ACC IS THE CONFERENCE OF QUARTERBACKS

■ Five ACC quarterbacks were ranked in ESPN's Top 15 QBs in College Football in 2025 – Cade Klubnik of Clemson, Carson Beck of Miami, Haynes King of Georgia Tech, Kevin Jennings of SMU and Darian Mensah of Duke.

■ The ACC features nine of the top 30 quarterback transfers heading into the 2025 season and has seen a strong influx of talent at the position.

ACC IS LOADED WITH PREEMINENT PLAYERS

■ Five ACC players are ranked on ESPN's list of 25 non-QB playmakers to watch.

■ ACC has 10 of the top 50 best players in college football (PFF College 50).

■ ACC has 1 of the 3 top returning players across six different positions (Pro Football Focus).

■ ACC has 3 of the top 10 teams in the 247Sports 2025 Transfer Football Team Rankings.

■ ACC has 22 of the top 100 transfers in the 247Sports 2025 College Football Transfer Portal Top Prospects.

ACC AVAILABILITY REPORTING

■ The ACC announced on July 22, 2025, two new policies to enhance the safety and well-being of ACC student-athletes in the 2025-26 academic year.

(1) Institutional event security plans will limit access to the competition area in football and men's and women's basketball.

(2) the availability status of student-athletes will be reported before each conference game in football, baseball, men's and women's basketball.

■ Before each conference game, a team will disclose any student-athlete whose availability for the upcoming game is in question. A student-athlete can be listed on the Availability Report if their status is uncertain for any reason (e.g., injury or illness, academic or other eligibility issue, personal or family matter, etc.); however, only the status and not the specific reason will be publicly reported.

■ In football, a report will be submitted two days before each Conference game (e.g., Thursday before a Saturday game) with an update on the day before the game and on game day.

■ For each report submitted before game day, student-athletes will be designated as Available, Probable, Questionable, or Out for the upcoming game. Game Day Reports will be submitted two hours before each game. For this report, student-athletes will be designated as Available, Game Time Decision, or Out.

■ All availability reports and the full conference policy will be available to the public and media on the ACC's website – www.theACC.com.
(starts Week 3 with Conference play).

** This policy is intended to help protect student-athletes and staff members from outside entities seeking to obtain inside information about availability and participation, including but not limited to injuries. It will also reinforce to athletes and staff the sensitivity of such information.*

2025 ACC FOOTBALL NOTES

TRIO OF TEAMS RANKED IN PRESEASON COACHES POLL

■ Three ACC teams were ranked in the top 25 of the Preseason US LBM Coaches Poll (August 4), powered by USA TODAY Sports, including two teams in the top 10 - Clemson came in at No. 6, ahead of Miami at No. 10, while SMU was ranked No. 16.

■ Clemson received two first-place votes in the poll.

■ Five additional ACC teams received votes: Louisville (126), Georgia Tech (27), Syracuse (16), Duke (12) and Florida State (8).

THREE TEAMS RANKED IN PRESEASON AP TOP 25 POLL

■ Three ACC football programs earned recognition in the 2025 Preseason Associated Press (AP) Top 25 Poll. Two teams were ranked in the top 10, with Clemson at No. 4 and Miami at No. 10. SMU was ranked at No. 16.

■ Clemson received four first-place votes in the AP poll.

■ Five other ACC teams received votes in the AP Top 25 Preseason Poll: Louisville (90), Georgia Tech (63), Florida State (8), Duke (6) and Pitt (3).

WEEK 1 FIRST FOR THE ACC

■ The ACC will have five different teams face a non-conference AP Top 25 opponent this week (Clemson, Florida State, Miami, Syracuse and Virginia Tech). That is the most in Week 1 in ACC history.

■ The previous high was four games against non-conference AP Top 25 opponents in Week 1 of both the 1982 and 1997 seasons.

ACC OWNS LABOR DAY ONCE AGAIN

■ The ACC is the only league to compete across five days - Thursday through Monday - during Week 1 of the college football season.

■ This will be the sixth time this has happened for the ACC in the regular season since 2017 (2017, 2018, 2021, 2022, 2023). No other FBS conference has done so even once over that same period. (*Stats Perform*)

■ Week 1 includes seven games against P4 opponents and Notre Dame – no other conference has more.

■ The ACC will once again anchor Labor Day Weekend on Monday night with North Carolina playing host to TCU, as six-time Super Bowl champion Bill Belichick makes his North Carolina debut with the Tar Heels hosting TCU.

■ ESPN will host a special one-hour *College Football Countdown* studio show live from Kenan Stadium on Monday, September 1, prior to the highly anticipated debut of Bill Belichick with the Tar Heels. The Labor Day special will air live from 7-8 p.m. ET on ESPN from the sidelines before the Tar Heels take on the TCU Horned Frogs for their season opener.

■ It marks the 16th consecutive Labor Day game for the ACC (excluding the 2020 COVID season), and the 19th time since the tradition began with Florida State vs. Miami in 2005.

■ ACC Football is set to dominate Fridays this fall, with a league-record 12 games scheduled for Fridays in 2025, the most of any conference.

■ 12 of the ACC's 17 football programs will participate in at least one primetime Friday night game.

STRONGEST NON-CONFERENCE SCHEDULE

■ ACC teams are scheduled to play 26 games against peer Power 4 Conference opponents and Notre Dame in 2025, the most of any conference by at least eight games.

