■ The ACC's two top-10 non-conference wins in Week 1 marked only the second time since 1980 that a single conference has achieved two such victories to start the season; the previous instance was when the SEC did so in 2018. (Stats Perform)



ACC AVAILABILITY REPORTING

- The ACC announced on July 22, 2025, two new policies to enhance the safety and well-being of ACC student-athletes in the 2025-26 academic year.
- (1) Institutional event security plans will limit access to the competition area in football and men's and women's basketball.
- (2) the availability status of student-athletes will be reported before each conference game in football, baseball, men's and women's basketball.
- Before each conference game, a team will disclose any student-athlete whose availability for the upcoming game is in question. A student-athlete can be listed on the Availability Report if their status is uncertain for any reason (e.g., injury or illness, academic or other eligibility issue, personal or family matter, etc.); however, only the status and not the specific reason will be publicly reported.
- In football, a report will be submitted two days before each Conference game (e.g., Thursday before a Saturday game) with an update on the day before the game and on game day.
- For each report submitted before game day, studentathletes will be designated as Available, Probable, Questionable, or Out for the upcoming game. Game Day Reports will be submitted two hours before each game. For this report, student-athletes will be designated as Available, Game Time Decision, or Out.
- All availability reports and the full conference policy will be available to the public and media on the ACC's website www.theACC.com.

2025 ACC FOOTBALL NOTES

THREE ACC TEAMS IN TOP 20 OF AP TOP 25 POLL

- The ACC has three teams ranked in the top 20 of the Week 4 Associated Press (AP) Top 25 Poll: Miami (No. 4), Florida State (No. 7) and Georgia Tech (No. 18).
- Miami moved up one spot to No. 4 following its blowout win over then-No. 18 South Florida last week.
- Florida State continued its climb up the top 25 poll, moving up to No. 7 despite an open week in Week 3.
- Georgia Tech made its debut in the AP Top 25 Poll this year, coming in at No. 18 after a 24-21 win over then-No. 12 Clemson in the two teams' ACC opener on Sept. 13.
- Four other ACC teams received votes: Louisville (25), Clemson (6), SMU (4) and NC State (4).

TRIO OF TEAMS RANKED IN TOP 20 OF COACHES POLL

- Following Week 3, the ACC placed three teams inside the top 20 of the US LBM Coaches Poll: Miami (No. 6), Florida State (No. 9) and Georgia Tech (No. 19).
- Miami remained at No. 6 for the second straight week, like all seven top teams in the coaches poll.
- Florida State climbed into the top 10, moving up three spots to No. 9 overall following an open week.
- Georgia Tech jumped into the top 25 of the coaches poll this week after defeating then-No. 12 Clemson last Saturday, Sept. 13.
- Five other ACC teams received votes: Clemson (116), Louisville (53), SMU (24), NC State (13) and California (1).

THREE'S COMPANY IN THE TOP 10

ALL EYES ON CORAL GABLES, CANES IN WEEK 4

- The spotlight is coming back to Coral Gables. ESPN announced that College GameDay Built by The Home Depot will be live from the University of Miami as the undefeated Hurricanes host the Florida Gators in a primetime Sunshine State showdown on Saturday, September 20, at 7:30 p.m. ET on ABC.
- This marks the 26th time Miami has played in a game featured on *GameDay* and the ninth time as the host site. It will also be the fourth Miami–Florida matchup selected for *GameDay*, joining the high-profile meetings in 2002, 2008 and 2019, and just the first in Coral Gables.
- The Hurricanes will welcome GameDay back to Coral Gables for the first time since September 26, 2020, when then-No. 12 Miami hosted Florida State.
- In addition to ESPN's presence, the ACC Network's ACC Huddle will also be live from Coral Gables, adding to the atmosphere surrounding the rivalry showdown between Miami and Florida.

- Miami's Carson Beck (transfer, 2025) is 3-0 with the Hurricanes and owns a career 27-3 (.900) record as a starting FBS QB the best among active players (min. 5 starts). (Stats Perform)
- Cal freshman Jaron-Keawe Sagapolutele has thrown for 780 yards through three games, the most of any freshman quarterback nationally.
- NC State's CJ Bailey is the first Wolfpack player since Philip Rivers (2002) with at least 5 passing TDs and 3 rushing TDs through the first three games of a season. (Stats Perform)
- Following his performance in Week 3 versus Clemson (Sept. 13), Georgia Tech's Haynes King has five career FBS games with 100+ passing and 100+ rushing yards tied for third-most among active players. (*Stats Perform*)
- Boston College's Dylan Lonergan joined UNC's Drake Maye (2022) as the only ACC QBs since 2000 with 8+ TD passes and zero INTs through their first two games of a season. (Stats Perform)
- Pitt's Eli Holstein became just the second FBS QB in the past 30 years (joining 2021 Heisman winner Bryce Young) with 3+ TD passes in each of his first six non-conference starts.(Stats Perform)
- SMU's Kevin Jennings threw two 75+ yard TD passes in Week 2 vs. Baylor, becoming only the eighth ACC QB since 2000 with multiple 75+ yard TDs in a game. (Stats Perform)
- Duke's Darian Mensah (389 yards, 3 TDs vs. Elon, Aug. 29) is one of only five ACC QBs since 2000 with 350+ yards and 3+ TDs in his debut, joining Cam Ward (Miami, 2024), Kyle McCord (Syracuse, 2024), Jameis Winston (FSU, 2013) and Philip Rivers (NC State, 2000). (Stats Perform)
- In Week 1, Georgia Tech's Haynes King (Week 1 at Colorado) became just the second FBS player since 2000 with 140+ passing, 140+ rushing and 3+ rushing TDs in a season opener, joining Jalen Hurts (Oklahoma, 2019). (Stats Perform)



