar Heels have played a bowl game in Charlotte, the last being against South Carolina in 2021. The Tar Heels are 1-1 versus the Mountaineers, with the last meeting coming in 2008.

■ Duke (7-5, 4-4 ACC) will make its 16th bowl appearance this season, making its first appearance in the 76th Birmingham Bowl versus Troy. The Blue Devils are 2-0 all-time versus the Trojans. The Blue Devils are 7-8 all-time in bowl play and have won each of their last five bowl games.

■ For the first time under head coach Mario Cristobal, Miami (7-5, 3-5 ACC) is postseason-bound. The Hurricanes head to Bad Boy Mowers Pinstripe Bowl for the second time. When Miami meets Rutgers, it will be the 45th bowl game in Hurricanes history and the 12th matchup against the Scarlett Knights, holding a dominant 11-0 advantage in the all-time series.

■ Georgia Tech (6-6, 5-3 ACC) will play in the Union Home Mortgage Gasparilla Bowl for the first time in program history, taking on the UCF. The Yellow Jackets return to postseason play for the first time since taking on Minnesota in the 2018 Quick Lane Bowl. The Jackets are 25-20 all-time in postseason bowl season, including winning three of their last five bowl contests. Georgia Tech is 3-2 versus the Knights, with the last meeting coming in Orlando in 2022.

■ Virginia Tech (6-6, 5-3 ACC) is bowl-eligible for the first time under head coach Brent Pry and the 35th time in program history. The Hokies will play Tulane in the Military Bowl presented by GoBowling.com, marking the third time that they have played in Annapolis, Maryland, with appearances in 2014 and 2018. Virginia Tech is 1-1 in the Military Bowl all-time and 13-21 in postseason bowl play overall. The Hokies are 5-4 versus the Green Wave all-time, with the last meeting between the two teams coming back in 1989.

■ Boston College (6-6, 3-5 ACC) will play in the Wasabi Fenway Bowl for the first time. The Eagles are bowl-eligible for the first time since 2021 when the Eagles were scheduled to play East Carolina in the 2021 Military Bowl. However, that game was canceled due to COVID-19 protocols. BC is 14-13 overall in bowl game history, with the Eagles last win a 36-30 victory over Maryland at the 2016 Quick Lane Bowl. The Eagles will face off with No. 24 SMU. BC trails future ACC member SMU 1-0, with the lone meeting coming in October 1986.

■ Syracuse (6-6, 2-6 ACC) will be the first ACC team to play in the RoofClaim Boca Raton Bowl. Making a bowl game for the second-consecutive season for the first time since 2012 and 2013, the Orange are 16-10-1 overall in 28 bowl appearances, including winning six of their last eight bowl games. Syracuse will take on South Florida, who holds an 8-2 edge over the Orange all-time

THE ACC WITH FOUR TEAMS IN THE FINAL CFP RANKINGS

■ The ACC had a total of four teams ranked in the final 2023 College Football Playoff (CFP) rankings, released on Dec. 3. The four teams were tied for the second-most among all FBS conferences.

■ Florida State was ranked No. 5 despite going undefeated at 13-0 overall and winning the 2023 ACC Football Championship Game over No. 15 Louisville on Dec. 2 at Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte.

■ Louisville came in at No. 15, having finished the regular season at 10-3 overall, while NC State was ranked No. 18, having gone 9-3 and closing the regular season out on a five-game win streak.

■ The Clemson Tigers were ranked No. 22 overall, finishing the regular season at 8-4 and on a four-game winning streak.

MULTIPLE ACC TEAMS RANKED IN TOP 25 IN WEEK 15

■ For the 14th consecutive week, the Florida State Seminoles were ranked in the top five of the Associated Press Top 25 poll, coming in at No. 4 overall in the latest poll on Dec. 3. Joining Florida State in the AP Top 25 poll was Louisville, which was ranked at No. 16 overall, and NC State at No. 19. Clemson also received votes in the poll.

■ Three ACC teams were ranked in the most recent USA Today AFCA Coaches Poll (Dec. 3). Florida State remained in the top five, moving up to No. 3 overall, while Louisville came in at No. 15. For the third straight week, NC State was in the top 25 coaches poll, moving up to No. 18. Clemson also received votes.

CLOSE CALLS

■ The ACC has 16 wins in close games this season (4 points or less).

■ Overall, the ACC has 32 wins in one TD games this season (8 points or less) - tied for the most among Power 5 conferences.

■ 42.9 percent of the ACC's conference games (24-of-56) were decided by one score or less (8 points) this season - the most among all Power 5 conferences in conference play.

VERSUS THEIR PEERS

■ The ACC has posted a 50.4 winning percentage versus Power 5 opponents this season - conference and non-conference combined - the second-best winning percentage among all Power 5 conferences.

■ The ACC has 67 wins over Power 5 teams - conference and non-conference combined - the third-most among all Power 5 conferences.

■ The ACC is one of just three conferences in all of FBS with a winning record over Power 5 opponents - conference and non-conference games combined.

■ ACC teams have a combined 14 wins over the top 25 nationally ranked opponents this season - the third-most among all Power 5 conferences.

■ The ACC has recorded a combined 21 wins over teams with an RPI in the top 30 (1-30) - the second-most wins among all FBS conferences.

■ ACC teams have a combined 28 wins over teams with a record over .500 - the most among all FBS conferences.

NON-CONFERENCE SUCCESS

■ The ACC has been solid in non-conference play this season, going 39-17 (.696) overall in non-conference play.