■ ACC teams are scheduled to play 15 non-conference games against opponents that were ranked in the 2025 Preseason AP Poll, five more than any other conference. Nine of those contests will come versus foes ranked in the top 10, also the most of any conference.

■ ACC teams will play 35 non-conference games against opponents that appeared in a bowl game last year, including eight against teams that made the 12-team College Football Playoff.

■ Based on team records from last season, the ACC is slated to play the toughest strength of schedule (.591) in non-conference play this season (considers FBS opponents only). (*Stats Perform*)

■ The ACC is stacked with preeminent players again heading into the 2025 season, including:

■ Five ACC players are ranked on ESPN's list of 25 non-QB playmakers to watch.

RETURNING ALL-ACC PERFORMERS

■ Led by first-team selections, Antonio Williams (Clemson), Blake Miller (Clemson), Chandler Rivers (Duke), Keylan Rutledge (Georgia Tech), Kyle Louis (Pitt), Desmond Reid (Pitt) and Isaiah Nwokobia (SMU), the ACC returns 23 players who earned first-, second-, or third-team All-ACC honors last year in 2024. (7 first-team; 7 second-team; 9 third-team selections)

■ Impact transfers ranked in the 247Sports Top 100 include: Duce Robinson, WR (Florida State); Will Heldt, DE (Clemson); Eric Rivers, WR (Georgia Tech); Ethan O'Connor, CB (Miami); CJ Daniels, WR (Miami); Charles Brantley, CB (Miami); Thaddeus Dixon, CB (North Carolina); Fa'alili Fa'amoe, OL (Wake Forest); Daniel King, OT (North Carolina); Khmori House, LB (North Carolina); Zechariah Poyser, S (Miami); Micah Pettus, OT (Florida State); and David Blay, DL (Miami).

ACC IS THE CONFERENCE OF QUARTERBACKS

■ The ACC had 13 quarterbacks named to the 2025 Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award Watch List – no other conference had more.

■ The ACC also had seven quarterbacks named to the 2025 Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award Watch List.

■ Five ACC quarterbacks were ranked in ESPN's Top 15 QBs in College Football in 2025 – Cade Klubnik of Clemson, Carson Beck of Miami, Haynes King of Georgia Tech, Kevin Jennings of SMU and Darian Mensah of Duke.

■ The ACC features nine of the top 30 quarterback transfers heading into the 2025 season and has seen a strong influx of talent at the position, including notable names like Carson Beck (Miami), Jaron-Keawe Sagapolutele (California), Darian Mensah (Duke), Miller Moss (Louisville), Steve Angeli and Rickie Collins (Syracuse), Dylan Loneragan (Boston College), Chandler Morris (Virginia), Gio Lopez (North Carolina), Devin Brown (California), Daniel Kaelin (Virginia), and Deshawn Purdie (Wake Forest).

■ Of the seven active FBS quarterbacks with at least 7,000 passing yards, Cade Klubnik is the only one with fewer than 20 interceptions thrown (18). (*StatsPerform*)

■ Quarterback Carson Beck, who transferred to Miami this offseason, has a 24-3 (.889) record as a starting FBS quarterback, the best of any active player (min. 5 GP) (*StatsPerform*).

■ Duke's Darian Mensah posted a 166.7 passer rating as a freshman last season, the sixth-best in the FBS (min. 150 attempts). The last FBS freshmen to have that high of a rating were Ohio State's C.J. Stroud (186.6) and Oklahoma's Caleb Williams (169.6) in 2021. (*StatsPerform*)

■ Georgia Tech's Haynes King finished the 2024 season with 2,114 passing yards, 14 touchdown passes, an ACC single-season record 72.9% completion percentage and just two interceptions in 11 games. King became the only NCAA Division I FBS player since 1956 with at least 2,000 passing yards, 10 touchdown passes, a 70% completion percentage and two or fewer interceptions in a season.

• Pitt's Eli Holstein and NC State's CJ Bailey were two of just eight FBS freshmen with 2,000+ passing yards and 15+ passing touchdowns last season.

• Virginia Tech's Kyron Drones recorded five games with a passing and rushing touchdown last season, the most in the ACC and tied for the sixth-most among power conference players.

■ Former ACC QBs are well-represented among NFL 53-man active rosters in 2025, as the league has 21 quarterbacks from an ACC school on 17 different teams. (as of August 26).

ACC X NFL

■ No conference blends college football and NFL experience quite like the ACC in 2025, with three former NFL head coaches now leading programs: Bill O'Brien (Boston College), Bill Belichick (North Carolina), and Frank Reich (Stanford), the most of any conference.

■ Belichick (six Super Bowl wins) and Reich (one) are the only two college football head coaches who have also won a Super Bowl as either a head coach or coordinator in the NFL.

■ Several ACC programs also feature General Managers with deep NFL ties, including Ron Rivera (Cal), John Garrett (Duke), Michael Lombardi (North Carolina) and Andrew Luck (Stanford), along with a growing number of former NFL stars contributing across coaching staffs and player development roles.

STEPPING UP IN NON-CONFERENCE PLAY

■ The ACC has registered 81 interceptions on defense against non-conference opponents since 2024, the most among any FBS conference over that time frame. (*StatsPerform*)

CLEMSON PICKED AS PRESEASON FAVORITE IN 2025 ACC FOOTBALL MEDIA POLL

■ Defending ACC Champion Clemson has been selected as the preseason favorite to win the 2025 Atlantic Coast Conference football title, following a vote of more than 180 media members credentialed for the 2025 ACC Football Kickoff in Charlotte, North Carolina.