CONFERENCE OF OBS PRESEASON LOVE

- The ACC had 13 quarterbacks named to the 2025 Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award Watch List – no other conference had more.
- The ACC also had seven quarterbacks named to the 2025 Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award Watch List
- Five ACC quarterbacks were ranked in ESPN's Top 15 QBs in College Football in 2025 – Cade Klubnik of Clemson, Carson Beck of Miami, Haynes King of Georgia Tech, Kevin Jennings of SMU and Darian Mensah of Duke.
- The ACC features nine of the top 30 quarterback transfers heading into the 2025 season and has seen a strong influx of talent at the position, including notable names like Carson Beck (Miami), Jaron-Keawe Sagapolutele (California), Darian Mensah (Duke), Miller Moss (Louisville), Steve Angeli and Rickie Collins (Syracuse), Dylan Lonergan (Boston College), Chandler Morris (Virginia), Gio Lopez (North Carolina), Devin Brown (California), Daniel Kaelin (Virginia), and Deshawn Purdie (Wake Forest).

- Boston College wideout Lewis Bond leads the nation in receptions per game (9.7) and total catches (29).
- Fourteen ACC players have already rushed for 100+ yards in a game this season. Four have done it twice Hollywood Smothers (NC State), Micah Ford (Stanford), Isaac Brown (Louisville), and Havnes King (Georgia Tech).
- Through three weeks, 12 different ACC players have posted 100-yard receiving games, with Clemson's Bryant Wesco Jr. and SMU's Romello Brinson each accomplishing the feat twice.
- The nation's top two sack leaders hail from the ACC.

- ACC teams are averaging 268.1 passing yards per game this season, the highest average of any FBS conference this season. The ACC led all FBS conferences in the category last season with 248.9 per game. (Stats Perform)
- ACC teams have combined to record 196 pass plays of 20 yards or more this season, the most of any conference.
- Through Weeks 0–3, the ACC features six teams that rank in the top 25 in the NCAA in passing offense this season, tied for the most among all conferences.

ACC OWNED LABOR DAY ONCE AGAIN

- The ACC was the only league to compete across five days Thursday through Monday, August 28 through September 1 during Week 1 of the 2025 season.
- This marked the sixth time this has happened for the ACC in the regular season since 2017 (2017, 2018, 2021, 2022, 2023). No other FBS conference has done so even once over that same period. (Stats Perform)
- The ACC once again anchored Labor Day Weekend with the lone game on Labor Day as North Carolina played host to TCU in Bill Belichick's collegiate coaching debut.
- It marked the 16th consecutive Labor Day game for the ACC (excluding the 2020 COVID season), and the 19th time since the tradition began with Florida State versus Miami in 2005.

■ Overall, the ACC went 12-4 in Week 1, including posting Power 4 non-conference wins over No. 8 Alabama (SEC), Colorado (Big 12), and No. 6 Notre Dame.

2025 ACC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME SET FOR 8 P.M. ET

- The 2025 ACC Football Championship Game will kick off at 8 p.m. ET on Saturday, December 6, at Bank of America Stadium in Charlotte, North Carolina, on ABC. The league's football championship game will showcase the top two teams based on regular-season conference winning percentage.
- The 8 p.m. ET kickoff marks the 16th time in the last 17 years that the game will be held in primetime. Since its inception in 2005, a total of 14 different teams have competed in the championship game.
- Bank of America Stadium, home of the NFL's Carolina Panthers, has hosted 14 of the last 15 ACC Football Championship Games. The ACC, Carolina Panthers, and the Charlotte Sports Foundation have an agreement to keep the championship game in Charlotte through the 2030 season
- The winner of the conference championship game has advanced to the National Championship Game or competed in the College Football Playoff in nine of the last 12 seasons, including both of the two participating teams last year, with the ACC being one of only three multi-bid leagues in 2024.