■ The ACC's 39 non-conference wins are the second-most non-conference wins among all FBS conferences.

■ The ACC has 13 non-conference Power 5 wins - which includes two wins over Notre Dame - the most among all FBS conferences.

■ ACC teams are 10-7 combined against the SEC and Big Ten, with the ACC recording six wins over the SEC and four versus the Big Ten. The rest of FBS is 10-47 overall versus the two Power 5 conferences.

■ The ACC has also handed Notre Dame two of their three losses this season - Louisville (33-20) on Oct. 7 and Clemson (31-23) on Nov. 4.

NC STATE'S PAYTON WILSON EARNS UNANIMOUS CONSENSUS ALL-AMERICA HONORS

■ Led by unanimous Consensus First-Team All-America linebacker Payton Wilson of NC State, the ACC placed 12 players – representing eight different schools – on NCAA-recognized 2023 All-America teams. Florida State led the league with four selections, while NC State had two. The NCAA recognizes the All-America teams selected by the American Football Coaches Association, Associated Press, Football Writers Association of America, The Sporting News, and Walter Camp Football Foundation to determine consensus All-Americans.

THREE ACC PLAYERS EARN NATIONAL AWARDS

■ A trio of players in Payton Wilson (NC State), Joe Shimko (NC State), and Mike Hollins (Virginia) won national awards. Wilson was named both the Butkus Award (best linebacker) and Bednarik Award (best defensive player) winner, while Shimko was awarded the Patrick Mannelly Award (best long snapper). Hollins was the 22nd recipient of the Capital One Orange Bowl-FWAA Courage Award and one of three winners of the 2023 Comeback Player of the Year Award.

■ Also a First-Team All-ACC selection, Wilson led the league and ranked fifth in the FBS in tackles with 138 and tackles per game at 11.5 per contest. He was also the league leader in tackles-for-loss with 17.5, the sixth-most in all of FBS. He also notched six sacks, 10 pass breakups, one forced fumble, two fumble recoveries, and three interceptions, returning one for a score.

■ Wilson is the first NC State player ever to win the Butkus Award and the first ACC player since Isaiah Simmons of Clemson in 2019. He was also the first NC State player ever to win the Bednarik Award and the first ACC player to earn the honor since Aaron Donald of Pittsburgh in 2013.

■ NC State's Shimko won the 2023 Patrick Mannelly Award presented by Zebra Technologies, the award given to the top collegiate long snapper in the nation. A graduate student from Belmar, New Jersey, Shimko was a semifinalist for the award each of the last two years.

■ This season, Shimko has not had a bad snap out of a total of 125 snaps for the Wolfpacks' special teams unit, snapping for 67 punts, 20 field goal attempts, and 38 extra-point attempts. He also registered a tackle in the road game at Duke. Overall, NC State is 16-of-20 in field goals and 38-of-38 in extra-point tries on the season.

■ Virginia graduate student running back Mike Hollins was named the 22nd annual recipient of the Capital One Orange Bowl-FWAA Courage Award and one of three winners of the 2023 Comeback Player of the Year Award.

■ The ACC's 2023 Brian Piccolo Award winner, Hollins survived the 2022 shootings that took the lives of three of his Virginia teammates. He returned this fall to play in 11 games for the Cavaliers, leading the team in rushing touchdowns.

■ As part of a three-man rotation at running back, he recorded 80 carries for 274 yards and a team-high seven touchdowns on the ground. He also had 10 receptions for 34 yards and one touchdown catch. Throughout the season, Hollins served as UVA's primary third-down back for short yardage and also for pass protection packages.

■ Florida State enters the bowl season on a 19-game winning streak, which is the second-longest current winning streak in the FBS.

■ The Noles have also won 11 straight ACC conference games, which is the fifth-longest conference winning streak to date. FSU also has a nine-game home win streak, the fifth-best in all of FBS, and a seven-game road win streak, which ranks seventh nationally.

■ NC State has won five consecutive games, while Clemson ended the regular season on a four-game winning streak.

■ Virginia Tech has scored in 369 consecutive games, the fourth-longest streak in FBS history.

HISTORICAL TOP-10 WINS

■ In the Labor Day primetime game on Sept. 4, the Duke Blue Devils upended No. 9 Clemson 28-7 in Wallace Wade Stadium in the two teams' season opener. The win was the first time the Blue Devils had beaten a top-10 team since defeating then-No. 7 Clemson in 1989, snapping a losing streak of 28 straight games to top-10 teams.

■ On Sept. 3, the No. 8 Florida State Seminoles defeated No. 5 LSU 45-24 in the Camping World Kickoff in Orlando, Fla. FSU's 45 points were tied for the most in a season opener against an AP top-5 team in the Poll era (since 1936). As the lower-ranked team, the Seminoles also recorded the first 20+ point win over an AP top-5 team since 1988 with the season-opening victory.

■ Louisville posted a 33-20 home win over No. 10 Notre Dame on Oct. 7, the program's second-straight win over a top-10 foe in the last two years and the eighth overall in school history. With the Cardinals' win over Notre Dame, the victory snapped the Fighting Irish's 30-game regular-season winning streak versus ACC opponents dating back to 2017.

■ Virginia held No. 10 North Carolina to just 27 points, well below the Tar Heels' average of 37.5 points per game on the season, to erase a 10-point second-half deficit in a 31-27 ACC road win on Oct. 21. The win was Virginia's first-ever win on the road against a nationally-ranked top-10 opponent.