■ The Tigers are coming off a strong 2024 campaign in which they posted a 10–4 overall record, went 7–1 in conference play, and captured the ACC Championship title. Clemson also made its seventh College Football Playoff appearance and finished the season ranked No. 11 in the final AFCA Coaches Poll and No. 14 in the AP Poll.

■ In the media voting, Clemson was picked to repeat as ACC Champion on 167 ballots.

■ Miami received seven first-place votes, followed by Florida State with four, while SMU and Georgia Tech each garnered two. Virginia Tech received one first-place vote.

■ Clemson led all teams with 3,083 points, while Miami (2,679) and SMU (2,612) were second and third, respectively. Georgia Tech (2,397) was picked fourth, while Louisville (2,370) came in fifth.

■ Duke (1,973) was picked to finish sixth in the preseason predictions, ahead of Florida State (1,920) in seventh, North Carolina (1,611) in eighth, Pitt (1,571) in ninth, NC State (1,505) in 10th, Virginia Tech (1,412) in 11th and Syracuse (1,381) in 12th.

■ Rounding out the preseason poll were Boston College (953) in 13th, Virginia (871) in 14th, California (659) in 15th, Wake Forest (576) in 16th and Stanford (426) in 17th.

KLUBNIK NAMED PRESEASON PLAYER OF THE YEAR

■ Clemson senior quarterback Cade Klubnik was voted the 2025 ACC Preseason Player of the Year, receiving 146 votes.

■ Klubnik is coming off a breakout 2024 season, leading the Tigers to an ACC title and a College Football Playoff berth. He accounted for 43 total touchdowns, completing 308-of-486 passes for 3,639 yards and 36 touchdowns, while rushing for 463 yards and seven scores. He ranked in the top 20 nationally in five major categories, including third in both passing touchdowns (36) and total touchdowns (43). His 21 passing touchdowns of 20-plus yards were the most in the FBS.

■ Georgia Tech's Haynes King (9), SMU's Kevin Jennings (5), Miami's Carson Beck (4) and Virginia Tech's Kyrn Drones (4) also received votes, as did eight other players.

Notably, it features both of last season's ACC Rookies of the Year: Louisville running back Isaac Brown (Offensive) and Clemson linebacker Sammy Brown (Defensive).

2025 ACC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME SET FOR 8 P.M. ET

■ The 2025 ACC Football Championship Game will kick off at 8 p.m. ET on Saturday, December 6, at Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte, North Carolina, on ABC. The league's football championship game will showcase the top two teams based on regular-season conference winning percentage.

■ The 8 p.m. ET kickoff marks the 16th time in the last 17 years that the game will be held in primetime. Since its inception in 2005, a total of 14 different teams have competed in the championship game.

■ Bank of America Stadium, home of the NFL's Carolina Panthers, has hosted 14 of the last 15 ACC Football Championship Games. The ACC, Carolina Panthers, and the Charlotte Sports Foundation have an agreement to keep the championship game in Charlotte through the 2030 season.

■ The winner of the conference championship game has advanced to the National Championship Game or competed in the College Football Playoff in nine of the last 12 seasons, including both of the two participating teams last year, with the ACC being one of only three multi-bid leagues in 2024.

■ The 12 honorees from current ACC schools include nine members of the National Football Foundation (NFF) College Football Hall of Fame, five recipients of ACC Football Legend honors, and two standouts named to the ACC 50th Anniversary Team in 2003.

■ To be eligible for the AP All-Time All-America Team, a player had to have been named an AP First-Team All-American at least once during his college career. The selection process did not consider a player's professional career.

NORTH CAROLINA, STANFORD & WAKE FOREST HIRE NEW HEAD COACHES

■ After over two decades of dominance in the NFL, Bill Belichick was hired for his first-ever college head coaching job at North Carolina in December 2024. Widely considered one of the greatest coaches in football history, Belichick won six Super Bowls and 17 division titles over his time in the NFL, which also includes 333 career wins to make him the second-winningest head coach in NFL history, behind only Don Shula, who holds the all-time record with 347 total wins.

■ Frank Reich was named Stanford's interim head football coach by Stanford Football General Manager Andrew Luck on March 31. The 36th head coach in program history, Reich is one of the sport's most well-respected offensive minds thanks to over 30 years in professional football, combining a 14-year playing career as an NFL quarterback with 18 seasons in various coaching roles. Reich was a member of six Super Bowl teams overall, four as a player with the Buffalo Bills (1991-94), and twice as a coach. Highly regarded in NFL circles with a knack for building lasting relationships, Reich's six-year head coaching tenure included five seasons with the Indianapolis Colts (2018-22) before his final stop at the helm of the Carolina Panthers (2023). Reich's NFL resume also includes four years as an offensive coordinator, including two seasons with the Philadelphia Eagles (2016-17), the second of which resulted in the franchise's first Super Bowl title in Super Bowl LII (2018).