ACC X NFL

- No conference blends college football and NFL experience quite like the ACC in 2025, with three former NFL head coaches now leading programs: Bill O'Brien (Boston College), Bill Belichick (North Carolina), and Frank Reich (Stanford), the most of any conference.
- Belichick (six Super Bowl wins) and Reich (one) are the only two college football head coaches who have also won a Super Bowl as either a head coach or coordinator in the NFL.
- Several ACC programs also feature General Managers with deep NFL ties, including Ron Rivera (Cal), John Garrett (Duke), Michael Lombardi (North Carolina) and Andrew Luck (Stanford), along with a growing number of former NFL stars contributing across coaching staffs and player development roles.

ACC ALUMNI ON AP ALL-TIME ALL-AMERICA TEAM

- Current Atlantic Coast Conference football members had 12 former Associated Press (AP) All-Americans named to the Associated Press (AP) All-Time All-America Team, as part of the news organization's celebration of the 100th anniversary of the storied honor for the top players in college football.
- The 12 honorees from current ACC schools include nine members of the National Football Foundation (NFF) College Football Hall of Fame, five recipients of ACC Football Legend honors, and two standouts named to the ACC 50th Anniversary Team in 2003.
- To be eligible for the AP All-Time All-America Team, a player had to have been named an AP First-Team All-American at least once during his college career. The selection process did not consider a player's professional career.

ACC CONTINUES PARTNERSHIP WITH COLLEGE FOOTBALL PLAYOFF FOUNDATION

- The ACC announced its plans to partner with the College Football Playoff Foundation (CFPF) again as part of this year's Extra Yard for Teachers Week (September 13-20). The initiatives include support for this year's Extra Yard for Teachers Week, Big Day for Teachers and the distribution of grant funds to support teachers in Charlotte.
- For the third straight year, the ACC will partner with a local Charlotte Mecklenburg School (CMS) to remodel a space that will directly benefit the school's students on a daily basis. In 2024, the conference worked with members of the Statesville Road Elementary administration, teachers and staff who were the recipients of a \$50,000 Extra Yard makeover. Additional details on this year's makeover will be announced in the future, as this will be the first year the conference will undertake two classroom makeovers.
- Since the inception of the ACC and CFP Foundation's partnership, over \$1.5 million has been given to support teachers in the ACC footprint.

■ The Allstate AFCA Good Works Team was established in 1992 by the College Football Association, recognizing the extra efforts made by college football players and student support staff off the field. CLEMSON PICKED AS PRESEASON FAVORITE IN 2025 ACC FOOTBALL MEDIA POLL

- Defending ACC Champion Clemson has been selected as the preseason favorite to win the 2025 Atlantic Coast Conference football title, following a vote of more than 180 media members credentialed for the 2025 ACC Football Kickoff in Charlotte, North Carolina.
- The Tigers are coming off a strong 2024 campaign in which they posted a 10–4 overall record, went 7–1 in conference play, and captured the ACC Championship title. Clemson also made its seventh College Football Playoff appearance and finished the season ranked No. 11 in the final AFCA Coaches Poll and No. 14 in the AP Poll.
- In the media voting, Clemson was picked to repeat as ACC Champion on 167 ballots.
- Miami received seven first-place votes, followed by Florida State with four, while SMU and Georgia Tech each garnered two. Virginia Tech received one first-place vote.
- Clemson led all teams with 3,083 points, while Miami (2,679) and SMU (2,612) were second and third, respectively. Georgia Tech (2,397) was picked fourth, while Louisville (2,370) came in fifth.
- Duke (1,973) was picked to finish sixth in the preseason predictions, ahead of Florida State (1,920) in seventh, North Carolina (1,611) in eighth, Pitt (1,571) in ninth, NC State (1,505) in 10th, Virginia Tech (1,412) in 11th and Syracuse (1,381) in 12th.
- Rounding out the preseason poll were Boston College (953) in 13th, Virginia (871) in 14th, California (659) in 15th, Wake Forest (576) in 16th and Stanford (426) in 17th.

KLUBNIK NAMED PRESEASON PLAYER OF THE YEAR

- Clemson senior quarterback Cade Klubnik was voted the 2025 ACC Preseason Player of the Year, receiving 146 votes.
- Klubnik is coming off a breakout 2024 season, leading the Tigers to an ACC title and a College Football Playoff berth. He accounted for 43 total touchdowns, completing 308-of-486 passes for 3,639 yards and 36 touchdowns, while rushing for 463 yards and seven scores. He ranked in the top 20 nationally in five major categories, including third in both passing touchdowns (36) and total touchdowns (43). His 21 passing touchdowns of 20-plus yards were the most in the FBS.
- Georgia Tech's Haynes King (9), SMU's Kevin Jennings (5), Miami's Carson Beck (4) and Virginia Tech's Kyron Drones (4) also received votes, as did eight other players.

FIRST ACC WINS AS HEAD COACH

- Wake Forest's Jake Dickert earned his first win as an ACC head coach in his debut, a 10–9 victory over Kennesaw State on August 29.
- North Carolina's Bill Belichick earned his first collegiate victory as head coach on September 6 with a convincing 20–3 win at Charlotte, marking the former six-time Super Bowl champion's inaugural win in college football and in the ACC.
- Stanford's Frank Reich picked up his first collegiate win as a head coach in the Cardinal's 30-20 win over Boston College in the two teams' season opener on September 13.