MILESTONE WINS IN 2023

■ North Carolina head coach Mack Brown recorded his 100th career win as the head coach for the Tar Heels with the 31-17 win over South Carolina on Sept. 2.

■ With his 100th win at UNC, Brown etched his name in the college football record books as the only coach to have won 100 games or more at two different FBS schools. He totaled 158 wins at Texas in 16 seasons from 1998-2014.

■ Wake Forest head coach Dave Clawson picked up his 150th career win as a collegiate head coach with the Demon Deacons' 37-17 win over Elon on Aug. 31. The season-opening victory was Clawson's 60th at Wake.

■ Louisville first-year head coach and alumnus Jeff Brohm recorded his first career win as the head coach of his alma mater with a 39-34 victory over Georgia Tech at the Aflac Kickoff Game on Sept. 1. The win also marked Brohm's first conference win in the ACC.

■ Clemson's Dabo Swinney recorded his 100th ACC regular-season conference win with the Tigers' 31-14 road win at Syracuse on Sept. 30. He joined Bobby Bowden (117) as the only two head coaches to have 100 or more conference regular-season wins in the ACC.

■ NC State's Dave Doeren registered his 100th career win as a collegiate head coach with the Wolfpack's 24-17 win over Clemson on Oct. 28. His 100th career victory was also his 77th win at NC State, which at the time tied him with Earle Edwards (1954-70) for the most victories in program history.

■ Florida State's Mike Norvell led the Seminoles to a 16-6 win over No. 15 Louisville at the 2023 ACC Football Championship Game to claim Florida State's 16th ACC football title since joining the league in 1992. The Seminoles improved to 13-0 overall, marking the third time in program history (14-0 in 2013, 13-1 in 2014).

BIG MEN ON CAMPUS

■ Dabo Swinney became the all-time winningest coach in Clemson football history with the Tigers' 31-23 win over No. 12 Notre Dame on Nov. 4. His 166th career win passed College Football Hall of Famer Frank Howard (165 from 1940-69) for sole possession of the Clemson record for career head coaching wins. He now has 169 career wins at Clemson and counting.

■ Dave Doeren became NC State's winningest coach in program history with the Wolfpack's 20-6 win over Miami on Nov. 4. With his 78th career win as the leader of the Pack, he passed Earle Edwards (76 from 1954-70) for the most victories in program history. He now has 81 career wins at NC State and counting.

ACC COACHING NOTES

■ Two new football coaches were hired in the ACC for the 2023 season: Georgia Tech's Brent Key and Louisville's Jeff Brohm. Key was hired after going 4-4 as the Yellow Jackets' interim head coach in 2022. Brohm returned to his alma mater after a six-year stint at Purdue.

■ Among active head coaches, the ACC's Dabo Swinney (Clemson), Mack Brown (North Carolina), Mike Norvell (Florida State), and Dave Doeren (NC State) rank among the top 40 in the nation in career winning percentage. Brown is second among all active coaches with 282 wins.

■ Clemson's Swinney owns 169 career wins, the 11th-most among active coaches. Swinney joins Bobby Bowden (173) as the only head coach ever to lead an ACC program to 150 wins.

■ Two of the five active coaches to win a national title reside in the ACC. Dabo Swinney led Clemson to national titles in 2016 and 2018. North Carolina's Mack Brown won a national title at Texas in 2005.

■ Four current league coaches have won ACC Coach of the Year honors - North Carolina's Mack Brown (1996), Clemson's Dabo Swinney (2015 & 2018), Wake Forest's Dave Clawson (2021) and Florida State's Mike Norvell (2023).

DUKE, SYRACUSE HIRE NEW HEAD COACHES

■ Manny Diaz was named the 23rd head football coach at Duke University on Dec. 7. The former University of Miami head coach, most recently served as the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at Penn State University for the past two seasons. In Diaz's 26 years of coaching, three have been spent as a head coach and 15 as a defensive coordinator, including 10 at the FBS Power 5 level.

■ Fran Brown, who is known as one of the country's top recruiters, was named the 31st head coach of Syracuse University Football on Nov. 28. A native of Camden, New Jersey, Brown spent the past two seasons with Georgia (2022-23), including a part of the national championship team in 2022. He has also coached at Rutgers (2020-21), Baylor (2017-18), and Temple (2011-16).

2023 ACC FOOTBALL HONORS CLASS ANNOUNCED

■ On Friday, Dec. 1, the 2023 ACC Football Honors Class was recognized at the ACC Football Honors event in Charlotte, North Carolina. The class includes a Heisman Trophy winner, multiple Super Bowl Champions, Hall of Famers, All-Americans, and several NFL standouts.

2024-30 FOOTBALL SCHEDULE MODEL ANNOUNCED

■ The ACC announced its future football schedule model for the next seven years, 2024-2030. With the addition of the ACC's three new member institutions next summer – University of California (Cal), Southern Methodist University (SMU) and Stanford University – the new model will go into effect beginning with the 2024 season.

■ The new schedule will continue with no divisions, feature 17 schools and will increase the number of annual conference matchups from 56 to 68. The top two teams based on conference winning percentage will compete in the ACC Football Championship Game on the first Saturday in December at Bank of America Stadium.

■ The approved format will continue to have each member institution play eight conference games per season, with all 17 teams playing each other at least twice over the next seven seasons – once at home and once on the road. The current 14 conference teams will play a total of three times each in California over the seven years and none will travel west to California in back-to-back seasons.