■ Jake Dickert was named the head coach at Wake Forest in December 2024, following the resignation of longtime head coach Dave Clawson. Dickert took over Washington State as interim head coach in 2021 and earned the permanent role, leading the Cougars for four years from 2021-24. In four seasons, Dickert compiled a 23-20 record (.534) and led the Cougars to three bowl games. Last season proved to be his best work, going 8-4 in the regular season

ACC & ESPN/ACCN INTRODUCE ENHANCED REPLAY TRANSPARENCY FOR 2025 FOOTBALL SEASON

■ For the 2025 season, audiences watching ACC officiated matchups on Friday night on either ESPN/ESPN2 or ACC Network and ACC Network's primetime Saturday games will hear the real-time discussions among the Referee, instant replay official in the stadium, and the ACC's Collaborative Instant Replay Official located in the ACC's Game Day Operations Center in Charlotte.

■ While the ACC began sharing Game Day Operations Center video with ESPN in 2023, sharing audio of the replay discussions represents a significant next step in transparency. Last season, the ACC conducted a limited experiment, allowing ESPN officiating analyst Matt Austin to listen to replay conversations during a November 21 Thursday night game between NC State and Georgia Tech.

COLLEGE FOOTBALL PLAYOFF

OVERVIEW

The College Football Playoff (CFP) is a postseason event to determine college football's national champion on the field, while emphasizing the significance of college football's unique regular season where every game counts.

RANKINGS

The selection committee ranks the schools based on the members' evaluation of their performance on the field, using conference championships won, strength of schedule, head-to-head results, and comparison of results against common opponents.

THE BRACKET

The format of the College Football Playoff is built on a 12-team bracket. The 12 participating schools are the five conference champions ranked highest by the CFP selection committee, plus the next seven highest-ranked teams. The four highest-ranked schools will be seeded 1-4 and will receive a first-round bye. The remaining teams, including the fifth conference champion, will be seeded 5-12 based on their final ranking.

TRADITION

The New Year's holiday period and bowl games belong to college football. This season following the CFP First Round games on campus, the four Playoff Quarterfinal games will be played in the Cotton Bowl Classic, Orange Bowl, Rose Bowl Game and Sugar Bowl. The following week, the Fiesta Bowl and Peach Bowl will host the Playoff Semifinals.

CHAMPIONSHIP MONDAY

The two teams that win the Playoff Semifinals compete for the College Football Playoff National Championship. The national championship game is in a different city each year, always on a Monday night.

UNIVERSAL ACCESS

Every Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) team has equal access to the College Football Playoff based on its performance during the regular season. No team automatically qualifies.

GOVERNANCE

University presidents and chancellors from all 10 FBS conferences and Notre Dame serve as the board of managers and govern the administrative operations, with commissioners and Notre Dame athletics director (the Management Committee) managing the event. A small staff in the CFP office in Irving, Texas, carries out the day-to-day responsibilities.

SELECTION COMMITTEE

A talented group of 13 high-integrity individuals with experience as coaches, student-athletes, college administrators and journalists, along with sitting athletics directors, comprise the selection committee. Members of the committee are Chris Ault, Troy Dannen, Mark Dantonio, Jeff Long, Ivan Maisel, Chris Massaro, Randall McDaniel, Mack Rhoades (chair), Mike Riley, David Saylor, Wesley Walls, Carla Williams and Hunter Yurachek.

ACC TIEBREAKER POLICY

The Atlantic Coast Conference Football Champion will be decided by a game between the top two (2) post-season eligible teams.

The two teams with the highest percentage of wins during all regular-season Conference competition shall play in the Championship Game. If three (3) or more such teams are tied with the highest percentage of wins or two (2) or more teams are tied with the second highest percentage of wins, the following tiebreaker procedure shall be administered to determine the representative(s) in the Championship Game.

The team with the highest win percentage, either outright or after application of the tiebreaker, shall be declared the home team for the Championship Game.

A. Two-Team Tie

1. Head-to-head competition between the two tied teams.
2. Win-percentage versus all common opponents.
3. Win-percentage versus common opponents based upon their order of finish (overall conference win percentage, with ties broken) and proceeding through other common opponents based upon their order of finish.
4. Combined win-percentage of conference opponents.
5. The tied team with the higher ranking by the Team Rating Score metric provided by SportSource Analytics following the conclusion of regular season games.
6. The representative shall be chosen by a draw as administered by the Commissioner or Commissioner's designee.

B. Three (or More) Team Tie

Three (or more) team tiebreaker procedure will be used to either a) identify one Championship Game representative, b) identify both Championship Game representatives, or c) eliminate team(s) from the tie. If the administration of the three (or more) team tiebreaker results in the elimination of team(s) from the tie, teams remain tied, and both Championship Game representatives have not been determined, the tiebreaker procedure will restart for remaining tied teams.

1. Combined head-to-head win-percentage among the tied teams if all tied teams are common opponents.
2. If all the tied teams are not common opponents, the tied team that defeated each of the other tied teams.
3. Win-percentage versus all common opponents.
4. Win-percentage versus common opponents based upon their order of finish (overall conference win percentage, with ties broken) and proceeding through other common opponents based upon their order of finish.
5. Combined win-percentage of conference opponents.
6. The tied team with the highest ranking by the Team Rating Score metric provided by SportSource Analytics following the conclusion of regular season games.
7. The representative shall be chosen by a draw as administered by the Commissioner or Commissioner's designee.

* Note: Conference games against otherwise post-season ineligible teams will always be counted in the league standings and in application of the tie-breaker policies.