MONTGOMERY NAMED INTERIM HC AT VIRGINIA TECH

- Philip Montgomery is now the Interim Head Coach for the Virginia Tech Football program, taking over after head coach Brent Pry was fired following a 0-3 start to the 2025 season on September 14. Montgomery, who was Virginia Tech's offensive coordinator, will lead the team for the remainder of the current season.
- Montgomery joined Virginia Tech after a stint as cooffensive coordinator with the Birmingham Stallions of the United Football League (UFL). He brings more than two decades of college coaching experience, including roles as a Power 5 offensive coordinator and head coach.
- From 2015–22, Montgomery was the head coach at Tulsa, compiling a 43-53 record over eight seasons. His second year proved to be his best, as the Golden Hurricane finished 10-3, while the pandemic-shortened 2020 campaign also saw Tulsa capture an American Athletic Conference title.

NORTH CAROLINA, STANFORD & WAKE FOREST HIRE NEW HEAD COACHES

- After over two decades of dominance in the NFL, Bill Belichick was hired for his first-ever college head coaching job at North Carolina in December 2024. Widely considered one of the greatest coaches in football history, Belichick won six Super Bowls and 17 division titles over his time in the NFL, which also includes 333 career wins to make him the second-winningest head coach in NFL history, behind only Don Shula, who holds the all-time record with 347 total wins.
- Frank Reich was named Stanford's interim head football coach by Stanford Football General Manager Andrew Luck on March 31. The 36th head coach in program history, Reich is one of the sport's most well-respected offensive minds thanks to over 30 years in professional football, combining a 14-year playing career as an NFL guarterback with 18 seasons in various coaching roles. Reich was a member of six Super Bowl teams overall, four as a player with the Buffalo Bills (1991-94), and twice as a coach. Highly regarded in NFL circles with a knack for building lasting relationships, Reich's six-year head coaching tenure included five seasons with the Indianapolis Colts (2018-22) before his final stop at the helm of the Carolina Panthers (2023). Reich's NFL resume also includes four years as an offensive coordinator, including two seasons with the Philadelphia Eagles (2016-17), the second of which resulted in the franchise's first Super Bowl title in Super Bowl LII (2018).
- Jake Dickert was named the head coach at Wake Forest in December 2024, following the resignation of longtime head coach Dave Clawson. Dickert took over Washington State as interim head coach in 2021 and earned the permanent role, leading the Cougars for four years from 2021-24. In four seasons, Dickert compiled a 23-20 record (.534) and led the Cougars to three bowl games. The 2024 season proved to be his best work, going 8-4 in the regular season.

ACC & ESPN/ACCN INTRODUCE ENHANCED REPLAY TRANSPARENCY FOR 2025 FOOTBALL SEASON

- For the 2025 season, audiences watching ACC officiated matchups on Friday night on either ESPN/ ESPN2 or ACC Network and ACC Network's primetime Saturday games will hear the real-time discussions among the Referee, instant replay official in the stadium, and the ACC's Collaborative Instant Replay Official located in the ACC's Game Day Operations Center in Charlotte.
- While the ACC began sharing Game Day Operations Center video with ESPN in 2023, sharing audio of the replay discussions represents a significant next step in transparency. Last season, the ACC conducted a limited experiment, allowing ESPN officiating analyst Matt Austin to listen to replay conversations during a November 21 Thursday night game between NC State and Georgia Tech

COLLEGE FOOTBALL PLAYOFF

OVERVIEW

The College Football Playoff (CFP) is a postseason event to determine college football's national champion on the field, while emphasizing the significance of college football's unique regular season where every game counts.

RANKINGS

The selection committee ranks the schools based on the members' evaluation of their performance on the field, using conference championships won, strength of schedule, head-to-head results, and comparison of results against common opponents.

THE BRACKET

The format of the College Football Playoff is built on a 12-team bracket. The 12 participating schools are the five conference champions ranked highest by the CFP selection committee, plus the next seven highest-ranked teams. The four highest-ranked schools will be seeded 1-4 and will receive a first-round bye. The remaining teams, including the fifth conference champion, will be seeded 5-12 based on their final ranking.

TRADITION

The New Year's holiday period and bowl games belong to college football. This season following the CFP First Round games on campus, the four Playoff Quarterfinal games will be played in the Cotton Bowl Classic, Orange Bowl, Rose Bowl Game and Sugar Bowl. The following week, the Fiesta Bowl and Peach Bowl will host the Playoff Semifinals.

CHAMPIONSHIP MONDAY

The two teams that win the Playoff Semifinals compete for the College Football Playoff National Championship. The national championship game is in a different city each year, always on a Monday night.

UNIVERSAL ACCESS

Every Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) team has equal access to the College Football Playoff based on its performance during the regular season. No team automatically qualifies.