■ The new model protects 16 annual matchups. Of the 16 matchups, 11 are retained from the current 3-5-5 schedule model, two are restored rivalries from the divisional format in Miami-Virginia Tech and NC State-Wake Forest and the three new schools fill the remaining three. The annual protected matchups are Boston College-Syracuse, Boston College-Pitt, Syracuse-Pitt, North Carolina-Virginia, North Carolina-Duke, North Carolina-NC State, NC State-Wake Forest, NC State-Duke, Duke-Wake Forest, Virginia Tech-Virginia, Florida State-Clemson, Miami-Florida State, Miami-Virginia Tech, Stanford-Cal, Stanford-SMU, and Cal-SMU.

ACC WITH THREE NAMED TO 2023 GOOD WORKS TEAM

■ The ACC had three student-athletes from three different institutions named to the Allstate AFCA Good Works Team this week. Will Shipley of Clemson, Ja'Mion Franklin of Duke and Gavin Bartholomew of Pitt were three of the 11 student-athletes chosen for the FBS Good Works Team.

ACC PLAYERS IN THE NFL

■ More than 280 former ACC football players were listed on NFL rosters prior to Week 1 of the 2023-24 NFL season. All 14 ACC schools were represented with Clemson leading the way with 42 former players.

■ A total of 283 former ACC standouts were on the NFL's active roster, physically unable to perform lists and practice squads, with 213 players on active 53-man rosters.

■ Following Clemson's conference-best 42 players, Miami ranks second with 30 players, while Pitt and Virginia Tech each have 27 players in the NFL.

SIAC JOINS LEAGUE'S FOOTBALL OFFICIATING ALLIANCE

■ The ACC and the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (SIAC) announced that the SIAC has joined the ACC's football officiating alliance that includes the ACC, Big South Conference and Ohio Valley Conference (OVC), Coastal Athletic Association (CAA), Ivy League, Northeast Conference (NEC) and Patriot League.

■ The SIAC joining the alliance is a first of its kind, as the SIAC becomes the first college athletic conference that consists mostly of historically black colleges and universities (HBCUs) to join a football officiating alliance. Formed in 1913, the SIAC is affiliated with the National Collegiate Athletics Association (NCAA) at the Division II level, with all but one member located in the Southern United States.

■ The football officiating alliance enables all eight conferences to work together on a wide range of officiating matters, including training, development, recruitment, retention, scheduling, and evaluation. The mission of the alliance is to increase proficiency and consistency among officials across the collegiate football officiating landscape, to aid in the development of less experienced officials, and to increase diversity throughout the profession.

AROUND THE ACC

◆ **Boston College:** BC wide receiver Lewis Bond leads the team with 42 receptions, 565 yards, and six touchdowns, which marks the ninth 40/500/6 season by an Eagle since 1996. Bond has caught at least one pass in all 12 games for the Eagles on the season, including a season-high seven catches for 104 yards and a touchdown versus Virginia (Sept. 30).

◆ **Clemson:** Linebacker Jeremiah Trotter Jr. headlined Clemson's collection of honors during the 2023 college football award season. Trotter earned several first- and second-team All-America nods to become Clemson's first multi-time All-American at linebacker since Keith Adams in 1999-2000. Trotter, a second-team AP All-American a year ago, garnered first-team All-America honors from both ESPN and Sports Illustrated, among others, in addition to a bevy of second-team selections for his performance in 2023. He was a finalist for the Butkus Award, presented annually to the nation's top linebacker, becoming one of six Butkus finalists in school history.

◆ **Duke:** Duke senior offensive lineman Graham Barton was named to the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) All-America second team, becoming the third Blue Devil to receive AFCA honors and the first since Jeremy Cash was tabbed to the first team in 2015. Barton started nine games for the Blue Devils at left tackle, helping the offense accumulate 2,027 rushing and 2,168 passing yards. He was selected as a first-team All-ACC recipient last month and is a key contributor to Duke's offensive line that ranks tied for second in the ACC and tied for 20th nationally in fewest sacks allowed (15), tied for second in the league and tied for 30th nationally in tackles-for-loss allowed (4.67), and fourth in the ACC and tied for 30th nationally in rushing touchdowns (25).

◆ **Florida State:** Florida State's Jared Verse garnered multiple All-American honors for his play this season, in which he had 41 tackles, 12.5 tackles-for-loss and a team-high 9.0 sacks. He added three pass breakups, 11 quarterback hurries, one forced fumble, one fumble recovery and a blocked extra point. He received All-American recognition from AFCA (first team), AP (second team), USA TODAY (second team), ESPN (second team), The Athletic (second team), College Football Network (third team) and Phil Steele (third team). Verse was also a first-team All-ACC selection and a semifinalist for the Lombardi Award and Lott IMPACT Trophy.

◆ **Georgia Tech:** The future looks bright for the Yellow Jackets, as a trio of freshmen in Eric Singleton Jr., Ethan Mackenny, and Aida Birr picked up Freshman All-American honors. Singleton was named to the ESPN, 247Sports, and On3 True Freshman All-America teams, and earned a spot on the College Football Network Freshman All-American First Team, and both The Athletic and College Football News Freshman All-America second teams. Mackenny was named to the ESPN and On3 True Freshman All-American teams and the College Football Network Freshman All-American First Team, while Birr was named an Honorable Mention Freshman All-American by College Football News.