National Championships

- The ACC won six NCAA National Championships in 2024-25 in ACC-sponsored sports. In addition, Stanford won the NCAA Women's Water Polo Championship.
 - North Carolina won the 2024 NCAA Women's Soccer Championship.
 - Virginia won the 2024-25 NCAA Women's Swimming & Diving Championship.
 - Notre Dame won the 2025 NCAA Fencing Championship.
 - Wake Forest won the 2025 NCAA Men's Tennis Championship.
 - North Carolina won the 2025 NCAA Women's Lacrosse Championship.
 - Stanford won the 2025 NCAA Women's Rowing Championship.
- The ACC has won a combined 29 NCAA titles over the last four academic years, the most by any conference in their respective league-sponsored sports.
 - ACC has won six or more national titles in each of the last four years, marking the best run in ACC history.
 - In 2022-23, the ACC won the most NCAA championships of any conference with a league-record nine.

 - Volleyball: 2 of the final 4 teams.
 - Women's Lacrosse: 2 of the final 4 teams.
 - Men's Golf: 2 of the final 4 teams.
 - Women's Golf: 2 of the final 4 teams.
 - Women's Swimming & Diving: Top 2 teams in the team standings.
- ACC student-athletes won 32 individual NCAA Titles in 2024-25.

LEARFIELD Directors' Cup Standings

- Six ACC schools were ranked among the top 25, including three in the top 10, in the final Division I LEARFIELD College Directors' Cup standings following the 2024-25 academic year. All 18 ACC programs finished in the top 75 of the final standings.
- This marks the 23rd consecutive year that four or more ACC schools placed among the top 30 in the final LEARFIELD Directors' Cup standings. North Carolina and Virginia have ranked among the top 30 nationally in each of the 31 years the Directors' Cup has been conducted.
- The ACC was one of only two conferences with every school among the final top 75 this year. This marks just the second time in the last decade in which every ACC team finished in the top 75 (2020-21 was the other occurrence).

ACC STUDENT-ATHLETE PROGRAMS & SERVICES

- The ACC conducted its fourth annual Health and Safety Summit in May 2025, this time in Charlotte, North Carolina, bringing together athletic trainers, team physicians, dietitians, mental health practitioners, sports performance coaches, and others within the ACC's health and sports performance community to collaborate and to share best practices.
- The ACC continued to provide leadership development programming to ACC coaches through the "Coaching the Whole Athlete Academy". The Coaching Academy is an eight-week virtual and immersive development program established by the league office that equips coaches with information, tools, and skills of a humanistic approach to better support the needs of the student-athlete.
- The ACC organized the second annual ACC Career Trek in Charlotte, North Carolina, in June 2025. The trek included 30 student-athletes across the league meeting with representatives and listening to panel discussions from five different categories including sports, real estate, finance/banking, consulting and government.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS

ACC Student-Athletes Excel Once Again in NCAA APR Report

- ACC Student-Athletes continue to demonstrate strong academic performance, as reflected in the latest Academic Progress Rate (APR) data released by the NCAA in May.
 - Overall, the ACC average APR is 991, seven points above the NCAA Division I national average. Every team among the ACC's 28 sponsored sports exceeded the NCAA's required APR of 930, while 114 ACC teams recorded a perfect score of 1000, including at least one team from each of the 18 member institutions. All ACC football, men's basketball, women's basketball and baseball programs exceeded the NCAA's required APR of 930.
- ACC Makes Another Strong Showing in NCAA Graduation Success Rates
 - The Atlantic Coast Conference's collective high level of academic success is again reflected by the NCAA Graduation Success Rate (GSR) report released in November 2024. The ACC's average graduation rate of 94 percent is four points higher than this year's national average of 90 percent.

ACC Again Leads the Way in U.S. News & World Report "Best Colleges" Rankings

- For the 18th consecutive year – and now with 18 member institutions – the Atlantic Coast Conference leads the way nationally among Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) conferences in the "Best Colleges" rankings released by U.S. News & World Report.
 - This year's 51.7 average rank of ACC schools is the best among all FBS conferences.
 - Two ACC schools rank in the top 10 – only one other school in an FBS conference is in the top 10.
 - Four ACC schools rank in the top 20 – no other FBS conference has more than two.
 - Six ACC schools are among the top 30 in this year's rankings, also the most among all FBS conferences.
 - The ACC has 14 member schools among the top 70 – no other FBS conference has more.

FOOTBALL SUCCESS

The ACC has solidified its reputation as a powerhouse in college football over the last decade, producing elite teams, top-tier coaching talent and Heisman-caliber athletes.

Elite Presence on the National Stage

• In eight of the past 12 seasons, the ACC has been represented in either the College Football Playoff or the BCS National Championship Game—an elite streak that began with Florida State's thrilling 34-31 win over Auburn in the final BCS title game in January 2014 (2013 season).

Four CFP Teams, One Conference

• The ACC is one of the few conferences to have sent four different programs to the College Football Playoff:

- Clemson (2015–2020, 2024)
- Florida State (2014)
- Notre Dame (2020, as a full ACC member during the pandemic season)
- SMU (2024)

Playoff Success That Stands Out

• With six all-time College Football Playoff victories, the ACC ranks third nationally behind only the SEC (18) and Big Ten (11).