GOVERNANCE

University presidents and chancellors from all 10 FBS conferences and Notre Dame serve as the board of managers and govern the administrative operations, with commissioners and Notre Dame athletics director (the Management Committee) managing the event. A small staff in the CFP office in Irving, Texas, carries out the day-to-day responsibilities.

SELECTION COMMITTEE

A talented group of 13 high-integrity individuals with experience as coaches, student-athletes, college administrators and journalists, along with sitting athletics directors, comprise the selection committee. Members of the committee are Chris Ault, Troy Dannen, Mark Dantonio, Jeff Long, Ivan Maisel, Chris Massaro, Randall McDaniel, Mack Rhoades (chair), Mike Riley, David Sayler, Wesley Walls, Carla Williams and Hunter Yurachek.

SELECTION COMMITTEE RESPONSIBILITIES

Rank the top 25 teams, assign the schools to the 12-team playoff bracket and assign the Playoff Quarterfinal and Playoff Semifinal bowl sites.

ACC TIEBREAKER POLICY

The Atlantic Coast Conference Football Champion will be decided by a game between the top two (2) post-season eligible teams. The two teams with the highest percentage of wins during all regular-season Conference competition shall play in the Championship Game. If three (3) or more such teams are tied with the highest percentage of wins or two (2) or more teams are tied with the second highest percentage of wins, the following tiebreaker procedure shall be administered to determine the representative(s) in the Championship Game. The team with the highest win percentage, either outright or after application of the tiebreaker, shall be declared the home team for the Championship Game.

Two-Team Tie

- a. Head-to-head competition between the two tied
- b. Win-percentage against all common opponents.
- c. Win-percentage against common opponents based upon their order of finish (overall conference win-percentage, with ties broken) and proceeding through other common opponents based upon their order of finish.
- d. Combined win-percentage of conference opponents.
- e. The tied team with the higher ranking by the Team Rating Score metric provided by SportSource Analytics following the conclusion of regular-season games.
- f. The participant shall be chosen by a draw as administered by the Commissioner or Commissioner's designee.

Three (or More) Team Tie

The three (or more) team tiebreaker procedure will be used to either (a) identify one championship game participant, (b) identify both championship game participants, or (c) eliminate team(s) from the tie. If the administration of the three (or more) team tiebreaker results in the elimination of team(s) from the tie, teams remain tied, and both championship game participants have not been determined, the tiebreaker procedure will restart for remaining tied teams.

- a. Combined head-to-head win-percentage among the tied teams if all tied teams are common opponents.
- b. If all tied teams are not common opponents, the tied team that defeated each of the other tied teams.
- i. If all tied teams are not common opponents and no tied team defeated each of the other tied teams, but a tied team lost to each of the other tied teams, such team shall be eliminated and removed from the tie.
 - c. Win-percentage against all common opponents.
- d. Win-percentage against common opponents based upon their order of finish (overall conference win-percentage, with ties broken) and proceeding through other common opponents based upon their order of finish.
 - e. Combined win-percentage of conference opponents.
- f. The tied team with the highest ranking by the Team Rating Score metric provided by SportSource Analytics following the conclusion of regular season games.
- g. The participant shall be chosen by a draw as administered by the Commissioner or Commissioner's designee.

Conference games against otherwise post-season ineligible teams will always be counted in the league standings and in application of the tie-breaker procedure.

- The ACC won six NCAA National Championships in 2024-25 in ACC-sponsored sports. In addition, Stanford won the NCAA Women's Water Polo Championship.
 - · North Carolina won the 2024 NCAA Women's Soccer Championship.
 - Virginia won the 2024-25 NCAA Women's Swimming & Diving Championship.
 - Notre Dame won the 2025 NCAA Fencing Championship.
 - · Wake Forest won the 2025 NCAA Men's Tennis Championship.
 - · North Carolina won the 2025 NCAA Women's Lacrosse Championship.
 - · Stanford won the 2025 NCAA Women's Rowing Championship.
- The ACC has won a combined 29 NCAA titles over the last four academic years, the most by any conference in their respective league-sponsored sports.
 - · ACC has won six or more national titles in each of the last four years, marking the best run in ACC history.
 - In 2022-23, the ACC won the most NCAA championships of any conference with a league-record nine.

LEARFIELD Directors' Cup Standings

- Six ACC schools were ranked among the top 25, including three in the top 10, in the final Division I LEARFIELD College Directors' Cup standings following the 2024-25 academic year. All 18 ACC programs finished in the top 75 of the final standings.
- This marks the 23rd consecutive year that four or more ACC schools placed among the top 30 in the final LEARFIELD Directors' Cup standings. North Carolina and Virginia have ranked among the top 30 nationally in each of the 31 years the Directors' Cup has been
- The ACC was one of only two conferences with every school among the final top 75 this year. This marks just the second time in the last decade in which every ACC team finished in the top 75 (2020-21 was the other occurrence).