◆ **Louisville:** Louisville defensive lineman Ashton Gillotte was named a second-team All-American by The Athletic, Sports Illustrated and USA TODAY. He was also a third-team selection by Phil Steele and an honorable mention All-American by CBS Sports. A First-Team All-ACC honoree, Gillotte enters the postseason ranked eighth nationally in sacks with 11.0, which is tied for ninth on the school's single-season list. The Boca Raton native started all 13 games, recording a career best 45 tackles and 14.5 tackles-for-loss on a defense, which ranked 16th nationally.

◆ **Miami:** Miami enters bowl season ranked 25th nationally in total offense with an average of 441.2 yards per game, which is second in the ACC. The Hurricanes also rank 26th in all of FBS in total defense, allowing just 324.1 yards per game. The Canes also lead the ACC in fewest sacks allowed at 1.17 per game and in rushing defense with an average of 97.1 yards per game.

◆ **North Carolina:** A finalist for the 2023 Doak Walker Award, Omarion Hampton ranks fourth nationally in rushing yards per game (120.2) and fifth in total rushing yards (1,442) this season. He was named to the Walter Camp First-Team All-America team and also picked up second-team All-America honors from AFCA, AP, The Sporting News, CBS/247Sports, FOX Sports, ESPN and Sports Illustrated. He also earned third-team All-American accolades from Phil Steele and honorable mention honors from College Football Network.

◆ **NC State:** Payton Wilson became the fourth Wolfpack player named a Unanimous Consensus First-Team All-American, earning first-team recognition on 16 different All-America lists, including AFCA, AP, FWAA, The Sporting News, and Walter Camp. He was also the winner of the 2023 Butkus Award and the 2023 Chuck Bednarik Award, legitimizing him as one of the best defensive players in the nation. He finished the regular season ranked fifth nationally in total tackles (138) and tackles per game (11.5), and led the ACC with 17.5 tackles-for-loss, which ranked sixth nationally.

◆ **Pitt:** Pitt cornerback M.J. Devonshire was named to the 2023 All-ACC Second Team, as he led the Panthers with four interceptions and 10 pass breakups. His four interceptions are the most by a Pitt defender in a season since 2012. Among ACC players, Devonshire ranks second in interceptions and first with 115 interception return yards. The Panthers had four players receive 2023 All-ACC Honorable Mention honors as well: tight end Gavin Bartholomew, return specialist Kenny Johnson, safety Donovan McMillon, and wide receiver Bub Means.

◆ **Syracuse:** On Tuesday, Nov. 28, Syracuse named Fran Brown its new head coach. In the regular-season finale, the Orange put up 35 points and piled up 468 yards of total offense in a win over Wake Forest to become bowl eligible for the second straight year. It marks the first time since 2012 and 2013 that Syracuse will head to a bowl in back-to-back seasons.

◆ **Virginia:** Wide receiver Malik Washington finished the season with 110 receptions, 1,426 receiving yards, and nine touchdowns. Washington broke the ACC single-season records for receptions (110) and receptions per game (9.16) in a season, while his 1,426 receiving yards are the fifth-most in a single season in ACC history. Washington is the sixth player in ACC history with 100 receptions in a season. With his record-setting season, Washington picked up multiple All-America honors - College Football Network (first team), AFCA (second team), AP (second team), FWAA (second team), Walter Camp (second team), Action Network (second team), FOX Sports (second team), ESPN (second team), Phil Steele (second team), Sports Illustrated (second team), and PFF (second team).

◆ **Virginia Tech:** The Hokies are going bowling for the first time under second-year head coach Brent Pry, earning their sixth win in dominant fashion. Virginia Tech's 55 points scored against Virginia in the regular-season finale were the most points scored by either team in the 104-game series. The last time Tech scored 55 or more points was against William & Mary in 2018.

◆ **Wake Forest:** The Demon Deacons had their bowl streak snapped at seven consecutive seasons this year, which was the second-longest in the ACC. However, the future looks bright for the Deacs, as they scored 31 points in the regular-season finale with three touchdown passes from redshirt junior Michael Kern, who was making just his second career start.