Unmatched Depth in Bowl Season

• The 2024 season saw a league-record 13 ACC teams earn bowl eligibility, tying for the most among all Power 4 conferences. This marks the 24th consecutive year the ACC has secured six or more bowl bids, excluding the unique 2020 season. The league has sent 10 teams or more to the postseason in seven of the last 11 years, and since 2014, ranks second among all conferences with 105 total postseason appearances.

Top Coaching Talent Across the Board

• Seven active ACC head coaches currently rank among the top 60 in the FBS in career winning percentage (at least one full season of coaching):

- Dabo Swinney (Clemson)
- Fran Brown (Syracuse)
- Rhett Lashlee (SMU)

ACC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME SUCCESS

Expanding the Field of Contenders

• With SMU making its first appearance in 2024, 14 different programs have now competed in the ACC Football Championship Game since it began in 2005—highlighting the league's depth and competitive balance.

• Clemson leads all schools with 10 appearances, followed by Virginia Tech and Florida State, each with six.

Champions Across the Conference

• Since the inaugural title game in 2005, six different schools have claimed the ACC Championship:

- Clemson: 9 titles (most in league history)
- Florida State: 5 titles, including the 2023 crown
- Virginia Tech: 3 titles
- Georgia Tech, Wake Forest, and Pitt: 1 title each

A Proven Draw in Charlotte

• The ACC Championship Game has been a major event in Charlotte, selling out five times at Bank of America Stadium—in 2010, 2011, 2015, 2017, and 2020—demonstrating the passion of ACC fans and the game's regional appeal.

Charlotte: The Long-Term Home of ACC Championship Football

• In April 2018, the ACC and the Charlotte Sports Foundation solidified a 10-year partnership to keep the title game in Charlotte through 2030. The game will continue to be played annually at Bank of America Stadium on the first Saturday of December, maintaining one of college football's premier championship traditions.

ACC & THE NFL DRAFT

Another Impressive Draft Class

• The ACC saw 42 players selected in the 2025 NFL Draft, representing 15 different institutions across the conference. This ties the league's highest single-draft total since 2021 (not including Notre Dame's nine picks that year).

Consistent Pipeline to the Pros

• Since the 2000 NFL Draft, the ACC has produced 853 total draft picks, including 122 first-round selections—ranking third among all conferences in both categories.

Top-Three in Recent Draft Production

• Over the last 12 drafts (2013–2025), the ACC has had 469 players selected, the third-most of any conference during that span. Notably, the ACC has seen 40 or more players drafted in three of the last five years.

No. 1 Overall Picks: A Legacy of Excellence

• Current ACC programs have produced 17 No. 1 overall picks in the history of the NFL Draft. Most recently, Miami quarterback Cameron Ward was selected first overall by the Tennessee Titans in the 2025 NFL Draft. Several ACC schools have contributed multiple top picks over the years:

- Stanford: 4 (Bobby Garrett – 1954, Jim Plunkett – 1971, John Elway – 1983, Andrew Luck – 2012)
- Miami: 3 (Vinny Testaverde – 1987, Russell Maryland – 1991, Cameron Ward – 2025)
- Cal: 2 (Steve Bartkowski – 1975, Jared Goff – 2016)
- Virginia Tech: 2 (Bruce Smith – 1985, Michael Vick – 2001)
- Clemson: 1 (Trevor Lawrence – 2021)
- Florida State: 1 (Jameis Winston – 2015)
- NC State: 1 (Mario Williams – 2006)
- SMU: 1 (Kyle Rote – 1951)
- Syracuse: 1 (Ernie Davis – 1962)
- Virginia: 1 (Bill Dudley – 1942)

Additionally, NC State's Roman Gabriel was selected No. 2 overall in the 1962 NFL Draft but was the No. 1 overall pick in the AFL Draft by the Oakland Raiders.

- The two teams will play for the "Victory Barrel" in the season opener after meeting in the Military Bowl last year, a 26-21 win by the Pirates in Annapolis, Md.
- Dave Doeren, the winningest coach in NC State history with 87 wins, enters his 13th season at NC State. His tenure ranks sixth in the FBS in longevity at a current school.
- NC State has won seven straight season openers, the longest active streak among current ACC teams. A win over ECU would tie the Pack's longest such winning streak since World War II (1997-2004; 1988-98).
- Under Doeren, NC State has lost just two non-conference contests in Carter-Finley Stadium, posting a 30-2 mark in non-ACC home games. However, one of those losses came to ECU back on November 23, 2013 in Doeren's first season in Raleigh.
- ECU's Blake Harrell, who led the Pirates to a record of 5-1 as the interim coach over the last six games last year, was named the head coach in November 2024.
- The Pirates have produced a 46-64 (.418) regular season non-league record since 1997.

- Duke returns 14 starters from last season's squad (six on offense, five on defense and three on special teams), which is tied for the sixth-highest total nationally.
- QB transfer Darian Mensah posted a 166.7 passer rating as a freshman last season (at Tulane), the sixth best in the FBS (min. 150 attempts). The last FBS freshmen to have that high of a rating were Ohio State's C.J. Stroud (186.6) and Oklahoma's Caleb Williams (169.6) in 2021.
- Elon, in its seventh season under head coach Tony Trisciani, was picked to finish eighth in the Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) preseason poll, after going 6-6 last year in 2024.
- In last year's meeting, Elon held Duke to just 59 rushing yards in the loss, the fewest total for Duke against a non-conference opponent since 2010.