ACC STUDENT-ATHLETE PROGRAMS & SERVICES

- The ACC conducted its fourth annual Health and Safety Summit in May 2025, this time in Charlotte, North Carolina, bringing together athletic trainers, team physicians, dietitians, mental health practitioners, sports performance coaches, and others within the ACC's health and sports performance community to collaborate and to share best practices.
- The ACC continued to provide leadership development programming to ACC coaches through the "Coaching the Whole Athlete Academy". The Coaching Academy is an eight-week virtual and immersive development program established by the league office that equips coaches with information, tools, and skills of a humanistic approach to better support the needs of the student-athlete.
- The ACC organized the second annual ACC Career Trek in Charlotte, North Carolina, in June 2025. The trek included 30 student-athletes across the league meeting with representatives and listening to panel discussions from five different categories including sports, real estate, finance/banking, consulting and government.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS

ACC Student-Athletes Excel Once Again in NCAA APR Report

- Atlantic Coast Conference teams continue to demonstrate strong academic performance, as reflected in the latest Academic Progress Rate (APR) data released by the NCAA in May.
- Overall, the ACC average APR is 991, seven points above the NCAA Division I national average. Every team among the ACC's 28 sponsored sports exceeded the NCAA's required APR of 930, while 114 ACC teams recorded a perfect score of 1000, including at least one team from each of the 18 member institutions. All ACC football, men's basketball, women's basketball and baseball programs exceeded the NCAA's required APR of 930.

ACC Makes Another Strong Showing in NCAA Graduation Success Rates

• The Atlantic Coast Conference's collective high level of academic success is again reflected by the NCAA Graduation Success Rate (GSR) report released in November 2024. The ACC's average graduation rate of 94 percent is four points higher than this year's national average of 90 percent.

ACC Again Leads the Way in U.S. News & World Report "Best Colleges" Rankings

- For the 18th consecutive year and now with 18 member institutions the Atlantic Coast Conference leads the way nationally among Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) conferences in the "Best Colleges" rankings released by U.S. News & World Report.
 - This year's 51.7 average rank of ACC schools is the best among all FBS conferences
 - Two ACC schools rank in the top 10 only one other school in an FBS conference is in the top 10.
 - Four ACC schools rank in the top 20 no other FBS conference has more than two.
 - · Six ACC schools are among the top 30 in this year's rankings, also the most among all FBS conferences.
 - The ACC has 14 member schools among the top 70 no other FBS conference has more

FOOTBALL SUCCESS

The ACC has solidified its reputation as a powerhouse in college football over the last decade, producing elite teams, top-tier coaching talent and Heisman-caliber athletes.

Elite Presence on the National Stage

• In eight of the past 12 seasons, the ACC has been represented in either the College Football Playoff or the BCS National Championship Game—an elite streak that began with Florida State's thrilling 34-31 win over Auburn in the final BCS title game in January 2014 (2013 season).

Four CFP Teams, One Conference

- The ACC is one of the few conferences to have sent four different programs to the College Football Playoff:
 - Clemson (2015-2020, 2024)
 - Florida State (2014)
 - Notre Dame (2020, as a full ACC member during the pandemic season)
 - SMU (2024)

Playoff Success That Stands Out

• With six all-time College Football Playoff victories, the ACC ranks third nationally behind only the SEC (18) and Big Ten (11).

Unmatched Depth in Bowl Season

• The 2024 season saw a league-record 13 ACC teams earn bowl eligibility, tying for the most among all Power 4 conferences. This marks the 24th consecutive year the ACC has secured six or more bowl bids, excluding the unique 2020 season. The league has sent 10 teams or more to the postseason in seven of the last 11 years, and since 2014, ranks second among all conferences with 105 total postseason appearances.

Top Coaching Talent Across the Board

- Seven active ACC head coaches currently rank among the top 60 in the FBS in career winning percentage (at least one full season of coaching):
 - Dabo Swinney (Clemson)
 - Fran Brown (Syracuse)
 - Rhett Lashlee (SMU)

Heisman Pedigree

ACC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME SUCCESS

Expanding the Field of Contenders

- With SMU making its first appearance in 2024, 14 different programs have now competed in the ACC Football Championship Game since it began in 2005—highlighting the league's depth and competitive balance.
- Clemson leads all schools with 10 appearances, followed by Virginia Tech and Florida State, each with six.

Champions Across the Conference

- Since the inaugural title game in 2005, six different schools have claimed the ACC Championship:
 - Clemson: 9 titles (most in league history)
 - Florida State: 5 titles, including the 2023 crown
 - Virginia Tech: 3 titles
 - Georgia Tech, Wake Forest, and Pitt: 1 title each

A Proven Draw in Charlotte

• The ACC Championship Game has been a major event in Charlotte, selling out five times at Bank of America Stadium—in 2010, 2011, 2015, 2017, and 2020—demonstrating the passion of ACC fans and the game's regional appeal.