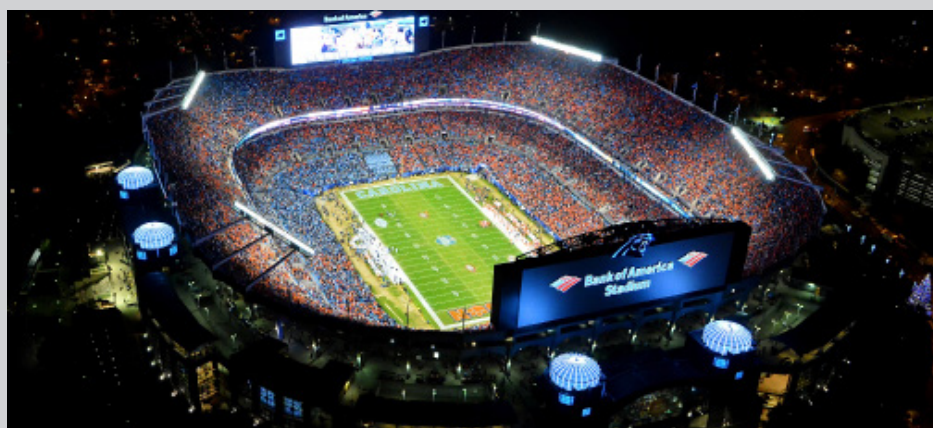

HOME OF THE ACC

NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

- No conference has won more NCAA national championships in the last two academic years than the ACC. The league's nine titles in 2022-23 shattered the league record of seven, set in 2021-22 and 2009-10.
- The ACC brought home NCAA Championships in 2022-23 in Women's Cross Country (NC State), Field Hockey (North Carolina), Men's Soccer (Syracuse), Women's Swimming & Diving (Virginia), Fencing (Notre Dame), Women's Tennis (North Carolina), Men's Tennis (Virginia), Men's Lacrosse (Notre Dame) and Women's Golf (Wake Forest). In addition, North Carolina women's tennis won the 2023 ITA National Indoor Championship. ACC student-athletes also won 29 individual national titles in 2022-23.
- This year, 2023-24, the ACC has already captured four NCAA national championships with NC State women's cross country winning its third-straight title, North Carolina's field hockey team repeating as national champions, and both Florida State women's soccer and Clemson's men's soccer each earning their second NCAA title in the last three years.
- The ACC has won seven national championships in football, men's basketball, women's basketball and baseball since 2015. The ACC is the only conference to win each of those four titles over that stretch.
- The ACC has won three of the last 11 football national titles and three of the last eight men's basketball national championships (most of any conference).
- Clemson (15-0) won the league's eighth football national championship in 2018 with a 44-16 win over previously unbeaten Alabama. The 28-point margin of victory was the largest over a No. 1 ranked team in ACC history.

ACC SUCCESS IN 2022-23

- Sixteen ACC programs finished the 2022-23 season ranked either No. 1 or No. 2 in their respective sports, and all 15 member schools captured either an ACC championship or an ACC regular-season championship.
- Six ACC schools placed among the top 20 of the final Division I LEARNFIELD College Directors' Cup standings. Virginia finished fourth and was joined in the top 10 by North Carolina, which placed eighth. Duke (16th), Florida State (17th), NC State (19th) and Notre Dame (20th) completed the ACC's top-20 contingent. Louisville (32nd), Wake Forest (42nd), Syracuse (45th) and Miami (49th) gave the ACC 10 institutions among the top 50. The feat marked the 21st straight year that four or more ACC schools placed among the top 30 in the final rankings.
- The ACC had the most Honda Award winners of any conference in 2022-23 with four – North Carolina's Fiona Crawley (tennis), Virginia's Kate Douglass (swimming), North Carolina's Erin Matson (field hockey) and NC State's Katelyn Tuohy (cross country).

ACC EXPANSION

- The ACC Board of Directors voted on Sept. 1 to formally admit the University of California (Cal), Southern Methodist University (SMU) and Stanford University to the Atlantic Coast Conference. Cal, SMU and Stanford will join the ACC as full members with full voting participation effective July 1, 2024 (SMU) and August 2, 2024 (Stanford and Cal). The decision followed the submission of letters of application from all three institutions.
- The additions of Cal, SMU and Stanford enhance and strengthen the ACC academically, athletically and financially as well as create a true national conference that spans coast to coast. The incoming universities enrich the league's competitiveness in all sports and further demonstrate the ACC's commitment to broad-based programs for both women and men. More than 2,200 student-athletes from Cal, SMU and Stanford will join the nearly 10,000 current ACC student-athletes competing at the highest level of intercollegiate athletics.
- Cal, SMU and Stanford will begin competing in the ACC across their respective sponsored sports beginning in the 2024-2025 academic year. The ACC leads all Autonomy 5 conferences with 15 women's sports offerings and no conference offers more than the league's 28 total sponsored sports.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS

- A player from a current ACC school has won the William V. Campbell Trophy® five times, including three times in the last nine years. That is the most of any conference over that span. The award recognizes an individual as the absolute best football scholar-athlete in the nation for his combined academic success, football performance and exemplary leadership.
- Eight ACC Football teams earned a graduation success rate (GSR) at or above the FBS average based on the report released by the NCAA in December 2023.
- The ACC remains the only conference to have multiple teams register GSR scores of 90 or higher every year since 2005. Boston College (97), Clemson (99), Duke (93), Louisville (96), Pitt (94), Virginia (91) and Wake Forest (93) reached that plateau in this year's report.
- For the 17th consecutive year, the ACC led the way among FBS conferences in the "Best Colleges" rankings released by U.S. News & World Report on Sept. 18, 2023.
- ACC teams continue to stand out among those from Division I colleges and universities that meet standards and excel academically, as evidenced by the annual Academic Progress Rate (APR) team data released by the NCAA in January 2022. All ACC football, men's basketball, women's basketball and baseball programs exceeded the NCAA's required APR. In football, 12 ACC teams have an APR above the Division I average of 968, which is the most among peer conferences).

ACC STUDENT-ATHLETE PROGRAMS & SERVICES

- The ACC's Committee for Racial and Social Justice (CORE - Champions of Racial Equity) continued its mission to promote and encourage inclusion, racial equity and social justice through education, partnerships, engagement and advocacy.
- Among CORE's accomplishments in 2022-23 were the second annual UNITE Award Class; the ACC's Fall, Winter and Spring UNITY Weeks (theme: "PRIDE, the fight against antisemitism and other causes"); mandatory staff education and the ACC Unity Tour in Washington, D.C. in July, 2023.
- The ACC conducted a Health and Safety Summit in Durham in May, in partnership with the ACC Healthcare Advisory Group, bringing together athletic trainers, team physicians, dietitians, mental health practitioners, sports performance coaches, and others within the ACC's health and sports performance community to collaborate and to share best practices.
- The ACC continued to provide leadership development programming to ACC coaches through the "Coaching the Whole Athlete Academy". The Coaching Academy is an eight-week virtual and immersive development program established by the league office that equips coaches with information, tools, and skills of a humanistic approach to better support the needs of the student-athlete.
- The ACC organized the first ACC Career Trek in Charlotte, N.C., in May 2022. The trek included 27 student-athletes from 12 ACC schools. The trek allowed student-athletes to explore potential careers, network with professionals, and gain insights into what employers are seeking in potential candidates.
- The 2021 ACC/Big Ten Basketball Challenge used the series of 28 men's and women's games to bring awareness to the importance of mental health and help to break down any stigma related to mental health struggles.
- The ACC hosted its fourth annual Fall Unity Week on Oct. 14-22, 2023. The theme for the 2023-24 academic year is "Civic Engagement," chosen by CORE in conjunction with the ACC Student-Athlete Advisory Committee (SAAC) to encourage their respective community's involvement in the lead-up to the general election in 2024.