- Wake Forest also returns All-American defensive back Nick Andersen, who led the ACC with 122 total tackles in 2024.
- Over the last 14 years, Wake Forest is 11-3 in season openers, including a 9-2 record in the College Football Playoff Era (2014-present). Additionally, WF has gone 10-1 in home openers in that same time period, with the lone loss coming to No. 1 Clemson in 2020.
- The Demon Deacons will look for new offensive threats, returning less than 30% of their total yards from 2024.
- Kennesaw State went 2-10 (2-6 Conference USA) in 2024 - its first FBS campaign.
- Jerry Mack takes over as the head coach of Kennesaw State and will make his FBS head coaching debut against Wake Forest. Mack was previously the head coach of North Carolina Central, winning three MEAC titles.

- Jamal Haynes also returns as the Yellow Jackets' starting running back, logging over 2,000 yards and 16 rushing touchdowns over the past two seasons.
- GT has made bowl game appearances in each of the last two seasons.
- This is Georgia Tech's first trip west of the Mississippi River since 2013, when the Yellow Jackets played at BYU.
- Colorado is coming off a 9-4 season, but returns just three offensive starters and 14.5% of its total yardage from a year ago.
- Colorado is 1-5 all-time against ACC opponents and has not met an ACC team since 2008. The Buffaloes' lone ACC win came against Clemson in the 1957 Orange Bowl.

- In 2025, the Panthers will be led by preseason All-Americans Kyle Louis on defense and Desmond Reid on offense, while quarterback Eli Holstein returns after a redshirt-freshman year last season that saw him become the first Pitt QB to win his first seven starts since Dan Marino in 1979-80.
- A member of the Northeast Conference (NEC), Duquesne received a pair of first-place votes and was picked to finish second in the NEC Football Preseason Coaches Poll.
- The Dukes have claimed at least a share of the regular season crown in each of the past two years under head coach Jerry Schmitt, who has led Duquesne to 10 conference championships and three trips to the NCAA FCS Playoffs in 21 seasons as the head coach.

- Louisville holds a 20-8-1 series advantage over Eastern Kentucky, which dates back to 1927. The Cardinals have won the last five meetings, with EKU's last win coming in 1985.
- Louisville's head coach Jeff Brohm has posted a 19-8 record in his first two seasons — recording the Cardinals' best two-season mark since 2014.
- The Cardinals are looking to win their 15th-straight home opener. Louisville hasn't lost a home opener since falling 23-16 against Kentucky in the 2010 home opener.
- The Cardinals have scored over 30 points in the last three contests against the Colonels, including posting 44 points in a win in 2013.
- Louisville returns the duo in the backfield of Isaac Brown and Duke Watson, who combined to run for 1,770 yards and 18 touchdowns a year ago. Brown rushed for 1,173 yards and 11 scores, while Watson added 597 yards and eight touchdowns.
- Eastern Kentucky head coach Walt Wells is in his sixth season, leading the Colonels to an 8-5 record and a spot in the FCS Playoffs for the 23rd time in program history.
- EKU closed out the regular season last year with five straight wins and won five of its final six games of the year.

- This will be the sixth meeting between the Seminoles and Crimson Tide, with Alabama leading the all-time series 3-1-1. Florida State is looking for its first win against Alabama since September 29, 2007.
- The Seminoles look to secure their first home win against an AP Top-10 team since October 17, 2020 (W, 31-28, vs. No. 5 North Carolina).
- This will be the seventh time that Florida State opens the season against an AP Top-10 team, and the second time in three seasons (2023, W, 45-24, vs. No. 5 LSU in Orlando).
- Tommy Castellanos, a Boston College transfer, will be the Seminoles' starting quarterback. The dual-threat QB made 20 starts for the Eagles, logging 3,614 passing yards and 1,307 rushing yards.
- Alabama went 9-4 (5-3 SEC) in 2024, with a trip to the ReliaQuest Bowl. This will be Alabama's first true road game against an ACC opponent since 2010 (at Duke).
- Alabama head coach Kalen DeBoer begins his second season with the Crimson Tide and sixth season overall. The former Washington coach boasts a 114-16 career record with stops at the University of Sioux Falls, Fresno State, Washington and now Alabama.

- Tony Elliott is beginning his fourth season with Virginia and is coming off a 5-7 season last year.
- Virginia returns 15 starters, including eight on the defensive side. The Cavaliers also boast 14 senior starters and 13 senior backups, giving them one of the most experienced teams in the country.
- Chandler Morris will be the starting quarterback for the Cavaliers. The North Texas transfer threw for 3,774 yards last year in North Texas' air raid offense.
- The Cavaliers' offensive line has combined to make 213 career starts, which leads all FBS units.
- Coastal Carolina enters its third season under head coach Tim Beck, who has led the Chanticleers to back-to-back bowl appearances over his first two years leading the Teal.
- This season, the Chanticleers have a new offensive coordinator (Drew Hollingshead) and defensive coordinator (Jeremiah Johnson).