Charlotte: The Long-Term Home of ACC Championship Football

• In April 2018, the ACC and the Charlotte Sports Foundation solidified a 10-year partnership to keep the title game in Charlotte through 2030. The game will continue to be played annually at Bank of America Stadium on the first Saturday of December, maintaining one of college football's premier championship traditions.

ACC & THE NFL DRAFT

Another Impressive Draft Class

• The ACC saw 42 players selected in the 2025 NFL Draft, representing 15 different institutions across the conference. This ties the league's highest single-draft total since 2021 (not including Notre Dame's nine picks that year).

Consistent Pipeline to the Pros

• Since the 2000 NFL Draft, the ACC has produced 853 total draft picks, including 122 first-round selections—ranking third among all conferences in both categories.

Top-Three in Recent Draft Production

• Over the last 12 drafts (2013–2025), the ACC has had 469 players selected, the thirdmost of any conference during that span. Notably, the ACC has seen 40 or more players drafted in three of the last five years.

No. 1 Overall Picks: A Legacy of Excellence

- Current ACC programs have produced 17 No. 1 overall picks in the history of the NFL Draft. Most recently, Miami quarterback Cameron Ward was selected first overall by the Tennessee Titans in the 2025 NFL Draft. Several ACC schools have contributed multiple top picks over the years:
- Stanford: 4 (Bobby Garrett 1954, Jim Plunkett 1971, John Elway 1983, Andrew Luck 2012)

- Syracuse: 1 (Ernie Davis 1962)

Additionally, NC State's Roman Gabriel was selected No. 2 overall in the 1962 NFL Draft but was the No. 1 overall pick in the AFL Draft by the Oakland Raiders.

Clemson leads series, 10-2-0 Last Meeting: Clemson, 31-14 (2023)

Head Coaches Syracuse: Fran Brown (12-4 in 2nd season at SU; 12-4 in 2nd season overall) Clemson: Dabo Swinney(181-49 in 18th season at CU; 181-49 in 18th season overall)

- Clemson holds a 10-2 all-time record against Syracuse, including six straight wins since
- The Tigers are 5-0 against the Orange in games played at Clemson.
- Syracuse (2-1) has won back-to-back games following a season-opening loss to then-No. 24 Tennessee in the Aflac Kickoff Game in Atlanta.
- Orange QB Steve Angelo leads the nation with 1,072 passing yards (357.3 ypg).
- Syracuse WR Darrell Gill Jr. posted six catches for 152 yards and two touchdowns
- · Clemson looks to rebound after a Week 3 road loss at Georgia Tech.
- The Tigers' offensive line has allowed just 2.67 tackles for loss per game, ranking 2nd in the ACC and 5th nationally.
- Clemson special teams have excelled—opponents have zero yards on kickoff returns and are averaging -0.5 yards per punt return.
- Clemson WR Bryant Wesco Jr. has recorded back-to-back 100-yard receiving games, the first Tigers player to achieve 100 receiving yards in back-to-back games since 2020.

Notes:

- SMU and TCU will meet in the Battle for the Iron Skillet, a rivalry that has been played in all but seven years since 1915. The Mustangs won last year's meeting, 66-42.
- SMU is coming off a 28-10 road win at Missouri State, moving to 2-1 on the season.
- Running back TJ Harden has found the end zone five times in the Mustangs' last two games, scoring twice against Missouri State.
- · SMU has won 10 consecutive regular-season road games, tied for the second-longest streak in school history (13, 1981-84).
- The Mustangs have recorded multiple takeaways in each of the three games this season and nine of the past 16 games.
- SMU QB Kevin Jennings (4,904) enters the TCU game needing just 88 yards to move into the top 10 of career passing yards at SMU. He's tied for ninth in program history with 35 passing touchdowns.
- TCU is 2-0 on the season and is aiming to go undefeated in non-conference play for the first time since 2022 and just the third time in the last 10 seasons (2017, 2022).
- TCU's offense ranks No. 14 nationally in scoring offense at 45.0 points per game.

- The Tar Heels have not allowed a touchdown in back-to-back weeks for the first time since 2012.
- UNC LB Mikai Gbayor was named ACC Linebacker of the Week after recording six tackles, a strip sack, and a fumble recovery for a touchdown in the win over Richmond.
- UNC RB Demon June's 50-yard run vs. Richmond was the longest by a UNC freshman since Omarion Hampton's 58-yard rush against Georgia State (Sept. 10, 2022).
- June finished with 148 rushing yards, the most by a Tar Heel freshman RB since Michael Carter had 157 versus Virginia in 2017.
- UCF (2-0) enters off a bye week following wins over Jacksonville State and North Carolina A&T.
- The Knights are one of just three FBS teams (along with BYU and Texas Tech) that have not allowed a first-half point this season.