FOOTBALL SUCCESS

■ The ACC has had a team in either the College Football Playoff or the BCS National Championship Game in eight of the last 11 years, as Florida State defeated Auburn 34-31 in the final BCS National Championship game in 2014. The ACC has the second most CFP appearances of any conference, including two teams in the 2020 season.

■ The ACC has 11 bowl-eligible teams this season, the most among all Power 5 conferences. It is the 23rd consecutive season in which the ACC earned at least six bowl bids. Not including the pandemic-affected 2020 season, the ACC has sent at least nine teams to a bowl every year since 2016. Since 2013, the ACC is second among all conferences with 111 postseason appearances counting this season.

■ Led by unanimous first-team All-America linebacker Payton Wilson of NC State, the ACC placed 12 players – representing eight different schools – on NCAA-recognized 2023 All-America teams. Florida State led the league with four selections, while NC State had two. The NCAA recognizes the All-America teams selected by AP, FWAA, The Sporting News, AFCA and Walter Camp to determine consensus All-Americans.

■ Among active head coaches, the ACC's Dabo Swinney (Clemson), Mack Brown (North Carolina), Mike Norvell (Florida State), Dave Doeren (NC State) and Jeff Brohm (Louisville) rank among the top 40 in the nation in career winning percentage. Swinney's .797 winning percentage ranks eighth in the nation. Brown is second among all active coaches with 282 victories, while Swinney is 11th with 169.

■ Seven ACC players have finished in the top three of the Heisman Trophy voting in the last 11 years, including 2013 winner Jameis Winston of FSU and 2016 winner Lamar Jackson of Louisville. Clemson's Trevor Lawrence finished second in 2020, while Pitt's Kenny Pickett was third in 2021.

ACC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME & BOWL SUCCESS

■ With Louisville making its first appearance in the championship game this year, 13 different ACC teams have played in the ACC Football Championship Game since its inception in 2005. Clemson leads all teams with nine appearances, followed by Virginia Tech (6) and Florida State (6).

■ The ACC Football Championship Game has sold out five times in Charlotte (2010, 2011, 2015, 2017 and 2020).

■ In April 2018, the ACC and the Charlotte Sports Foundation announced a 10-year agreement that will keep the ACC Football Championship Game in Charlotte through the 2030 season. The game will be played annually at Bank of America Stadium on the first Saturday in December.

■ The ACC is in the 10th year of a 12-year agreement with the Capital One Orange Bowl, which will host an ACC team – either its champion or next available team – in all years when the Orange Bowl is not a semifinal site for the College Football Playoff. The opponent will be the highest-ranked available team from the SEC, Big Ten, or Notre Dame.

■ Six different ACC teams have played in the prestigious Capital One Orange Bowl since 2013 – Clemson in 2013, 2015 and 2023, Georgia Tech in 2014, Florida State in 2016 and 2023, Miami in 2017, Virginia in 2019 and North Carolina in 2020.

■ The ACC's current bowl lineup includes the Holiday Bowl, Pop-Tarts Bowl, TaxSlayer Gator Bowl, Bad Boy Mowers Pinstripe Bowl, Duke's Mayo Bowl, Tony the Tiger Sun Bowl, Military Bowl presented by GoBowling.com, Wasabi Fenway Bowl, Union Home Mortgage Gasparilla Bowl and 76 Birmingham Bowl. In addition, the ACC will send a team to the Reliaquest Bowl if the league's opponent in a non-semifinal Capital One Orange Bowl is from the Big Ten.

ACC & THE NFL DRAFT

■ Since the 2005 season, the ACC has had 666 players chosen in the NFL Draft, including 103 first-round picks, the second-highest total of any conference.

■ Four ACC players were selected in the first round of the 2023 NFL Draft in Kansas City, led by Pitt All-America defensive tackle Calijah Kancey who was the No. 19 overall pick to the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. He was joined in the first round by Boston College WR Zay Flowers (22nd, Baltimore Ravens), Clemson DE Myles Murphy (28th, Cincinnati Bengals) and Clemson DT Bryan Bresee (29th, New Orleans Saints). Syracuse OT Matthew Bergeron, GT Edge Keion White and Miami CB Tyrique Stevenson were taken in the second round. Five ACC players were third-round picks, while 20 were selected in rounds four through seven.

■ The ACC's 32 picks in 2023 represented 13 different institutions.

■ The ACC has had 385 players selected since 2013 - the second-highest total among all conferences - and has had 40 or more players picked in five of the last 10 drafts. The ACC's 45 draftees in 2018 was its third-highest ever.