- The Tigers begin the season ranked No. 4 in the AP Poll. This marks Clemson's first AP Top 5 ranking since November 2022.
- This is Clemson's first non-conference home game against an AP Top-10 team since October 2013 (W, 24-22 vs. No. 6 Notre Dame).
- Clemson begins the season as the ACC preseason favorite by the media.
- Of the seven active FBS quarterbacks with at least 7,000 passing yards, Cade Klubnik is the only one with fewer than 20 interceptions thrown (18). (*Stats Perform*)
- Defensively, Clemson is led by All-Americans T.J. Parker and Peter Woods, who combined for 15.0 tackles-for-loss in 2024.
- LSU leads the all-time series 3-1 against Clemson, with the last meeting coming in 2019.
- The Tigers went 9-4 (5-3 SEC) in 2024, and went 1-3 against Top 25 opponents.
- The matchup features two of the 14 winningest programs in FBS history. The programs have combined for 1,623 wins (815 - LSU (12th all-time) and 808 - Clemson (13th all-time)).

- The Mustangs fell in the 2024 ACC Football Championship Game to Clemson on a last-second field goal after posting a perfect 8-0 conference record in regular-season play.
- Rhett Lashlee begins his fourth season at SMU, boasting a 29-12 overall record, including an 11-3 mark in the Mustangs' first season in the ACC last year.
- Kevin Jennings threw for over 3,200 yards and added more than 300 more on the ground last season. Jennings took over as SMU's starting quarterback in Week 3, helping the Mustangs win nine straight games.
- SMU returns backside safety Isaiah Nwokobia, who finished second on the team with 100 tackles in 2024.
- East Texas A&M posted a 3-9 record in 2024, including a 2-4 mark in Southland play.
- This contest marks the third consecutive season that the Lions have faced an FBS foe.

- The Golden Bears have scored 40+ points in their last two meetings against the Beavers.
- Justin Wilcox begins his ninth season as the Golden Bears' head coach and looks to take Cal to its third consecutive bowl game.
- True freshman Jaron-Keawe Sagopolutele will be Cal's starting quarterback to open the season. Sagopolutele set the Hawai'i high school record for most career passing yards with 10,653 and was a 5-star recruit by On3.
- Oregon State is looking for its fourth consecutive season-opening win and fifth straight home-opening win to kick off the 2025 season.
- Despite starting the 2024 season with a 4-1 record, Oregon State finished the season at 5-7 in its first year under alumnus Trent Bray.
- Former Duke standout Maalik Murphy will be Oregon State's starting quarterback. He passed for 2,933 yards and 26 touchdowns last season for the Blue Devils.

- The two teams last played in 1991, playing annually from 1986 to 1991 as non-conference opponents. South Carolina leads the series 11-7-2, with Virginia Tech's last win in the series coming back in 1974.
- Virginia Tech and head coach Brent Pry enter the 2025 season with a new offensive and defensive coordinator, a new offensive line coach and 32 new transfers on the roster after a 6-7 record last season.
- Last year in 2024, the Hokies played in five one-score games and their seven losses by an average of 6.8 points per game.
- South Carolina head coach Shane Beamer is a Virginia Tech alumnus and the son of legendary Hokies coach Frank Beamer. He's in his fifth year with the Gamecocks and has compiled a 29-22 record.
- The Gamecocks ended 2024 with a strong nine-win regular season, a late-season momentum surge that saw them win their last six regular-season games, and a top-20 finish.

- Miami and Notre Dame meet in a top-10 matchup at Hard Rock Stadium to kick off the 2025 season. The Hurricanes routed Notre Dame 41-8 in the two teams' last matchup in 2017.
- The Hurricanes are in their fourth season under head coach Mario Cristobal, who has led Miami from five wins in Year 1 to seven wins in Year 2 and to 10 wins in Year 3 last year, only the second 10-win season over the last 20 years at Miami.
- Miami QB Carson Beck, a Georgia transfer, takes over the reins of a Miami offense that ranked No. 1 in the nation in both yards per game and points per game last year under offensive coordinator Shannon Dawson.
- Notre Dame head coach Marcus Freeman enters his fourth full season in 2025, after leading the Irish to a 14-2 record and a national championship game appearance in 2024.
- The Irish will have a new QB in redshirt-freshman CJ Carr, who played in one game for Notre Dame last year and has not attempted a pass in his collegiate career.
- ND will be led offensively by returner Jeremiyah Love, who rushed for over 1,125 yards and 17 touchdowns on the ground last year, while wide receiver transfer Malachi Fields is the top wideout for the Irish after a standout career at Virginia.

Notes:

- One of the biggest games in North Carolina history will kick off on Monday night, as NFL legend Bill Belichick makes his collegiate coaching debut versus TCU in Chapel Hill.
- This season, North Carolina has 23 incoming FBS transfers on its current roster, the most in the ACC, and tied for the sixth-most in the FBS. Overall, they have more than 70 new players on the roster for 2025.
- South Alabama transfer Gio Lopez, who had 2,559 passing yards and 465 rushing yards in 2024, is the projected starter at quarterback for the Tar Heels.
- Defensively, the Tar Heels added several key additions in Pryce Yates (UConn), Thaddeus Dixon (Washington), Khmori House (Washington) and Andrew Simpson (Boise State) to a unit that was decimated by departures to the NFL and transfer portal.
- TCU will be led by QB Josh Hoover, who returns after a record-breaking 2024 season, throwing for nearly 4,000 yards. He's considered one of the top signal-callers in the Big 12 and was ranked No. 9 among all FBS quarterbacks in The Athletic's preseason list.
- In 2023, TCU hosted Colorado's first game under Deion Sanders. The Horned Frogs lost as a 20.5-point favorite, falling to Colorado 45-42 in the 2023 season opener.