- · Florida State and Kent State will meet for the first time on Saturday.
- The Seminoles (3-0) are coming off an open date and moved up to No. 7 in the Week 4 AP Top 25. FSU is only the fourth preseason unranked team in the AP poll era to reach the top 10 by Week 4.
- FSU leads the ACC in scoring offense (54.0 ppg 3rd nationally), rushing offense (295.5 ypg – 6th), fewest penalties per game (3.50 – 8th) and scoring defense (10.0 ppg – 14th). The Seminoles are the only P4 team to lead their league in both scoring offense and scoring defense.
- Offensively, FSU is 5-for-5 on fourth-down conversions this season.
- In the Week 2 win over East Texas A&M, the Seminoles ran for 361 yards and passed for 368 yards, marking just the third time in program history they've had 350+ rushing and passing yards in the same game. The last FBS team to do so was Kent State in 2020.
- · Kent State is 1-2 under interim head coach Mark Carney.
- The Golden Flashes opened the season with a 21-17 win over Merrimack, snapping a 21-game losing streak dating back to Sept. 16, 2023.

Notes:

- · Saturday marks the 86th all-time meeting between the in-state rivals. Duke leads the series, 43-37-5, and has won four of the last five matchups.
- The two programs are separated by just 22 miles between Carter-Finley Stadium and Wallace Wade Stadium.
- NC State is 3-0 to start the season, coming off a 34-24 ACC road win at Wake Forest.
- Wolfpack RB Hollywood Smothers leads the ACC in rushing yards (380) and rushing yards per game (126.7). He is the first NC State player with multiple 140+ yard rushing games in a season since Andre Brown in 2005.
- · Duke enters its Homecoming game on a two-game skid but has won five straight against instate opponents. The Blue Devils' last in-state loss came to North Carolina on Nov. 11, 2023.
- Duke has won three straight ACC openers, including victories over Virginia (2022), No. 9 Clemson (2023) and North Carolina (2024).
- The Blue Devil defense ranks ninth nationally in tackles for loss per game (9.0).
- Turnovers have hurt the Blue Devils this season, as they have turned the ball over seven times (5 fumbles; 2 INTs) and just forced one turnover (fumble) on defense.

Notes:

- · Georgia Tech is 3-0 for the first time since 2016, but will be looking for its first win over Temple. The Owls won the lone previous meeting, 24-2, in 2019.
- · Georgia Tech has won seven straight games at Bobby Dodd Stadium, its longest home winning streak since winning eight in a row from 2016-17.
- The Yellow Jackets are coming off their first win over Clemson since 2014, snapping a nine-game skid to the Tigers.
- Since Brent Key's first game as head coach (Oct. 1, 2022), Georgia Tech has seven wins over AP-ranked opponents as an unranked team — the most in FBS during that span.
- GT QB Haynes King has five career games with 100+ yards both passing and rushing, tied for the third most among active FBS players.
- Temple is 2-1 under first-year head coach K.C. Keeler, who posted a 97-39 record over 11 years at Sam Houston State.
- The Owls dropped their first game of the season last week at No. 13 Oklahoma, 42-3.
- Temple's offense is 10-for-10 on red-zone opportunities (8 TDs, 2 FGs) and has yet to commit a turnover this season — one of just nine FBS teams without a giveaway.

Notes

- Saturday's matchup between Miami and Florida will mark the 58th all-time meeting in the storied series, with the Hurricanes holding a narrow 30-27 advantage.
- Miami enters at 3-0 following a dominant 49-12 win over No. 18 South Florida.
- Quarterback Carson Beck, who is 2-0 in his career against the Gators, leads the nation in completion percentage (79.3%) and ranks 11th nationally in passing efficiency (185.7).
- Defensively, the Hurricanes stand 15th in the nation in rushing defense (75.0 ypg) and have yet to surrender a fourth-down conversion this season (0-for-3).
- Florida comes in at 1-2 on the year, looking to rebound from a two-game skid.
- The Gators haven't won in Miami since September 7, 1985, when they posted a 35-23 victory.
- Despite recent losses, Florida's defense has been stout—allowing just 87.0 rushing yards per game (23rd nationally) and holding opponents to 20 points or fewer in seven straight contests.
- The Gators face a daunting path ahead, with seven of their final nine games coming against AP Top-15 teams, including five in the top 10.

- Cardinal running back Micah Ford rushed for a career-high 157 yards and a touchdown in the win over BC, his second 100-yard performance in three games this season.
- The Stanford defense is one of just 11 teams in all of FBS with two defensive touchdowns on the season, tied for first in the ACC with SMU.
- Virginia is coming off a 55-16 win at home over William & Mary in Week 3.
- The Cavaliers finished with a program-record 700 yards of total offense (379 rushing, 321 passing) in the victory over the Tribe.
- Virginia has recorded 868 passing and 800 net rushing yards this season. No other FBS team has reached each of those marks so far in 2025. (Stats Perform)
- Through the first three games, Virginia has yet to allow a sack this season. It marks the first time since 2011 that the Hoos have not allowed a sack in three consecutive games.