■ Current ACC teams have had a total of nine players chosen as the first overall selection in the NFL Draft. The most recent was Clemson's Trevor Lawrence, who was tabbed first in 2021 by the Jacksonville Jaguars. Miami (Vinny Testaverde, 1987, Tampa Bay; and Russell Maryland, 1991, Dallas) and Virginia Tech (Bruce Smith, 1985, Buffalo; and Michael Vick, 2001, Atlanta) each had two top selections while Clemson (Lawrence, 2021, Jaguars), Florida State (Jameis Winston, 2015, Tampa Bay), NC State (Mario Williams, 2006, Houston), Virginia (Bill Dudley, 1942, Pittsburgh) and Syracuse (Ernie Davis, 1962, Washington) each had one. Also, NC State's Roman Gabriel, the No. 2 overall selection in the 1962 draft, was chosen No. 1 in the AFL Draft by the Oakland Raiders.



ACC NETWORK

■ ACC Network supports the ACC's 24/7/365 football initiative with year-long coverage throughout its live event and studio coverage, original programming, and content on its social platforms.

■ Along with a full slate of season-long football games on ACCN, the network provides wall-to-wall coverage every Saturday throughout the fall. The ACC Huddle, ACCN's franchise football studio show leads into the action with an hour pregame show (11 a.m. – noon ET), provides coverage at halftime and between games, as well as a primetime show leading into ACC Primetime Football and an hour-long postgame show. The ACC Huddle also appears on ACCN around other tentpole football events – ACC Football Kickoff, Pro Days, Signing Day, CFP and select bowl games.

■ For the third consecutive year, ACCN embarked on a 14-campus ACC Football tour throughout August (2023) to kick off the football season. ACC Football Road Trip featured 14 one-hour shows airing in primetime over three weeks from campuses across the conference. ACC Football Road Trip previewed each team's upcoming season and included exclusive interviews with head coaches and student-athletes while showcasing unique aspects of those 14 football campuses.

■ ACC Huddle and ACC PM took to the road for a number of stops at campuses throughout the 2022 football regular season including North Carolina (vs. Florida A&M), Virginia Tech (vs. Boston College), Florida State (vs. Boston College), NC State (vs. Wake Forest), Syracuse (vs. Florida State) and Wake Forest (vs. Syracuse), in addition to being onsite at the 2022 Subway ACC Football Championship Game and the Capital One Orange Bowl.

■ This season, two of ACC Network's signature programs, ACC Huddle and ACC PM, hit the road and traveled to college football game sites every week of the regular season this fall for the first time in the Network's history. Either ACC Huddle or ACC PM, if not both, have been on a college campus each week. In Week 1, ACC PM was at both Wake Forest and Virginia Tech, while ACC Huddle was live at Virginia Tech, in Orlando for FSU and LSU, and at Duke. The rest of the season saw both shows at eight different schools - Week 2 - Florida State, Week 3 - Clemson, Week 4 - Pitt, Week 5 - Virginia Tech, Week 6 - Miami, Week 7 - Duke, Week 8 - Miami, Week 9 - Georgia Tech, Week 10 - NC State, Week 11 - North Carolina, Week 12 - Georgia Tech, and Week 13 - NC State, in addition to being onsite at the 2023 ACC Football Championship Game.

■ ACCN's football analyst roster includes four former NFL players Tim Hasselbeck, Mark Herzlich, EJ Manuel and Eddie Royal, College Football Hall of Fame Coach Mark Richt and former Clemson and Georgia Tech standouts Eric Mac Lain and Roddy Jones.

- This will be USC's 57th all-time bowl appearance.
- The Trojans have the nation's 10th-highest bowl winning percentage (.630) among the 98 schools that have made at least 10 bowl appearances.
- USC's 34 bowl victories are third behind Alabama's 44 and Georgia's 35 for the most in the nation.
- This will be USC's fourth appearance in the Holiday Bowl, all in the past 10 seasons. USC beat Nebraska in the Holiday Bowl in 2014, 45-42, fell to Wisconsin the following year, 21-23, and lost to Iowa 24-49 in 2019.

- No. 22 Clemson will be making a bowl appearance for the 19th consecutive year, adding to its current school record that began in 2005. It is the current longest active streak among ACC teams and the fifth-longest in the nation.
- The Tigers will head south to the Sunshine State to compete in the TaxSlayer Gator Bowl for the 10th time.
- The matchup against Kentucky will be the Tigers' 46th bowl game in program history, as the Tigers have a 26-23 overall bowl record.

- After claiming its 16th ACC Championship, No. 5 Florida State moved to 13-0 on the season and is one of just three undefeated Power 5 teams entering bowl season.
- Florida State has won its last two trips to the Orange Bowl and boasts five Orange Bowl victories all-time, including the 1993 National Championship.
- With 13 wins, the 2023 FSU team joined the 2013 National Championship team (14-0) and the 2014 College Football Playoff team (13-1) as the only 13-win teams in program history.
- At 19 games, Florida State will take the second-longest winning streak into its Orange Bowl matchup against Georgia. The 19-game win streak is the second-longest in program history and third-longest in ACC history.
- With the 2023 ACC Football Championship Game win over Louisville, FSU's eight wins over bowl-eligible Power 5 teams are the most in the country heading into bowl season.
- This will be Georgia's 62nd bowl game appearance, the second-most of any team in the country. The Bulldogs' all-time bowl record is 37-21-3.
- Georgia is making its 27th consecutive bowl appearance, which ranks as the longest active streak in the country.
- Georgia has appeared in the Orange Bowl four times (1942, 1949, 1960, 2021).
